## Abbie Wood Beats Fred Cameron.

Amherst Crack Loses by Ten Yards—Montreal Champion Won in Sensational Sprint—Time for Ten Miles Was 55.42—Another Match Soon

Amherst, N. S., Sept. 24.—Amherst is in mourning tonight; its peerless winner, Fred S. Cameron, went down to defeat in his first professional race against Abbie Wood of Montreal.

The race was witnessed by fully 2,000 people, and was uneventful throughout. Wood had the pole but before the lap was finished Cameron took the lead and the first two miles and a half was reeled off in quick order.

Wood then forged to front and Cameron allowed him to set the pace until five miles were reached. Wood took his time the five miles being run in 27.18.

For the last five miles Cameron led with Wood close on his heels. Lap after lap was run off in this order. In only one instance did Cameron make one of his spurts and Wood responded freely. The runners were so evenly matched that the spectators saw that both were depending on the finish sprint.

In the final Cameron led the three-quarters of the lap when Wood

put on a burst of speed, never equalled on the Ramblers' grounds, and breasted the lap about ten yards ahead of the Amherst champion.

That Cameron's supporters were disappointed in putting it mildly, but although he has been defeated they have still faith in him. They realize that Wood is probably the best man in Canada, but they claim that his wide experience in running enabled him to out-general Cameron and that the latter made a mistake in allowing the Montreal man set the pace in the earlier portion of the race.

Both men finished fresh and were in condition to go another ten miles. Another race between the two rivals will take place on the Ramblers' ground within a fortnight and a third race has been arranged to be held in Montreal in the near future.

Wood is a fine type of athlete and made a host of friends here. The time for the race was 55.42. On the same track last fall Cameron defeated Fowler in 54.46.

## DEATH OF C. N. SKINNER

Represented St. John in Dominion Parliament From 1887 to 1892

St. John, Sept. 22.—C. N. Skinner, K. C., City Recorder, died tonight after a lengthy illness. In Hon. Mr. Skinner was born in 1733, his father being a native of Nova Scotia. Called to the bar in 1860, he early entered politics and was elected a member of the New Brunswick parliament before Confederation.

## Many Mourn for Governor Fraser

All Classes at the Funeral—Prominent Men Pay Last Tribute of Respect—Twenty-Five Clergymen, Politicians and Business Men at Ceremony.

New Glasgow, Sept. 29.—Slowly through the streets of his native town, which mourns the death of its distinguished son, the body of the late Duncan C. Fraser, Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia, was conveyed this afternoon to its last resting place in the family lot at Riverside cemetery.

New Glasgow mourns deeply for the departed governor and the long procession through the streets this afternoon will long be remembered by those who thronged the route of the cortege. The funeral of Governor Fraser was the largest ever seen in New Glasgow, representative of the masses as well as the classes. In the cortege were men from every branch of life. As early as yesterday distinguished men of the province arrived in New Glasgow to pay their last respects to the dead governor.

The residence of the late Harvey Graham, brother-in-law of Governor Fraser, where the body lay, was the centre of the thoughts of New Glasgow citizens and visitors, and hundreds of friends viewed the body that lay encased in the simple black coffin in the large drawing room.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. W. McMillan, of St. Matthew's church, Halifax, assisted by the Rev. Ernest Forbes, New Glasgow; Rev. Dr. Poole, and Rev. E. A. McCurdy.

Immediately after the service those who wished to see the governor's face passed through the drawing room to the coffin. When the hearse having the body of Governor Fraser had passed the top of Provost street, the carriages in the procession had not all left the Harvey Graham residence, a quarter of a mile distant. In the procession were twenty-five clergymen, representing the various churches and denominations of the province, followed by representatives of the grand lodge of Free Masons of Nova Scotia. Following the Masons were members of the local legislature. The dominion parliament was represented by William Chisholm, M. P., Antigonish; Senator Ross, Halifax; Senator McSweeney, Moncton, and D. D. MacKenzie. Following were the judges of the supreme court, including Chief Justice Townsend, ex-Chief Justice Sir Robert Wetherbee, Judge Drysdale and Judge Meagher of the county court. General Drury, of Halifax, represented the governor of New Brunswick; the governor of Quebec being represented by Col. Fages; Commissioner Coombes, of the Salvation Army, was represented by Staff Capt. Jennings.

Robert Buchanan, who played the accompaniments and also solos on the piano, is a musician of a high order. Craighall Sherry the elocutionist, was at home in both humorous and pathetic readings bending the hearers to his own mood. Mr. Sherry is also a good singer. He was frequently encored. The troupe deserved all the nice things that have been said about them—Advocate.

## Inquest on Death of Charlottetown Man.

Roused from Sleep and Was Ill-treated By Three Young Men—His Wife Found Him Dead, Lying on Kitchen Floor with Head Bruised.

Charlottetown, Sept. 24.—An inquest is being held by Dr. Dougherty, the coroner, into the death of Geo. Holmes, a well known blacksmith of Victoria, aged 46.

The deceased retired early Thursday night in his usual good health and about 12 o'clock he was roused from sleep by three young men who had been attending the exhibition in

Charlottetown. They brought liquor with them and treated Mr. Holmes between four and five o'clock yesterday morning. Mrs. Holmes was shocked on finding the lifeless body of her husband on the floor of the kitchen lying close to a chair from which he had evidently fallen. There was a bruise on the side of his head evidently caused by the fall.

## BLESSED HALF MILLION CATHOLIC DEAD

Archbishop Bruchesi Hopes That Religious Barriers Will Be Swept Away, and That One Cemetery Will Hold All.

Montreal, Sept. 18.—The feature of the annual ceremony of blessing the half million dead lying in the Catholic cemetery behind Mount Royal this afternoon, was the reference by Archbishop Bruchesi to the recent Eucharistic Congress. His Grace paid an eloquent tribute to "The support received from our separated brethren," and added, he hoped the time was coming when through the mercy of God there would be but one cemetery in Montreal, and that all religious barriers separating the people would disappear.

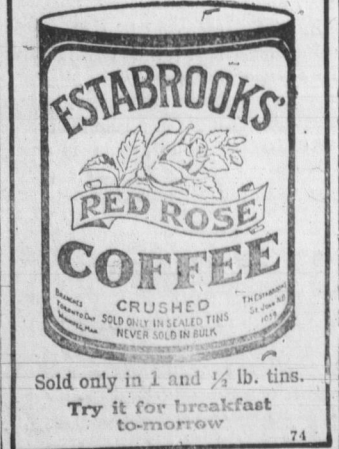

A timely article on the mail order business and its harmfulness to the maritime provinces appears in September's number of the Busy East.

Nearly \$2,000,000 went out of this province alone last year to swell the pockets of the Upper Canadian millionaire and he spends not a penny towards the support of New Brunswick's industries. Your home merchant does and you should endeavor to help him along. Again, your money helps to increase the business of the Toronto and Montreal mail order houses to such an extent that they must have larger quarters. This increases the real estate value of those cities. But is your real estate in Montreal or in Chatham, and where would it be to your advantage to have this increase?

The local merchant carefully stocks his store with the more staple lines in his business and if he does not carry the particular article you wish to get, give him a chance to get it for you. In nine cases out of ten he is enterprising and only too willing to go out of the beaten track to meet your wishes if you give him a chance. ## ARRESTED FOR THEFT AND FORGERY

Three Boys in Jail at Dalhousie Who Claim They Belong to Moncton.

Dalhousie, N. B., Sept. 26.—Willard Price, Robert Hicks, and Roy Heath have been arrested here and placed in the county jail charged with theft and forgery. They were working with the Dalhousie Lumber Co., on the Southwest, and when they left, a valuable revolver, a safety razor and several articles of clothing were missed. They were followed to Charlottetown, where they were placed under arrest but were not searched. When lodged in jail yesterday, Officer Geo. Seely took each aside, but got nothing but denials. He placed them in other cells and after a search found the articles under the floor in the cellar of the jail. Besides the theft they forged an order on the Dalhousie Lumber Co. for \$61. They confessed to the theft. They said they came from Moncton, having been sent here by an agent of the Dalhousie Lumber Co.

Chief of Police Rideout, when asked about the above report, said he knew nothing about the affair, and does not know of any boys from Moncton giving the names mentioned above.

## LEWIS TO GET \$1,000,000 HOTEL

Quebec, Sept. 28.—A million dollar hotel for the town of Lewis is the latest good fortune which has befallen that municipality. It is said that the construction of the new hotel will be started next spring and the building will contain between six and seven hundred rooms.

Mr. Charles Murray Colmey, of New York, the promoter of the project, having petitioned the council of Lewis, asking that the town grant Shaw Park as the site for the new hotel, the question came up at a meeting of the council last night, when every alderman present showed himself favorable.

Mr. Colmey explains in his letter that the Quebec Central and Grand Trunk Railroads are interested in the construction of the new hotel. Shaw Park is on the heights and is a magnificent location.

## NOVA SCOTIA GOVERNORSHIP

Position May Go to Sir Frederick Borden

Toronto, Sept. 28.—The World, Conservative, gives currency to a report that Sir Frederick Borden will be the next Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia.

The expenditure of \$248,000 for the coming year's work was provided for by the home mission committee of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which held its annual meeting here yesterday. The committee in order to meet its obligations next spring, will require from ordinary sources about \$77,000 more than these sources yielded last year.

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## RAILWAY OFFICIAL LAUDS DOUKHOBORS

Can. North. Freight Agent Astonished at Progressiveness Displayed by Veregin Colony.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 27.—George Stephen, general freight agent of the Canadian Northern Railway, who has returned from a visit to the Doukhobor colony at Veregin, is very enthusiastic over those much-abused people.

"While I always understood that the Doukhobors were progressive," said Mr. Stephen, "I was simply astonished at their progressiveness and modern methods. Threshing operations commenced last week, and no less than forty threshing outfits, owned outright and manned by the Doukhobors themselves, commenced work with instructions to operate in two shifts of twelve hours each, that is day and night, until all the grain has been threshed. This year's crop of grain, particularly in oats, is the largest harvested by the Doukhobors since they came to Canada, and it is expected that threshing operations will continue well into November.

"In addition to the raising of grain the Doukhobors are engaged in horse raising. They have also an up-to-date flour mill with a capacity of 200 barrels per day. Then, too, they manufacture brick on a reasonably large scale and find a ready market for all they can produce.

"While Veregin is the headquarters of the Doukhobor society, the people, who number about 7,000 are distributed throughout the territory occupied by them into forty-one villages, each of which has a population of from 100 to 200.

"Another feature indicating the progressiveness of the Doukhobors is their private long distance telephone system of some 100 miles. I believe that the Doukhobors are an acquisition to Western Canada. They are producers in the fullest meaning of the word."

## MORE FEVER

Several new cases of typhoid fever have developed this week, and one death, that of Alexander Montgomery aged 21 years, has taken place. Conditions are about the same this week as last. The hospital is overflowing and many patients cannot be properly attended to.

## THE BEAVER DAM NUISANCE

Beavers are multiplying and getting bold. They are disputing with the farmers and lumbermen the right to the streams. They have recently dammed Ledmeadow Brook, between Doaktown and Bartholomew, the dams being one hundred yards long, flooding the meadows and preventing the driving of logs. Game Warden Robinson, of Doaktown, has obtained authority for cutting the dams and forcing the builders to go elsewhere. Beavers have also dammed the south branch of Muzera Brook, flooding the road leading to the sportsmen's camp at Layton Brook to the depth of three feet. High-bank Brook near Beaver River, has been dammed by these animals this fall, and the I. C. R. water supply has been partially cut off, so that an application has been made for permission to cut the dam and force the beavers to build their winter home elsewhere. It will soon be time to thin out the beavers by trapping and shooting. It is unkind to protest them from the hunter and refuse them the dam privileges that are necessary to their existence.—World.

## ITALY'S KING HAS NARROW ESCAPE

Threw Himself to the Ground in Time to Escape Being Struck by Aeroplane

Milan, Sept. 28.—King Victor Emmanuel and his cousin, the Count of Turin, had a narrow escape from a serious accident today, while inspecting the aeroplanes at the Aerodrome here. The aviator, Simon, failed to observe that the king and the count were walking directly in front of him, and started his machine. It swept toward them at full speed. There were loud cries from the alarmed spectators, and a warning call to lie down. The sovereign and the count threw themselves to the ground and the machine just cleared them.
