Ottawa, March 29.-Canada's tribute of loyalty to the Empire was offered in the House of Commons today amid a scene which was marked by the significance and impressiveness of a critical occasion in the history of the Dominion. The public galleries were crowded to an extent only assoclated with parliamentary events of the first importance. The members were out in full force, eager to hear in every detail what was expected to be a pronouncement of great moment. Over all brooded a spirit of grav-Ity that seemed to have been reflected from across seas. For the time being party issues were forgotten in the common thought that Canada was about to make her response to the call of duty. There was an intense hush as first Mr. Foster, then the Prime Minister, and after him Mr. Borden voiced the sentiments which have found so acute expression throughout Canada during the past few days. SIR WILFRID'S TRIBUTE

Concluding his statement as to Canada's position in regard imperial defense, Premier Laurier yesterday said: "But although I do not believe that the danger is imminent, I have no hesitation in saying it would be folly to sleep in a sense of the fullest security. Vigilance, eternal vigilance, must be the watchword, not only in England but in Canada and in every other part of the British empire. On more than one occasion I have said that I would deprecate Canada being drawn into the vortex of militarism in Europe.

"The situation of Europe cannot be characterized as other than madness. Every nation there is living in a condition of armed peace almost as intolerable as war. England is the one nation which has not lost her head, which has refused to adopt conscription and sacrifice her children on the altar of this insatiable moloch. I hope the day shall never come when we will be drawn into the conflicts of Europe, but I have no hesitation in saying that the supremacy of the British Empire is absolutely essential not only to the maintenance of that empire but to the civilization of the world. I have no hesitation in saying that the supremacy of the British Empire on the sea must be maintained in a high degree of efficiency it has occurred the last one hundred years. I have no hesitation in saying also that if the day should come when the supremacy of Britain on the high seas is challenged it will be the duty of all daughter nations to close around the motherland and make a rampart about her

to ward off any attack. "I hope that day will never come, but should it come I would deem it to be my duty to devote what would be left of my life and energy to stump the country and endeavor to impress upon my fellow-countrymen, especially my compatriots in the province of Quebec, the conviction that the salvation of England is the salvation of our own country; that therein lies civil and religious freedom and all that is of value in this life."

> Published herewith are the results of The Advertiser's second pinmoney contest. The first column shows the vote up to March 10; the second, the vote up till 10 o'clock Saturday night, March 27; and the third column the gain in votes made by each candidate between these two dates. The success of the contest is evidenced by the fact that during the two weeks the contest has been in progress there has been a gain of 356,001 votes, while the votes recorded up to March 27, show a grand total of 1,-

> As usual there have been some tremendous increases. In one district alone one candidate has increased by over 46,000 votes in two weeks, overcoming another candidate's lead of over 30,000, and placing herself in the first place. Though this is the largest individual gain, several candidates have made a gain of between 20,000 and 26,000. An increase of 20,000 in one district has changed one candidate from third place, with a decided majority against her, to first place, with a good lead.

> There are a large number of candidates who have added between 10,000 and 20,000. All along the line there have been marked increases in the votes, and in several of the districts the contest is very close indeed, in several cases only a very few thousands of votes separating the leading candidates. The result of this contest, too, has proved to a conclusion what can be done by a little systematic work, as several of the candidates who were well down on the list have now made themselves either leaders in the race or else very dangerous rivals of the leaders.

Some Radical Changes Proposed in Bill Before the Legislature.

Toronto, March 29.-Gordon C. Wilson, M. P. P. for North Wentworth, is introducing an amendment to the public health act, which contains some important changes. The discretionary power heretofore vested in unicipal councils, giving them power grant sums considered necessary by ocal boards of health has been made bligatory by substituting the word shall" for "may." Another important amendment provides that in ase of dissatisfaction with the action of the local board of health a complaint may be registered with the provincial board. The bill also aims at restricting the authority of attending physicians in cases of smallpox, liphtheria, scarlet fever, cholera or typhoid. Under the present act the board of health, medical health officer or attending physician or any one of them may give orders which will result in the removal of persons affected with any of these diseases and the destruction of their clothing. Mr. Wilson's bill will take away this authority and provides further that in cases where children are removed from school because of contagious disease it will not be sufficient to present a certificate from a legally qualified practitioner to assure the child's return. The certificate must come from the medical health officer. Under the new bill the names of the specific diseases before mentioned are struck out and the words "any contagious diseases" substituted, a very material widening of the operation of the act. Introduced by Mr. Wilson and Allan Studholme, the mover and sec-onder of the bill, a deputation from


