

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# THE FRASER INSTITUTE.

## TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The accounts for the past year, (ending June 30th, 1890,) duly audited, are submitted with this Report. They show all the details of the receipts and disbursements of the corporation during the year.

The revenue derived from the basement of the Institute building amounts to \$1,424.91, being a fair increase upon that of the past year. It is probable that this may be further increased during the current year, as the large hall is in frequent request.

The revenue from the farms is about the same as in previous years.

In consequence of failure to lease some of the offices in the Fraser Buildings, their rental has fallen considerably below that of last year, and although, as respects the offices, there is now a slight improvement, the nett revenue from the buildings generally has diminished by over one thousand dollars. Every effort has been made to lease it. During the present year one store is vacant; but it is expected that a tenant for a period of years will shortly be arranged for.

The current expenses of the Library have increased \$46.63, notwithstanding that every effort has been made towards economy.

The general expenses of the corporation, however, have not materially increased, the difference being more than covered by a sum of \$179.85, expenses of the Fraser Buildings omitted from the last Annual Report; and an increase of over \$150.00in the taxes upon the Fraser Buildings. But for these two items the total current annual expenses would have shown a small reduction on those of last year,

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The attendance at the Library, for the past year, shows a fair increase, but the number of persons who now avail themselves of the Library by borrowing books, is much larger than heretofore, and is increasing. Schedule VI gives the details of the attendance, and contains a comparison of its numbers with those of previous years.

In accordance with the intention expressed in last year's Report, a considerable addition was made to the Library in the autumn of last year, by the purchase in England of a large number of valuable books.

Schedule VII contains a list of the donations of books during the past year, being 1056 volumes.

An alphabetical catalogue has been prepared in accordance with the intentions expressed in last year's Report, and its printing is nearly completed. This catalogue is intended to facilitate the use of the Library as a circulating library; and copies of it will be distributed at cost price, which will be practically nominal. It is intended also, to prepare and print a catalogue by subjects, the better to facilitate reference to the large number of valuable and instructive books on almost every imaginable subject, which are now to be found in the collection.

The 'Board has arranged with the Faculty of Law of McGill College, for the conversion of a large room into a Law Library, in which the Law books of the Faculty, as well as those belonging to the Institute, are placed. This room is under the charge of a gentleman appointed by the Law Faculty; and the arrangements made, enable visitors to the Fraser Institute and Library, to consult the entire Law Library so constituted. The Board trusts that this will be found of great advantage to Law students, and others desirous of information on legal subjects, as constituting practically a free Law Library both select and extensive.

The Board begs to call attention to the position of the finances of the Institute, in the hope that persons interested in education, and in the spread of useful knowledge generally, will, from time to time, appropriate some small portion of their means, towards extending the Library, and increasing its efficiency. debts, and it confines the remuneration of its staff, and the purchase of books, strictly within the bounds of its income A reference to the statements submitted will show, that without further assistance, further purchases of books cannot be made, and the Institution will consequently, be unable to keep pace with the literary progress of the world. It has already received generous donations from its Governors and others, by means of which it has been enabled to purchase within the last two years, over 5,000 volumes of much needed books. The purchase of the best works among those which are being daily issued by the publishers, is a necessity, if the Institution is to be kept up to the standard required in Montreal. And as stated in the last Report, the Board is particularly desirous of increasing the collection of books upon North America, especially Canada. Many books of the best class, have been reduced, by use, to a condition which requires them to be rebound, and efficiently to carry out this object would need a further cousiderable sum. Any assistance which persons interested in the spread of useful knowledge, may see fit to afford, towards the purchase of books, and towards rebinding those requiring it, will be gratefully received by the Board ; and will be carefully applied to the purpose which may be specified by the donor in making the donation.

In this connection the Board desires to remark upon the work on which they are engaged, that the revenue derived from the bequest of the founder, serves to administer in an orderly and efficient manner, the existing collection of books, now comprising about twenty thousand volumes; exclusive of law books, and of the collections of the German Society, and of the Horticultural Society, which together number about four thousand volumes more. There are two large reading rooms, one of which, containing the Mackay collection of pictures is appropriated to ladies, and these rooms are supplied with the leading Magazines and literary periodicals. Special facilities are provided for Students engaged in literary work, and the rooms are open every day in the week, during lengthy hours, free in every sense, for the use of the public.

These advantages are provided without public aid; or any assistance beyond that derived from a few persons interested in

the spread of knowledge, whose contributions are mentioned in Schedule II. In other parts of the Dominion, free libraries are supported by municipal taxation, but circumstances render that difficult, if not impossible, in the province of Qu bec. The Board, therefore, ventures to hope, that in view of the advantages to the public which this Institution provides, and of the limited and restricted means at its disposal, the citizens of Montreal, who already rank so high as benefactors of education, will aid in placing its Free Library upon a footing commensurate with the needs of their wealthy and cultured city.
