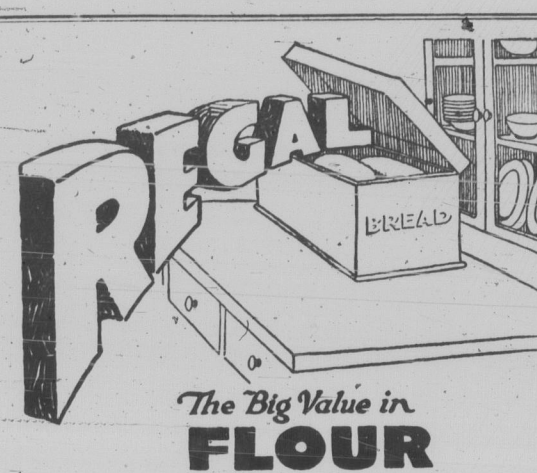

Dear Sir:

In a previous letter on Evasion of Military Service, I showed how one young man had been punished and how his father had been arrested for assisting him. Since that time the father has been sentenced to one month's imprisonment at hard labour, fined \$4500.00 and has a further suspended sentence of three years in the penitentiary.

In sentencing this man, Mr. Justice Lennox said in part, "that disloyalty is one of the gravest offences and there is no ground nor excuse for anyone in Canada being guilty of disloyalty." "That Weber was a public man and a leader in his community yet he discouraged his two sons to evade the service of their Country, in connection with the war and in defiance of the duties of citizenship."

These remarks fully apply to the case and men whom I am discussing, they assume to be prominent men, to be educated men, all hold public offices and are in receipt of salaries from the State.

I have before me official copies of J. Allan LeBlanc's exemption papers and shall first submit a medical certificate.

Copy:—
"Re: exemption granted J. Allan LeBlanc, serial No. 35956 P. C. Question: "State what you know of health of the father of the above exempted man and to what extent he is able to work?"

Answer:—"Have been on medical attendance on Alex. J. LeBlanc, the father of the above exempted man for seventeen years. He has always been in poor health, and is at present suffering with liver trouble. His heart and eyes are also seriously affected. He is able to do about 25 per cent of his work."

Dated at Dalhousie this 9th day of August 1918.

The above answers are correct. I understand that any misstatement renders me liable to punishment."

The three first clauses in this statement are vague. One might have "attended on a patient for seventeen years, seeing him half a dozen times for house calls." "His heart and liver are affected, this should be specific, either too much drink or cold feet might explain these conditions. I shall discuss the 75 per cent disability and eyesight later.

I shall now quote statements made by J. Allan LeBlanc in November 1917, repeated with additions in June and October, 1918 to secure exemptions and extensions. I shall only include the more important statements. Serial No. 35956, name J. Allan LeBlanc. "My father Alex. J. LeBlanc Postmaster and Town Clerk of Dalhousie, (he leaves out that he is also County Secretary) has been sickly for a great number of years and has been continuously under medical care and treatment. Of late years he has been getting weaker and to-day (17th Oct. 1918) is not capable of doing more than 25 per cent of his work and I have been doing it myself since the date of your last order" (June 11th, 1918) granting me an extension.

"It takes every cent to keep affairs going, and while I have not contributed more than fifty in cash since my return here, I have as before stated done over seventy-five per cent of my father's work, practically all of it."

"If I were conscripted he would have to resign his position and the family would suffer."

Since that date (Nov. 1917) my father has been growing weaker and on the advice of his physician, N. Doucet of Dalhousie, N. B., it is necessary for me to go home to relieve him of much of the work which he is now doing and which is beyond his strength."

The latter statement is dated 11th June, 1918.

The above answers are correct and I understand that any misstatement will make me liable to punishment.

In a statement of C. G. S. Asprey, Dominion policeman dated Oct. 19th, 1918, he says: "Inquired from Dr. N. Doucet to-day regarding father's health, who said, 'father has liver trouble and bad eyesight, cannot see' (Continued on page 3)

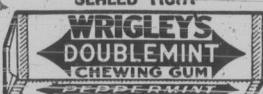
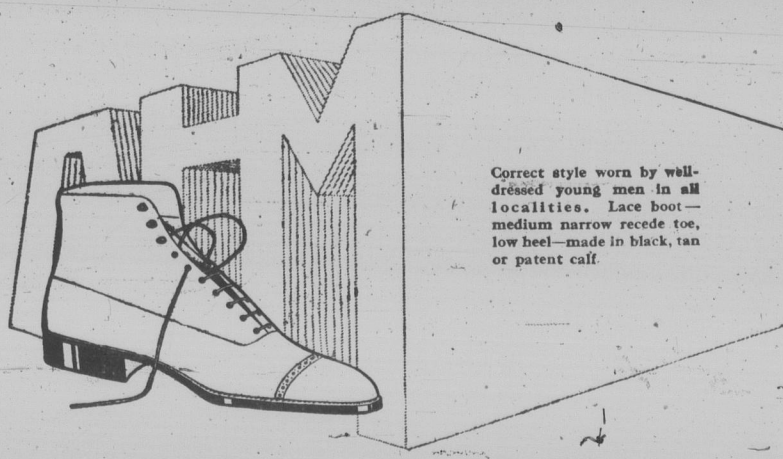

to read and write more than one hour
at a time."

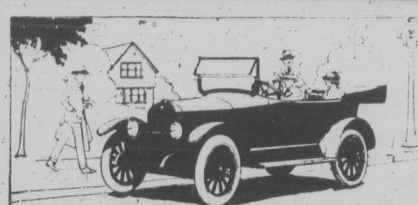
Now what are the facts?

Take the period from November
1st, 1917 to Feb. 1st, 1919.Alex. J. LeBlanc had one trivial
illness in Aug. 1918 which confined
him to the house a few days. From Nov.
1917 he performed his duties of Post-
master, Town and County Clerk, in
exactly the same manner as in all
previous years. The work of Town
Clerk was greater in that period than
ever before, very heavy in fact, it
took him to Fredericton and Bathurst.
He did all the work of County Secy.,
at the meeting in Jan. 1918 and in
Jan. 1919, four days continual writ-
ing and on the latter date, on his own
confession sat up one night, writing,
till 3 a.m.In addition he collected for the Victo-
ry Loan in 1917, for the K. of C. in
1918 and was so energetic that he
tried to secure the Victory Loan col-
lection in 1918.He was so well that all during the
season of 1918, in all weathers, at all
times of day and night, he personally
operated a motor car for hire. He
drives hard, very fast, an impossibil-
ity if his eyes were bad or his heart
out of order.He is so vigorous that in Nov. 1918
he assaulted a young man 25 years
younger than himself, causing painful
injuries.A 75 per cent. disability puts a man
out of business, he is practically bed-
ridden, or confined to his house much
of the time. It is notorious that this
man was up and about all this
period and that he is rarely in bed
before one, two or three o'clock in
the morning.It was said to the writer by two
members of the council at the 1919
meeting how much better Alex. J. Le-
Blanc was than five or six years be-
fore.Every statement made here can be
confirmed by any residents of Dal-
housie who has any regard for the
truth. Every member of the County
Council can prove that Alex. J. Le-
Blanc performed all his duties in
1919 as in previous years and that his
eye-sight was as keen and he was up
to his usual standard."It takes every cent to keep things
going."Alex. J. LeBlanc's salaries from
public offices are about \$2400.00 a
year, he has enough private income
to bring this up to about \$3000.00 a
year. He owns two valuable dwelling
houses, three shops, a motor car, horse,
carriage, cows, twelve valuable town
lots and wears a fur coat, market
value \$500.00. Since these statements
were made in October last, he has
purchased another shop and house,
the Murphy Hotel. He is reported to
have said in his son's office "that he
regretted he had not purchased a
\$6000.00 property, that was on the
market some time before, and that he
was now open to purchase any good
property that came on the market."One very bad feature is the brazen
indifference of the men concerned to
public opinion. It has been a matter
of ordinary conversation here, how
young LeBlanc had bragged and
boasted to a friend how he had fooled
the Tribunal in St. John, and had ac-
cused "deception by lying about his
father's health. This person can be
produced when required."At a semi-public meeting which he
recently addressed here, J. Allan Le-
Blanc is reported to have said "he had
done nothing to be ashamed of he could
hold his head as high as anyone in
Dalhousie."He forgets the "Fisher" proverb,
"A man's word is his bond, and he
will be found out."Our Mayor and Chief Magistrate,
W. S. Montgomery by his habitual of-
ficial association with these men and
keeping them in office argues that
these are the men he delights to hon-
our, that he approves of, disloyalty
and that he gives aid, comfort and
assistance to enemies of our King
and Country.These men believe themselves above
the law apparently, and that they and
their friends have sufficient influence
to prevent the New Brunswick authori-
ties, taking action against them. It
is remarked how many people have
expressed the same view. I also be-
lieve that the authorities of the Prov-
ince will take no action in these cases,
if left to themselves.I first applied for copies of these
exemption papers to the authorities in
St. John and met a curt refusal.I then sought them through a friend
in Ottawa, a member of the Union
Government, who got them through
the War Department.

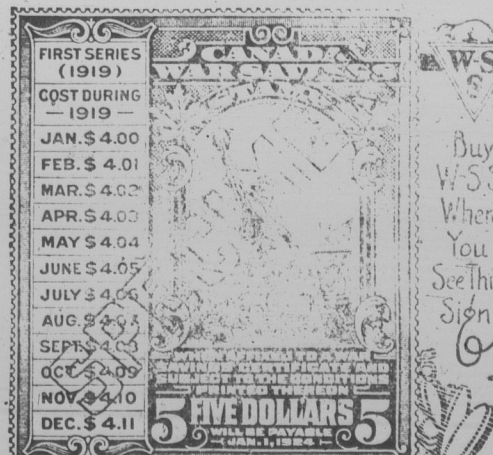

HOPETOWN

Influenza is still in our midst and many a home is mourning the loss of some dear one. On Saturday last another loss was sustained by the death of a kind neighbor and friend in the person of Mrs. Elias McRae who leaves besides her sorrowful husband, seven young children, the youngest seven days old.

In spite of bad roads, the funeral was largely attended. The Rev. Rural Dean Buckland held a short service at the house and also at the Church and gave a very helpful and sympathetic address from the 15th Chapter of the 1st Corinthians.

This is one of the many rural parishes where the people are so poor that they are unable to procure proper medical attention that a wide awake Board of Health should venture a qualified trained nurse. Sanitary arrangements are in many of the houses and unless proper treatment, apart from an occasional visit from the medical officer the present epidemic may not be stamped out for some time.

Our young soldiers are returning from overseas, confident that the English are in the minority. Hopetown gave the largest majority of men for overseas service from any other parish on the Coast. Hats off to the returned men and those who are in our midst with gold stripes on their arms.

Ground Limestone For The Soils

"A limestone country is a rich lime. If this is exposed to the air
country." This is a proverb and it gradually absorbs carbon dioxide,
trium much older than American agriculture. But every soil can be
made a limestone soil, simply by liberal applications of pulverized lime-
stone. The initial application of two
tons per acre of ground limestone, with
subsequent applications of pulverized
limestone is the first great economic
step to be taken in that positive soil
enrichment which is needed to treble
the average acre-yield of the land now
under cultivation and to restore to
profitable agricultural use the vast
areas of tillable land now lying neg-
lected or agriculturally abandoned in
most Southern States.

In the northern part of the South-
land, especially in the Piedmont and
intermountain regions, some soils are
found for whose permanent improve-
ment ground limestone is all the far-
mer needs to buy, although as a gen-
eral rule phosphates must also be ap-
plied; and in many cases, especially on
the more sandy soils of the Coastal
Plain, potash salts must likewise be
added. In a few places soils have been
found which, though deficient in
potassium (the important plant-food
element contained in potash salts), are
naturally rich in phosphates (com-
pounds containing the element phos-
phorus), and thus require the purchase
of only limestone and potash salts.

Southern farm soils are almost in-
variably sour, or acid, in other
words, they contain essentially less
than no limestone, for moderate ap-
plications of limestone will be destroy-
ed by the soil acidity. Thus one may
apply one ton of ground limestone per
acre to certain land and still have no
limestone in the soil, or a four-ton
application may leave only three tons
for future benefit, after the acidity ex-
isting in the plowed soil has been
neutralized.

Limestone and Legumes

With liberal applications of lime-
stone (and phosphorus or potassium
added, if needed) most Southern soils
can be made to produce abundant crops
of such valuable biennial or peren-
nial legumes as red clover, alfalfa,
clover, sweet clover (mellilotus) and
alfalfa; and these when infected with
the proper bacteria have direct access
almost twelve months in the year, to
the inexhaustible supply of nitrogen in
the air. The biennial and perennial
legumes store up very much more
nitrogen and organic matter in their
roots than do the annual plants, such
as corn, and one seeding (some-
times with a nurse crop and with no
extra preparation of the seed bed) may
provide a legume crop to occupy the
land for from two years to five
years or more.

These deep-rooting legumes are the
"best subsiders," and in many ways
they are the best soil-improving
crops. Furthermore, they are splen-
did pasture crops, and if not cropped
too closely (a bad practice for any
pasture) they will furnish grazing
from early spring till early winter.
These are among the most valuable
crops in profitable live-stock farming;
and nothing is needed more for the
development of live stock in the South.
Moreover, clover and alfalfa are the
best crops to precede corn, as is well
known by every corn-belt farmer.
Limestone and legumes must consti-
tute the foundation for corn and
cattle in the South.

Kinds of Lime.

Ordinary limestone is calcium car-
bonate (CaCO₃) composed of the
three primary elements, calcium, car-
bon, and oxygen, as anyone might
know from the name if he will only
remember that the ending "ate" on
the more common chemical names,
signifies oxygen.

When 100 pounds of pure limestone
are burned, 44 pounds of the gas (oxi-
de) are driven off, and 56 pounds of
quicklime, or calcium oxide remain.
Quicklime is ordinary fresh-burned
caustic lime. When moistened, the
56 pounds of quicklime takes up 18
pounds of water and make 74 pounds
of water-slicked, or hydrated, caustic

Uses of Lime.

Ordinary limestone serves two very
important purposes in soil improve-
ment. One is to correct the acidity of
sour soils, and the other is to supply
the element calcium as plant food;
and in most soils calcium is much
more deficient than potassium, and
even more deficient than phosphorus
in many soils.

The Kind of Lime to Use.

According to the dictionaries, the
word caustic means "capable of de-
stroying the texture of anything by
eating away its substance by chemi-
cal action." This definition well de-
scribes the destructive action of caustic
lime on the humus or vegetable matter
of the soil, and when the "vegetable
matter is destroyed the nitrogen which
it contains is liberated and in part
dissipated, so that the use of caustic
lime, whether fresh-burned or hydrat-
ed, augments the difficulty of increas-
ing or maintaining the humus or ni-
trogenous vegetable matter of the soil.
This problem is already serious enough
in Southern agriculture, and if possi-
ble we should avoid burning the
humus out of the soil with caustic
lime.
