Peace Riots Shaking German Cities; Viennese Stone Palace

STAID LONDON BUSINESSMEN UNBEND FOR FESTIVITIES OF ROTARIANS' PICNIC

AND MUCH MATERIAL TAKEN

Well-Directed Counter-Attacks and Desperate Resistance Taking Steam Out of the Austrian Offensive, Emperor Charles' Legion Being Unable to Make Decisive Headway-Heavy Defeat Seems Certain For the Teutons.

London, June 20 .- News reached London this afternoon that the Italians have regained Capo Sile, the town on the lagoon to the west of the Piave River, near its mouth, which was captured by the Austro-Hungarians.

The River Piave, overflowing its banks, has destroyed several pontoon bridges constructed by the Austrians at Intestadura and also at San Ponna di Piave. This has increased the difficulty of the Austrians in their rear communications, affecting the transportation of artillery, ammunition, food and fresh troops.

It is stated that the Austrians fighting south of the Piave River continue to implore help and also that two of their divisions have been greatly reduced by losses.

Paris, June 20 .- The splendid resistance of the Italians and their Franco-British allies leads the French press to conclude that the Austrians cannot avoid defeat, especially as well-directed counter-attacks have resulted in the capture of thousands of prisoners and much war

A Havas dispatch from Rome says that Italy has achieved a great double victory, referring to the recent naval exploit in the Adriatic, and

the present checking of the Austrians.

Late in March, says the Echo de Paris, Field Marshal von Hindenburg demanded that Austrian divisions be sent to the French front. Field Marshal Conrad von Hoetzendorff, supported by Emperor Charles, assured the German leader that an Austrian offensive against Italy would have a great chance of success, and would be received joyfully by the Dual monarchy. This point of view was finally accepted by the Jerman supreme command.

ITALIAN SPIRIT HIGH.

Italian Army Headquarters, June 19 .- By the Associated Press .-Realization that the Austrian offensive has failed is spurring the Italian troops to a desperate resistance along the Piave. Heavy fighting continued today around the Montello Plateau on the north, and near San

Dona-di-Piave on the south.

On Montello, which is hilly and wooded, the opposing forces frequently stumbled upon each other unexpectedly. Such meetings always result in sharp encounters. The spirit of the Italian troops is at high pitch despite wounds, loss of sleep and constant movements made necessary by the conditions of the terrain at several points.

ITALIANS CONTROL AIR.

All Stockyards of States Are Placed Under Fed. License

Washington, June 20.— All stock-yards in the United States today were ordered by President Wilson to be put under federal license. A presidential proclamation was issued which requires that licenses must be obtained from the food administration on or before July 25. Licensing also is required of commission men, order buyers, traders, speculators and scalpers handling or dealing in live cattle, sheep, swine or goats, "in or in connection with such stockyards," except those exempted by the food and fuel law.

It was pointed out by the attorney that the information was correct and that it would be useful to Germany. Vernon was the son of a former partner of Jonas, named Hahn, and changed his name after the outbreak of the war, the attorney asserted. [Reported by Edward Cronyn & Co.]

LONDON, June 19. — The board of trade committee, in its report on the position of shipping and shipbuilding in the reconstruction period after the war, unanimously recommends the early removal of Government control. MEAT PRICE JUMPS. SAYS C. O. L. REPORT, AND MAKES EXCUSES

Some Retailers May Be Taking Advantage.

PACKERS WITHIN THE LAW

Report to Crothers Has Different Tone Than O'Connor Employed.

Ottawa, June 19.—The cost of living branch reports to the Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor, as follows, oncerning food in cold storage: "Reports from the cold storage com-panies for June 1 indicate an increase n quantity in store of butter, eggs, pork, mutton, lamb and fish, and a decrease in the quantity of cheese, beef and fowl, compared with May 1 of this

ear.
"As compared with June 1, 1917, we button in store, more beef As compared with June 1, 1917, we have more butter in store, more beef and more fish. We have less cheese, eggs, pork products and fowl than a year ago. The most striking comparison is in the case of beef, of which we have 11.72 per cent more than on June 1, 1917. Since the purchasing commission of the Allies is fully aware of this fact, and a large proportion of this stock is already under contract to them, we find no grounds for any charge of hoarding. "TAKE TO THE WOODS"

NIAGARA CAMP, June 19.—Two men, presumed to be military deserters, who evidently had rowed across Lake Ontario in a boat from Hicks' boathouse at the mouth of the Humber River, Toronto, and were almost exhausted, were towed to shore west of Niagara today by a fisherman. The pair did not wait for an introduction to the military authorities on this side of the lake, but immediately made off into the woods, while the fisherman was telephoning the authorities here about them. "The most striking feature recently in the market situation of storage products has been the great rise in the price of beef. The matter has been carefully investigated with the view of detecting profiteering, and while the merchants in some localities have apparently used the general rise in prices to cover an undue increase, we have not been able to find any evidence that the general increase throughout the country was due to unlawful action on the part of the meat packers. The increase is general throughout the whole of North America, and is fully as marked in the case of live cattle as in the case of meat. The increased price is due wholly to the war situation, particularly to the fact that the purchasers of the United States army and the purchasing commission of the other Allies have considered that the increased price to the farmer was necessary to stimulate the production of more beef on the farms.

"It is impossible to make an exact statement for the country as a whole, but the evidence available indicates that the rise was most evident in the price of live animals and in the retail trade. Apparently, if any of the dealers have taken advantage of the situation to raise the price unduly it is the retailers. This probably is due in part to the fact that the wholesaler have large stocks on hand, on which they are not allowed by the Canada Food Board to advance their prices. It is noteworthy that wholesale prices of beef have advanced very much more in the United States than they have in Canada.






