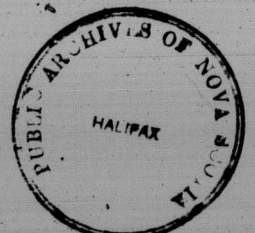

Sketches from the South.

Continued.

After leaving this honorable gentleman we visited the president. The presidential mansion, since the destruction of the palace, is a plain, wooden building, situate in a central part of the town. In front of the building, and along the street leading to it, are stationed, what I suppose they call

LA GARDE NATIONALE. Their uniforms recommend them to attention, for with the country's defense they are without doubt the best discipline and most efficient soldiery in the world. The invariable uniform of the private seems to be blue drill, more or less shabby. This sameness would be wearisome, were it not for the infinite variety of hats they wear.

They pass the time most agreeably in drinking, sleeping, smoking and playing cards. Thus they cultivate the arts of peace rather than of war. They have no record of target practice to give to the world, the bugbear drill never interferes with their happiness, but they are fond of arms when "piled," and the great pleasure in contemplating them in that position, their penchant to retire early in a fight has hitherto prevented accurate tests of their bravery being made, but it is said that remarkable courage and fortitude have been displayed by such of them as have been detailed for shooting parties at the execution of political offenders.

Passing these under the aegis of the Government we went through a waiting room into the business apartment of the President's private secretary. We had a few minutes conversation with him, during which our names were sent up to the President and his pleasure sought in the matter of giving us an audience. In the meantime, while not talking I had an opportunity to contemplate the limited, but varied prospect formed by the open back door of the apartment, leading into the back yard of the premises. Immediately outside the door were ranged more of the afore-said guard. In every respect they were the same as their brethren at arms, except that perhaps they were a little more noisy in their games, and a trifle worse for use or ornament.

A dirty stream traversed the length of the yard on the right side of which was a low outhouse, probably a kitchen, in the open doors of which appeared at intervals women and children, presumably the servants of His Excellency. One or two small black pigs, attenuated, but not pale, with snouts of greyhound, "long drawn out," gave remarkable promise of racing qualities, as they foraged on either side the stream. A horse was tied in one corner, a small child played in the refreshing coolness of no clothing, a gorgeous rooster strutted among some mosses, and given

terribly irate at the mouth gambols of the pigs, who occasionally amused themselves by giving their tails an extra kick, snorting two or three times successively in an absorbed kind of way, then dashing of at a mad pace, only to be arrested by the president's aide-de-camp, an individual in a most gaudy uniform of loose rose-colored pants, a military coat, epaulettes and glittering with gold lace, a cocked hat, gay with feathers, and boots that were the perfection of "shine." He conducted us upstairs into the presence of

THE PRESIDENT.

We found seated upon a sofa in his reception room a slight old man of medium height, with a benevolent expression of countenance, and the color of a dark mulatto. His head and his forehead are well shaped and Caucasian; his mouth and nose more Ethiopian, yet not strongly marked as such. He had gray, curly hair and a gray moustache, and his face was fringed with light gray side-whiskers meeting around his throat. We had rather a lengthened conversation, from which I derived the most agreeable impressions of his Excellency. He is said to be a rare exception to the chief rulers of Hayti hitherto. The report of him is that he is eminently religious, kind and charitable. That he possesses these exemplary virtues my personal observation of him leads me faithfully to believe. It is true that he lacks the conscious dignity and pride, the regal reserve, which are incidental, nay, becoming to rulers, equally true to me, I think, that his want of mental force makes him to some extent the shuttlecock of his ministers, but I remember him as a plain, kind old man, with pleasant, affectionate ways, and a kindly face, over which, in repose, there sometimes came a weary, thoughtful expression that told of a mind ill at ease with his position.

POMP OF POWER.

State pageantry seems to have waned in Hayti since the withdrawal of Jefferson, the President preceding Salnave, under whom the Emperor Shenlouque, who took upon himself the title of Faustus 1st, it is said to have flourished and grown to most regal proportions. Shenlouque wore a crown and kingly robes and spoke right regally from a throne. These emblems of royalty disappeared at the advent of a revived republic under Jefferson, but this President, an educated and accomplished man, at present resident in Jamaica, maintained with democratic zeal the exterior majesty of the chief ruler's position. He delighted to live in the air and perfume of a royalty created by himself. He rode in a blaze of magnificence, conspicuous among his escort of brilliantly uniformed, well-mounted officers. He was faultless in his etiquette, a marvel of gracious manners, and a most agreeable conversationalist. His receptions distinguished foreigners are said to have been very grand affairs indeed. Many of his soldiers were clothed in the brilliant Zouave costume, and all well-clothed and better disciplined than at present. Although the obnoxious throne was removed from the salle de reception in the palace, yet its other adornments were increased. Six or seven thoroughly perfected military bands were always in attendance upon state occasions. The palace grounds were artistically laid out by French gardeners, a decorated with fountains, rare trees and flowers. He projected and carried out many public works either of utility or luxury. He endeavored to inspire the people with a proper regard for their nationality, and under his regime for many years, the Republic is said to have enjoyed a remarkable degree of prosperity and financial credit. But he lost the people's confidence. Were he perfect as a ruler this would probably have been equally the case. A nice little revolution of the kind so common in Hayti taught him the uncertainty of all earthly things, and banished him inexorably from the island. The revolution, however, are that he was licentious, in a country where almost everybody is so, that in the latter years of his rule he was guilty of gross profligation of the public monies, and that he was cruel. The present President is said to be none of these. He abhors military executions, and always leans to the side of mercy. He possesses no vices and everybody bears witness to his unassuming charity and scrupulous honesty. Under the present constitution of the country, the chief executive officer is degraded of much power, but a man of many character and decided opinions can, by a firm stand, generally mould affairs conformable to his will, for the reason that in many cases his party are dependent for their political, yea, physical existence upon a popular ruler who represents them, and herein is said to consist the chief weakness of President Nissage Saget, viz: that he is weak and irresolute, and that he allows himself to be too much swayed by the Cabinet. Although a man of fair intellect, finding that he cannot exercise it untrammelled, he weakly gives his sanction in matters of administration to what involves a sacrifice of cherished opinions and predilections, which if manfully stood up for would in many cases import more of justice and less of vicious diplomacy into the management of affairs. He is said to be a brave man, although one who has an aversion for bloodshed. A character and disposition like this unfit him for the position he occupies. His various qualities are traded upon by designing supporters, and without being made beneficial as examples or potent in the government of the country. Hayti too must be ruled, not reasoned with, until at least the absence of anarchy shall improve the understanding of the people. The weal of the country so much depends upon the capacity of its chief executive officer is proven by its unparalleled prosperity under President Boyer, when there was an overflowing treasury and a thriving people, and the only encumbrance upon the resources of the country, viz: the tribute to France for the acknowledgment of its independence was rapidly reduced by annual instalments, which were paid in gold almost as soon as the French frigates sent for its collection dropped anchor in the harbor of Port au Prince. At the time of Shenlouque, the Emperor, a negro of but little education, but considerable ability and great force of character, the Island is said to have been very prosperous for a time.

I have already mentioned the status of the country under President Jefferson, and there are other examples to prove the powerful influence that the chief ruler of administrative ability and decided character has been able to exercise in the councils and administration of the government of the republic, and the powerful impulse the properly directed talents of such a person have invariably given to the country's prosperity.

I saw the president several times afterwards. One day in company with my friend our stay at the Executive Mansion was necessarily delayed until his dinner hour. He invited us to dine with him. The day was Friday, and the dinner a very plain one, for the President consistently carries his observance of the rules of his Church into private life. But there was a bottle of good Bordeaux on the table, from the contents of which the President drank in a silver goblet—we in plain glass. Then the milk of human kindness was there, and with the wine, and above all the proper regard for conscience, atoned for what might have been a want in the entertainment.

THE GOVERNMENT.

Another day my friend and I were

present at a meeting of the President and Council in the matter of my friend's business with the government. The Council consists of four members, viz: the Minister of Justice, Minister of Marine, &c., Minister of the Interior, Minister of Finance. The Minister of Justice is a tall, partly good-looking man of reputed good ability. His complexion is dark, not more so though than if bronzed by the sun, and his structure very different to the least, as to whether there is any negro blood in his composition. The difficulty of deciding this question will appear from the fact that there are no very accurate records of pedigree kept in this country, the people are reverently anxious to preserve their genealogy, and the presence or want of exact amount of shade in a man's complexion cannot be accurately reckoned by his color or appearance. The Minister of Marine, &c., I have described already. M. Laporte, the Minister of Finance, is a venerable-looking old man, garrulous in a weak voice, and apparently white. Whether from the infirmity of age or want of natural ability or what he is said to be unfit for his position and unpopular. Apparently his son is the jealous guardian of his father's honor, for, during my stay at Port au Prince, or just before he fought a bloodless duel with a person, whose name I have forgotten, the cause of which is said to have originated in some attack made by the young man's opponent upon the private or political reputation of his father.

GENERAL LOQUET.

The Minister of the Interior, General Loquet, is perhaps the most popular and influential member of the Government. He is a man I should think, of between forty-five and fifty years of age, with the color of a light mulatto, curly, iron grey hair and a bristling, clipped moustache of the same color. He has a thoughtful, very intelligent-looking face, to which the harsh lines about his mouth, and rather cold-looking gray eyes, that impart a severe expression when you look closely at him. But then these are but the outward features, which might naturally leave their imprint on their faces. Loquet was a prominent leader of his party with the last revolution. He fought bravely and well, until the war ended with the flight of Salnave. He commanded the escort that brought the unfortunate ex-president a prisoner into the capital. Under the advice and with the concurrence of his colleagues he ordered and presided over the shooting of Salnave's generals and ministers outside of the town, and he was one of the tribunal who tried their leader, and now he is one of the ministry, and a wall of support to the government; and yet I do not believe him to be a cruel man, except from necessity. His manner is reserved, but agreeable, and invites your confidence and respect. His whole deportment is that of a gentleman, and he entertains hospitably and well in a house whose interior convenience and luxuries denote the rank and refined tastes of his owner.

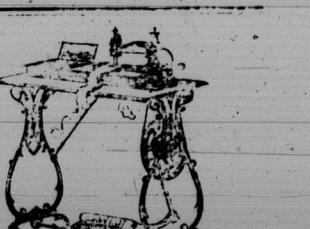
