Every survivor will bear to his grave a mark of that awful moment. THE CONFESSIONS OF MR. BROWN It is said that the Ottawa authorities have arranged with Mr. Adam Brown, of Hamilton, late commissioner to the Jamaica Exhibition, to take a trip through Canada, delivering illustrated lectures on the West Indies, with a view of inciting Canadians to seek trade with the islands, and particularly with Jamaica.

No patriotic Canadian will cavil at any legitimate effort being put forward to advance the commercial interests of the country. It is really time that the present policy were reversed, if it can do no better than it is now doing. An Ottawa dispatch says that in 1875 the exports of Canada to the islands were \$4,000,000. That was when the Liberals were in power. Last year, under the high-tax policy, the exports were valued at but \$2,719,000. Mr. Brown has been interviewed on the

subject, but he tells us little new regarding the means of extending our markets with Jamaica. He says that the way to beat the Yankees in selling flour to the people of Jamaica is to undersell them in the market—to give them as cheap or cheaper and as good or better breadstuffs than are now sent by our neighbors. All of which was known before. Mr. Brown further says we can take fruit and coffee from Jamaica as payment if freights are not too high. Most wise commissioner!

Then Mr. Brown tells us that though under no consideration will his friends in the high tax party admit that Canadians can hold their own with United States manufacturers in the markets of the Dominion, they can send furniture, carriages, tinware, stoves, plows, clothing, cottons, and many other articles to the West Indies, and sell them at a profit alongside of United States manufacturers-aye, in competition with the products of the "pauper labor" of the old world, about the baneful effects of which so much used to be said by the Canadian protectionists!

If Mr. Brown reasons correctly there are really no "infant industries" in Canada requiring constant "pap" from the Dominion reasury, because if our manufacturers can send their goods to far-off Jamaica, and sell them in competition with the world, they can have nothing to fear from competition at home with no freights, commissions or tariffs to combat.

If Mr. Brown will preach as he has recited to the press reporter at Halifax, fresh from his triumphs in Jamaica uppertendom, his proposed missionary tour will be warmly indorsed by every opponent of high taxation and combine rule.

THE COLLEGE AND THE FARM. The sixteenth annual report of the Ontario Agricultural College and Experimental Farm is a compact volume of 262 pages containing a complete record of the past year's work at the above institutions. It is a compendium of useful facts which the farmers of Ontario would do well to scan closely, not only for these facts as bearing upon their own occupation, but because it is a public institution the conduct of which deserves their closest scrutiny. Those in charge evince a constant desire to extend its usefulness and to stimulate, as far as they can, the progress of agriculture, by influences direct and inthe best rather than the worst side of each direct, within and without the college walls. 

A grocer advertises in the Chicago Tribune that he has 200 barrels of granulated sugar to sell at \$\frac{3}{2}\$ cents per pound. Canadians have to pay \$8\$ cents, the extra \$4\$ being taken from us, so some papers say, in order to make us rich and loyal. The Chicago price is exceptionally low, however, granulated selling throughout the States at 5 cents, or 21 pounds for \$1\$. On this subject a Brockville correspondent of the Globe writes as follows: "At Brockville eight dozen eggs bring \$1 and \$1 buys thirteen pounds of granulated. At Morristown, N. Y., just across the river, eight dozen eggs bring \$1 20 and \$1 20 will buy 25 pounds of granulated. At Brockville it takes two dozen eggs to buy a gallon of coal oil. At Morristown one dozen will buy five quarts.




