
Two Train Inspectors Appointed tor the C. P. R.

# Children's Aid Society

Number of Interesting Reports Sub mitted by Officers of the Society

The regular meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held yesterday afternoon, when a large amimportant business was transacted. 
Important Proposals Sent to the Spanish Government.

A report has been circulated in wellinformed circles in Manilla that the governor-general has sent a momentous telegram to the Madrid government, amounting to an ultimatum. He gives the government three alternatives:

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
