Berliner Tageblatt claims that the Czar's manifesto will give amnesties, partial or complete, to Russian prisoners in Siberia. These sentenced to a life penal servitude will receive mitigation of the sentence, and offenders domiciled in Siberia will be permitted to return to any part of European Russia except St. Petersburg and Moscow. The sentences of those in jail in European Russia for serious offenses will be reduced by one-third. A large number of minor offenders vill be completely pardoned. Numbers of those who fled the country for political reasons will be pardoned on ondition of their taking the oath of allegiance. The peasantry in certain districts will be excused from arrears of crown dues. Even the Jews, says the Berliner Tageblatt, will not be forgotten, and the ill-starred Hebrew will also be excused from arrears.





A DOUBLE FORGERY.

The Man Who Attempted to Swindle Mr. Bisbee Gave the Name of a Respected School Principal. On Friday last the "Advertiser" published the facts of an attempted

Mr. Bloomfield says he has no knowledge of anyone else of the same name in this district, and this confirms the belief that the guilty man committed a double forgery in signing the names "George Bloomfield" and 'John Manning' to documents now in possession of Mr. Bisbee and Mr. D. 




