Great Brita, France and Italy Will Not Refuse to Consider Any Serious Proposal Regarding Methods of Reparations Payments, But Will Decline To Discuss Any Suggestion From German Officials as to Reductions From

· London, April 5.-Although the British Government has not eceived in full from the British representatives in Berlin the note sent by the United States secretary of state to Berlin on the German reparations question, the official British opinion is, it was learned today, that Germany failed dismally in her attempt at a new method of solving the reparations problem—that of approaching the United States for assistance. British officials gather from the press reports that Secretary Hughes' note indicates a refusal by the United States to be a party to any German attempt to escape responsibility for the war and reparations payments. It is believed here that Germany's next move will be a direct approach to the allies. As to this, it is said in official quarters, no German proposal will be dismissed without serious consideration by Great Britain, France and Italy.

The German move, however, it is declared, must be a proposal regarding the method of reparations payments and not embodying proposals for a reduction from the total sum decided on by the Paris conference of the allies.







Nothing Was Done. Hon, H. S. Beland (Beauce) hoped and expected that after the matter of riots was brought up last session the Government would have investigated it but nothing had been done. The peac treaty aimed at relieving sufferers to some extent. The Quebec riots were a matter, however, from which the people of Canada were the only ones who could be called upon to indemnify the sufferers. Had the unfortunate outbreak occurred in another province he would have been just as ready to ask compensation for the sufferers.

Major C. P. Power (Quebec South) said some of the soldiers sent to Quebec at the time of the riots were raw recruits who had not handled rifles until ten minutes before they were sent on the streets. The newspapers of the country had published inflammatory reports with regard to the so-called riots, and these young recruits from outside points were probably affected. Surely the person or persons responsible for sending such men to Quebec should be willing to shoulder the blame.

Hocken Opposed. H. C. Hocken (Toronto West) said a pension for men who were on streets of Quebec when they had been warned by Gen. Lessard to keep off. Men who refused to be warned had no night to come to Parliament asking fo an indemnity. How could soldiers dis tinguish between these men and rioters? The people of Canada, outside of the Province of Quebec, had contrib-uted liberally to the winning of the war in men and money, but they should not be called upon to indemnify those who played the part of rebels at a time when the country needed loyal citizens. He felt that if an indemnity were granted to these people, the action of loyal citizens who had contributed their






