ENGLISHMEN GIVE BIG ODDS.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 18.—The cricket match between the British amateur and a team of 22 "soldiers," selected from the junior members of the various Philadelphia cricket clubs, was begun at noon to-day. Robert S. Newhall the veteran player acted as captain for the colts.

The Phillies won the toss and chose to go to the bat first. While the youngsters as a rule fell easy prey to the high class bowling of the Englishmen, seven of them succeeded in getting double figures as also did Capt Newhall. The full team was retired at 148 runs.

The Brits then went to bat and when stumps were drawn for the day they had scored 41 with the loss of two wickets.

BLIZZARD ON THE CHILKOOT PASS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—A letter from Crater Lake, Alaska, dated September 2, says: "A thousand men toiled all of yesterday in a blinding storm of snow and sleet on the summit of Chilkoot Pass. The blizzard lasted from daylight until dark. An Indian chief at Dyea told me a few days ago that Chilkoot Pass would probably be blocked by snow about the 25th. He said that miners fortunate enough to have their supplies across the summit before that time would have a hard time. The river claimed, will keep open until late in November, although the lakes will probably be frozen in six weeks."

AMERICAN POLITICS.

AMERICA MUST REMEMBER THAT SHE PLAYS BUT A MINOR ROLE.

London, Sept. 20.—The Globe this afternoon in an editorial on the facility of arbitrations with a power, which disregards alike the legal prescriptions and ordinary courtesies of civilized nations, says: "Lord Salisbury has treated the United States with kindness they do not deserve. Always wearing the silk gloves, until America has forgotten the existence of the iron hand beneath it. The idea of our being afraid of a fourth rate power like the United States could only have occurred to sufferers from a severe attack of swelled head. America has lost all sense of proportion and has forgotten she plays only a minor role in the affairs of the world."

PEARY EXPEDITION ARRIVE AT SYDNEY, N. S.

SYDNEY, C. B., Sept. 20.—The Peary exploring steamer Hope arrived here at 5 p. m., all well. The Hope came in burning her last ton of coal, her bunkers having been swept clean. Her bunkers were smashed and her decks were repeatedly swept by the furious seas of an unusually stormy summer. The compass was all out of gear, and she came down on dead reckoning. She is nearly as deep in the water as when she left for the purpose of bringing back the huge Cape York meteorite. This meteorite, the largest in the world, is in the hold of the vessel, embedded in ballast in order to keep it secure from the motion of the vessel. The weight is between seventy and eighty tons. It will be conveyed direct to New York by the steamer. Lient Peary has also on board six Cape Eskimo—three men, woman, girl and boy, with tents, dogs, sledges and canoe. He communicated with the natives engaged for the North Pole expedition of 1898. All are eager for the journey.

Cape Sabine was visited and relics of the Greely horror obtained. The par-

ties landed and re-embarked as follows: Porter, Cape Haven hunting bear, etc., August 13th, Sept. 13; Lys, Godhaven August 7th, Sept. 7; Pr. F. Schubert and White, United States National Museum, Washington; one sailor at Oresund, August 28th, picked up Sept. 4th; Steia, August 10, Sept. 2nd. The summer in Baffin Bay was marked almost continuously by stormy weather and an unusual scarcity of ice. The most severe storm was luckily missed while the ship was anchored in Lively Bay, Discoe Island. Had they been out in this weather they might have fared badly.

The party consisted of 27 all told, including artist, taxidermist and surgeon. The crew numbered 17. United States National Museum representatives: Professors White and Schubert, with two others, S. Ickney and S. Shine, landed at Nouranek, near North Greenland, for four weeks, and collected fossils, plants, vertebrate, etc., conveying them to points where they were picked up by the vessel. They lived in tents and subsisted on food obtained from the Hepe. Pleasant weather was experienced till August 8th, then severe snow storms were encountered and the thermometer went 20 degrees below zero. They were pleasantly entertained by the local governor, who treated them right royally, and furnished the best of live brought from Denmark. The natives crowded round the tents and offered to sell ducks, fish, etc.

Jeunen, the Swede, your readers will remember, having his feet cut off through having been frozen and came back to civilization with the last expedition. He was again this trip and remained at the whaling station, of which he is superintendent at Baffin's Land.

Most of the party leave by rail to-morrow, some, including Lient Peary, remain a few days. The steamer comes and sails direct for New York with the meteorite. The expedition got a short distance further than the last voyage.—Halifax Chronicle.

KLONDYKE DUTIES.

FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS HAS BEEN RECEIVED FROM THE COLLECTOR.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—Mr. Davis, ex M. P., who was sent up to Fort Cudahy in September last year as a collector of customs, in Yukon country has sent another remittance to the customs department amounting to \$12,000 for duty collected to July 26th. This totals \$18,000 in duty collected since Davis arrived in Yukon. The greater part was collected from companies and about \$4,000 in gold dust was sent on to the mint at San Francisco. The letter accompanying the remittance contains a news-Record.

ANOTHER PIGEON.

A WHALING SHIP CAPTURES A PIGEON SENT OUT BY PROF. ANDRÉ.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 20.—A despatch received here from Hammerfest, in Norway, says the whaling ship Falkena has brought there the third pigeon despatch sent by Prof. Andree, who left the Island Orso in a balloon on July 1st last on an attempt to cross the polar region. The message brought by the Falkena reads: "July 13, 12.30 p. m.; latitude 82° N.; longitude 12.3 east. Good voyage eastward, all well."

DECISION GIVEN.

ON THE DISPUTED SECTION OF THE PENINSULA ACT.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—It is announced this morning that Attorney General McKenna's decision on section 22 of the tariff law will be given to the public after the cabinet meeting to-day. The friends of the western continental railroads who have been watching the matter closely are greatly discouraged to-day and are strongly of the opinion that the decision will be against them. Senator Elkins, who has been here for several days in the interest of a construction of the section that will be favorable both to American railroads and the American merchant marine, practically gave up the fight this morning. He believes the decision will impose the discriminating duty of 10 per cent. only on goods of foreign countries imported into Canada or Mexico for consumption and re-imported there into the United States and will not apply to goods coming into the United States from consular countries under consular seal. He was at the White House this morning and made a final appeal to the President in behalf of his own construction of the section.

LATER.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Attorney General McKenna to-day announced his opinion in the matter of section 22 of the new tariff law.

He holds in effect that goods coming

directly into the United States from foreign countries through Canadian ports are not subject to the discriminating duty of ten per cent.

He also holds that foreign goods shipped from countries other than British possessions in British vessels are not subject to the discriminating duty.

Two questions were asked the attorney general, the first of which was in effect whether the discriminating duty of 10 per cent. provided for in section 22 should be assessed against an invoice of tea from China, which had arrived at Vancouver in British vessel and thence shipped through Canada to Chicago.

The second question was whether the discriminating duty should be assessed against a cargo of manganese ore from Chile, which recently arrived in a British ship at Philadelphia.

Both these questions the Attorney General answered in the negative.

LOBSTERS.

The catch of lobsters on the Maine coast this year has not been good, and the falling off is attributed to violent storms which have raged there and as far as Nova Scotia. Lobsters are becoming scarcer every year, but under the new law, which is being strictly enforced that prohibits the canning of lobsters for two years, Mr. Marston, of the firm of C. W. Marston & Co., lobster dealers of Portland, Me., thinks the catch will improve. He says that in Nova Scotia they will can anything, meaning short or underized lobsters, and that this is what is ruining the fisheries.

Lobsters were formerly caught in great numbers about Shelburne, N. S., but now few are found there, and the fisherman go farther East for them. New Brunswick is only furnishing enough for home consumption.

The United States Government is making an effort on the Maine coast to improve the lobster fisheries which are suffering from the almost unanimous support of the lobster merchants and fishermen. A Government vessel has patrolled every section of the Maine coast, and the orders of its skipper are to purchase all the seed lobsters he can find at market rates. Before there was a fine of \$5 for fishermen having those lobsters in their possession, and when

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
