## THE CORRESPONDENCE

Tabled by Sir Wilfrid Laurier; Incomplete, Says Manitoba.

Dominion Government Declares a Desire to "Promote in Every Way Compatible" Manitoba's Welfare—Drawn Up for Political Effect, Says Minister Campbell of Manitoba—The Autonomy Debate—J. C. R. Running Rights Over C. A. R.

Ottawa, April 4.—Yesterday, after routine, the House having gone into committee on the bill enabling the Grand Trunk to acquire the Canada Atlantic.

Mr. Haggart asked for the promised Government statement on the subject. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that the Government had decided to introduce separate legislation to give the Intercolonial Railway running rights over the C. A. R. It was considered better to do this than as was first proposed, by amendment to the Grand Trunk bill.

In reply to Mr. Maclean, Sir Wilfrid said that the statement might be made before the third reading.

Mr. Jordan, submitted that the full explanation of the Government's proposals should be given while the present bill was in committee. Sir Wilfrid asked what more could be stated than had already been told.

Mr. Jordan, in a full statement had been promised to the House.

E. B. Oser reminded Sir Wilfrid of the promise made by Mr. Emmerson. "Under such circumstances, I move that the committee rise and report progress."

The committee accordingly rose without having dealt with the bill.

## PERHAPS MARRIED WOMEN WILL VOTE IN CHATHAM

### City Council will Petition Legislature to Extend this Privilege to Wives—All City Grocery Stores will now Close at 7 P. M.—Many By-laws Passed

The tenders for civic work for the year were opened last evening. Considerable interest was taken in the tenders and the free seats at the back of the Council Chamber were filled.

The chief feature of the meeting was the passing of by-laws. Ald. Potter had a handful and he succeeded in having them all passed except one in regard to the fire limits.

Ald. Marshall thought this by-law unfair to the smaller groceries. It looked like prosecution.

Ald. Austin said that the point was not taken by Ald. Marshall. There was no law in Chatham enforcing as rigidly as that. He thought the by-law a good one and in cases of necessity.

Like Ald. Marshall's plug of tobacco, he thought that no attempt would be made to enforce the by-law.

Ald. Edmondson agreed. He said that often now cases of necessity occurred when a family would run short of staples on Sunday. Nothing was ever said to the grocer who sold.

Ald. Westman thought that the by-law didn't go far enough. It should also provide for closing at ten o'clock Saturday night.

Ald. King—Oh, give them one night off.—Laughter.

Ald. Marshall rose to reply. He said that an attempt had been made to copy him down by the part of Ald. Austin and Ald. Westman. He had never yet voted for any motion that he didn't understand and he wasn't going to begin now. If the by-law were going to impose on one grocer he was going to oppose it.

The report was adopted.

MARKET.

Ald. King for the special Market committee reported that they had instructed Architect Rutley to revise the plans in accordance with instructions and now presented them for inspection. The committee was in a position to ask for tenders. Adopted.

FINANCE.

Ald. Austin reported for the Finance committee as follows:

Re request of James Russell for reduction of the transient traders license, that no action be taken.

That this Council petition the Legislature for a by-law allowing married women to vote in municipal matters.

That the city solicitor's account, \$325, for services rendered in the suit of Thompson vs. the city be paid.

That the City Clerk should send to the Minister of Public Works a statement of the amount due for Local Improvements and that request be made for immediate settlement.

That no action be taken in regard to the isolation hospital.

PROPERTY.

Ald. Westman for the Property committee reported as follows:

That The Planet account of \$9.62 be paid.

Re request of W. W. Seane for permission to erect coal oil and gasoline tanks on the river bank, that it was found that it was injurious to have gasoline tanks of this size in the city and that the request in regard to gasoline be not granted.

That permission be given to build the oil tanks two feet under ground and that the by-law in regard to explosives in the city be so amended as to allow this.

Re request of Job Moore, lineman, that his salary be increased \$5.

That the two drivers and the foreman of the fire department be given an additional \$5 per month.

That the report was adopted.

Ald. Westman said that the Chief of the Fire Department requested the purchase of a hydrant gate and a new nozzle. Ald. Westman moved that it be purchased. Carried.

Ald. Westman moved that Chas. Morre be hired as inspector at a salary of \$15 per year, to do all the work in the city. Carried.

Ald. Westman said that in reference to the extension of waterworks mains, he had investigated and found that the Public General Hospital and the Normal Academy hadn't sufficient fire protection. A four-inch main is all the protection these two buildings have.

At the suggestion of the Mayor, this matter was referred to the Finance committee along with other extensions already so referred.

PETITIONS MUST BE DATED.

Ald. Potter stated that he had obtained the opinion of the city solicitor in regard to signatures to petitions for pavements being dated. The solicitor advised that the Council should refuse to accept petitions not dated. He also said that the Council could have the date of signature after each name.

Ald. Marshall suggested dating each petition blank when it was obtained from the city clerk.

Ald. Potter moved, seconded by Ald. Westman, that no petition be received unless it were dated and the date of signature placed after each name. Carried.

TO ADVERTISE THE CITY.

Ald. Marshall said that the program of proceedings for the Stationary Engineers' Association was in the printer's hands. The Association asked \$100. for the use of 15 pages in the book to be devoted to advertising the city. A thousand copies had been contracted for and these programs would be sent all over Canada.

Ald. Marshall moved, seconded by Mr. Austin, that \$60 be paid the Association for use of the 15 pages for advertising the city. Carried.

Ald. Austin spoke in favor of the motion from an advertising standpoint, and also from the fact that the convention itself would be an advertisement for the city.

The matter was referred to the industrial committee to see that proper cuts and photographs of the city were reproduced in the book.

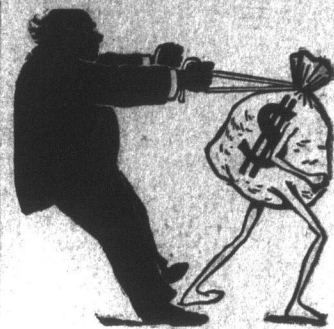
Mayor Cowan called the attention of the Board of Works to the condition that the Windsor Road was in, west from the King St. pavements.

The Mayor also asked the City Clerk to notify the committee appointed to investigate the different pavements of the city, to do so and report.

The Mayor referred complaints regarding on boulevards to the Parks and Cemetery committee to investigate and to prepare a by-law that could be enforced, as the present one was not satisfactory.

JOSEPH SMITH THE PURCHASER.

Head of Mormon Church Buys 67,000 Acres in Alberta.

Minneapolis, April 3.—A special from Butte, Mont., says: President Joseph Smith, head of the Mormon Church, has bought 67,000 acres of land in Alberta, and proposes to establish a colony of Mormons. The price paid was about \$400,000.

Rev. Dr. S. G. Stone Dead.

Ferry Sound, April 2.—Rev. Dr. S. G. Stone, of Sault Ste. Marie, died suddenly of heart failure Saturday morning at the residence of his son, H. E. Stone, Ferry Sound. Rev. Dr. Stone entered the ministry in the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1861. Later he was elected editor of The Christian Advocate, the organ of the M. E. Church. He was one of the two representatives of his church at the ecumenical conference in London, Eng. After the union of the four branches of the Methodist Church he became associate editor of The Christian Guardian. In 1897 he was elected president of Toronto conference. Two years ago he was asked for superannuation and has since resided in Sault Ste. Marie. A widow, six sons and three daughters survive him.

E. D. O'Flynn Dies.

Bellevue, April 3.—E. D. O'Flynn, of Madoc, died Saturday afternoon. He was many years one of the leading figures in the County of Hastings, having been a member of the County Council and Warden of the county. The deceased was a Liberal and was twice a candidate for election to the Dominion House of Commons against Sir Mackenzie Bowell and once for the Ontario Legislature against the late Dr. Boulter. On each occasion he was defeated. He was 74 years of age and was born in Lennox County.

Booth to Equal Eddy.

Ottawa, April 3.—John R. Booth has under consideration plans for the erection of an immense paper mill equal to the Eddy establishment. The pulp mill is now in operation and he intends manufacturing its product.

"DOLLAR WHEAT."

Trusts and monopolies are usually considered to be unfair, because they tend to make the rich richer and the poor poorer. Nevertheless, in some cases, the producers are directly benefited. For instance, when a "big corner" raises the market price of grain and produce to a fabulous sum, the farmer benefits, if he does not part with his wheat too early, and a dollar a bushel would mean, on an average, that over \$700,000 would go annually into the pockets of the farmers of the United States. VICTORIAN'S ROUGH TRIP.

Arrived Halifax Saturday Having Averaged 13.23 Knots Under Stress.

Halifax, April 3.—The new turbine steamer Victorian, which has been awaited with so much interest, arrived Saturday morning, docking at 11.30 o'clock. As she came up the harbor the wharves were thronged with thousands of spectators. She was boarded immediately by officials and newspaper men, and after a hurried inspection trip, Capt. McNicol called them into the saloon and told the story of the trip. He said the ship had encountered bad weather, and had left Mobile in the teeth of a strong westerly gale. Approaching the Newfoundland coast, ice was encountered, in about latitude 47, and the ship was compelled to take a southerly route, as far as latitude 42, the track of the steamers bound to New York. She logged 2569 between Mobile and Halifax, and was 17 days 22 hours and 59 minutes on the voyage. The average speed was 13.23 knots per hour, and the best hour's run was 18 1/2 knots.

Wonders of the Wireless.

The Marconi system worked well, and through it the ship was kept constantly supplied with the news of the world. The system works directly for about 120 miles, and by using the steamer Campana as a medium to reach the Lucania, a distance of over 300 miles was had. They were in communication with the Celtic and St. Paul for two days, and it was from the former that all details of the Parisian accident were heard, and this was later verified from the Tunisian. When they picked up the Tunisian that steamer was about 10 miles south of them, and they kept in touch for a distance of 167 miles.

MINES OF WEALTH.

Interesting Statistics of the Ontario Fisheries Catch of 1904.

Statistics of importance as showing the growth of the fishing industry of the Province have been issued by Mr. S. T. Bastedo, Deputy Commissioner of Fisheries for Ontario.

During 1904 the total catch of fish of all kinds was 24,009,970 pounds, an increase over 1903 of 2,036,295 lbs. The estimated value of the catch was \$1,793,229. All the varieties show an increase except sturgeon, catfish and tullebe. The decrease in the sturgeon catch was 9,000 lbs., in catfish 181,000 lbs., and in tullebe 16,450.

Of the finer varieties herring showed an increase of 1,164,430 lbs., whitefish \$41,550 lbs., lake trout, 488,12 lbs., pike, 238,375 lbs.

The appliances used in this industry include 128 tugs worth \$313,513, employing 672 men; and 1,477 boats, valued at \$105,747, employing 2,453 men; 5,490,036 yards of gill nets were used, 103,328 lbs. 5 1/2 pound nets, 275 hoop nets, 75 dip nets and 2 moorings, which were licensed by the Department and valued at \$931,097. The fry distributed in Provincial water by the Dominion Fisheries numbered only 77,359,000. In 1903 the total catch was 21,973,675 lbs. The finest fishing waters in the Province are found in the North Channel of Lake Huron, where, in 1904, 4,343,225 lbs. of fish were taken. The catch of trout and whitefish in the North Channel exceeded that of any other provincial waters. Of the former there was taken 2,101,050 lbs., of the latter 1,532,200 lbs.

Lake Erie has the distinction of producing the largest quantity of herring—2,644,500 lbs., or 83 per cent. of the total catch of the Province. Other varieties caught in Lake Erie also show an increase, except sturgeon and coarse fish. A similar condition exists in Lake Nipissing.

The revenue from all sources received by the Department was \$50,000, and the expenses \$34,315.17, leaving a surplus of \$15,684.83. The maintenance of the steamer Gilphey, on Georgian Bay, costs \$4,500.

FATHER JOHN BULL.

All English-Speaking Nations Are Members of the Family.

Comradeship and good-fellowship were in evidence at the recent banquet given by the R. C. F. A. sergeants, in Ontario, to the visiting sergeants of the 90th U. S. Infantry of Sackett's Harbor, N. Y. An address was presented by the visitors, in which they said:

It is an honor to sit with you in a gathering which history has never overlooked before. Such a feeling of comradeship and good-fellowship never existed at any time as at the present between those in the British and American services. We call each other cousins, why not brothers? Are we not children of the same parent? True, the elder child got on his ear and set up in business for himself, and is doing pretty fair, but the other children have no cause to complain of their share in the old man's business.

Are We Not Brothers? "Why not in this day of trust and consolidation in other lines of business extend it to the family business of Father John? Anyone that would try to prove this merger illegal would have a sorry countenance after he had been into trouble. Are not our brothers, then? First, our God; second, our country; third, our King and President; and then our family, the English-speaking nations."

Lakes Getting Deeper.

Shipowners are puzzled over the cause of the phenomenal rise in the levels of the great lakes in the last ten years, and are at a loss to explain it, very foot of added draught for their ships means the shipment of thousands of dollars in their freight capacity, and as a natural result they are pleased.

These figures show the rise in lake levels during the last ten years, the number of feet being the height above mean sea level:—

In each case the comparison is taken at the high-water mark for the year.

Quick Work of Crematory Plant.

"The time will come when dead bodies will be cremated in Toronto," said City Engineer Rust, to a reporter the other day.

Mr. Rust stated that he had just received a letter from a French firm offering to sell a crematory plant for this purpose to the city.

They said in the communication that they had disposed of a plant to the city of Leeds, England, and mentioned as a proof of its success that a human body which had been placed in it in an ice-cold condition at 3 p. m. had been converted into white ashes by 6 p. m., and 8,000 feet of gas was required for the cremation.

Law Wallace's Ben Hur.

In commenting upon the literary triumph of Lew Wallace, The Atlanta Constitution says:

"The motive for the great semi-religious story of 'Ben Hur' came to the author after a straightforward talk with Ingels on the subject of religion and the existence of a God, and it was to refute his doctrine and show the purely human probability of a God man that the great novelist undertook the preparation of the work that has been translated into almost every known language."

The sale of the book is said to be as great as ever, twenty-five years after its appearance. Its success was phenomenal in every way, the aggregate sales reaching 1,000,000 copies.

Wild Cat Plentiful.

Wildcats seem to be plentiful in this neighborhood this season as several have been killed. This week S. W. Clifford killed two in the bush near Zion, one of them weighing nearly sixty pounds.—Hopworth Journal.

PHILANTHROPY HIS HOBBY.

Sir William Macdonald's Latest Gift of \$4,000,000 to Education.

Sir William Macdonald, the millionaire tobacco manufacturer of Montreal, is a philanthropist of which any country would be proud. His latest gift to education amounts to about \$4,000,000, and yet little is known of it.

The bulk of the money will go to the establishing of two great colleges, one an agricultural college, and the other a teachers' college, or Normal school, each a manifestation of the same general idea. The colleges will be practically one institution, although the two will be under the Agricultural Department and the other under the Education Department of the Quebec Government. They will be built close together at St. Anne de Bellevue, where no fewer than six farms have been bought for the purpose. One of these has been famous for many years as the Reford Ayrshire Stock Farm.

In addition to the main structures there will be residences for male and female students. The group of buildings will stand in a fifty-acre field sloping toward the river, and Sir William has given instructions that they shall be of the very best material obtainable. Brick and stone, steel, concrete and tiles will be used, and already the stone for the foundations has been laid on the ground. By October it is expected the colleges will be ready to begin the work which is certain to have such an important effect on the educational future of the Province of Quebec.

MAN 2,000,000 YEARS AGO.

There are to-day in Australia some tribes who represent the paleolithic or oldest types of prehistoric man, while later types of the neolithic groups are found in America, declared Prof. Macallum in his lecture Saturday at Toronto University. The former most chipped or flaked stone implements, while the work of the neolithic races was polished. When Athens was at the height of its greatness the shores of the Mediterranean were peopled by men of the neolithic type; and during the Roman climax the Swiss lake dwellers were contemporaneous for 1,000 years. It would be many centuries before neolithic man disappeared, and he would be extinguished rather than transformed.

Remains of these primitive men were found in the Pliocene strata, and two million years ago a conservative estimate of the age of these remains. Prof. Macallum placed the historic period at 10,000 years. While the skulls were found of a distinctly advanced type among the more primitive forms, these instances have been considered by men of science to be pathological exceptions. Prof. Macallum thought it strange that only exceptions should be preserved. The Spy skull, a celebrated discovery, had a brain capacity of 1,700 cubic centimetres, while that of the average Parisian was only 1,500. The oldest human remains were found in 1856, and these were of the neanderthal type, the lowest in human development.

#### BY-LAW NO.

A By-Law Regulating the

each day of the week (excepting  
Saturday, and the day immediately

closed until the hour of five o'clock

2. That any person found guilty  
of a breach or infraction of any of  
the provisions of this By-law shall  
be liable to a fine or penalty not  
exceeding twenty dollars exclusive of  
costs and costs in default of  
payment forthwith, the said fine  
and costs or costs only may be levied  
by distress and sale of the goods  
and chattels of the offender and in  
case of no sufficient distress being  
found to satisfy such fine and costs  
the convicting Justice may commit  
the offender to the common goal of  
the County of Kent with or with-  
out hard labor for any period not  
exceeding twenty-one days unless  
said fine and costs be sooner paid.  
3. That this By-law shall take  
effect and come into force on the  
15th day of April, A. D. 1905.

Among the Frieburgers there is a superstition which says that the marks and spots on the moon's face are the outlines of the traitor Judas Iscariot, holding his hand over his face while sneezing just prior to hanging himself. This last belief accords with the old Frankish legend which says that there was no spot on Euna's bright face until after the time of the crucifixion of Christ. Still another story tells us that in the time of the creation God threw an offending angel against the face of the moon, while another is to the effect that the moon witnessed the creation of Adam and Eve and took an impress of their features on his surface, intending to people his own land with similar beings. When he essayed to imitate God's works, he made nothing but a slinky serpent, which since that day has continued to fold and unfold its mighty coils in full view of the descendants of the God created beings.

## TRUE STORY OF MASSACRES

Those at Baku Planned by Bloody Guilty Originators of the Terrible Butchery at Kishineff.

London, April 3.—The true story of the Baku massacres as told in the Caucasian newspapers is a tragedy with which the atrocity of Kishineff alone of recent years may be compared, Armenians at Baku taking the place of the Jews at Kishineff.

"For four days," in the words of the Bakinskia Ivestia, "a savage bacchanalia raged in which the passions of homicide, outrage, arson and plunder were let loose."

### 2,000 People Killed.

The paper goes on to say that during those days no less than 2,000 people lost their lives as victims of the cold-blooded machinations of the St. Petersburg authorities. The latter attributed the outbreak to the sudden development of an internecine feud between the Mussulman and Armenian inhabitants, but those acquainted with the relations of the Christians and Mussulmans there know this to be false. The truth is boldly asserted by the Bakinskia Ivestia, which, it must be remembered, like all Russian papers, is published under the supervision of the censor.

The Ivestia says that it has not the slightest doubt that the massacre was organized by the same blood-guilty persons who planned the butchery at Kishineff. Then it proceeds and tells the blood-curdling tale in detail.

A word to the wise is heeded.

## HOME SLAVERY.

Some Wives and Mothers Become Too Self Sacrificing.

Self sacrifice is natural to some women. Often its power masters them altogether until their lives become one ceaseless devotion to endless labor and acceptance of unpleasant things that the pleasant part of living may be kept sacred for the rest of the family.

The purely useless side of this entire self effacement must sometimes strike the beholder, who realizes that it gives as little real benefit to the family as to the individual. Putting aside the moral effect on the younger members of a family brought up to regard their mother as a machine operated for the family convenience, the woman who consecrates herself to the well being of her family does not really accomplish all she desires.

If she renounces all recreation and higher life for herself and gives up all communion of mind and spirit with her husband and children, it is doubtful if she has chosen the best way of spending her health and energies.

If overfatigue numbs her mental brilliance or saps her buoyancy, the atmosphere of home is more greatly injured than the added cleaning and stiches and cooking can repair. If she is too worn out to give sympathy to the children's joys and sorrows, what do the lavish larder and fine furniture avail?

And if, as does happen, overtaxed nature gives way and she must step in the breach to take up her work, and to take care of the work as well, what has she gained that she does not finally lose in her breakdown?

A life laid down in a worthy cause is not lost, but gained, but to teach children and husband selfishness and to ruin one's own helpfulness to them by useless drudgery is not a worthy cause.—Chicago Record Herald.

## Baked Potatoes.

Baked potatoes are supposed to be very easily digested, and so they are when they are baked properly. A hot oven is necessary, for a strong degree of heat is required to turn the starch of the potato to dextrin. Cooked in a slow oven a baked potato is no more digestible than boiled. Potatoes in the shell are very good, besides being wholesome. Bake large potatoes, and when quite done cut off a piece from one end and scoop out the inside. Mash with salt, pepper, butter, a little hot milk and the white of an egg to three potatoes, the egg beaten stiff. Re-fill the shells and return to the oven for a few minutes.

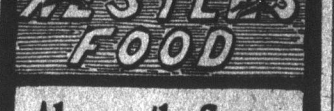

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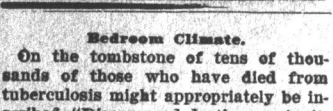

ON TO VLADIVOSTOCK

Vice-Admiral Rojstvensky Sends the Word to His Wife.

Russia Expects Him to Defeat the Japanese Fleet—100,000 Chinese Homeless As a Result of the Fighting Around Mukden—Peace Recedes Into the Background—A Renewal of Fighting Expected.

St. Petersburg, April 4.—A letter from Vice Admiral Rojstvensky to his wife, just received here, indicates that the departure of the second Pacific squadron from Madagascar waters is final and that now it is on the way to Vladivostok.

Russia Leans on Rojstvensky. St. Petersburg, April 4.—The statements concerning the prospect of peace sent from St. Petersburg should be regarded with the utmost suspicion. The truth in Russia has the fullest confidence in the ability of Vice Admiral Rojstvensky to inflict defeat upon the enemy, thus completely turning the tide of events.

100,000 Chinese Homeless. Gen. Oku's headquarters in the field, April 4, which is suffering among the Chinese in the vicinity of Mukden. Scores of villages were destroyed in the recent fighting and 100,000 persons are homeless and destitute.

Linevitch Too Brief. London, April 4.—The correspondent of The Times at St. Petersburg cables: The brevity of Gen. Linevitch's telegrams and the contradictory reports of Russian correspondents render it difficult to obtain a correct version of what is occurring in Manchuria.

Marching Through Mongolia. The representative of The Novoe Vremya telegraph that there are rumors that the Japanese are marching through Mongolia.

Temporary Check to Peace. The belief is gaining ground that the prospects of peace have suffered a temporary check, although in the opinion of leading diplomats here a certain interval was bound to follow the first exchange of proposals.

Wives of Reservists Starving. According to The Razsvet, the wives of reservists who have been drawing rations from Moscow since the outbreak of the war are now starving.

Expect Renewal of Fighting. Gushu Pass (108 miles north of Tie Pass), Manchuria, April 4.—A renewal of fighting is expected shortly.

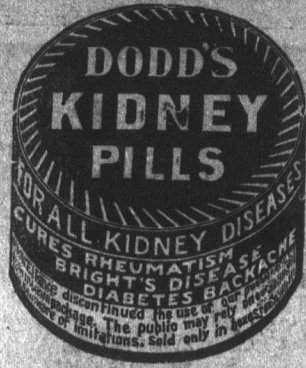
Temporarily Repealed. St. Petersburg, April 4.—An Imperial manifesto was published in The Finland Gazette yesterday, directing that, in compliance with the request of the Finnish estates, the military service law for Finland, issued July 1901, be temporarily repealed pending legislative settlement of the question.

Bomb Thrown Dead. Lodz, Russian Poland, April 4.—The would-be assassin of Police Commissioner Szabalovics of the second district, who was seriously injured Saturday afternoon by a bomb which was thrown at him in the street, is dead.

Fought in the Crimea. Kingston, April 4.—Patrick McGee, 75 years old, formerly janitor of the old grammar school, was found dead in bed yesterday morning at his home on William street.

Fire at Guelph. Guelph, April 4.—At noon yesterday fire broke out in the spanning room of the Taylor-Forbes Co. and before it was subdued damage to the amount of \$1,500. Covered by insurance.

Five Feet of Snow. Denver, April 4.—The snow storm, which has raged in Colorado and a portion of New Mexico for 24 hours has subsided. Between Clyde and Fairview the snow is 5 feet deep.



M.P.P.'S MARK TIME.

Legislature Not Doing Much While Waiting for the Estimates, but Cabinet is Working.

Toronto, April 4.—Very little business of importance was transacted during the brief session of the Legislature yesterday afternoon. There was a slim house and until the estimates are brought down, which may not be till Friday of next week, the members will mark time.

Two bills were introduced. Mr. Torrance (North Perth) seeks an amendment to the Municipal Act, to make it optional with municipal councils to exempt property assessed for sidewalks as a local improvement.

Dr. Jessop (Lincoln) has an amendment to the act respecting conveyances to trustees for burial grounds, whereby the trustees can beautify the grounds whether the owners of lots agree or not.

Hon. Mr. Hanna laid on the table correspondence between Sheriff Dawson of Lincoln and the Government with regard to the appointment of a jailer to the late T. F. Blain.

The Premier informed Mr. Munro (North Oxford) that James Cochrane, bailiff of the first division court of the County of Grey, had been removed for having been an active partisan during the elections.

In reply to Mr. Preston (East Durham) the Premier said the report of the Railway Taxation Commission had not been received, but would be laid on the table as soon as it was received.

HON. JAS. SUTHERLAND HOME. Will Not Resume Duties at Ottawa During This Session.

Woodstock, April 4.—Hon. James Sutherland, Minister of Public Works, arrived home early Sunday morning from San Antonio, Texas, where he has spent the past four months in an endeavor to regain his lost health.

The week's traveling from the south had its effect, and as a result Mr. Sutherland was greatly fatigued on his arrival. While the climate in the south has benefited him in some respects, yet he is far from being well.

Mr. Sutherland yesterday expressed the hope that the coming summer months at his home here would make him feel himself again. It is most probable that he will be in a condition to warrant his return to Ottawa during the present session of the House.

PARTY FURNISHED MONEY.

Hon. Mr. Prefontaine Says It Put Up for Petitioners' Deposits.

Montreal, April 4.—Proceedings in connection with the petition of Ludger Fleau, contesting the election of Ald. Ames, as M. P. in St. Antoine division commenced yesterday before Judge Curran.

The first witness called upon to give evidence was Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, who upon being questioned by counsel for the respondent, admitted that the Liberal party had furnished Fleau, as well as the petitioners who contested in other divisions, with the necessary money to make their deposits.

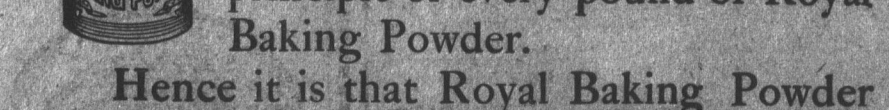
