[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, Feb. 1. - The end of 1909 brought to a close Canada's biggest building year; the beginning of 1910 ushers in what promises to be a period of still greater activity and develop-ment. Nothing more fully reflects the marvellous growth of the country, nor fortells with a more assuring degree the wonderful expansion which take place in the next twelve months, than the remarkably sound manner in which the season closed. Operations in all sections were vigorously prose-cuted up to the final day, and the existing force of activity carried into the new year with an increasing momentum which leaves no doubt as to the prospects for 1910. The losses which occurred in December, with two exceptions, affected only such places as had experienced uninterrupted progress throughout the year, and came more as a relaxation following the heavy pressure of the preceding months, and a temporary let up pre-paratory to resuming operations with renewed energy, than as any unfavorable indication.

Both the great British parties are pledged to grapple with the land problem. In Ireland, the solution is well advanced. In England a substantial beginning was made in the small holdings act of 1907. In Scotland, the boon was deferred by the House of Lords, when it rejected Lord Pentland's bill

The Government went into the present election with both a record and a prospectus on the land question. The Unionist party had to its credit the Wyndham act, which has facilitated the rapid transfer of the soil of Ireland to the Irish people, but it had nothing to offer England or Scotland, the small holdings act of 1901 having





He also paid the packers' rake-off on the Canadian product. The farmer was not benefited at all, as the per capita duty of \$1 50 kept the American market closed against him, and the packer used it as a lever to depress the Canadian market for live hogs.

What is wanted is the freest interchange of all animals and animal products. Thorough inspection to protect against disease is all that would be necessary. The producer and consumer would both be benefited. The only parties who would lose by it would be the trusts and revenue departments, whose coffers are filled with the plunder of the people.
