The Members having returned-
The Hon. Alexander Laird addressing Mr. McNeill the Clerk; proposed the Hon. Dozald Montgomery, a Member for the Town and Royalty of Princetown and Township No 18, to be their Speaker, which was seconded by Cornelins Howat, Esquire.

And the question being put, st that the Hon. Donald Montgomery do take the chair of this House as Speaker,".

It was resolved in -the affirmative.
The Hon. Donald Montgomery having been declared by the Clerk duly elected, he was conducted to the chair by the Hon. Mr. Laird andMr. Howat, and standing on the apper step, he returned his hamble acknowledgments to the House for the greathonor they had been pleased to confer on him, by choosing him to be their Speaker.

Mr. Speaker elect, with the Houses then went ap to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber; when Mr. Speaker elect acquainted His Excellency that the House had chosen him to be their Speaker, and humbly trusted their election would meet His Excellency's approbstion.

Whereupon the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said-

## Hon. Mr. Montgomery;

I am commanded by Hisw Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to acquaint you that he hath so good an opinion of your integrity, diligence and sufficiency for executing the important office to which you have been elected, that His Excellency is perfectly satisfied with the choice which the House of Assembly have made, and doth allow and confirm you to be their Speaker.

And hereapon, Mr. Speaker addressed His Excellency to the following effect:-

## May it Please Your Exçllurncy;

As you have been pleased to approve of the choice of the House of Assembly in appointing me to be their Speaker, it now becomes my duty hambly to request of Yoar Excellency, that all the usual rights, immunities and privileges accorded to previons Houses of Assembly may be granted to this House, amongst which are, freedom from arrest, freedom of speech in their debates, and free access to Your Excellency on all suitable occasions, in matters connected with the business of the House of Assembly and the welfare of the Colony.

The President of the Council then replied-
Mr. Speaker;
I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to say, that His Excellency being fully assured of the prudence, loyalty and good affection of the House of Assembly, most willingly grants to them all their privileges, conformajily to ancient usage, the laws of the land and Her Majesty's instructions.

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to
make a Speech to both Houses: of the EXegislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he hade to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which was read by the Clerk, and is as followeth :-

The late crisis in Commercial affairs, which has occasioned such universal embarrassment, has been falt in this community with much severity ; but I trast it will not be withont itg advantage, and that it may have the effect of confining cornmarcial enterpriee in future, within Tess specnlative limits.
A decrease in the public Revenue was anticipated, but I am happy to inform you that it is not so great as was approbended; and I trast that by judicious economy in future appiopriations, you will find means of moeting the deficiency.

And Mr. Conroy reported that the Committee had gone through the draft Address reported from the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, and had adopted the same, without making' any amendment thereto ; and the sait Address was again read at the Clerk's. Table. and is as followeth :-

To His Excellency Sir: Dominick Daly, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edicard, and the Territorite thereinto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, \&c. \&c. \&c.
May it Please Yotr Exchiexcy:-

1. We, the Representatives of the People of Prince Edmard Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, beg to thank your Excellency for your speech in pening the present Session.
2. Notwithstanding the late period at which it has becone necessary for your Excellency to convene the Legislature, your; Excellency may rely on our williggpess to derote the time niecessary for the maturing of those;measures which are essential fifor the maintenance of public cre⿻i一it:
3. The embarrassment and inconvenience which have been so severcly feit in this commanity, consequent upon the late commercial crisis, we may reasonably expect will not be without their niterior adoantages, by restraining commercial enterprise in future, within more reasonable limits.
4. It is gratifying to learn from your Excellency that the anticipated decrease in the public revenue is not so great as was apprehended. In order to meet the deficiency, we beg to assure your Excellency that we will studiously endeavour to exercise the most jadicious economy in orir future appropriations.
5. We shall.be prepared to grant the necessary supplies for the public service so soon as the accounts for the past, and the estimates for the current year shall be laid before us.
6. The very abundant harvest with which Proridence, last season, has blessed the labours of the husoandman, naturally calls for the expression of our warmest thankfulness; and it is a very gratifying reflection, to find that produce of all sorts has not only been exported to a large extent, but has commanded ready sale at advantageous prices.
7. It is also satisfactory to learn that there has been so considerable an increase in the export of Fish-a circumstance which cannot fail to attract public attention to this valuable and important branch of industry.
8. The communications referred to by your Excellency, upon the subject of a Federal Union of the North American Provinces when laid before us, shall receive that attention which their importance demands.
9. So soon as your Excellency is pleased to lay before us the Despatch from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, setting forth the grounds of the disallowance of the Act relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island, we will be materially aided in forming a correct judgment as to the most prudent course to be adopted in regard to this question.
10. We are not surprised to learn that Her Majesty's Government has declined to propose the contemplated Loan to the Imperial Parliament; and the Despatches upon the subject; will no doubt fully inform us of the grounds upon which this refusal has been based.
11. It is satisfactory to know that the question of the Land Tenures and Fishery Reserves is engaging the attention of the Secretary of State; and so soon as the documents containing his suggestion for facilitating the equitable adjustment of the question shall be laid before us, we beg to assure your Excellency that we will be prepared to give that careful consideration to the subject which its grave importance entitles it to.
12. We trust, notwithstanding'your. Excelleacy having tendered your resignation of the distinguished and highly important position of Representative of Her Majeety in this Colony, and of the intended employment of your Excellency's services in another portion of Her Majesty's Colonial possessions, we will nevertheless enjoy the adrantage of your Excellency's personal administration until the arrival of your successor in the Colony.
13. We beg to convey to your Excellency the expression of our confidence in your Excellency's desire earnestly to cooperate with us in our exertions to promote the general welfare of the Colony.

## And the said report being again read-

The Hon. Mr. Whelan moved to amend the same, by striking out the whole of the ninth, tenth and eleventh paragraphs of the said Address, and substituting the following :-

We learn with regret that the Act passed last session, relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island, has not received the Royal assent. We shall give carcful attention to the grounds set forth by the Secretary of State for advisizg the disallowance of this Act, so essential to the welfare of a large portion of her Majesty's subjects, and so long and loudly called for.

It is likewise with surprise we learn that it is not the intention of Her Majesty's present Government to propose to the Imperial Parliament the guaranteed Loan contemplated for this Island. This measure was adopted at the suggestion and with the concarrence of a late Colonial Minister, esperienced in Colonial affairs, and advocated in tio House of Commons by his saccessor, the Right Hon. Lord Stanley,thus pledging the faith of the Crown to assist the local Legislature and Government to mature a measure so well calculated to allay public discontent and promote the welfare of the people. The Secretary of State's Despatches on this subject, will receive our earnest deliberations.

We do, however, observe with satisfaction that the whole question of the Land Tenures, together with that of the Fishery Reserves; is engaging the anxious attention of Her Majesty's Colonial Minister; and we shall give respectfal attention to the suggestion referred to by your Excellency for facilitating the equitable adjustment of the difficulties that appear to have surrounded those questions. But should it' not be of the most feasible and liberal nature, we shall be compelled to believe that the only mode of an effectual settlement is to be found in the enforcement of the conditions of the Original Grants, by means of which, justice may be
done to the Tenantry, with respect to the land tenures generally, and the claims of the Proprietors to any portion of the Fishery Reserves be fully investigated.

The recollection of the just and impartial manner in which you have administered the Government of this Island for a period of nearly five years, and the readiuess you have always shown to co-operate with the Legislature in carrying out all measures that were calculated to advance the interests of this Colony-will make us feel deeply interested in your future welfare and happiness:

The House divided on the motion of amendment:

While bearing testimony to the justice and impartiality of your Excellency's past administration of this Government, the House of Assembly deem it their duty to express their deep regret that any untoward circumstances should bave arisen to render it advisable on your Excelleney's part to consent to the recent alterations in the Constitution of this Colony. When the system of Responsible Government was put in operation here in 1851, it was expressly declared by Act of Parliament, to which Her Majesty readily gave her assent, that it shonld be the same as that which obtains in the neighbouring Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia a:idi New Brunswick, the leading feature of which system is, the: the Departmental Officers of the Government shall be directly responsible to the people, by bolding seats in the Legislature. This form of Government has been attended with the best results wherever it has preailed; and it mas conceded to this Colony on condition of its paying the charges of the Civil List beretofore borne by the Imperial Government. Prituce Edward Island has faithfully fullilled its part of the agreement, and its prosperity has been promoted by the new system of administration. But the Government being now formed on principles directly at variance with those which were established in 1851, and the people having lost all control over the most important offices in the administration, the House of Assembly feel called upon to remonstrate against such a sacrifice of the people's rights, and to declare that should a system, so perricious, so unconstitutional, and so much at variance with the law of the land be contioned to characterise the administration of this Goreroment, your Escellency's advisers will not be entitled to the confidence of the people.

That the Act 18th Vietoria, Cap. 31, intituled "An Act to authorize remaneration to che Members of the Legislative Council for their services in the General Assembly "expired on the tenth day of May last (being the time of the issaing of the Writs for the General Election which took place next after the passing of the said Act.).

Ordered, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

Resolved, therefore, that the said Sheriff was not authorized to do so by law, and that the investigation of any votes beyond those of the said Michael Power, Donald MeMillan and Malcolm McDonald, is contrary to the neaning and intention of the Election Law of this Colony, and that this Committee are not justified in admitting the evidence relating to the votes of the said George Sentner, John Plyer and Alexander Hamilton.
2. and legal votes over the said Ronald Walker, the said Thomas Owen is entitled by law to take his seat in this House as a Member for the said Third Electoral District of King's County ; and that the said Sheriff of the said County be directed forthwith to amend his return to the Writ of Electionfor the said District, by striking out the name of the said Ronald Walker and inserting that of the said Thomas Owen, as a Member retarned for the said District.

Your Committee to whom was referred the several petitions for opening new lines of roads, have to report:-

1. On the petition of certain inhabitants of Lot 61. That in 1856, the House of Assembly recommended the Government to apprint "an inquisition to be held, and a line of road opened on the County line between King's and Queen's Counties, from the Whim road to the Murray Harbour road, at the southern corner of Lot 61." The inquisition took place accordingly, but no further action was taken by the Government in the matter. Your Committee recommend thas the whole, or at all events as much as possible, of the line of road be opened in the ensuing season. The application, in the same petition, for opening the Sturgeon and St. Mary's roads from the County line, is founded on good grounds, and ought to be opened under the Road Compensatioo Act, 14 Victoria, cap. 1, to afford those facilities the petitioners require.
2. The petition of inhabitants of Lot 11, prays for the oponing of a road from the Main Post Road to the Western Road, to enable them to occupy lands purchased from the Goverument. Your Committee consider that the line of road prayed for, ought to be opened by the Government, as being a portion of the Crown Lands.
3. The petition from the inhabitants of the head of Montague River and surrounding Settlements, is to open a road.
from Queen's road, north side of Montague River, and between Donald D. Campbell's and Alexander Macdonald's farms. This your Committee would recommend, as shortening the present and crooked line of road (from the upper Montague Bridge towards the Main Post Road) called Sparrun's Road, at the south end; bat this would have to be done under che Act 14 Victoria, cap. 1, unless a right of way is given by Campbell and Macionald, when a sum might be appropriated out of the $10 a d$ monegs for the district, for the object prayed for.
4. Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the petition of divers inhabitants of Cavendish, Cavendish Road, North Rustico aud adjoining Settlements, to open a line of road along the Cape or Bank, eastward of the Main Road from Charlottetown to the Gulf shore; which old road now prayed to be re-opened, was clcsed by consent of the settlers some years since, and the present road opencd through the farms, further from the shore.
5. The petition of the inhabitants of Lots 61 and 63 , is for a road from the Main Road to the Gaspereaux shore, through the late Mr. Lewellin's farm, or some other suitable line. Your Committee recommend that if Mr. Sullivan's agent and the owner of the farm adjoining, southward of the late Mr. Lewellin's farm, will give, free of any charge, a sufficient right of way (say eighteen feet) to the public, that a sum be appropriated out of the usual road grant for the district towards opening the new line prayed for.
6. The two petitions from the inbabitants of Murray River, south side, Lot 64, King's County, might at first sight appear antagonistic; but your Committee consider that both pray for the same object, viz: the opening of a line of road from the west end of the present lower road to the mais road; and which your Committee recommend ander the provisions of the Act 14 Victoria, cap. 1, unless a free right of way is given by the owners or occupiers of the lands.

Resolved, That an Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying His Excellency to direct that the recommendations contained in the foregoing report be carried into effect.

3. Resolved, That the sum of five thousand eight hundred and twenty-five pounds, being the amount provided by Statute as salaries to the public officers, be granted and paid to the several public officers entitled to receive the same.
4. Resolved, That the sum of one hundred pounds be granted and paid, as the salary by Statute, of the Assistant Controller of Customs and Navigation Laws, and Collector of Impost.
5. Resolved, That the following salaries and allowances not provided by Statute, be paid for the following services, viz:Education, a sum sufficient.

And the said Resolutions being again severally read, were, on the question being seperately put thereon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the order limiting the time for the reception of private petitions be suspended; and thereupon,

A petition of Anne Cullen, Widow of William Cullen, formcrly Clerk of the House of Assembly, was presented to the House by Mr. Davies, and the same was received and read, setting forth that she is now far advanced in life and her prospects are anything but cheering, and praying for a small annual grant, for her future support.

A motion being made that the said petis.on be referred to the Committee of Supply,

The Hon. Mr. Perry moved in amendment to the motion, to leave out all after the word "that," and substitute the following "the prayer of the petition be rejected."

And the motion being seconded and the question put thereon, it passed in the negative.

The question being then put on the main motion, it was carried in the affirmative; and

Ordered, accordingly.
Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the various Despatches from the Secretary of State to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and transmitted to this House, by Messages of His Excellency, on Wednesday, the 20th day of April last.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. J. Yeo took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.
And the Chairman reported that the Committee had come to several Resolutions, which he was directed to repart to the House.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again-which the House agreed to.

The Resolutions reported from the Committee were then read by the Clerk, and are as follow:
Wheress certain questions arising out of the originai grants of the lands in this Istand, severally called the Escheat question, the Fishery Reserves' question, and the Quit Rent question, have for many years cuused much discussion and difference of opinion amongst the people of this 1 sland, and many delusive projects and impracticable measures have been, and are from time to time, enunciated respecting each questions, whereby the teoantry bave been, and are greatly imposed upou, and induced to support the propounders of such measures, under the delusive hope that by doing so they will be relieved from the pasment of rent; and the attention both of the people and Legislature being occupied with such deceptive schemes, measures tending to develope the resources of the Colony are not only neglected, but a state of society, equally opposed to che moral, social, and political welfare of the peuple and their true interests, is produced ; and whereas various Despatches have for a great number of years declared that Her Majesty's Government will not consent to any compulsory interference with the lands and rights of the Proprietors, and which has been strongly reiterated in the Despatches of Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton-now Her Ma-
jesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies-dated the 20th October, 1858, and 3d December, 1858, from which it is clear that any measures for the benefit of the Tenantry mast result from amicable arrangement with the Proprietors; and whereas the agitation of hostile measures, such as Escheat, Fishery Reserves, and Quit Rents, must not only result, as they always have done, in leading the tenantry into costs and trouble, without, in any way, ameliorating their condition, but will also engender a feeling in the Proprietors, rendering them disinclined to listen to proposals which, if such agitation wore at an end, they would be likely to entertain; and whereas Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton in his Despatches above referred to, while refusing to sanction tweasures which in England are considered inconsistent with the rights of property, has expressed the readiness of Her Majesty's Government to co-operate with the Legislature in furthering measures for the settlement of the land tenures, if "conceired in a spirit of fairness and conciliation to all parties": -

Therefore Resolted, 1st, Tbat a humule address be presented to Her Majesty, praying that Her Majesty will be pleased to direct a commission to some discreet and impartial person, not connected with this Island, or its affais, to enquire into the existing relations between Landlord and Tenant, and to negotiate with"the Proprietors for such abatement of present liabiiities, and for such terms for enabling the Tenants to convert their leaseholds inte freeholds, aswithout infringing on the rights of the landlords-may be fairly and reasonably assed for to ameliorate the condition of the Tenantry.

2d. Resolfed, That in the opinion of this House, the basis of any such arrangement should be a large remission of arrears of rents now due; and secondly, the giving every tenant holding under a long lease an option of purcbasing his land at a certain rate, at any time he might find it convenient to do so.
3. Resolfed, That a remission of arrears of rent may be reasonably asked, inasmach as the existence of these arrears, although it is due partly to an unvillingness of the tenants to pay rent, under the idea that Escheat, or some other delusive scheme, would enable them to erade. yet it is also due in part to the laches and remissness of the landlords and their agents in not enforcing it, and because, in many cases, the arrears, however incurred, amout to so large a sum, that the exacting them would prove ruinous to a large number of loyal and industrious people; and would further entirely put it out of their power to avail themselves of the plan suggested in subsequent resolations, for purchasing their farms.

4th. Besolved, That as the circumstances of the tenantry would not in general enable them to pay down any large portion of the parchase moaey, the best and only means for converting the tenares into freebolds lies in the adoption of
a plan which would practically constitate every farm a saring's bank for its owner, in which he could, from time to time, invest his savings at interest towards the purchase of his farm, an arrangement which could be effected by the following means, viz: that the Landlords should agree to permit the Tenants to purchase their farms for such sum per acre as sbould be fixed upon; and providing farther, that when any tenant (whose reat was paid up) should be desirous of paying any sum, not being less than ten pounds, towards the parchase of his land, be shonld have the option of doing so, and that the interest on the ten pounds, or other amount so paid, should theneeforth go in reduction of his yearly rent, and so on fur every payment on account of purchase, until the whole was paid, when be should reeeive his deed; and that similar covenants should be inserted in all fature leases for terms over forty gears. Such an arrangement would uot ooly give the tenant the advantage of paying an instalment of bis purchase money, and at the same time reducing his rent whenever he chose, without subjecting bin to the rexation and costs incident to cases of ivability to meet instalments agreed to be paid at a particular day, but would, in the opinion of this Hoase, grodually, but certainly, change the tenures into freeholds without the aid of loans, and the expensive subsistence of Public Offeers, by whicb heary liabilities have already been, and would, if perservered in, to a muck greater extent, be imposed on the public finances.

## And the said Report being again read,

The Hon. Mr. Whelan moved in amendment to the same, that all after the word "Whereas" be struck out, and the following inserted in lieu thereof:-

Certuin despatches from fornier Secretaries of State for the Colonies, and printed in the Journals of the Houst of Assembly of this Island, clearly show that the Crown never relinquished, in favour of the assumed Proprietors of Township Lands in Prince Edward Island, ita claim to the arrears of Quit Rents, or to the controul of the Fishery Reserves, and by the Civil List Bill passed in 1851 ceded to tisis Colony tid interest in those Quit Rents and Reserves.
Resolved, therefore, that measures ehould be adopted to :ecover from the Proprietors of Township Lands the amount of Quit Rents of which they have been long in arrears, so soon as the present Act authorising an assessment upon such ethall expire-the money being requisite for the encouragement of education and for the general inprucement of the Colony; and that other measures should be resorted to, to put in force :he right which this Colony has legally acquired to lease or otherwise dispose of the Fishery Reserves for the benefit of the people of this Island.
Wherras the Government ond Legislature of this Island have. for several years past, shewn a disposition to settle by amicsble means, the long agitated question wibb respect to the tenures of
land in this Island ; and as ar earnest of that disposition, a Bill was passed in 1853-which received the sanction of the Imperia! Government-to purchase the estates of the land claimants at certain fixed rates, under the operation of which two valuable estates were purchased and sold in small tracts to the settlers thereon, by means of which their material prosperity has been much advanced; and the Legistature of this Colony subsequently passed a Bill to raise \& Loan by Imperial guarantee, so that greater effect might be given to the principles of the Purchase Bill, and which measure was strongly recommended by the Right Hon. Heary Laboacbere and the Right Hon. Lord Stanley, late Secrataries of State for the Colonies. But the Loan Bill having been disallowed-by means of private intrigue and gross misrepresentation, as this Committee believe-and it being inexpedient to effect any further parchases of Township lands in the absence of such a measure, this Honse regres that they perceive no other method of effecting a settiement of the question of the Land tenures that will prove satisfactory to the people of this Island, than by resorting to their undoubted constitutional right of demanding an investigation in:o the original tities of the assumed Land Proprietors.
Resolfed, therefore, that an address be presented to Her Majesty, praying that she may be graciously pleased to authorise the establishment of a Court of Enquiry, to investigate the claims of individuals holding Township lands in this lsland, in virtue of Crown Grants, the conditions upon which they were tnade not having been complied with.

Mr. Cooper then moved to amend the said reported resolutions, by expunging the whole thereof, and substituting the following:

Rissolved, That repeated applications have been made to Ministers, from the gear 1787, to resume the ferfeited lands,
and settle the inhabitants; and in November 1802, Governer Fanning communicated a Despatch, in amswer to suefi kpplications, that His Majesty was gracionsly pleaseì to signiify his royal pleasure, by the Right Honorable Lord Hobstr, Secretary for the Colonies, that the Goverument of this Istand should be prepared to pursue, without loss of time, when circumstances should render it advisable, the requisita and legal steps for effectually revesting in the Crown such Lands as might be liable to be eschicated and forfeited to His Majesty, either by non-improvement, non-payment of quit rent, or non-performance of any of the conditions of the grants thereof. That in obedience to His Majesty's pleasure, as before signified, an Act was passed, on the 2nd of April, 1803, for effectually revesting in His Majesty, his heirs and successors, all such Lands as are liable to be escheated in this Fsland. That this Act was not put in operation until the year 1818, when only two Townships, Numbers 15 and 55, were revested in the Crown by Escheat; and the Inhabitants settled in freehold; while other townships were equally liable to escheat, and the inhabitants entitled to be settled in freehold.

That an eqitable adjustment between landlord and tenant, as recommended by Earl Grey, and Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton ; is at variance with His Majesty's pleasure as signified by Lord Hobart, because an equitable adjustment cenanot be effected, until the titles of the persons holding over forfeited lands are investigated to expose the wrongy whioh bave been isflicted upon British sabjects, by keeping them in a position intended for foreigners.
Therefore Rasolved, that an Act passed in the year 1803, intituled "An Act for effectually revesting in His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, all such Lands as are, or may be lisble to forfeiture within this Island," be carried into operation.
The House divided on the motion of amend ment.

And the names being called for, they were taken down as in the last preceding division:

"Resolved, That a delegation composed of Messrs. Kent and Carter, Members of this House, having been sent, last spring, to the British North American Colonies to solicit their aid in resistance to the Convention entered into in January 1857, between Her Majesty's Government and the Emperor of the Firench,
on the subject of the fisheries of this Colony, and those Gentlemen having received the promptest and most cordial co-operation of the Legislatures and people of our sister Colonies, and the said Convention having been withdrawn, with an emphatic declaration and recognition of the territorial and maritime rights of the people of this Colony.
" Resolved, That Mr. Speaker do communicate the warmest thanks of this House, to the Legislatures of the several Colonies to whom we are so deeply indebted for their influential aid and sympathy.
"Passed the House of Assembly, 13th April, 1858.

"Clerk of Assembly."

A petition of Henry Palmer and Theophilus Stewart, Indian Commissioners, was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr. Thornton, and the same was received and read, setting forth the claim on the part of the Indian population, for a renewed grant for the present year, for the purchase of seed potatoes, as well as for the relief and succour of the indigent sick and aged amongst them; and the great and important benefits conferred on the recepients of the past liberality and benevolence of the Legislature
and Government in consequence of the appropriations annually made for these objects, since the year 1855, and praying that an equal amount of sympathy and consideration for this long neglected and meritorious part of the population will be extended towards them by the House when in supply.

Ordered, That the said petition do lie on the Table.

The Hon. Mr. Yeo from the Special Committee to whom was referred every petition relating to Schools and Education, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk's Table.

Ordered, That the said Report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the s:id Committee.

The Hon. Mr. Nacaulay took the Chair of the Commitee; and after some time spent therein-

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.
And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress and had directed them to move for leave to sit again-which the House agreed to.

A Message from the Council by Mr. Desbrisay :-
Mr. Speaker ;
The Legislative Council have passed the Bills intituled as follows, without any amendment, viz:-
"An Act further to continue an Act regulating Seamen shipped on board of any ship or vessel belonging to Prince Edward Island, whilst within the preciucts of the said Island."
"An Act to amend the Act to enable the Supreme Court of Judicature to give relief against adverse claims made against Sheriffs and other persons having no interest in the subject of such claims."
"An Act to incorporate the Trustees of the Baptist Church at Bedeque."
"An Act for regulating the size and quality of fish barrels and tierces, and the weight of fish made up therein, and for the appointment of fish Inspectors; also, to regulate the inspection of pickled fish for sale within this Island, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned."

Your Committee appointed to examine and report upon Private Bills, baving onder their consideration two certain Bills referred to them, viz: a Bill to extend Telegraphic communication, and a Bill to amend the Att incorporating the Cbarlottetown Gas Light Company, submit-that both the Bills in question are of a private nature; but inasmuch as the fees upon similar Bills bave not bitherto, in all cases, been rigorously exacted by the House, sour Committee would recommend that the said Bills be exempt from such fees.
With regard, however, to the Bill to extend Telegraphic commanication; as the passing of the measure would involve a considerable annoal charge upon the revenues of the Colony, your Committee cannot recommend that the Bill be proceeded with, daring the present Session.

Resolved, That a Committe be appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, pursuant to the resolutions adopted from the Committee of the whole House yesterday, on the consideration of the Despatches of the Secretary of State.

A petition of Alexander Sutherland, Minister, and of others, members of the congregation of the Free Church, Bedeque Road, Township No. iif, was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr. Haviland, and the same was received and read, praying for an Act of incorporation ; and thereupon,

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Haviland have leave to introduce a Bill to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Free Church congregation, Bedeque Road, Prince Edward Island.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time.

A petition of Alexander Sutherland, Minister, and of others, members of the Free Church congregation at New London, was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr. Haviland, and the same was received and read, praying for an Act of incorporation; and thereupon,

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Haviland bave leave to introduce a Bill to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Free Church congregation at New London.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be referred to the Special Committee appointed to report on every Private Bill, to examine the same and report thereon.

Mr. Davies from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of Duncan Macphee and Hector Maclean, contractors for the erection of Prince Street Wharf, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read, and is as followeth :-

Your Committee to whom was referred the petition of Duncan Macphre and Hector Maclean, buiiders of the Ferry Wharf, Prince Street, Charlottetown, having made careful enquiry into the merits of the petition, have to report-
That upon the completion of Prince Street wharf in January, 1858, application was made by the contractors, to the Government, for pasment of the last iustalment then due thereon, as also for the amount of an account then furnighed for extra work, amounting to $£ 156$ 7s. 7 dd ., -which applieation was referred to \& Committee of the Executive Couveil. to report thereon.
The said Committee recommended payment of last instal-ment-less the eam of $£ 665 \mathrm{~s}$. for the Superintendants' ove: time, after the first of September, 1857, the date on which the contract was to have been finished under penalty; and also that the sum of $£ 345 \mathrm{~s}$. 7d. only, be paid for the extra
work, instead of $£ 156$ 7s. 7 d . claimed by the conatractors. Said Committee forther reoommended that any balance of the penalty should not be exacted from the contractors, as the wharf was so far finished in Octoper, as to admit of its being used by the pablic.
This report was signed and agreed to by the contractors, add pagment made in accordance with it.

Your Committee-from the preceding explanaticn-are of opinion that this settlement mast be regarded as final and binding on petitioners, and cannot recemmend that it be distarbed.

They, Lowever, in justice to the petitioners, feel bound to state, that they corceive petitioners were bardly dealt with by the Government, for the following reasons,-first, it was covenanted by the agreement, that "timely notice" was to be given, if any deriation was made from the original plan; secondly, that ang. extra work, or departure from such plan, if entailing additional work, was to be left to the valuation of two.disinterested persons, one to be named by each of the parties to the agreement; and lastly, that payment was to be made in current money of the Island, at certain dates, as the work progressed.
Your Committee regret to have to say, that these covenants in the agreement do not appear to have been carried out with good faith by the Government, as petitioners state that timely uotice was not given of said deviations made from the original plan, which retarded the progress of the work, and ought to have invalidated the penal clause in the agreement.
That the extra work was not referred to the valuation of two disinterested persons, as agreed upon; but petitioners were, from the pressure of clamorous creditors ander the necessity of acceding to the dictation of the Government; and that payment was made in warrants, on which they had to sabmit to a large discount.

Your Committer are of opinion thatipetaioners are entitled to the favorable consideration of this Fionorable Houso; and recommend that, at least, the sum deducted from the petitioners, for the saperintendants over time, be paia to them.
All of which is respeatfoty sabmitted.

Mr. Gray from the Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, pursuant to the Resolutions adopted from the Committee of the whole House, on Thursday last, on the consideration of the various Despatches from the Secretary of State to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee, which Address was again read at the Clerk's Table, and is as followeth :-
to the queen's most excellent maj esty Most Gractovs Sovereitan:-
We, your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjecte, the Honse of Assembly of Prince Edward Island in Parliament assembled, beg to approach your Majesty, and most hambly submit for your Royal consideration the following premises:
In certain Despatches from one of Your Majesty's Ministere, the Right Honorable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Baronet, Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated Downing Street, 20tb Octoher and 3rd December, 1858, the Right Hodorable Baronet therein states " that the whole question of the land tenures in this Island, is engaging his most anxions aitoutition, and that it would give him anfeigned pleasure to receive such stiggestions for their amicable settlement, as could be acceptecl by Your Majesty's Government."

Having taken these Despatches into coneideration, after mature deliberation and with an ewrneat design to terminate the diaputes which have so long disturbed the pence and
harmory of the Coloay, the House have adopted the following Resolutions:-

Warrens certain questions arisiug out of the original graats of the lands in this Island, severally called the Escheat question, the Fishery Reserves' question, and the Quit Rent question, have for many years caused much discussion and differcace of opinion amongst the feople of this Island, and many delusive projects and impracticable measures have been, and are from time to time, enunciated respecting such questions, whereby the tenaniry have been, and are greatly imposed upon, and induced to support the propounders of such measures, under the delusire hope that by doing so they will be relieved fiom the payment of rent; and the attention both of the people and Legislatare being occupied with such deceptive schemes, measures tending to develope the resources of the Colony are not only neglected, but a state of scciety equally opposed to the moral, social, and political welfare of the people and their true interests, is produced ; and whereas various Despatches bave for a great number of years declared that Her Majesty's Government will not consent to any compalsory interference with the lands and rights of the Proprietors, and which has been strongly reiterated in the Despatches of Sir Edward Bulwer levtou-now Her Majesty's priacipal Secretary of State for the Colonies-dated the 20 th October, 1858 , and $3 d$ Decemb $\cdot \mathrm{r}_{\text {. }} 185 \mathrm{~S}$, from which it is clear that any measures for the benefit of the Tenantry must result from amicable arrangement with the Proprietors; and whereas the agitation of hostile measures, such as Eecheat, Fishery Reserves, add Quit Renta, must not only result, as they always bave done, in leading the tenantry into costs and trouble, without, in any way, ameliorating their condition, but will also eugender a fecling in the Proprietors, rendering them disinclined to listen to proposals which, if such agitation were at an end, they would be likely to entertain; and whereas Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton in bis Despatches ahove referred to, while refusing to sanction measures which in England are considered inconsisteat with the rights of property, has expreased the readiness of Her Majesty's Government to co-operate with the Legislature in farthering measures for the sottlement of the land tenures, if "conceived in a spirit of fairness and conciliation to all yartics":-

Therefore Resolfed, 1st, That a hamble address be presented to Her Majesty, praying that Her Majesty will be pleased to direct a commission to some discreet and impartial person, not connected with this Lsiand, or its affairs, to enquire into the existing relations between Landlord and Tenant, and to negotiate with the Proprietors for such abatement of present liabilities, and for such terms for enabling the Tenants to convert their leaseholds into freetrolds, aswithout infringing on the rights of the landlords-may be fairly and reasonably asked for to ameliorate the condition of the Tenadtry.

2nd. Resolved, Tat in the opinion of this Honse, the basis of any such arrangement should be a large remission of arrears of rents now dus; and secondly, the giving every tenaat holding under a long lease an option of purchasing his land at a certain rate, at any time he might find it convenient to do so.
3rd. Resolved, That a remission of arrears of rent may be reasonably asked, inasmuch as the existence of these arrears, although it is due partly to an unwillingness of the tenants to pay rent, under the idea that Fscheat, or some other delnsive sokeme, would onable them so evade, yet it is also due
in part to the laches and remisssess of the landlords and their agents in not enforcing it; and because, in many cases. the arrears. however incurres, amount to so large a sum, that the exacting them wonld prove ruinous to a large number of losal and indastrious people, and woald farther entirely put it out of their power to avail themselves of the plan sug. gested in subsequent resolutions, for purchasing their farms.

4th. Resolved, That as the circumstances of the tenantry would not in general, enable them to pay down any large portion of the purchase money, the best and onls means for converting the tenures into freeholds, lies in the adoption of a plin which would practically constitute every farm a savings' bank for its owner, in which he could, from time to time, invest his savings at interest, towards the purchase of his faru, au arrangement which could be effected by the following mians, viz: that the Lundlordy skould agree to permit the Tenants to purchase their farns for such sum per acre as stould be fixed upon; and providing farther, that when any tenant (whose rent was paid up) should be desirous of paying any sum, not being less than ten pounds, towards the purchase of his land, he should have the option of doing so, and that the interest on the ten pounds, or other amount so paid, should thencefurth go in reducti:口 of his yearly rent, and so on tor every payment ona account of purchase, until the whole was paid, when he should receive his deed; and that similar covenants should the inserted in all future leases for cerms. over forty years. Such an arrangement would not only give the tenant the advantage of payiug an instaluent of his purchase money, and at the sane time reducing his rent whenever he chose, without subjecting him to the vexation and costs incident to cases of inability to mect instalment. agreed to be paid at a particular day, bat would, in the opinion of this House, gradually, but certainly, change the tenures into freeholds without the aid of loans, and the expeasive subsistence of public officers, by which heavy liabilities have already been, and would, if perserered in, to a much greater extent, be imposed on the publie frnances.

We do therefore bumbly pray that Your Majesty will be pleased to tale the foregoing mattersinto your Royal consideration, and to appoint some fit and proper person or persons as Commissioner or Comasssioners, to enquire into the relations of Landiord and Teuant in this Island, and negociate with the proprietors of Township lands, tor the fixing some certain rate of price at which every tenant may, at ang time, have the option of purchasing his land, or of paying instalments of such purchase, and thereby gradually reducing the searly reut until the whole price thereof is paid; and also to negociate with the respective proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent in such cases, and on such Townships as the said Commissioner or Commissioners, from the circumstances of the Tenantry or otherwise, may deem reasonable and expedient; and also to make such report respecting the Fishery Reserve question, and other questions relating to the Township lands of this Island, as we confidently hope, will effect a final settlement thereof, and prevent all agitation regarding the same, in future.

And the said Address being again read, and the question put thereon,

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.
And Mr. Macneill reported thatthe Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, had amended and then adopted the same; and the report so amended being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:

Your Committee to whom were referred the several petitions of inbabitants of different sections of the Island, praying for the establishment and removal of Post Offices, have to report, that haring cxamined the various petitions and applications referred to them, they sabmit the following recommendations.

1. That the Post Office at West River, Township No. 47, ie removed near to John McDonald's, Cross Roads.
2. Also, that the Post Office at Alesander McKinnon's, Township No. 14, be removed near to John Connors's, Township No. 14.
3. Also, that the Post Offiee at Bryan's Cross, Township No. 31, be remored to Bonshaw, Tomaship No. 30.
4. Also, that a Post Office be established at Cornwall, Township No. 52; and
5. That a Post Office be established at Towaship No. 65, south side of Elliot River.
6. Your Committee have to report that at the present time there are two Post Offices at a distance of about two miles from each other on the south side of Murray Harbour; and instead of these two Post Offices, your Committee recommend that one Post Office be established at or near Mr. Charles Brehaut's, shoemaker, Marras Harbour, and another Post Office at the Littie Sands, at or near Mr. Angus Biue's, junior; as by this alteration, your Coramittee are of opinion the various settlements of Murray'Harbour (soutb), White Sands, High Bank and Little Sands will be better provided for, in their postal accommodations, than at preseot.
7. Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the petitiun of inbabitants of Townships Nos. 38 and 39 , for the establisbment of a Post Office on the St. Peter's Road.
8. Your Committee cannot recommend the prajer of the petition of Josiab Grant, Postmaster at Cascumpec, for an iacrease of salary.
9. Your Committee find, from a statement furnished by the Postmaster General, that the amount of postage on letters sent to and received from Launching Place, for 1856, 1857 and 1858, was only thirty-one shillings for those three years; while the amount paid to the Postmaster and for carriage of the Launching Place mails, for the same period, was $£ 18$ 0s. 2d. Yoar Committee therafore recommend that the above way office be no longer continued, but in fatare the letters, \&c., to that part of the country, be formarded to the nearest Post Office.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the report be a Committee to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that His Excellency will be pleased to direct the recommendations contained in the said report to be carried into effect.

A Message from the Council by Mr. Des-brisay:-

## Mr. Speaker;

The Legislative Council have agreed to the amendments made by the House of Assembly to the Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Acts concerning the property of the Methodist Church in Prince Edward Island," without any amendment.

And then he withdrew.

Mr. Conroy from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of inhabitants of Townships Nos. 5 and 6 , praying for the opening and completion of a road from the new bridge at Mill River to the Settlement at Township No. 6, in lien of that previously proposed, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:-
Your Committee to whom was referred the pelition of inhabitants of Cascumpec, praying for the opening of a road to Mill River bridge, south-west side, have to report-that they would recommend the Governmeut to appoint a Commission to report to this Hoase, in its nest Session, an the most eligible site for a road to said bridge.

The Hon. Mr. Palmer from the Committée appointed to search the Journals of the Legislative Council to ascertain the proceedings had in reference to the recent change in the construc-
tion of the Executive Council of this Colony, reported that they had found the following entry :-

After some time, the House was resumed, and Mr. Craswell repcrted that the Committee bad agreed to the draft of an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, relative to the formation of the Government of this Colony.

"The said Address was then read, and is as followeth :-
"To the Qeeen’s Most Excellent Majestr.
"We, Your Majesty's faitinful subjects, the Members of Your Majesty's Legislative Council of Prince Edward Island. in Colonial Parliament now assembled, humbly approach your Throne with sentiments of loyalty and attachwent to jour august person and Government.
"Your Majesty was graciousi'y pleased, in the jear 1851, to concede to your faithful subjects in Prince Edward Island the benefits of Constitutional or Responsible Government.
"To this end Your Majesty was pleased to give your royal assent to a Bill transmitted from this Legislature, and passed on the 23 rd April, 1851.
"This Act conceded to this Island a ssstem of Responsible Government similar to that which is in force in Your Majesty's neighbouring Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, together with Your Majesty's real and personal property, in exchange for the assumption by this Colonial Legislature of the payments necessary for the future support of the Civil Charges of Your Majesty's Government, as likewise of sundry Pensions to persons indicated by Your Majesty who had been long official servants of the Crown in this Is'and.
"'She conditions of this arrangement have been faithfully carried out on the part of your faithful subjects, and Your Majesty need not be reminded that Responsible Gorernment consists in the members of a Government being respectively members of one or other branch of a Legislature, which is the practice now in force in the before named neighbouring Propitces.
"At a recent Election, with the details of which it is not necessary to trouble Your Majesty, a small majority was ohtained in the House of Assembly, of parties who codearoured to do away with the constitutional form of Government.
" A majority, homever, having been declared, it became the duty of the former administration to place their offices at the disposal of Your Majesty's Representative.
"Their successors bave insisted on appointing to all the Departmental and most important. offices in the Colons. persons who have no seats in the Legislatare, and who are consequently in no way responsible to the people, and the Statute whereby all persons accepting office under the Cromr are, when members of the Assembly, compelled to present themselves to their constituents for re-election, is thos evaded, and no parliamentary responsibility exists.
"In the year 1854, when Your Majesty's affairs and the interests of your subjects were watched over by Sir Alexander Bannerman, now Lieat. Governor of Newfoandland, a similar attempt to abrogate the Constitution was made by the same parties. On that occasion Your Majesty's Legislative Council deemed it a duty they owed to Your Majesty and the country to present to His Excellency the following Address:
"To His Excellency Sir Alexander Bannerman, Knight, Licutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island, Prince Edzeard, \&c. \&c. \&c.

- Mar it Please Your Excellevcr.
"We, the Members of Her Majesty's Legislative Council of Prince Edward Island, are desirous of calling Your Excellency's attention to the recent appointments to offices in the Government of this Island. made, as it appears to us, in riolation of the compact entered into on Your Excellency's arrival in the Colony, and calculated to deprive Her Najesty's subjects of the form of Government at that time graciously conceded to their representations and wishes by Her Miajesty's command.
"We consider ourselvesjastified in believing that the form of Government was understood to be Responsible Departmental Government, as in our estimation will be made evident in reference to Your Excellency's Speech on your first meeting the Coloniad Legislature, as well as to the Act of 16th Victoria, Cap. 3, in both of which documents the nature of the Responsible Government granted was explained and described to be similar to that then in furce in the Provinces of Canada, NovaScotia, and Nex Brunswick-a construction which has received its confirmation from its being so practised under Your Excellency's auspices up to the time of the recent change of Government.
"The conditions imposed on this Colony as their part of the compact, have been faithfully performed, whilst the proceedings of Your Excellency's present advisers give us just cause to apprebend the departure from that compact which in our opinion was entered into on the part of the Crown.
"We are prepared to admit that under the system conceded to us, a majcrity of the House of Assembly is constitativnally entitled to the possession of the Government. and readily acknowledge that were it not that Her Majesty's Royal allowance to an Act creating an entire new Franchise not yet acted on, connected with other circumstances, points out that the existing House of Assembly is not a true representation of the people-it would be the duty of this House to give Your Excellency's Government a constitutional support were it sought on terms honourable to the Members of this Council.
.. That notwithstanding the efficiency of this branch of the Iegislature is sensibly affected by having no adequate share in the Government of the Colony, we entirely repudiate the sapposition that to a Government constracted on those principles which we conceive to be constitational and responsible, any difficulties would be offered by any majority of this House, which might differ from that Government, on less important political opinions.
"We further beg to refer to Your Excellency's Speech at :he opeaing of the present Session, when you were pleased to state that you had received a requisition from several members of the Assembly, to convene the Legislature on an early day, they stating that "they considered that no time should be lost in order to exclude by legal enactment, departmental officers from occupying seats in the Legislature," Your Exeellency was pleased in reply to say that you declined to call the Legislature together at an unusual period, because in so doing you might be deemed to admit that evils had arisen demanding an immediate change, whilst you bore testimony to the prosperity of the Colony under the existing form of Government.
"We agree with Your Excellency that there exists no canse for alteration, nor do we recognize any desire for it on the uart of the people.
"That in the mean time the offices of Keeper of Plans and Treasurer, filled heretofore by members of this Council, are given to gentiemen haring no seats in the Legislature.
." That, iu respect to the Treasurer in particular, the absence of that officer from one or other branch of the Legistature is not only a great inconvenience, when iuformation is required, hat withdraws that department from the surveillance of the public, which experience has shown to be so necessary to the maintenance ut pablic confidénce.
"Reviewiug these circumstances, we beg to draw Your Excellency's atrention to the fact that the Government have a majority in the House of Assembly consisting of those who proposed to Your Excellency their intention to pass legal enactments for the purpose of excluding departmental officers from the Legislature, notwithstanding which, no step bavebeen taken to carry out their expressed views on this matter; and two of that majority actually hold office and remain in the Iregislatare, yet they bave made use of their official position as members of Your Excellency's Government ta introdnce changes not warranted nor sought by the people.
"And thus it is proposed to Your Excellency to introduce ingredients of Government from the United States into the constitution of this Ber Majesty's Colony, to which Her Majesty's subjects are averse, and which are in imitation of a system probably having its origin, not in any analagous circumstances, bat in the fact that in a ferderal anion the pretensions of the representatives of different states are very difficult of adjustment, and which is moreover accompanied by great and acknowledged practical evils, aud is known to be disapproved of in the American States themselves, on the just ground that their departmental officers are not the serFants of the people, but of the President.
- "We, therefore, pray that Your'Excellency will be pleased to interfere and avert, in such manner as may to your nisdom appear best suited, these impending evils."
"After the ensaing prorogation, this was followed by His Excellency's dissolving the then House of Assembly, and after the election of a new Parliament, the departmental officers were cosstitutionally appointed from both Houses of the Legislature; and we know that His Excellency Sir Alexander Bannerman's prompt decision in this matter was bonored by Your Majesty's Royai approbation: The some-
what adventitious circumstanoes of two very recent general elections render a similar course unadvisable the the present instance.
"But if. in the year 1854, there existed powerfin-reasons for so decisive a step, those reasons not only exist at the present time in their fall extent, but much has been added to aggravate the injustice then done to stiis braneh of the Legislature; for, at that time, there were in this House two members named to take their part in the Frecutive Government. At this time, although there are two honorable gentlemen coinciding in political matters with the majority in the House of Aesembly, and one of whom is now selected by themselves, the framers of the Government have not coindescended to acknowledge the existence of the Liegislative Council by placing either of these gentlemen in the Execttive Government.
"And here we think it proper to assure Your Majesty, that though a decided majority of this Council does not, in geperal, agree in opinion on public measures with the majority, of the new House of Assembly, notbing can be farther from our thoughts than to interrupe by our votes the legitimate proceedings of the House of Assembly. If such an intention should be alleged against us, we can but deny its veracity and appeal to the Journals of our House in the year 1854, when parties and circumssances were relatively the same, for its refatation. The imputation can have no weight until it is borne out by our proceedings.
"To sum up the ground-work of our humble representation, we complain of a total exclusion from the Executive Government of the Colong.
"We beg most dutifally to lay before Your Majests some further facts, of which it appears to us to be our bounden daty to take care that Your Majesty should not remain aninformed.
"In a population so mixed as this is, it has been a just policy not.altogether to exclude from the administration of its affairs the Roman Catholic population, consisting of 32,000 out of 71,000, as appears by the Census taken in 1855.
"In the late Executive Conncil, out of nine members, there were three Roman Catholics. In that just formed there is not one.
"As thiugs are, we, Your Majesty's dutiful members of your Legislative Council, and all your faithful Roman Catholic subjects, are excluded from any share in the Government of the Colony.
"We need scarcely remark on the daily difficulties thrown in the was of all legislative business by the absence from this House, not only of all depsrtmental officers, but of any one whomsoever who can answer the smallest practical enquiry either regarding administrative affairs or the proceedings and intentions of the Government.
"Under all these circumstances, we, Your Majesty's faithful subjects, members of Your Majesty's Legistative Council; pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to give your Rogal instructions, that an administration may be formed to preside over the affairs of Your Majesty's loyal subjects in this Island in consonance with Your Mijesty's gracious instructions at the time when your Royal assent was given to the Civil List Bill passed in thin Legislature 23rd April, 1851, and that the compact then so generously entered into by Your Majesty may not be disturbed."

Ordered, That the said report be committed to a Committee of the whole House, on Satarday next.

The expense incurres by the petitioner was for attempting to recover tax from the deficiency of the area of such Townstips, in which the Prothonotary and Attorney Geoeral of that time lost payments of mach larger amounts, for the same service, than the Queen's Frinter. Your Committee are of opinion that as the Attorney Gezesail and Prothonotary have foregone their claims, and as the Goveroment of the day did not sustain the petitioner's claim, the prayer of said petition should not be sastained,-all of which is respectfully submitted.

And Mr. Macneill reported thatthe Committee had gone through the Bill, and made several amendments thereto; which amendments were again read at the Clerk's table, and agreed to by the House.

Mr. Davies from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of John Mackinnon, late a' Preventive Officer for the Port of Charlottetown, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the. House the report of the said Committee, which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:-

Your Committee to whom was referred the petition of John Mackinnen, late Preventive Officer, have to reportthat the petitioner seized the American schooner "Dragonet," in August, 1855, for a violation of the Revenue laws, as also a quantity of powder discovered by him on board the said vessel.

That a fine of one hundred pounds was inflicted on the owners of the said vessel, and the powder was forfeited, and sold at public sale.

That the petitioner does not appear to have received the proportion of the proceeds of the powder, \&c., to which your

Committee conceive he was entitled by law, nor any part of the expenses incurred by him in seizing the vessel, excepting the proceeds of a gan seized by the petitioner on board said vessel. Your Committee therefore recommend his case to the favourable consideration of your Honorable House.

Ordered, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

Your Coramittee to whom were referred the following petitions, beg to report as follows, viz:-
A petition from certain inhabitants of St. Peter's Bay and adjacent settlements in King's County, praying for a grant of money to enable them to improve the navigation of St . Peter's Harbour, in aid of which object the petitioners have sabscribed about two hundred pounds.

A petition from the inhabitants of East Point, praying for a grant of money to aid them in deepening the channel from the North Lake to the sea, so as to admit of the ingress and egress of small craft. And also a petition from the inhabitants of Souris, praying for a grant to aid them in constructing an embankment by which the ebb and flow of the tide in the
harbour of Souris could be confined within its proper chamnel and the depth of water be thereby consicerably increased. The two last named petitions, as well as the first, are ciccompanied by subscription lists; and your Comailtee are of opinion that if the objects which they sercacily recomaned to the favourable consideration of the House, could be acsom. plished by an expenditure of public woney conmersuraic with the means of the Colony, great adrantagcs woula ide conferred, not only upon the petitioners, but upon all classes of the commanity generally. Your Committee, however, believing that in the present depressed state of the reverue, a sufficient amount could not be appropriated to commence with any prospect of success the improvements contemplated, they recommend that the further consideration of the prayer of the several petitions be deferred until next Session, and that, in the meantime, an address be presented to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, requesting that some efficient person or persons may be appointed to examine the sites of the proposed improvements - report on their practicability - furnish an estimate of the probable expense that would be incurred on them, and if practicable accompany said report by such plans as would tend to direct the deliberations of the House on this subject, so that it may be fulls and maturely considered in its next Session.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

And Mr. J. Yeo reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the matter to them referred, and had come to a Resolution, and agreed to an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, which Resolution and Address were again read at the Clerk's table, and are as follow:-

Resolved, That al hamble Address be prepared to forward to Her Mlajesty, in answer to the Address of the Legislative Council. now before the Committee, and also praging Her Majesty for the reconstruction of the said Legislatipe Council.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJEStY. Mayir Please Your Majesty:
The Legislative Couccil haviog, during the present Session; addressed Your Majesty complaining of the exclusion from the Legislature of certain salariedioffcers of the local Government, alleging that such measures is a departare from the principle established under the Act of the General Assembly, of this Colouy, passed the 23rd April, 1851; the Council arer that this Act. conceded to the Island a system of Responsible. Gorernment similar to that which is: in force in Your Majesty's neighboring Provinces of Canada, NopaSeotia iand New Brunswick.

The House of Assembly deny that ány. particular system of Responsible Gevernment was conceded to this Island by. the Act referred to by the Legislative Cooncil.

In an Act passed by the Colonial Legislature, is the Year 1850 , it was attempted to provide, by express enuctmens, that a system of Responsible Government, similar to that in force in the Provinces of Canada, New Branswick and Nova Scotia, should be granted to and established in this Tsland. This Act was disallowed by Yoar Majesty; and in a Despatch from the Right Honorable Earl Grey, Your Majesty's then principal Secretars of State for the Colonial Department, to Sir Alexander Bannerman, dated 3lst January; 1851, bis Lordship declared that-""The grant of Respansible Government had never been embodied as a condition in simifar Acts," and that "the only conditions therefore to be inserted in the Act; on the part of Her Majesty's Gopernment, are those relstive to the surrender of the Ciown Revenues; the rest"-namely; the conditions respeecting Re-
sponsible Government,-his Lordsbip stated, " stand. as was the case in the other North American Provinces referred to, on the faith of the Crown." It mas in the same Despatch farther declared, that if the Legislature would consent to pass an Act embooging certain terms relative to provision to be made for retiring officials, his Exzcellency should be at liberty, without entering into particular details, so to reconstruct the Executive Council as to include those who possess the confidence of the Assembly.
In conformity with the views expressed by Earl Grey, the Colonial Legislature passed the Act of the 23rd April, 1851, to which reference is made in the Address of the Legislative Council; and in this Act it will be found that the enactment embodied in the Act of 1850 "that a sssten of Responsible Government similar to that in force in the sister Provinces shall be granted to, and established in this Island," is altogether abandoned.
The Honse of Assembly is willing to admit that on the introduction of Responsible Government, by Sir Alexander Bancerman, the Executive Councii was reconstructed upon the $D_{\text {epartmental system, and remained in force, however }}$ fairly carried out, notil the General Election, which took place in March last ; bat they will not allow that His Excellency Sir Alexander Bannerman, in his address, delivered to the Legislature in the year 1851, put any other construction on the meaning of the term "Responsible Government," than that contained in the Despatch of the Right Honorable Earl Grey, herein before referred to; and which in its details can only be understood to be according to the well anderstood wishes of the people. This Departmental system; howerer, after some gears' experience, was found to be inapplicable to the circumstances of a small Colony, the attainment of office having become the chief inducement to obtain seats in the Legislatare, as out of twenty-four Members which composed the late House of Assembly, seldom less than nine were in possession of offices of trast and emolament under the Government.

From about the year 1855, the prejudicial influence of salaried officers, having seats in the House of Assembly, began seriously to engage public attention; and since that period, the feeling of the people against such a system has been rapidly increasing until the last General Election, when the principle of the exclusion of salaried offieers from the Legislature became one of the chief measures insisted on by the different constituencies; and a majority of the present House, of no less than nineteen to eleven, was returned to carry out that principle. As evidencing the force of public opinion on this subject, we would respectfully call Your Majesty's attention to the fact, that the Commissioner of Pablic Lands, after accepting office in the year 1857, appealed to the people, and was rejected by a iarge majority; that the Attorney General
and Registrar of Deeds, at the General Election in June last, were in like manner both rejected; and that, at the recent Ellection in March last, the Treasurer and Postmaster General were also rejected; the Colonial Secretary being the only Departmental Officer who was able to procure a constituency. Upon no occasion has the late Government been able to command the services of a Law Officer of the Crown on the floor of the House of Assembly. although various attempts have been made to effect that object.

The impossibility of carrying out the system of Departmental Government in this small Colony has compelled the Government repeatedly to have recuurse to the alternative of appointing persons to Departmental Offices, and to seats in both the Execative and Legislative Councils, who had been previously rejected as candidates for seats in the House of Assembly; thus professing to conform to the letter, whilst sacrificing the true principle of responsibility to the people.

We would further respectfully represent to Your Majesty, that the assertion in the Address of the Legislative Council, "that all persons aceepting offices under the Crown are, when Members of the Asscmbly, compelled to present themselves for re-election," is not founded on fact, inasurach as any Member of the Assembly who, at the time of his election, shall hold any one of the various offices named in the Act of the eleventh year of Your Majesty's reign, many of which do not exceed in yearly value the sum of ten pounds, and shall subsequently be appointed to the highest office at the disposal of the Government, is not required to vacate his siat in the House of Assembly.
The Legislative Council assume that the dissolution of the House of Assembly in 1854 took place in consequence of an attempt made by the then party in power to abrogate the constitution, by endeavouring to exclude from the Legislature certain Departmental officers.
The Legislative Couucil could not be ignorant that the grounds apon which His Excellency dissolved the Hoase of Assembly was the then recent allowance, by Your Majesty, of the Act passed by the Legislature of this Colony in that year, by which the elective franchise was greatly extended.

Upon the recent formation of the present Government, the Legislative Council consisted of eleven members, no less than nine of whom were nominees of the late Government, and the remaining two held offices of trust and emolument, and were also Members of the Exective Council. The whole of these gentlemen, with the exception of the Honorable William Forgan, were strong political partizans, hostile to the party composing the present Government and its supporters, and still closely identified with the views and principles of the existing minority in the House of Assembly. Under these untoward circumstances, the Lieatenant Governor proceeded to form a Government exclusively from the majority of the

House of Assembly. Alchough the present Gorernment has sobsequently nominated a gentlemen to fill the vacancy which existed in the Legislative Council, it was not coosidered adrantageous to the pablic service to place either of these two geatlemen in the Exsecntive Council, as their limited influence would be entirely jineffectaal to carry taryagh the Legislative Conncil any messure which the Government might deem necessary to promote the pablic interest of the Colony.
The only Bill partaking of a Goverument measure which, after baving passed the Honse of Assembly, was submitted to the Legislative Concil during the present Session, was an Act to empower the Government of this Colony to enforce, if necessary, prepayment of postage on letters transmitted to Great Britain, in accordance witi a Despaich received from Your Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonial Department. This Bill received the decided opposition of the Legislative Council, and was summarily rejected.

The 甘ouse of Assembly feel constrained to complain to Your Majesty, that the refusal to pass this Bill was based more upon a factious opposition to the Assembly, thana due regard to the unprejudiced discharge of their functions as a Branch of the Legislature, the Bill being thrown out by the influence of two of its members who were members of Your Majesty's late Government of this Colony, when the following special Report was agreed to, and, as the House of Assembly has every reason to conclude, by the unanimous opivion of that Government as then consituted :-
"Council Ceamber, Oct. 19, 1858.
" The Honorable Coloniul Secretary, from the Committee to whom was referred, at a former meeting of the Board, the Despatch from the Secretary of State regarding prepayment of postage, laid before the Board the report of the Committee, and the same mas read and approved of, and is as followeth:
"The Committee of the Executive Conacil, to whom was referred the Despatch of the Right Honorable Lord Stanley, Secretary of State tor the Colonies, dated lst Jume, 1858, with the accompanying documents, having reference to the pre-payment of postage, beg leave to report: that having referred the question to Mr. Benjamin Davies, Postmaster General, for bis opinion thereon, and' whose opinion having been favorable to the change contemplated, and haring carefully and minutely examined all the said documents, the Committee are of opinion that such change would prove beneficial, in decreasing the labor and responsibility entailed upor the Post Office anthorities and their assistants; rand as it will be necessiary, in the carrying, ont of such change, to amend our Statutes, wherein pre-payment is now optional, and not compulsory, they would recommend that the Act be sc altered at the nest Sesssion of the General Assembly.
"The Committee would farther recommend, that the system of stamps be adopted, on the introduction of pre-payment."
The Legisistive Council complain, that the present Government was formed without any member belonging to the Boman Catholic body. The House of Assembly fally admit this fact; but they regret being now compelled to bring nander Your Majesty's notice, that at the late Election, the

Ro. 3 Catholic body exercised their closely united and ntmuri influence in opposition to the present majority in the House of Assembly, and that at present there is not, in either branch of the Legislatare, one Roman Catholic who is not decidedly opposed to the existing Government.
We would also assare Your Majesty, that.the Legislative Council, as at present consiituted, although containing a ferw persors respectable in their stations in life, is not composed of \{ndividuals whose education and intelligence at all fit them to discharge the onerous and important duties of their position ; and. consequently, they do not possess the confidence or respect of the people: but, on the contrary, by far the greater number have been nominated to their seats daring the last few jears iu consequence of the well known facility with which their opinions could be moulded to meet the views of the Leader of the late Government ; and that the reconstruction of that body is absolutely necessary, to remove the obstruction which, as at present constituted, they are ready to raise up against measures proposed by the Assembly for retrieving the Colony from the difficalties and embarrassments into which it has been thrown.
The Honse of Assembly beg leave to represent to Your Majesty, that from the fact of so great a majority of the Legislative Conncil being politically opposed to the present Government, it is in vain to look for its sapport in formarding any measure which the House of Assembly may deem necessary to promote the interests or to fostir and develop the resources of the Colony; under these circumstances, and as the only remaining alternative, to prevent the future introduction of strong party feelings into the elements of the Legislative Council, and in accordance with the almost onanimous wishes of the several constituencies, as declared at the late General Election, the House of Assembly have agreed to a Bill to render the Legislative Council Elective; the principle of this Bill was adopted by a majority of twenty-lbree to two, and was finally agreed to in all its details by a majority of seventeen to nine.
The Honse of Assembly, bowever, despairing of its receiving the assent of the Legislative Council, as at present constituted, have ordered the Bill to be published for general information. And Mr. J. Yeo reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, had amended and then adopted the same; and the report so amended was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth :-

The Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts, bave to report,-That owing to the want of information, and the rery limited tine at their disposal, they have only been able to test the general accuracy of the Accounts. Such entries as they hare checked, have been found correct, excepting such errors as have been pointed out by the Auditors.

They have to observe, that they have received a communicaticu from W. E. Clark, Esquire, late Controller for Charlottetorn, alleging that most of the errors noted by the Auditors in the accounts of his department, were made io copying, and do not appear in the original eatries.

The debt of the Colouy, at the end of the fiancial year. 1858, as appears by the andited accounts, (exclusive of the amount claimed by the vendors of the Worrell Estate,) एаa $£ 39,84710 \mathrm{~s} .2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$., as will more fally appear by reference to the accompanying Table, marked (A.)
The Revenue for the past year, from all sources, was £ 33,292 2s. $3 \mathrm{~d} \frac{3}{4}$.; as compared with that of the previous year, a falling off appears of $£ 8164$ 2s. $0 \frac{3}{4}$ d. on the total annual receipts.
The accompanying tables marked (B) and (C) shew the falling off, and the datiable articles on which suct falling off has occurred.

The Expenditure for the past year was $£ 43,2698 \mathrm{~s} .1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$.' and as compared with the Expenditure of the previous year. shews a decrease of $£ 5,253 \mathrm{~s}$ s., which can also be seen by the accompanying table marked (D.)

Your Committee have to complain of the confused manner in which the vouchers relating to the expenditure have been submitted to this bonorable Honse. Many of zuch moucbers not baving been obtained by your Committee until tbe 13th instant, in consequence centich, and the fact that the vouchers are not classified, renders it impossible for them to report as to the correctness or otherwise, of the public expenditure; they are also at a loss to know, in many instances, under what heading su:h charges have been included.

Several items ol the Expenditure apprar to your Committee to be excessive ; Stationary for the Public Offices costing no less a sum tbau $£ 115$. They observe that $£ 1315$ s. more than the sum fix d $b$. Statute, has been paid to the Public
 bag by Patrick Mooney, charged in the Post Offie Accounts. which, in their opiniu:, o: ght to bave been recovered from his suretien; they recommend that steps be taken against said Patrick Monne,, or his sureties, for the same. Your Sommittec reemanend :le Expenditure in detail to be published for gesera: information.

Your Comm:a bere :lso to report, that it appears by the Road Corresponde:n's account, that "by the authority of an order in Cumecil;" Warrants were discounted for the Road Serrice, on which a loss of $£ 2989 \mathrm{~s}$. 3d. was sustained. The manner in which these discounts were made, appears to your Committce to be most objectionable, inasmuch as from 5 to 10 per centum discount was submitted to, -one individual alone receiving $£ 1116 \mathrm{~s}$. 3 d . as discount, at the rate of 10 per cent. Your Committee are aware that cash is required by the Road Correspondent for the payment of orders under 40 s .; they are of opinion that no sufficient check exists against the Correspondent's " jobbing in Warrants," and recommend in future, if it should be necessary to discount Warrants for the Road Service, that it should be done by the Treasurer, and that the Warrants should be pabliely advertised.

Your Committee have also to report, that by the returns of the Commissioner of Public Lands, the receipts in the Pablic Lands' Office for the past year, exclusive of the
receipts for Crown Lands, have been less than the expenditure by $£ 215$ 16s. 1d.

They have prepared an estimate of the probable loss that will, in the opinion of your Committee, altimately arise from the speculation in Public Lands, which estimate is appended hereto and marked (E), from which it appears there wiil be a loss of about 85 per centum, or in round numbers of $£ 17$,000 , out of the $£ 20,550$ already invested. It is assumed in this calculation, that if the vendors of the Worrell Estate succeed in making good their claim on the Government, and the amounts set down in the Commissioner's accounts as due on Public Lands, will be paid, together with the interest that will accrue thereon.

Your Committee recommend the accounts of the Crown Land department in future to be kept sejarate and distinct from the general accounts of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Colonf, and reported on according! $y$ by the Auditors of the Public Accounts.

Your Committee have also to remark, that "part only" of the Light Duty accounts accompany the Controller's returns. They append a list of such as are deficient. The present method of collecting Light duty, in the opinion of your Committee, affords the Government no means whatever of detecting embezzlement, and ought to be altered; but understanding that the present Government bave the matter under consideration, they think it unnecessary to offer any suggestions.

Fu: Cormmittee recommend that in future a detailed statement of the expenditure in the different departments of the Governmeut, with the vouchers classified and numbered, should be sent down with the Public Accounts to the House; and that it should be the daty of the Auditors to prepare such statements and classify the vouchers, for which some addition to their present salary ought to be made.

Your Committee recommend the suggestion of the Auditors, respectiag payment of Preventive Officers, to be adopted; but they cannot agree with the Auditors, that the issuing of Warrants for small sums tends to their deprecintion; they are of opinion that it should be optional with the party to whom the Government may be indebted, whether be will receive his claim in one or more Warrants; they are also of opinion that all sums under $£ 5$ should be paid in cash, and, therefore, that no Warrants for a smaller sum than $£ 5$ ought to be issued.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:-

An Act to Incorporate the Mnister and Trustees of the Free Church Congregation, Bedeque Road.

An Act-to amend the Acts concerning the property of the Methodist Church in Prince Edward Istand.
An Act further to amend the Act Incorporating the Cbarlottetown Gas Light Company.
An Act to amend the Act for the protection of the Herring and Alewives' Fisheries in this Island.

An Act to extend the Criminal Jurisdiction of the Police Court in the City of Charlottetomn.

After which, Mr. Speaker spake as followeth:
May it please your Excellency-
On behalf of Her Majesty's faithful Commons of Prince Edward Island, I have now to present the following Bills of Aid and Supply voted to Her Majesty during the present Session, to which I have humbly to request your Excellency's assent, viz:-

An Act to continue an Act for the better prevention of Smuggling.

An Act to continue certain Acts therein mentioned.
An Act to amend the Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Statute Labor and the Expenditure of Public Moneys on the Highways.

An Act for appropriating certain Moneys therein mentioned, for the service of the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:-
Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:
The completion of those measures which were necessary to the maintenance of the public interests, upon which you have been engaged, demands my best acknowledgments, and enables me to release you from further attendance.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:
I thank you, in Her Majesty's name, for the Supplies which you have granted for the Pablic Service.
Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:
I must not permit this last opportunity to pass without expressing to you the gratification which I shall ever experience in the recollection of the harmony which has subsisted between the Executive and the other branches of the

Legislature during the whole course of my administration of this Government, to which the uninterrupted trapunility of the Island daring the same period may, in a great measure, be reasonably attributed.

The performance of the important, and often anxious duties attaching to my station, has been facilitated and alleviated by the confidence which gou have ejer so frankly reposed in the sincerity of my desire to promete the welfare of this community; and notwithstanding the pecaliar evils with which this Colony has had to contend, I have had the satisfaction of witnessing the triumph of its natural resources, in its steads, though limited improvement.

In bidding you adien, I fervently trust that the favor of Divine Providence, which has been so signally manifested towards this Island, may ever be continued to it, and conduct
its inhabitants to the condition of prosperity and improvement which is ever attainable by the united and harmonions caltivation of such capabilities as are possessed by Prince Edward Island.-Farewell!

After which, the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said :-

## Engrossed copy of Minutes of Scrutiny on Georgetown Election.

Georgetown Court House, March $\uparrow 5$ th, 1859. Sheriff attended at the hour of twelve o'clock, pursuant to appointment, at the Court House.

William Underhay, Sherifi, sworn to the imfirtial discharge of his duty u; L. C. Owen, J.P.
T. C. Underhay sworn to faithfully perform his duty as Sheriff's Clerk, by the Sheriff.

John Smith appointed Sheriff's Assistant on behalf of Hon. Roderick McAulay. Sworn to the impartial discharge of his duty by the Sheriff.

Hon. Edward Thornton appointed Sheriff's Assistant on behalf of Andrew A. McDonald, Esquire.

Bond entered into by Roderick McAulay, candidate, and Daniel Gordon and Lemuel C. Owen as sareties for the payment to A. A. McDonald of taxed costs of scrutiny.

Bond entered into by Andrew A. McDonald, candidate, and Allan McDonald and Edward Thornton as sureties for the payment to Roderick McAulay of taxed costs of scrutiny.

Tuesday, the 29 th instant, at ten o'clock, forenoon, appointed by Sheriff and Assistants for proceeding in the scrutiny, at the Court House in Georgetown.

Tuesday, March 29th. The Sheriff and his Assistants met at the Court House, in Georgetown, pursuant to appointment, to proceed with scrutiny.

Protest of Roderick McAulay entered against the competency of John C. Underhay to act as Clerk at this scrutiny, on the ground of party bias. (Marked No. 1.)

Vote of Richard Thornton. Voteson liability to pay half or thole of the rent of place oceupied by Nalcoln Campbell, which is sixteciu pounds per year, 3rd Range, Letter F. Srom, objected by Haviland and McAulay.

John Lavers produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Richard Thornton. I did not see him rote here ou the polling day. He resides on the farm, I believe, Edward Stiggins used to occupy. I don't know how long he has resided there; something over a year, I believe. I know he had a crop last summer. I am not aware that he occupies any part of a house jointly with Malcolm Campbell. I can't say that he does: not occupy any part of that housc. I believe he has resided on the farm that Edward Stiggins occupies. I can't say positively that he is there now; but I have known him to reside there a month ago.

Captain John McDonald produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Richard Thornton. I can't say whether or not he voted here last election. I don't know any individual of that name in this District but one, Mr. Thornton's son. When they took the house last fall two years, Richard Thornton had an interest in it with Malcolm Campbell. They were partners. I am not
aware of their being in partnership yet. They are not to my knowledge in partnership yet. In the spring or summer following, there was some misunderstanding between Mr. Thornton and Campbell. Previous to their taking the house, Richard Thornton had been in the habit of boarding with ine; after this misunderstanding, he frequented my house again. I asked him the reason he did not stay at Campbell's. Mr. Thornton then told me that he had given up the business; he found it would not pay him. He led me to understand that they had dissolved partnership. Thornton docs not occupy any part of that place now to my knowledge. Ife has been living over the River. I know the premises in question to be thase on which Richard Thornton roted. I know to whom the house and premises belong; it was to Mr. Colin MICDonald, when Richard Thornton and Malcolm Camplell took them on rent. I don't know the term of their lease, (viz., how many years they took it for.) I can't say whether or not Richard Thornton is liable to pay any part of the rent of that house. I should not ask any person to pay any part of the rent of my house that I was living in. I said there was some difference between Richard Thornton and Malcolm Campbell. I can't say whether or nut they are now on good terms. I can't say whether or not they are on bad terms. I hare never seen any writing where the partnership has been dissolved between Richard Thornton and Malcolm Campbell. I never saw any where it was antered into. I understooll from Richard Thornton that there was a total dissolution of all co-partnership between him and Malcolm Campbell. I understood by Mr. Thornton that he lives on a farm out at Sturgeon. I have no loubt that he is the same Richard Thornton that roted here. I did not understand from Richard Thornton, or any other person, for what time they had taken the house. It was Colin McDonald that first told me they had taken it. My time was not then expircd by some two or three months.

Decided by the Court that evidence on any vote marked objected will be received when offered.

Court adjourned for one hour and a half, at half-past tivelve o'clock.

Court re-openel, pursuant to adjournment, at two o'clock.

Vote of Richard Thornton recalled.
Colin McDonall produced by A. A. MeDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Richard Thornton. II did lease property from me. Himself and Malcolm Campbell were connected in it. It was Town Lot No. 2, 3rd range, letter 1 , and premises. I consider him still liable to me for the rent of the place. I hold him liabie as long as I hold the agreement. [An agreement hetween Colin McDonald on the onc part, and Richard Thomton and Malcolm Campbell on the other part, produce? hy A. A. McDonald, marked No. e. ] I don't sinow where Richard Thomton resides now. I think he resides with his father now. When he entered into that agreement, I think he did reside with Malcolm Campbell. Inever hoard of any dissolution of co-partnership between Richard Thornton and Malcolm Campbell. If I had heard of it in a regular may, I should hare endorsed it on the agreement. Malcolm Campbell pays the rent for those premises. I consider that Richard Thornton has a joint liability with Malcoln Campbell for the payment of the rent. That was the conditions at the time. While he is a joint tenant, I consider he has a joint possession. Decidedly I consider it in that ligl:t. What is the use of an agreement if it is not so. It is a matter of no consequence which gives me the rent; both are liable for it .

Vote of Louis Nicholas. Statutc Labom qualification. Swurn. Objected by Haviland and McAuliy.

Alexander Rubertson produced by R. MuAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I was in Geurgetown on the day of the last election for Georgetown. I saw an Indian rote at that election. I know he always went by the name of Lewey. IIe gave his name as Louis Nicholas. He voted for McDonald. I don't know where he is now. I saw him to-day as if he were moving away some where. He had a sleigh and squaw and youngsters and other matters on it. I think I have known this Indian for six or seven years past; five or six at all events. I know him to be addicted to the migratory habits of the Mic Mac tribe-moving from place to place. I have never known him or any other Indian perform Statute Labour in this district. He might have performed Statate Labour without my knowledge. I was Overscer
at least once, whilst he was living in the eastern end of the Town. - He was not required to perform Statate Labour, and did not perform Statute Labour. I don't know whether or not Louis. Nicholas is a British subject. I' will not swear he is not. It is my opinion he is not. I don't know his age. I will not swear that he is not liable to perform Statute Labour. I did not consider him liable or I would have called upon him. There was a dense crowd, and he was surrounded by the people when he voted. I remember the last time I was 0 verseer, the Road Commissioner gave me a list of parties liable to perform Statute Labour that were working at shipyards, and his name was not among the rest. I have known him during the time he resided here, to be in the Town and out of it. I have known him to be at Pictou, Panmure Island, and up Montague. I am not sure whether or not he was in the precinct at the time I got the list from the Commissioner. I dou't know whether or not he was in my precinct at that time. He lived to the east part of the Town. I know him to be more of his time about Georgetown than any other Indian. I believe he did remove his camp from Georgetown within the last two years. Not the winter before last, but the winter before that, he told me he had his camp at the head of Montague. I mean by that not the winter before this present winter that has expired, but the winter before that. I mean the winter of 1857.

George Parker produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I believe I know the person you call Louis Nicholas. I understand a person of that name voted at the last election for Georgetown ; but I was not there when he voted. I know that he has lived within Georgetown or Royalty, where his camp is now, with the exception of moving it from one side of a creek to the other, since the winter of 1857 . I am not aware that ever he performed Statute Labour. I know nothing of it. I have been an Overseer. I know nothing of Indiaus being in my precinct when I was Overseer. There were none to my knowledge when I was Overseer. I did not think Indians were liable to perform Statate Labour until now. There are many things coming to light-now-a-days thatiwe knew nothing of before. I was not an Overseer last year. I have told you that I did not consider Indians liable to perform Statate Labour before now. I
know nothing of it. I have been an Overseet. I cannot swear from my consequent knowledge of the Road Act that Indians are not liable to perform Statute Labour. I have had no conversation with the Indians with reference to political affairs. I believe the Indian, Lonis Nicholas, to be under British rule.

John W. Robertson produced by A. A. MeDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I am a Road Commissioner for District No. 11, King's County. I consider. Indians, male. persons between the age of sixteen and sisty, liable to perform Statute Labour, according to the laws of the land. I never directed my Overseers to call on any person to perform: Statute Labour, but on all persons liable. I never got any returns for Indians that I recollect. I had no account of the Indian in question having performed labour last year. There was ne Overseer where he resided.
The Sheriff gives as the reason why he dismissed John W. Robertson without being discharged by R. McAulay, that R. McAulay would not put questions to him touching the matter at issue.

Vote of Daniel Johnston. Special vote. Objected by A. A. McDonald and R. Walker.

Charles Stewart produced by A.A.McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know one Daniel Johnston, son of Hector Johnston, of Brudenell River. I was told he voted at the Eighteen Mile Brook, Lot 51. I think I know his age. He was born the latter end of January, 1839. I can't be positive to a day whether it was the latter end of January or the first of February. It was either one or the other. I believe he is not twenty-one years of age. My youngest daughter was bornin August, 1838. She is some four or five months older than he; and, of course, she can't be twentyone until next August. I was not present at the birth of this Daniel Johaston. I do not swear to a day or an hour; but I know the time. To a certain degree, I must speak from hearsay. He was not more than two or three weeks old when I first saw him. I did not say exactly he was two or three weeks old; he was a few weeks. I guess he was not a few months., My wife wanted to go to visit Mrs; Johnston after the boy was borr. I drove her out there. I believe he is not twenty-one. I say he is not twenty-one. Peter Gordon was married at New Year's, and Dan. Johnston was born a few weeks
after. I speak both from hearsay and eyesight. I did not apply to any person to come here to testify to the juniority of this boy. I have my subpœna to come here in my pocket. I did not take any minute or memorandum of the birth of this boy. I have certain reminiscences which cause me to know the age of the boy.

John Holland produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I was Returning Officer for the fourth district of King's County, in the fourth polling division. I know Daniel Johnston, son of Hector Johnston, of Brudenell River. He was Poll Clerk for Mr. McNeill there. I think he voted for Mr. Haviland and McAulay. He polled there. I don't know anything about his age.

Peter Gordon produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Daniel Johnston, son of Hector Johnston, of Srudenell River. I believe he was not twenty-one years of age on the 19th of this month. My reasons for that belief are these: I was married on the last day of the year 1838. I know that Daniel Johnston was born in the month of January, 1839. I do say that Daniel Johnston is not twenty-one years of age. I don't keep a record of the age of my own family. I was not present when he was born. I did not see him born. There were parties there at the time he was born that told me he was bornsome of the females that attended when he was born. One thing I can swear myself, he was not born when I was married. No one told me he was born. I suppose and I am sure that he was born in the month of January. I did not see him born. Upon my word, to tell the trath, I did not see Daniel Johnston alive at the time I was married. He was not born, as far as I can recollect. The first time I sam Daniel Johnston alive was in February, 1839. He was not walking. He was suckling. He was in his mother's arms. The first time I saw him I would take his age to be about a month or six weeks. I do positively swear that I believe Daniel Johnston was not twenty-one years of age on the 19th of March inst. I can't tell how many children Mr. Johnston bad at the birth of this Daniel Johnston. I can't tell how many children Mrs. Johnston had. I can't tell the age of Mr. Johnston's eldest son. The person whom I call Daniel Johnston could not have been a girl. I would not come here to give evidence
without I came to tell the truth. I am aware that Mr. Johnston lost a son and a daughter, and has three sons alive. I am sure that Daniel Johnston was not one of those persons that died; whether the child bad a name then or not. What I swear is, that the child I saw then, is the one that is called Daniel Johnston. I might not be mistaken in this Daniel Johnston. I will swear positively that the young man Daniel Johnston spoken of here to-day, will not be twenty one years of age until some time in January next.

Vote of Alexander Robertson. Statute Labor qualification. Sworn on the oath againstbribery. Objected by McDonald.

George Parker produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I was present on the day of the Election, when Alexander Robertson voted. I know him as called the son of John W. Robertson, Georgetown Royalty. He recorded his vote for Mr. Haviland and McAulay. I was speaking to him on the day of the Election at the time of polling. I think it was the Sheriff pat the questions to him when he voted. I did not speak to him that day before he voted, to my knowledge. I never spoke to him about voting any time before the election, to my knowledge. I never asked him to vote for Mr. McDonald.

Jobn W. Robertson produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I have a son of the name of Alexander. I was informed he voted at the last election. I saw his vote on the Poll Book. He was not twenty one years of age on the 19th of this month. I do say my son is not twenty-one years of age. I had some conversation with my son on the night previous to the election. I did not teil him he was of age-to come and vote. What I told him the night previous to the election was, I was down in the Town here, and I was told that they had his name down on the opposite side, to vote. I mean by the opposite side, the Tory side. I told him first that he was not twenty-one years of age, and could not swear to his vote ; but that he might go forward and vote for Haviland and McDonald ; . but ii Mr. McAulay objected to his vote, not to swear to it.

John Smith produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Alexander Robertson, the painter's son. Alexander told me his father asked him
to vote for Mr. McDonald at the last election. Alexander told me he told his father he would not vote for him. - I don't.know anything about what is in a book in Alexander's father's house, except what be, Alexander, told me. He told me he was looking in the record, and he said he would be twenty-two next fall. He said his father took the record off that record, and put it on another paper, a year later. He never told me that any other person in Georgetown wanted him to vote. His mother never told me his age.

David Logan produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:
I know Alexander Robertson. I dont know whether he is the Painter's son or not. He told me that he was twenty one last September. He was a Son of Temperance. He joined as eighteen in ffty-five. I understood it was his father put his name down. It was in September or October in fifty-five that he put his name down as eighteen. If he was eighteen in September, fifty-five, I should think he was twenty one last summer. I was acquainted with Alexander Robertson. He told me he would vote for Haviland and McAulay, only that he was afraid of his father turning him out. He did not, that I am aware of, say that his father wished him to vote for McDonald. I will not swear that Alexander Robertson son of John W. Robertson, was twenty years of age the 19th of this month. I belive at that time there were not any persons takeninte the Sons of Temperance under eighteen years of age. I swear positively there was none put down their names at that time under eighteen years of age.

Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:
I am a member of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, in Georgetown. Alexander Kobertson, sou of Robertson the Painter, was a member of that Order. I am not sure whether he is now or not. I think it was in October, 1855, that he joined that Order. I am positive to the year and think it was in October. It was a rule of that Order at that time, that no person should be admitted into the society at a less age than eighteen. John W. Robertson, Alexander's father, was a member of the Sons of Temperance at the time that Alexander joined. I forget whether John W.. Robertson was in the Division Room the night his son was initiated; but he fies a very regular attendant
attendant. I can't say from recollection who proposed Alexander, as a member, but to the best of my belief it was his father. He could not be admitted without his father's knowledge. At that time he wrote his age down as eighteen. . From that circumstance, I believe him to be twenty two years of age next September or October. Persons might possibly be admitted under eighteen years of age. But it was the ruie of the Division to admit none under that age. I should think Mr. Robertson was anxious to have his son's name on the hooks of the Division. I will not swear that the Alexander Robertson'in question was twenty one years of age on the 19th of this month. I had no doubt but he was twenty one years of age on the 19th of this month. Last summer I was in conversation with Mr. Robertson; we were speaking about his son; he said he believed he had as good a right to vote as many that did vote ; but rather than there should be any doubt he would not bring him forward.
John W. Robertson re-called.
I was in the habit of keeping a record in writing of the birth of $m y$ children. There are entries made there. That is not the original record. [Family record prudve:d by John W. Robertson, No. 3.] Those entries were not made at the time of the birth of those children. [Original record produced by Jolin W.Robertson, marked No. 4.] That is the original record. I will swear positively that my son Alexander was born on the 1st of September, 1838. The first book produced is a copy from the original. The first of September was the day on which my son Alexander was born.

Court adjourned at a quarter past six o'clock, until nine to-morrow morning.

Court re-opened, pursuant to adjournment, at nine o'clock, Wednesday the 30th instant:

## Vote of Alexander Robertson re-called.

Angus McPhail produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I am a little acquainted with Alexander Robertson, J. W. Robertson's son, in the Royalty. I did not see him vote... I heard him say he voted for Mr. Mc 1ulay and Haviland. I can't tell anything about bis age, except what he told me himseif. I heard him say that his father told him about the time of the Election in June, that: he conld not rote then; but after September he would be able to
vote then. All I know about this young man's age, is what he told me himself, except the books in the Sons of Temperance. I cannot swear that this young was or was not twenty one years of age on the 19th of this month. I don'tknow anything about when he was initiated in the Order of the Sons of Temperance. I did not belong to the Sons then, but the books will tell.

Elizabeth Robertson produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I am the nother of Alexander Robertson, the son of John W. Robertson. He was born on the first of September, 1838. My son Alexander was not born in 1837. My daughter Elizabeth was born in 1836 ; and there is two years and nine months between them. My daughter was born in January. I think it was the 23 rd or 24 th - I can't be positive which. The entry made in that prayer book was made the very day of his (my son's) birth. He always marks the birth of every one of them.

Vote of John Morrison. Three-fourths Town Lot No. 9, 2nd Range, Letter F. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Town Lot No. 9, 2nd Range, Letter F. It is situate between Mrs. Stiggins's Lotand Henry Griffin's, on the western side of the main street. I was Collector of Town Assessment for last year: Michael McAulay paid the taxes for one half, and I think that Hugh McDonald paid the other half. There are two frames on the Lot. I believe Mr. Allan Morrison has one of the frames, and Mr. Kello the other. It is reputed to be theirs, and I have known both to have men working there. I know one John Morrison that voted on some portion more than the half of that Lot. I think it is that Lot he voted on. Some time in February Mr. Kello called upon me, the roads being very slippery, and wished to know if I would drive him up to Mr. Michzel McAulay's ; he told me on the way going up that he had some money to pay Mr. McAulay for a portion of the Lot; and he did not wish to pay it until he would get a deed of conveyance of that portion. He told Mr. MeAulay his business. Mr. McAulay told him he would not give any conveyance until the whole was paid. He said
there were other parties who had bought portions of that Lot. He said he sold a portion of it to Mr. John Morrison; and I think he mentioned Hagh McDonald ; and at the time, he handed a paper down from a shelf over the cupboard or dresser. He said that was the original grant. I think he said he had had about twenty years. He handed me the document. I perused it, it was a grant from the Government. I think it was dated in 1838. Governor Fitzroy's name was to it. He said that he never gave a scratch of a pen to any person, of the property ; but he would to Kello, when he paid for his share. I think it was in last February that we went out to McAulay's. I am sure that it was in this winter that is passed and gone. I don't think Michael McAulay told me when he sold this portion of the lot to John Morrison. Bat my impression is that it was sometime ago. I can't say for certain. It might be one two or three years. I don't know fro:n my personal knowledge, of Mr. McAulay exercising any further ownership over that Lot than paying the assessment, and his own admission of forbidding Peter Stewart to go on with Mr. Kello's frame. John Morrison voted for McDonald at the last Election. The portion of that Lot that the buildings are not on, is not enclosed, to my knowledge. 'There are bushes on it. I don't know what portion of the Lot John Morrison claims. Mr. Kello's farm is on the north east corner ; and Mr. Morrison's frame is to the south of it, about the middle of the Lot. I never heard of John Morrison, having an equal claim to the frame with Allan Morrison. I never heard that he had any claim to any property here, until he voted here last summer.

Michael McAulay produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Town Lot No. 9, 2nd Range, Letter F. I did own that Lot before now. I sold part of it to John Morrison. I conveyed it to him in writing. I gave him a writing of it to the effect that it was his property. It is not very long ago that I gave him the writing. I believe it was the 20th of this present March, 1859, that I gave him that writing. My reason for not giving him a deed of the land before, was that he never asked for it. I think it is three or four years since I sold the land to him. John Morrison has been in possession of that
piece of ground since I sold it to him. One quarter of NQ. 9 , and a half of Lot No. 10, I sold to John Morrison. He was to pay me twenty-five pounds for the piece of land on Lot No. 9. The reason why I paid the Assessment for that guartet Lat was, that he was teaching school at the Head of the Bay, and he told mè, as I was home and knew the number of the Lots to pay it, and he would pay me again. I think Mr. Morrison made improvements on that piece of land since I sold it to him. I asked him if he had any share of the House. He told me he had. The frame I speak of is on the part of the lot, I sold to John Morrison. I did sign the writing I gave John Morrison, as a title to that land.

Allan Morriśon produced by A. A. McDonald.
Protest entered against Hon. E. Thornton, Sheriff's Assistant, holding private interviews with witnesses, by Roderick McAulay. Marked No. 5.

Allan Morrison Sworn by the Sheriff:
I know my brother John Morrison: Owns a part of Lot 9, 2nd Range, Letter - F. There are improvements on that property. There is a frame of a house roughboarded. That frame with what is done to it, cost me fifty-one pounds some odd shillings. My brother has an interest in that frame. He has half of it, when it is finished. I consider my brother's share of that Lot, with the improvements thereon, worth over fifty pounds. My brother has not contributed anything to the building of that house. He is liable to pay me one half of the expenses of those premises. I never buught the interest in the place. It is a private understanding between us.

Vote of Timothy Donovan. Town Lot No. 16, 4th Range, Letter F. Receives $£ 5$ 10s. yearly rent.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from W. H. Bidge, relative to Town Lot No. 16, 4th Range, Letter F. (Marked No. 6.) Admitted to be authentic.

Admitted by the Court that Timothy Donovan voted for Georgetown, last election, on the above named property.

Agreement produced by A. A. McDonald, relative to Town Lot No. 16, 4th Range, Letter F. (Marked No. 8.) Admitted to be authentic.

Vote of Angus McDonald. Pasture Lot No. 8 acres of reserved land. Votes for A. A. McDonadd. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

John C. McKeown produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know a person by the name of Angus McDonald of Grand River. If it is the same, brother to Roderick McDonald of Burnt Point. I did not see him vote here. All that I know about the matter is, I was on Burnt Point some time ago, in conversation with Roderick McDonald . He told me that his brother Angus had the Deed of a Pasture Lot on the reserved land on Burnt Point; and that he did not care for it further than for the sake of a vote. He did not say anything about having it enclosed. I have known Roderick McDonald to have it in possession for the last twenty seven years. That is in my opinion the same eight acres on which Angus McDonald voted here. Roderick McDonald did not tell me that he had any deed or grant of that land.

Court adjourned at ten minutes past one, until ten minutes past two o clock.

Court re-opened, pursuant to adjournment, at ten minutes past two o'clock.

Proclamation made at twenty minutes to three o'clock, that if no evidence be offered within one hour, the Court will be closed.

Vote of Michael Campion. Special Vote. Objected by Walker and McAulay.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from W. H. Badge, Assistant Registrar, relaiive to Town Loi No. 12, 2nd range, letter A. Marked No. 9. Admitted to be authentic.

Certificate from the Court of Probate, relative to the will of the late John Campion, produced by R. McAulay. Marked No. 10.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from W. H. Badge, relative to Michael Campion. Marked No. 11. Admitted to be authentic.

Vote of Angus McDonald recalled.
Roderick McDonald produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff :

My brother Angus McDonald, of Grand River, Lot 55, holds a Lot on the Reserved Lands. I am using the land by his consent. I consider my brother is the owner of the land, because all the documents are drawn and recorded in his
name. My brother has never sold, or in any way conveyed the Lot to me, any further than that I was to have the privilege of the Lot for paying the assessment for it. I can't exactly say how long I have had the use and occupation of it ; but I should say handy thirty years. He had the grant some time befure he and I came to any agreement about it. My brother never demanded any rent from me, no more than the assessment. When I took the Lot, the understanding was, that I was to keep the assessment paid as long as he thought proper to leave me the use of the Lot. I don't see that my brother derives any benefit from the Lot, because all that the Lot produces I keep for my work on the Lot. I have no right, title, claim or ownership of that land to dispose of it to any person whatever.

Vote of Michael Campion recalled.
Thomas Byrne produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Town Lot No. 12, letter A, 2nd range. I have the use of that Lot. I first got the use of it from John Campion. I have the use of it from Michael Campion now I believe that Lot to be Michacl Campion's Lot. Some time previous to John Cainpion's death, Michael Campion came to me and told me he had purchased those Lots from his father, and wanted me to shew him where the Lots were. I shewed him the Lot in question. He authorised me to occupy and use it for him. I have had it ever since. I was never dispossessed of that Lot since I got it from John Campion. I never saw any written conveyance from John Campion to Hicheel Campion.

## Vote of Timothy Donovan reculled.

Edmund F. Byrne produced by A. A. MeDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

The signature as witness to the agreement between Hev. F. J. McDonald and Timothy Donoran, now exhibited, is my signature. The agreement was signed by Timothy Dunovan at the time of the date thereof.

John B. Howlett produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know the pruperty in question, of Donovan's. I know that Timothy Donovan leased the property to a person. He leased it to Sutherland within the last few years. The Rev. Francis McDonald was the last he leased it to, I
believe. I have never known any other person to be in occupation or possession of those premises, but Timothy Donovan, or his tenants. I never knew his children, John and Maurice, to be in any other possession of the property than while they lived with their father. The children were aware of his having leased it. They did not object in any way to his doing so. When a former tenant lived in this place of Donovan's, Donovan authorised me to receive the rent on his account. The eldest of his sons, John, called on me, to know if any of the rent was paid into my hands. He told me his father sent him to say that if the rent was not paid, the father would sue the tenant. I believe John and Maurice Donovan to be still minors. I believe the property is Mr. Donovan's own. I think he made an attempt to convey it away. I only heard it. I heard parties saying he made it over to those two children, John and Maurice. I think he did do so, as far as some writing went.

Vote of Donald A. McPhee. Pasture Lot Nu. 165, Georgetown Royalty. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Objected by Havilind and NcAulay.

A paper produced by R. McAulay, purportin. to be a certificate from W. H. Badge, relative to Pasture Lot No. 165, marked No. 12. Admitted to be authentic.

Certificate from the Court of Probate, relative to the will of Francis L. McPhee, produced by R. McAulay, marked No. 13.

John McPhee produced by A. A. MeDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know who is the owner of Pasture Lot No. 165. Donald A. MiPhee is the owner of it at present. There is no other man living, I believe, owns it but himself. It formerly belonged to his late brother ; but it is his since his death. I have a conveyance to prove it. I am witness to it [Paper produced by witness, marked No. 14.] The signature to it as witness is my own. There is no other man living, except Douald A. McPhee, that has any claim on that Lot. The signature as conveyer is my father's, Donald McPhee. I know the Lot in question. I know the deed was signed about the time it is dated. Whatever time is mentioned on the face of the document, that is the time they were signed. It was in the year 1856 they were signed. I know my brother Donald A. McPhee has been in possession of this property ever since, by paying the taxes.

Receipt for land assessment produced by A. A. McDonald, marked No. 15.

Donald McPhee produced by A. A. M‘Donald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

Paper produced, purporting to be a conveyance from John McPhee and Elizabeth McPhee. (No. 14.)

I am a witness to the exhibited transfer from John McPhee and Elizabeth McPhee to their brother Dinald A. McPhee. I saw them sign it. I signed the exhibited conveyance to Donald A. McePhee. My late son, Francis L. McPhee, was never married. I have no living children but the two that signed the quit claim there, and the one it is conveyed to. No person belonging to the family ever exercised any acis of ewnership over the property, but my son Donald A. McPhee, since he got these documents. That was about two weeks after his bruther's death.

Vote of Dougald McLeod. Special vote. Objected by McDonald. Votes for Haviland and Mcaulay.

Willian Sanderson produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff :

I was presiding officer at the first polling division, in the fourth district, at this election. Dougald McLeod recorded a special vote for Georgetown there. I think he recorded his rote for McAulay and Haviland. That is the same Dougald MeLeod who stays with Mr. Cogswell, in Georgetorn here. His name was entered in the poll book as a clerk for Mr. McNeill.

Richard Smith produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I was in Mr. Cogswell's employment last spring. I entered his employment the 5 th of April, 1858. Dougald McLeod was not in Georgetown when I came. He came there a week after me; on the 12th, to the best of my knowledge. He had not ever been living in Georgetown before that, to the best of my knowledge. Dougald McLeod was not at Cogswell's when I came there. He was not there to his apprenticeship. He might come and go away again. Dougald McLeod was not, to the best of my knowledge, as I heard from himself, he was not hired at Cogswell's before the 5th of April last. He told me he was not hired there before the 5th of April last. I can't say that Dougald McLeod was or was not in any other place in Georgetown before I came to Cogswell's. Doagald McLeod was an apprentice with Mr.

Cogswell. He was to serve with him as an apprenticce for two years. He had not the measles after he came there. He had the measles before I came to Mr. Cogswell's. He was perfectly recovered from the measles when he came $t$ ) Mr. Cogswell's. He said that he had the measles before he came to Mr. Cogswell's. I can't positively swear that he was not at MIr. Cogswell's before he had the measles. I can't positively say, from my own knowledge, whether he caught the measles from Mr. Cogswell or not, only as he said himself. I did not know Dougald McLeod before I went to Mr. Cogswell's. He told me he was not an apprentice to Mr. Cogswell at the time I came there. He did not tell me whether he had been living with Mr. Cogswell before that time or not. I did not ask him.

John Kelly produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Dougald McLeod, whose vote is in question here. He told me about three weeks or a month ago, that he was not quite ten months out with Mr. Cogswell. I never knew him to be a resilent of Georgetown before he came to Mr. Cugswell's. I don't know the time Doagald MiLeod hired with Mr. Cogswell. Only some time in April last, Mr. Smith and Dougald came to me about some tanpits. I understood from my own boys that he had been in Georgetown about a week. I will not say that he was or was not with Mr. Cogswell a month before the 15th of April. Possibly he might; but I never saw him, nor never knew bim to be in the place.

Cuurt adjourned at half-past five o'clock, until ten o'clock to-morrow morning, the 31st of March.

Court re-opened, pursuant to adjournment, at ten o'clock, Thursday, the 31st March.

Protest entered by Roderick McAulay against the reception by the Sheriff of the deed poll from Donald McPhee to Donald Athenitius McPhee, handel in to the Court yesterday, on the ground that the said document does not contain the requirements of the Act for rendering a release as effectual for the conveyance of freehold estate as a lease and release by the same parties, nor proper and sufficient words to pass the estate of the said Donald McPhee to the said Donald A. McPhee. Marked No. 16.

## APPENDIX (A.)

Proclamation made at seven minutes to eleven, that if no evidence be offered within one hour, the Court will be closed.

Vote of Donald A. McPhee recalled.
Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I think I know the Lot 165. It is unimproved. It is the next Lot but one to Lots that I hold myself in the Royalty. I think it is in its wilderness state. I think it is a Lot that John McPhee purchased in 1849 or ' 50 , I think. I know nothing about who is in possession of it. I never saw any person exercising any ownership over it, except that Mr. Wright run it the day after it was purchased from the Government. I have never seen any person whatever exercise acts of ownership over that property. I used to bear that it was on that lot that Laughlan McPhee voted. I know nothing from my own knowledge.

Froclamation made at 16 minutes past eleven, that if no evidence is offered within one hour, the Court will be closed.

Vote of Alexander McKenzie. Town Lot No. 7, 2nd range, letter G. Assessor's deed. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Objecter by Haviland and McAulay.

Duncan MicDonald produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:
[Mr. Smith examines the witness, by consent of all candidates, as interpreter.]

Witness does not know Lot 7 , 2nd range, letter G; but he heard that Alexander McKenzie owned a Lot. Witness heard that Mlexander McKenzie had a Lot here. Does not know how he got the Lot. McKenzie knows himself how he got the Lot. Witness does not know where the Lot is situated. Witness does not know that one Angus McKenzie has any claim on that Lut. Witness does not know that the Lot in question is occupied by any person. He hears that Alexander McKenzie has it.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from W. H. Badge, Assistant Registrar, relative to Town Lot No. T, 2nd range, letter G. Marked No. 17. Admitted to be authentic.

John B. Howlett produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Town Lot No. 7, 2nd range, letter G. I know of it being sold for assessment here abnut five or six years ago. It was sold to John

Grifin. I was one of the assessors at the time I know John Griffin has trensferred the Let to another person. John Griffin got a deed of it. I think I am a witness to John Griffin's transfer to the present claimant or owner, Alexander McKenzie. I am aware of John Griffin having transferred it to Alexander McKenzie. I was a witness to the transfer from Griffin to Alexander McKenzie. I have not got the deed or transfer in my possession. They were given to the parties. It was for the non-payment of the pump and well assessment that this Lot was sold.

Mr. McAulay objects to receiving evidence of documents, without the documents are produced to the Court.

Henry Griffin produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff.

I know Town Lot No. 7, 2d range, letter G. Angus McKenzie was the first owner of it from the Government. Angns McKenzie was an apprentice boy with me. After he left me he purchesed this Lot No. 7, 2d range, letter G. Some time after he left the Island; and the Lot was sold for non-payment of assessment. My brother John Griffin got the Lot and got the assessors' deed of it. Some time after my brother bought it, this Alexander McKenzie come along and my brother sold it to him. As far as I can understand, it is in Alexander MeKenzie's name ever since, and I am paying the assessment for him.
Mr. McAulay objects to the Court receiving evidence of documents, without the documents are produced to the Court.

Henry Griffin recalled.
I have not known any person to be or to have been in possession of the Lot in question since my brother John Griffin transferred it to Alexander McKenzie. I pay the taxes for Alexander McKenzie at all times. Sometimes he sends it down before, and sometimes after.

Vote of Daniel McDonald. Statute Labor qualification. Srorn. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff

I was agent for one of the candidates in Georgetown, last election. I think there were two Daniel McDonalds voted there. There was a Daniel or Donald McDonald objected to, that is reputed to reside somewhere over Grand

River way. He voted for Mr. McDonald. I don't know what business he follows. Only I am told he goes to sea sometimes in the summer time. I did not know his name until he gave it out. His face seemed familiar to me. I heard after he voted, but not before, that he was at sea last summer, with Captain McDonald, of the Hemisphere. He does not reside in Georgetown, to my knowledge. He voted on the Statute Labour qualification. I can't tell where he makes his home in the winter. I don't know where Daniel McDonald resides. I know neither his father, his mother, or his home.

Thomas Owen produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I was a candidate at the last election. I stood at Narrow's Creek polling place, Lot 55. I saw several Daniel McDonald's vote there. One Daniel McDonald that I saw vote there, the first time that I became acquainted with him was in Boston; he was with Captain John McDonald, on board the Hemisphere, last fall twelve months. The next time I remember seeing the man was on the twenty-first of February last. I rode from Charlottetown to New Perth with him in the express. He told me he resides at Launching. The next time I saw him was at the polling division at Narrow's Creek, on the 19th of March, between two and three o'clock in the day. He voted for Mr. Thornton and Walker there. He was not questioned whether he voted on property or Statute Labour. I considered the man a resident of the place and a good vote, and he was not questioned what he voted on. Since that time, I have seen him in the Court House here, and caulking a boat at Captain McDonald's of the Union Hotol. I will not swear that the Daniel McDonald whose vote is now sworn on the Statute Labour qualification is the same man. The boat he was caulking was opposite Captain McDonald's house, on the common or street.

Captain John McDonald produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

Daniel McDonald, John's son, from Launching, is caulking a boat at Captain John McDonald's. He told me so himself yesterday. I was on the polling ground here on the day of the election. I heard some person ask this same Daniel McDonald if he had been up. He said, Oh yes; it
is all right; I have voted. He did not say for whom he voted. He is the same Daniel McDonald that generally sails with Captain McDobald, in a vessel called the Hemisphere. He has sailed with Captain McDonald, in the Hemisphere; for some time, since last fall twelvemonths, until he left him last fall in Halifax. I understand his home when not at sea, is at Launching. This man did not tell me he had sworn to his vote. Daniel McDonald was working with me in my house within the last two years. I won't be positive to the month, it is over eighteen months since. I can't say exactly how long he remained with me. He was assisting me to make a set of sails for the J. W. I know that he resided in Georgetown the winter of 1858. He sailed from Georgetown last summer, except one trip he staid home. I won't be positive where he resided this winter. He has not been in Georgetown all winter, I am confident. He has been here since a few days previous to the March Court. I think he made some clothes, in January last, for Mrs. McDonald's children, in Georgetown, last fall, after he came from Halifax. I recoliect he stayed home from sea one trip that Captain John was away with the "Hemisphere" last summer. I don't know whether here or in Launching.
Alexander Robertson re-called.
I was all the time in attendance with the candidates, in Georgetown, this last election. I recollect of a man by the name of Daniel McDonald having been sworn to his qualinication at that election. There were two Daniels besides, that voted; but neither one of them were questioned but this Daniel. It was Daniel McDonald that I was told sailed in the "Hemisphere" that was sworn.

Court adjourned for one hour, at a quarter past one $0^{\circ}$ clock.

Court re-opened, pursuant to adjournment, at a quarter past two o'clock.

Daniel Gordon produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I have been carrying on business, as merchant, in Georgetown, for the last few years. I know Daniel McDonald of Launching, the younger son of John McDonald, very well. I know he was at sea last summer. His home last summer was on the sea; but when he wos on shore his
home was at Launching Place. I never saw any documents to prove that he has any property at Launching place. I have his own words to prove that he has a farm at Launching Place. John McDonald, the father of Daniel HicDonald, had a running account with me. In 1857 or 1858, I threatened to prosecute for the amount due me. Daniel McDonald came to me and stated that he was the owner of the firm, and if I would wait until the crop grew, that he would pay me the amount, as he had a good crop in that year. In 1858, in the fall, a lot of grain was shipped on board my vessel. In February, 1859, the 7th, he paid me some money on account. He told me not to put them to expenses for the balance, as tise place was now finally or fully his. I know he resides here just now. I see him in the Court House ; but I think he moves about a good deal. I should call Launching Place bis home, decidedly, because he lived there with his father for a number of years. I have known him to live there for twenty years, except when he was at sea. I have been in a house on the farm at Launching Place which John McDonala and his sons call theirs. I can't say wher: Daniel HcDonald resided in ihat house. I have not been there very latelj. I have not been in the house for the past tivo years; therefore I can't say whether he has made that house his home or residence for that time or not. When he told me the farm was his, I considered it was his farm and home. I am sure Georgetown is not his permanent residence for the last twelve months. I saw that Daniel McDonald on the ground last election ; but I did not see him vote. Why I consider Georgetown not to be his place of residence for the last twelve months is, because I know he has been to sea the most part of the summer. He sailed in the schooner "Hemisphere," of Qucbec, last summer, a great part of the time. That vessel left Georgetown last scason once or twice. I can't say that Daniel McDonald sailed in her every trip. I saw him on board more than once.

Mrs. Captain John McDonald produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I am acquainted with Daniel McDonald, who sailed in the " Hemisphere." It is last August twelvemonths, about the 8th or 10th, he was employed with Captain McDonald to go in the "Hemisphere," he siiled with him from that
time until after January; then he boarded at our house until very near spring; and then he was hired again to work. He was under wages from that time until last December. Since then he has been back and forth to my house. I have had him. hired at different times, at at Court times, and is at this present time hired with me. The winter of 1858 he was boarding at my house. My husband was learning him navigation. I should say he was residing at Georgetown for the last twelve months, except when he was at sea. I know that he has been hired with my husband for the last two years, except for a very few months. They were many times away, and many times at home. The way the year was spent, they would be away on a voyage, perhaps for two months, and then come home and stay from one, to two or three wetks, and then go on another voyage. He has ns,i been twelve months coust:nt in Georgetown for the last two years, for they were many: many times to sea during that time. He has not iven four months from being under wages with my husband during the last two years. I think it was on the 10th of January, 1858, when they came to Georgeown here from sea. He was paid off in December last, in Halifax, and came home in January, and he has since been several times employed with me. He is now hired by the day.

Alexander McDonald produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff :

I know Daniel McDonald, who was with my father in the "Hemisphere." My father employed him on or about the 12th of August, 1857. He then went on a fishing voyage to the Labrador with him. He returned here from the Labrador. I think they remained four weeks in Georgetomn, after they returned from the Labrador. I don't know exactly. He went on a voyage to the United States with him after that, and returned to Georgetown, and remained with my father the whole winter. I believe he was working with Captain John McDonald, of the American House, before he hired with my father. Daniel McDonald has been employed with my father this last summer, on board the schooner "Hemisphere." The vessel was sailing from Georgetown all summer. I am certain of Daniel McDonald remaining on shore one trip that the vessel was away. The longest time that he has been absent from

Georgetown, during the last twelve or eighteen months, is not more than two months at the farthest. I think he was hired with my father by the rionth. Sometimes he did not remain in Georgetown longer than two weeks. Sometimes four weeks. In the winter of 1858, he remained here all winter, learning Narigation with my father. He might be absent from Georgetown, for two or three days at one time. I think he was more than once away during that winter. I don't know where he went those times. I don't follow him. I went to where he called his home with him once. I went to Launching Place with him. I think all the time put together that he was in Georgetown, during the last twelve months, would be about six months. I think he did reside six months out of the last twelve, in Georgetown, up to this date, but not up to the 19th of February. He resided, part of last February, at my father's, and part of the time at Launching Place. I know he has not been absentsiz months at any one time, between last February and this February. I don't know him to be a resident in Georgetown, for six months at one time, during the last twelve months, up to 19th February. I mean by sailing from Georgetown, sailing out of the Port of Georgetown. That schooner took part of a cargo on board at Cardigan one time. She took a cargo on board in Charlottetown in the spring of 1858. I think she did not take a cargo on board in Pictou, in the summer of 1858. But I am not sure. I don't know how many trips she made out of Georgetown with a cargo. I don't know how many cargoes she had on board that summer altogether. I never saw her Register, but the words on her stern are "Hemisphere Borealuis, Quebec."

Captain John McDonald re-called.
Daniel McDonald has not been resident in Georgetown, six months consecutively, during the last twelve months. Captain McDonald's schooner hails from Quebec. Daniel McDonald has not been absent from Georgetown, six months at any one time, between the first of February, 1858, and the first of February, 1859. I consider Daniel McDonald's home in Launching. I have been led to understand that the property at Launching, is Daniel McDonald's. There is a house on it. His father lives in it, with the rest of the family, and himself when he is home. I could not swear that house is
either Daniel M‘Donald's or his father's. Daniel McDonald resides occasionally in Georgetown. Daniel Gordon recalled :
I am satisfied that Daniel McDonald has never lived in Georgetown for six months at one time during the last two years. I have lived in Georgetown for the last twenty years, and Daniel McDonald has not been one year in Georgetown, consecutively, during that time, to my knowledge. I am not aware that Daniel McDonald has been absent from Georgetown six months at any one time during the last year. I can't say whether he has or has not. In the winter of 1858, it was known to all the people here, that he was studying navigation with Captain John McDonald, and this winter again he has been a part of the time in town. That is all the residence I have known him to have in town. I don't know where Daniel McDonald served his time as a tailor, or whether he ever served his time.

Vote of Donald Campbell. Special vote. Votes for Haviland and McDonald. Objected by R. Cameron and R. McAulay.

James McFarlane produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Donald Campbell, commonly callee Donald Campbell, Clerk, of Montague. I saw him some short time before the day of polling. He came into my place ; and I said to him, "Campbell, you escaped being brought up for voting last summer." I asked him if he was going to vote this time, and he said, "Yes;" that he intended to vote to try whether he could have a title to a Lot that he claimed in Georgetown. That was all that passed between us. I understood that he intended to vote on the Lot he voted on last year, but there was nothing about any Lot mentioned. He did not tell me any thing about his title to that Lot. There was some talk about the receipt that Stewart brought here last June. He said the money had been paid, whether the receipt was right or not. He does not reside in Georgetown.

Mr. McDonald, candidate, admits that the said Donald Campbell voted at Montague.

Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I am acquainted with Donald Campbell, Clerk, up Montague. He told me he claims a right to property in Georgetown. It is Town Lot No. 2, fourth rauge, letter A. He told me some short time before the election, that he
owned it eighteen years ago, and was never dispossessed, and would hold on to it until put out by legal process. McAroy had that Lot in occupation for some years past, until the time of his death. McAroy told me that it was Captain Angus McDonald, of some where about Souris or North Side, that gave him possession of it. I know, four or five years ago, I saw part of the Lot ploughed, and McAvoy told me he was ploughing there; and Captain Angus came along, and said that he was glad that he caught some person trespassing there, as he wished to make his claim good; and that he prosecuted McAvoy, wot for any damages he should recover, but to make his claim good to the Lot or Lots. Mcavoy did not do any thing more to the Lot until after the trial. Judgment went against McAvoy. McAvoy then took the Lot from Captain Angus. McAroy has it enclosed with several other Lots. He had a crop off it last summer. McAvoy told me he was brought up for trespassing on the Lot of Captain Angus. I don't know what Lot Donald Campbell qualified on, when he voted for Georgetown, only that he told me it was on that Lot that he intended voting. He told me so a very short time before the last election-only a day or two. I was never Collector of Assessment until this year. I never received any from Donald Campbell. I received the assessment for that lot from McAvoy. I had no means of knowing that he roted, only from himself and John Cameron. Cameron mentioned that he voted on that Lot. I believe McAvoy was ploughing on Town Lots Nos. 2 and 1, at the time he was prosecuted for trespass by Captain Angus McDonald. I can't say whether he was prosecuted for one or both. He was ploughing a ridge all round. One side of the ridge was on Lot 1 ; the side next the street. The Lots were not enclosed at that time. I am not sure but there might be part of the foundation of a fence. I remember seeing a low fence; but I can't say whether it was then or afterwards, or before. I don't recollect of any fence between Lots Nos. 1 and 2, at that time. For the last year or two, Lot No. 1 is outside altogether; no fence round it.

Court adjourned until nine o'clock to-morrow, the first of April.

Court re-opened, pursuant to adjournment, at nine o'clock, first of April.

Vote of Donald Campbell recalled.
Paper produced by Roderick McAulay, relative to Town Lot Nio. 2, fourth range, letter A, purporting to be a certificate from W. II. Badge, Assistant Registrar. (Marked No. 18.) Admitted to be authentic.

Vote of Augustine McDonald. Votes on Town Lot No. 12, first range, letter D. Share in property of A. A. McDonald, Esquire. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

John Lavers produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I reside in Georgetown. I have a dwelling house of my own here. The No. of the Lot my house is on is No. 9, ]st range, letter A. I know No. 12, first range, letter D. It is not cultivated. It is not stumped nor enclosed. I don't know of any person catting down there, for Augustine MICDonald, last summer twelve months. I saw some person cutting bushes on the street, and on A. A. McDonald's Lot. I can't swear positively that the trees were not cut on Augustine McDonald's Lot. I don't believe there are any on it to cut. It is all stumps; there are no trees on it. I don't think there was any thing more on it in 1856, than what is on it to-day. I am positive it is the same Lot I am speaking about that Augustine McDonald holds. It adjoins my Lot No. 11, alongside of it. I don't know of Augustine McDonald having any interest in any other property in Georgetown. He may or may not. I don't know.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from John Aldous, Commissioner of Crown Lands, relative to Town Lot No. 12, first range, letter D. Marked No. 19. Admitted to be authentic.

Archibald J. McDonald produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know of Augustine McDonald having an interest in the business of A. A. McDonald.

Protest entered by R. McAulay, relative to the reception of evidence on the vote of Augustine McDonald. Marked No. 20.

The Sheriff and Assistants decide against the reception of evidence on any property on which Augustine McDonald claims to vote, except Town Lot No. 12, first range, letter D.

Archibald McDonald on oath :
I know Town Lot No. 12, 1st range, letter D. Augustine McDonald is in possession of it.

Paper produced by A. A. McDonald, purporting to be a certificate from Crowa Land Office, relative to Town Lot No. 12, first range, letter D. Marked No. 21. Admitted to be authentic.

Mr. McDonald protests against the decision of the Sheriff's Court, relative to the admission of evidence on Augustine McDonald's vote. Protest marked No. A. 22.

Archibald McDonald on oath :
Town Lot No. 12, letter D, is not cultivated. There is no house on it. It is not all enclosed. I think there is a fence round three sides of it. I believe my brother Angustine to be in actual possession of that Lot. He sent a man to cut down on it, for the purpose of taking possession of it. I can't tell any thing about who put the fence on the three sides of the Lot. In passing the Lot one day last summer, I saw a fence, I think, on three sides of it. I think it most likely that fence was put there by others, in enclosing their own Lots.

Proclamation made at twenty-three minutes to twelve o'clock, that if no evidenee is offered within one hour, the Court will be finally closed.

Mr. McAulay withdraws his protest against the reception of evidence on the vote of Augustine McDonald. Protest marked No. 20.

Vote of John Sanfe. Town Lot No. 2, fourth range, letter G. Votes for Haviland and McDonald. Sworn. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff :

I know Town Lot No. 2, fourth range, letter G. I can see it from where I stand now. It is not improved. It is all covered with spruce or fir bushes. [Paper produced by R.McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from the Crown Land Office, relative to Town Lot No. 2, fourth range, letter G. Marked No. B. 22. Admitted to be authentic.] Why I came to know the Town Lot so well is, because when the number and letter of the Lot is given out, I could go and put my hand on any Lot in the Town. I was an assessor, and had the plan of the town, and studied it very minately. I have not been on the Lot lately. I have been handy to it. I have seen it. I am not sure if $I$ have ever been on it. I passed it lately. I went to see it this morning, to satisfy myself, in case I would be called upon to give evidence on it: I did not expect to be called upon to-day to give evidence
on that Lot. I declined doing so, when asked. I accompanied Mr. Owen with a plan this morning, to inspect this lot, and other lots for the same purpose. I did not take a plan. I accompanied Mr. Owen with a plan. I believe he had a plan in his hand. It might be a plan, and it might not. It might be a plan of the Royalty, or Charlottetown. I did not see the inside of it. I saw Mr. Owen beside me drawing it out. I thought it was a plan. It might be a pattern of crochet work. I know Mr. Owen did not examine it in my presence. I can't tell whether John Sanfe has or has not been in possession of that Lot. I heard before the election that John Sanfe claimed some Lots there. I did not know before that, that they belonged to any person. I heard that John Sanfe bought a Lot sometime.

Court adjourned for one hour and a quarter, at a quarter to one o'clock.

Court re-opened, pursuant to acjournment, at two o'clock.

Vote of Peter Dalton. Pasture Lot No. 60, Georgetown Royalty. Votes for Haviland and McDonald . Sworn. Objected by McAulay. James Campbell produced by K. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Pasture Lot No. 60, in the Royalty of Georgetown. There is part of it cultivated. There is about an acre or a little more ploughed, as near as I can say. I am not very sure. I am not very sure, but I don't think there was any crop in that acre or a little more, last year. I expect it was ploughed last fall. The rest of the lot is not cultivated. There is part of it, woods on it. Some of it may have been stumped, but never was ploughed. It is my firm belief that there was no crop taken out of any part of that lot last year. I reside permanently on the adjoining farm. We know the lot as James Dalton's, or between James and Peter. I believe Peter was not home part of last summer. I believe he was about a year away. That lot was fenced in last summer, part of it. The fence is round the part that is ploughed now. There is a part of the lot cut down, besides the part that is ploughed. I think there is a part of it stumped over alongside of the ploughing. Peter and James Dalton live together on those Lots out there. I always thought that the property belonged to James Dalton. I did not know that Peter owned any of it. I don't know whether he does own any of it or not. They

are living together in one house. The house they live in is not on Lot 60. I don't know if Peter Dalton put up any of the fences that are up. I don't know Peter Dalton to make any improvements on that lot. He might, without my seeing him. It is my opinion that Peter Dalton took no crop, viz., agricultural produce, off that lot last year. There was no crop taken off that lot by any person last year, that I know of. Mr. Howlet and Mr. Devereux had the use of all the lots as a pasture, last year. There is no fence between them, that I know of. Part of Lot 60 must be under the same common fence with the lot they are building on.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from the Registry Office, relative to Town Lot No. 8, first range, letter B. Marked No. 23. Admitted to be authentic.

## Vote of John Sanfe recalled.

Lemuel C. Owen produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know the piece of ground known as Town Lot No. 2, fourth range, letter G. It is not a cultivated lot. I saw it this morning. I can't tell any thing about any person owning it. I know the lot. I saw it this morning. I don't know any thing about any person owning it. I heard that it belonged to one of the Sanfes, but I have only hearsay for it. I know nothing about that. I was at several sales here, but I can't tell whether John Sanfe purchased that lot or not. I took no account of the lots that were sold. I own a good many lots in Georgetown. I purchased a good many from the Crown. I once paid the assessment of a lot to which I had no title from the Crown, by a mistake, and subsequently demanded the money back, but did not get it. It was local assessment I spoke of. I never paid any land assessment, until I paid all the instalments. I don't know whether it is the practice in the country or not to pay the land assessment until all the instalments are paid. I never did so. When lots are sold, they are paid in instalments; and when the instalments are not paid at the time, the money paid is forfeited, and the title remains in the Crown. I can't tell whether or not if any person trespassed on those Lots, after I had them purchased, and the first instalment paid, they would be liable to be prosecuted. It is my opinion if a person purchases land, and pays the first instalment, he is entitled to a claim on the land; but if he fails to pay the last instalments, he forfeits it after-
wards. If a person trespassed on those lots, by cutting timber, although not enclosed, they might be liable, if the person had paid the instalment. I have heard that one on the Sanfes has some claim on the lot in question, but I don't know. I don't know that any person has any real claim to it.

Vote of James Sanfe. Town Lot No. 13, fourth range, letter F. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Sworn. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

Lemuel C. Owen produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know where Town Lot No. 13, fourth range, letter $F$, is. It is not cultivated. It is not enclosed. There are no trees on the lot, but it has never been levelled. There is a cellar on Lot 12, and the four walls of a house on 14, as far as I can judge from the appearance of the place. I did not measure it. I was rather doubtful this morning. [Paper produced by $R$. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from the Crown Land Office, relative to Town Lot No. 13, fourth range, letter F. Marked No. 24. Admitted to be authentic.] There may, perhaps, be two or three feet of the house on Lot 13. The house is all on fourteen, with the exception of two or three feet, as far as I could judge. I don't know who has it. I have no idea, only from repute. I was told that some of the Sanfes had a claim on it-nothing more than that. I could define the boundaries of Lot 13, by stepping it out, as I did this morning. I had a plan with me, and I could range the line with the line of the lots below.

Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Town Lot No. 13, fourth range, Ietter F. It is not an improved lot. It is not fenced or enclosed. I uever saw it fenced or enclosed. There is no house on it. There is what is called a cellar on it. A small hole dug. It was intended to be dug on Lot 12, and four walls of a small house put on it. The one that dug that hole goes by the name of the Russian I believe the piece of a house was erected at the Russian's expense, by some men from the country. The cellar is either on the eastern side of Lot 13, or very handy to it, between Lots 13 and 12. The Lots were never surveyed, to my knowledge. I saw the Lots stepped out this moraing. I took the on lots from the other block. There is a fence on the south part
of Lot 13. I am not sure whether it goes all the way across the Lot. There may be part of the commencement of a house on Lot 13, but the most of it is on Lot 14. I have no knowledge of the boundaries of Lot 13 , except by taking the range from the other Lots below, and stepping them out. I swear positively that that house is not where I saw it first, for I saw the Russion prying it off from its foundation to another place. I don't know whose property that house is at present. I don't know if it is any person's. The house is a few small spruce logs, sided on both sides, without roof, floor, doors or windows. This commencement of a house was erected some time last summer, or perhaps in the fall. I think it was rather late in the season. I think it was the intention of the person who commenced that building to finish it. I am not sure that ever I saw any rafters on that house. There are not any on it now. I have not seen the building, to take any notice of it, since last fall, until to-day and yesterday.

Vote of Edmund Kayne. Town Lot No. 14, fourth range, Ietter F. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Sworn. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

Alexander Robertson produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Town Lot No. 14, fourth range, letter $F$, in Georgetown. There are a few feet of it enclosed with other Lots, about twenty feet as far as I can judge, perhaps a little less or more. The rest is not cultivated. Those few feet of it are enclosed with Lot No. 15, in the same range and letter. The rest of the Lot is unimproved, with the exception of those few logs that were spoken of as a house, in whole or in part on it. I think mostly all. The house is the same house we have been describing all along. It is the same house that was put up for the Russian. I have seen no established bounds on that Lot, except Mr. Howlett's fence alongside of it. I was to see that Lot last, this morning and yesterday. I have passed and repassed it often, but never went to see the bounds of it before yesterday. Neither of the candidates, or their assistants, have had any private conversation with me, relative to the lot in question, or either of the other lots.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from the Crown Land Office,
relative to Town Lot No. 14, fourth range, letter F. Marked No. 25. Admitted to be authentic.

Vote of Joseph Ball. Pasture Lot No. 319. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Sworn. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.
Lemuel C. Owen produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Pasture Lot No. 319. I was on it this morning. By the plan, it is alongside of the line of Lot 53 and Georgetown Royalty, and a brook running throughitinto Brudenell River. The line of Township No. 53 separates this Lot from Township No. 53, by the plan. I only know it by the plan. It is unimproved. It is not enclosed. It is in a wilderness state. The two lots belonging to Balls are between Cundall's lots and the line of Lot No. 53, and all the lots in that range, between Cundall's and the line of Lot 53 , are in a wilderness state, except a small field on Mr. Johnston's lot. I don't know of any person being in possession of them, except that they are reputed to belong to the Balls. I know I purchased those twc lots for the two Mr. Balls, and gave them the numbers of them. I don't know whether they ever paid any thing for them or not. There is no road down where 319 is.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, relative to Pasture Lot No. 319. Marked No. 26. Admitted to be authentic.

Paper produced by A. A. McDonald, purporting to be a certificate from the Crown Land Office, relative to Pasture Lot No. 319. Marked No. 27. Admitted to be authentic.

Vote of John Ball. Pasture Eot No 295. Votes for A. A. McDonald. Sworn. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.
L. C. Owen produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I did own some land in the vicinity of the south-west part of the Royalty of Georgetown. I know where the lot of land is, numbered 295. It is on the same range between 320 and 185 . Severa: lots between them. It is on the new road to be opened down there. It is unimproved. In a wilderness state. Not fenced in. I know nothing more about it than I do about. 319. I don't know that any person has possession of it. I think this is one of the lots I purchased in 1856, for Mr. Ball. There is no person living on it.

Paper produced by R. McAulay, purporting to be a certificate from the Crown Land Office, relative to Pasture Lot No. 295. Marked No. 28. Admitted to be authentic.

Paper produced by A. A. McDonald, purporting to be a certificate from the Crown Land Office, relative to Pasture Lot No. 295. Marked No. 29. Admitted to be authentic.

Proclamation made at five o'clock, that if no evidence is offered within one hour, the Court will be finally closed.

Vote of John Sanfe recalled.
John B. Howlett produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know John Sanfe, who voted at this last election. I know he does hold Town Lot No. 2, fourth range, letter G. He requested me to purchase a couple of lots for him, and I purchased that lot along with anctiner. He authorised me to take possession of those lots for him. He went on the ground with me and gave me possession. Ife gave me the use of the lots, if I would pay the assessment on his account. There was some tall trees standing on the lots at the time. We got those trees cut down and carried away as longers. I intended to have stumped and ploughed it last summer, but it was not done. I know when he purchased those lots. The first payment was made on those lots on the 6th of July, 1857, and the second payment appears to have been made on the 12th of August, 1858. I know John Sanfe owns the lot. I think he has a title to that property. I saw a title to it. I hold in my hand two titles to it. I sent the money to Town for the deed myself. I don't know how long ago. I occupy the lot for Sanfe. I cut down some trees on the lot, as already stated, to cnable me to get it ploughed. I did not get it ploughed. I did not take out the stumps of those trees we cut down. I did not enclose it. Mr. Sanfe has this hold of it, that he purchased it, paid for it, or somebody on his behalf, and gave me the use of the lot for paying the taxes. It is not liable to taxes yet. The title I hold in my hand is a receipt from the Crown Land Office for the money that was paid on it. No person has ever threatened to prosecute me for trespass, or done so, since I took possession of that land for John Sanfe; and if any one were to trespass on it, except John Sanfe, or some person on his account, I would prosecute them myself.

## Vote of James Sanfe recalled.

John B. Howlett produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know James Sanfe, who voted at this election at Georgetown. I believe him to be the owner of Town Lot No. 13, fourth range, letter F. There is the walls of a house on that lot at present; the whole frame was once complete. I took the rafters off myself. That building has never been removed from the place where it was first erected. The lot joins one of my lots. It is bounded on the west by No. 14. There is a stake in the rear of the lot by my fence, between that lot and No. 12. The frame of that house I spoke of is on the lot in question, No. 13. The frame might be removed in the imagination of people who see ghosts, but otherwise it could not without my seeing it. I put down four stakes to define the place where the house was to be laid at first. The house was put there at that time, and is there still, with the exception of the rafters that I took off myself. That house was put there by a young man by the name of McLeod, and another by the name of Johnson, I think. William Sanderson, Esqr., employed them to put that house there. He employed them to put that house there for the use of William Conpiece, the man known as the Russian. I have three lots of my own in that vicinity. The house here spoken of, is now neither Conpiece's nor Mr. Sanderson's. I paid for it fully five months ago, before the man went away to Charlottetown. I have no interest or claim whatever in or to this property, beyond what I have stated. Some time this spring twelve months, that frame of a house was put up by Mr. Sanderson. I do not know if that house was there the 19th of February, 1858. I think the stuff was hauled on the snow. The house was not put up to occupy the ground for Sanfe. It was not Sanfe's orders to put up the house, but the house had been put on since Sanfe got the lot. I believe Sanfe to have owned the house from the day it was put up. I believe the house was put there for the use and benefit of Sanfe, for he won't let it off. I know the lot was not sold since the house was put up. Sanfe never got the ground enclosed. It is partly enclosed. It was done by me. There are two sides of the fence now standing. Those fences that are up now, were put up to divide that from other lots; but there has been a part of that lot enclosed by itself,
which fence I removed. I am enclosing the land for myself, on Sanfe's account. I fenced that partly, one time for a pasture for a calf. The calf is not two years old yet, I believe. The assessors always call it an improved lot when there is a house on it. There never was a door in it, and it is now without a roof. A door could be put in it, and a roof on it.

Court adjourned at twenty minutes past six, until ten o'clock to-morrow, the 2nd of April.

April 2nd. Court opened at ten o'clock, pursuant to adjournmerí.

Edmund F. Byrne sworn in as Clerk by the Sheriff.

Vote of J. Sanfe recalled.
Samuel Ford produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

Knows Lot No. 13, fourth range, letter F. Does not see any enclosure on it. Sees part of a house-the walls of a house. The house is about fifteen feet long, and about twelve or thirteen feet wide. It is a log house. The logs are up; no roof on it, or no rafters. There is no wall underneath it. There are blocks under it. It is about a foot over the ground. I always understood the house was put there for the Russian, William Kelpiece. I think, from what I understood by the sale last July, the house was put on that lot in a mistake, by the Russian. I know there was a great row about it last July. The Russian put that house there for his own benefit, not for Sanfe. He was going to get married. I don't think the house was sold by the lot, last July. I was in the Court House last summer, when Mr. Archibald McKinnon bid upon a lot upon which that house was supposed to stand. I was there all the time during the sale. I believe the lot is Mr. Sanfe's. I can't exactly say who took the lot out of the sale. I heard Mr. McKinnon and Mr. Sanderson speak about the lot. I can't exactly tell the words, but it appears to me that Mr. McKinnon had something paid on the lot, or had the lot bespoke. I can't exactly say. I recollect Mr. Sanderson saying that the Russian had a house built or building upon that lot, and that he could not parchase it on account of being a foreigner. I recollect some thing about that lot and house being left to Mr. Sanderson's bid, for the Russian. I would not be certain whether it was thought then that this house was on Lot 12 ; but I recollect that after the sale was over,
that the Russian went and dug a cellar on Lot 12. The Russian did not remove it. Whether he tried to remove it, I don't know. I believe he sold the house. He offered to sell it to me. I saw preparations to remove the house,-saw the skids laid. I understood he, the Russian, sold the house to Mr. Howlett. He, the Russian, sold it for three pounds. I can't say exactly when the house was put ap; it was some time last spring. I don't know the boundaries of Lot 13. I don't know the number of the Lots at all, to say whether this house is on Lot 12 or 13 . I never said that part of this house was on Lot 12. I think it was about last September that the Russian sold the house for three pounds. I don't know whether it was Lot 12 or 13 that Mr. McKinnon said he had a claim to, but it is the lot the house is now standing on. I understood he, the Russian, put the house on the wrong lot. I can't exactly say when the house was put up, but think it was last spring, about May or June, after the snow went.

Daniel Gordon produced by R. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

Owing to a dispute in the Court yesterday, four of us went on the ground this morning, and surveyed the ground. We found the lot an open uncultivated lot. We found that some body had commenced building a log hat on that or the adjoining lot. By survey, we found there was about eighteen inches of the house on the Lot 14, but by the stakes shown by Mr. Howlett, the house would be very near the line. I can't tell by whom the house was put there. I was not in the Court House at the sale of the lots last year. There are no trees on this lot. There are a few stumps of trees. I did not count the number of stumps; there are not many. Can't say whether there are half a dozen stumps on it. I was on Lots $13,14,15$ and 16 today. We found no enclosure at all on this lot. Surveyed this lot by actual reasurement. The adjoining lot on the south-west, the fence buts on this lot. The lot was never levelled. I could not say whether it has ever been enclosed. It may have been enclosed before I was born. It is not enclosed at the present time. Can't say whether it was enclosed within the last two years. We measured the boundaries to Lot 12. I was on the corner of Lot 15, and staked or
 whether the house has been removed or not. I
saw a lever there, as if it had been used for lifting the House. I would think the house has not been removed.

Vote of Peter Dalton recalled.
James Dalton produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

Myself and my brother, Peter Delton, are joint owners of Pasture Lot No. 60. Have had that lot in possession since the year 1843, to the best of my knowledge. Have cultivated most of that lot. Between three and four acres of that lot is cultivated. Stumps in part of it. Myself and brother are joint owners of this lot, No. 60. Had no crop on it last year I would not like to say myselt and my brother derived two pounds each, benefit from the lot, last year. We burned the wood off it. We took no agricultural produce from that lot last year. I think, without measuring the ground, that there are three or four acres of chat land cut down. Myself and my brother Peter are now in the actual possession, use and occupation of Pasture Lot No. 60. We have had the lot since we purchased it. There were cows belonging to the town, pasturing on it last summer. We held it the same as ever, although we had no agricultural crop in it. I gave the use of it for pasturing to those parties who had cows there. I myself hold other property in the Royalty of Georgetown. I have had that other property over twelve months. I hold land under Mr. Haviland for a term of years. I have a half lot of my own, that I purchased from the Crown, besides. I hold four lots from Mr . Haviland. There is not a fence round the whole of Lot 60. There is a fence round part of. Our dwelling house is not on Lot 60. Myself and my brother purchased that lot. There is no fence dividing that lot from my dwelling house. There is part of that lot enclosed with another. The lot does not front on the roan, over the bridge. There is a road to go in the rear of it. Unless under a necessity, I would not sell the lot under forty pounds. My brother, who voted on part of this lot, was absent from the Island for a length of time. He returned in the latter end of last August, the 17th or 16th, or some time thereabouts. I did not sell this property to any body. Myself and my brother have been in possession of this lot since 1843. No person since that time has attempted to put us out of possession, by a course of law. Myself and brother paid thirty pounds
for that lot a number of years ago. It was some time in June my brother left here. He was back the next August twelve months.
John Devereux produced by A. A. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Pasture Lot No. 60, in the Royalty of Georgetown. Peter and James Dalton now claim pussession of that lot. I was, in the year 1856, cultivating that lot with Peter and James Dalton. The spring 1856, Peter and James Dalton gave me liberty to plant potatoes on the same lot. I did so, and had a crop of potatoes off it. The winter previous to 1856, James D:Iton cut some wood on Lot 60 for me. He was living in my house before that. I did not say that Peter and James Dalton gave me part of that lot; but they gave me permission to plant potatoes on part of it. I think I saw Peter and James Dalton's title to that properts. As far as I recollect, the title to that property is in Peter and James Dalton's name. Mr. Byrne, who is now dead, wrote the title. I saw the agreement some time ago. Mr. Thomas Byrne's name is signed to it as witness. I did not say which of the Daltons' name is first in the title. The Daltons gave me as much as I would be able to plant. They gave me the use of part of the half lot. They made no charge for it. I done some turns for them. I had my cow on it for two summers. He did not say how long I was to have the use of it. He told me I might plant potatoes in it every spring, when not occupied. He never sold me any part of the lot. It was since that spring, I had my cow in it.

Mathew Kearney produced by Mr. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Pasture Lot No 60, in the Royaity of Georgetown. I was working with either Peter or James Dalton, on that lot. I was planting potatoes. It was this spring three years. I can't exactly say which asked me to plant the potatoes. I think the both of them spoke to me, as far as I recollect. I am not sure whether I done any thing further to this lot, at the request of Peter Dalton. I don't know that ever I saw Peter Dalton working on that lot. I can't say. I can't say whether the potatoes grew well or not. I don't think there was any couch in them. I don't think I was speaking to Mr. R. McAulay at that patch. I did not bring a scarifier there, and did not see them moulded. I can't say whether they were
near the middle or near the fence. They were planted among the stumps. I could not say what quantity of ground was planted. I should think there was half an acre. When I was working there, it was for James and Peter Dalton together, that I was working.

## Vofe of Edmund Kayne recalled.

John B. Howlett produced by Mr. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I know Town Lot No. 14, fourth range, letter F. That lot is in possession of Edward Kayne. The lot is partly cleared. I suppose there is half of it has been inside my fence for some time, perhaps two years or more. I have no claim on that lot, only what Mr. Kayne had given me. He gave me the use of it. I think Mr. Kayne purchased this lot in 1857. I cion't know whether Mr. Kayne has got a grant of it or not. I know he purchased it, and paid part. I know he has fulfilled the conditions of the agreement. The request of Edmund Kayne was to clear and enclose this lot. It was done at his request. I could not do it else, or partly done, as I before stated. I cleared and enclosed part of that lot since Edmund Kayne told me to do so. I did it for both purposes, that is, for Mr. Kayne's use and my own benefit. I enclosed and cleared about half the lot, perhaps it may be a little over. It was not since he gave me possession that I enclosed all that is enclosed. There was a part of that lot within my enclosure before E. Kayne purchased it. After he purchased, the fence was removed again on to Mr. Kayne's lot: and if I had fencing poles enough, I would enclose the whole at the same time. I don't swear that there is wore than one half of that lot enclosed; but about one half, or perhaps more. There was some levelling done to part of the other half. I think there was some stumps taken off it. This clearing was done by myself and son. I don't know but there was another boy with him. I could not say how much of this lot I had enclosed when Kayne bought it. I can't say how much more is enclosed now. I will say there was two and four feet taken in since Kayne bought it. There was between one and forty feet taken in by me since Kayne bought it. I took over one foot and less than forty. On my oath, I can't go nearer than that, whether I took in ten feet or twenty.

Vote of Donald A. McPhee resumed. Pasture Lot No. 165, Georgetown Royalty. Objected by Haviland and McAulay.

Alexander Robertson recalled :
I have reason to believe that it was in 1851, not in 1849 or 1850, that Pasture Lot No. 165 was purchased by John McPhee. I purchased a lot the same time, and I and John McPhee helped one another surveying it. I believe John Mcllhee purchased that lot for himself, as we agreed to purchase the one between us, and take half each. I don't know any thing about the grant being taken out by John McPhee. I understood that this lot is the one that Francis L. McPhee voted on. I can't tell whether the deposit on the purchase of this lot was paid in John McPhee's name or not. John McPhee spoke of it the next day as his lot.
Court adjourned for one hour and ten minutes, at ten minutes to one o'clock.

Court opened, pursuant to adjournment, at two o'clock.

## Vote of Donald A. McPhee resumed.

John McPhee recalled:
I purchased Pasture Lot No. 165 for my late brother. He sent me expressly from Charlottetown to buy it.for him. I took the receipt in his name. The money I paid was a Nova Scotia twenty shilling note. 'Iwenty shillings I had to pay, and I got four shillings change. The grant was taken out in my brother's name: my brother who is dead, Francis Lauchlan McPhee.

Proclamation made at three o'clock, that if no evidence is brought forward within one hour, the Court will be finally closed.

Vote of William McKay. Town Lot No. 1, first range, letter F. Votes for Haviland and McAulay. Sworn. Objected by Mr. McDonald. Admitted by Mr. McAulay.

Joseph Revel produced by Mr. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

Knows the range of lots passing along the street, above the Court House, over to the Common. Fenced in some of those lots for Mr. McNeill. I fenced in a whole block belonging to Mr. McNeill. It is the block furthest to the westward. Fenced in the whole of the lots in that block, in one fence. There was a crop put in those lots last summer. Mr. McNeill put the crop in. They are in his possession still,

I think. I can't say whether all those lots fenced in are McNeill's, but he fenced and cropped them.

Stephen Sweeney produced by Mr. McDonald. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I was about fencing in some lots last spring for Mr. McNeill. A block of lots next the Common, to the west end of the Town. They front on the road passing up to Dr. Kaye's. They front on the street passing Mrs. Stiggens's, the first street above the square. They are the furthest block to the westward of the Town. I fenced in the whole of the block, with the exception of one lot of Kiely's, about the middle of the block. I fenced in the first lots on the corner, on the road passing up to Dr. Kaye's,-the two lots to the westerard. Mr. McNeill employed me to fence the lots. Mr. McNeill cropped them last summer. Don't know of any other person claiming those lots, except Mr. McNeill. I don't swear that McNeill owns all those lots.

Mr. McDonald produced a certificate from Mr. Aldous, to show that Town Lot No. 1, first range, letter F , was soid at public sale to Mr. McNeill, and that no grant or license of occupation was given previous to 6 th of July, 1857, of said lot. Admitted as authentic by Mr. McAulay. Marked No. 30.

Mr. Finlay McNeill produced by Mr. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

Knows Town Lot No. 1, first range, letter F. Bought the lot at public sale. Conditions, one-third down, and one-third each year, to be paid in three instalments. I paid one instalment. I paid the second instalment too. I understand William McKay, Esquire, claims this lot. I had conversation with Mr. McKay, after I bought this lot. I cleared and stumped it. McKay came to me, and said he would sue ine for trespass. I said if the lot were his, I would give him the lot, and get my money back from the Government. Mr. McKay did notsue me for trespass. I was enclosing the other lots alongside, and I asked Mr. McKay to allow me to enclose it with the others. He did so. I was not to pay him any thing for it. This interview was before I enclosed and after I ploughed the lot. Mr. McKay has not spoken to me about the lot, since that time. I think Mr. McKay claims that lot. He told me he bought it from the assessors. I knew the late Charles McLaren. Knew his signature. Sig-
nature to document is his. I am acquainted with the signature of William Sanderson, R. Gidley and other assessors. [Document produced by Mr. McAulay. Admitted by Mr. McDonald to be an assessor's deed, and admitted to be registered. Marked No. 31.]

## Mr. McNeill:

I purchased Lot 1, First Range, Letter F, 6th of July 1857. I have this Lot by Mr. McKay's permission, some time in Octoker after. I have not been disturbed in my possession by Mr. McKay, by any course of law. I hold this property under my purchase from the Crown, and by Mr. McKay's permission also. When Mr. McKay found me working on this Lot, he told me he would sue me for trespass. I told him if the Lot were his I would give it up to him at any time. I asked his permission to enclose that Lot and use it. I told Mr. McKay that I had bought it from the Crown. I hold it still by Mr. McKay's permission, and by the purchase also. It was to make my purchase good from the Crown, that I paid the second instalment.

Proclamation made at twenty five minutes past four o'clock, that if no evidence be brought forward within one hour, the Court will be finally closed.

Vote of Wellington Nelson. Pasture Lot No. 268. Voted for Haviland and McAulay. Objected by Mr. McDonald. Admitted voting by Mr. McAulay.

Mr. McDonald produced a certificate from W. Badge, Registrar Office, to shew that Wellington Nelson conveyed all property away. Signature of W. Badge admitted by Mr. McAulay. (Marked No. 32.)

Mr. McDonald produced certificate from Mr. John Aldous, to shew that no grant or license of occupation of Pasture Lot 268, in Georgetown Royalty, was given to Wellington Nelson or any person whatever. Signature by Mr. Aldous admitted by Mr. McAulay as authentic. (Marked No. 33.)

Vote of John Norton. Town Lot No. 7, First Range, Letter B. Voted for Haviland and MuAulay. Objected by Mr. McDonald.

Mr. McDonald produced certificate from W. Badge, Registrar Office, to shew that Lot 7, First Range, Letter B, was granted to James Stewart Norton, and that no deed appears on record. Admitted by Mr. McAulay. (Marked No. 34.)

Mr. McDonald produced a certificate from Hon. Charles Young, that no will of the late James Norton, deceased, is on record and that no person has taken out Letters of Administration for estate. Admitted as authentic by Mr. McAulay. (Marked No. 35.)

Courtadjourned by proclamation until Monday morning next, the 4th day of April, at ten o'clock, at half-past five o'clock.

Court opened, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday, 4th April, at ten o'clock, a.m.

## Vote of John Norton risumed.

George Moore prodrced by Mr. McAnlay. Sworn by the Sinerift :

I know John Norton on the Town Road. I am John Norton's brother-in-law. I know that John Norton is in possession of property belonging to James Norton, since 1854, undisturbed by anybody. I understand he is in possession of property owned by the same James Norton in Georgetown. It is a Lot in Georgetown. I am aware that John Norton is in possession of every article moveable and imoveable, belonging to James Norton. John Norton possesses a Lot in Georgetown. I can't tell the No. and Range of the Lot. I can't tell how he became possessed of any property in Georgetown. He has paid the Quit Rent for that Lot to my certain knowledge, both before and since his brother died. I never saw John Norton working thatLot. I can'ttell if James Cogswell is in possession of that Lot now.

Thomas Owen, Esq. produced by Mr. McAulay. Sworn by the Sheriff:

I am brother-in-law to the late James Norton, of Three Rivers. Before his death he showed me the grant of Town Lot No. 7, First Range, Ietter B, in Georgetown, a year or two before
his death. It was a Government grant in favour of James Norton. John Norton I believe is in possession of that property now. He is in possession of all his brother owned before his death. He died intestate. By the consent of the family John Norton is in possession of the property now. I believe Mr. Cogswell cultivates the lot now. John Norton has been in the undisturbed possession of the property of James Norton since 1854, by the consent of the family. He lived with James Norton previous to his death. I have seen no documentary evidence to shew how he became in possession. It never was demanded of the family. I have not seen John Norton within the last eighteen months cultivating that lot. I said James Cogswell cultivates that Lot for him, as others are cultivated in Georgetown. I believe it is by the permission of John Norton that Cogswell cultivates this Lot. I have not seen John Norton at any time since his brother's death, cultivating or using that Lot. I never saw his brother do it either. I saw Cogswell cultivate it, I believe by his, John Norton's permission.

Proclamation made at a quarter past eleven o'clock, a. m., that if no evidence is offered within one hour, the Coart will be finally closed.

Court closed, by proclamation, at a quarter past twelve o'clock, noon, no evidence having been offered within one hour, agreeably to the last and previous proclamation.

Sir;
I received your Despatch relating to the Loan of one hundred thousand pounds, which had been contemplated for Prince Edward Island, within a few days of the closing of the Session of Parliament, and at a moment manifestly too late for enabling Her Majesty's Government to recommend, if such had been their decision, that measure to the consideration of the Legislature. Since that time, affairs of such pressing importance have forced themselves on my attention, that I have been prevented informing you of the course I have thought proper to pursue with the report of your Council and the explanatory statements with which it is accompanied. I have now to apprise you that I have referred your Despatch, together with these explanations, to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and that I have requested their Lordships' investigation and report on the financial condition of the Island, as therein disclosed. I shall Eave the honor to communicate again with yon, when I am in possession of their Lordships' opinion on this subject.

With reference to my Despatch of September last, acquainting you that I had communicated the correspondence respecting the proposed Loan of $£ 100,000$, to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, I have now to acquaint you, that in the present state of the finances of the Colony, Her Majesty's Government are of opinion that it would be hopeless to attempt to obtain a guarantee from the House of Commons.

The whole question, however, of the Land tenures, together with that of the Fishery Reserves, is engaging my most anxious attention; and it would give me unfeigned pleasure to receive such suggestions for the amicable settlement of these differences as could be accepted by the Imperial Government.
It has occurred to me that if, within the Island, an impartial Committee could be formed, composed of members fairly representing the interests of Landlord and Tenant, they might devise modes of settlement consistent with what in this Country are considered the legitimate rights of property, and which would obtain the concurrence of both parties.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honourable the Executive Council of Canada, dated 4th September, 1858, approved by His Excellency the Governor General, on the 9th Sept.
The Committee of Council are respectfully of opinion, that it is expedient to bring the subject of the Union of the British North American colonies, under the notice of Her Majesty's Government, with as little delay as possible, and to inform the Government of each such colony that the attention of Her Majesty has been called to the subject by Your Excellency.

That Your Excellency should submit to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the colonies, the propriety of authorizing a meeting of delegates on behalf of each colony and of Upper and Lower Canada respectively, for the purpose of considering the subject of such $\mathrm{Fe}-$
derative Union, and reporting on the principles on which the same could properly be based.

That such delegates should be appointed by the Executive Government of each colony, and meet with as little delay as possible.

That the report of such delegates should be addressed to the Secretary of State for the colonies, and that a copy of it, as soon as it is prepared, should be placed in the hands of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor of each colony, in order that they may lay the same before the Provincial Parliament, with as little delay as possible.

The Committee have had under consideration a Despatch (No. 87,) Dated 26th November, 1858, from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating that the Imperial Government, before authorising a meeting of Delegates from the Executive Councils of the British North American Provinces, on the subject of a Federal Union, as proposed in the Order in Council, commanicated to the Colonial Secretary by your Excellency's Despatch, No. 118, of 9th September last, desire an expression of the sentiments which may be entertained by the Governments of the Lower Provinces on that important matter, in order not to commit them to a preliminary step towards the settlement of a question of which they had not yet signified their assent to the principle.

In order to place the Governments of the Lower Provinces in possession of all the proceedings that have hitherto taken place in reference to the above mentioned subject, the Honourable the Attorney General (L. C.) recommends that a copy of the said Despatch No. 87, as well as of the letter addressed by the Delegates from Canada to the Right Honourable the Colonial Secretary, while in England, be communicated to the Governor and Lieutenant

Governor of each of such Provinces, with a view to invite such action in the matter as may be deemed expedient.

The Committee advise that the suggestion of the Honourable Attorney General be approved and acted on.

We have the honour to submit for the consideration of Her Majesty's Government, that the Governor General of Canada, acting under the advice of his Responsible Advisers, has been pleased to recommend that the subject of a Federative Union of the Provinces of British North America, should form the subject of discussion by Delegates from each Province, to be appointed under the Orders of Her Majesty's Government; and we have been instructed to urge the importance of this step as well upon grounds peculiar to Canada, as from considerations affecting the interests of the other Colonies and of the whole Empire.

It is our duty to state that very grave difficulties now present themselves in conducting the Government of Canada, in such a manner as to show due regard to the wishes of its numerous population. The Union of Lower with Upper Canada was based upon perfect equality being preserved between these Provinces, a condition the more necessary from the differ: ences in their respective language, law and re-ligion-and although there is now a large English popalation in Lower Canada, still these differences exist to an extent which prevents any perfect and complete assimilation of the views of the two Sections.

At the time of the Union Act, Lower Canadr possessed a much larger population than Upper Canada, but this prodaced no difficulty in the Government of the United Province under that Act. Since that period, however, the progress of population has been more rapid in the Western section, and claims are now made on behalf of its inhabitants for giving them representation in the Legislature, in proportion to
their aumbers, which claims, involving, it is believed a most serious interference with the principles upon which the Union was based, have been and are strenuously resisted by Lower Capada. The result is shown by an agitation fraught with great danger to the peaceful and harmonious working of our constitutional system and consequently detrimental to the progress of the Province.

The necessity of providing a remedy for a state of things, that is yearly becoming worse, and of allaying feelings that are being daily aggravated by the contention of political parties, has impressed the advisers of Her Majesty's Representative in Canada with the importance of seeking for such a mode of dealing with these difficulties as may for ever remove them. In this view, it has appeared to them advisable to consider how far the Union of Lower with Upper Canada could be rendered essentially federative in combination with the Provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, and Prince Edward Island, together with such other territories as may be hereafter desirable to incorporate with such confederation, from the possessions of the Crown in British North America.

The undersigned are convinced that Her Majesty's Government will be fully alive to the grave nature of the circumstances referred to, which are stated by them, under the fall responsibility of their position as advisers of the Crown in Canada. They are satisfied that the time has arrived for a constitutional discussion of all means, whereby the evils of internal dissention may be avoided in such an important dependency of the Empire as Canada. Butindependent of reasons affecting Canada alone, it is respectfully represented that the interest of the several Colonies and of the Empire will be greatly promoted by a more intimate and united Government of the entire British North American possessions. The population, trade and resources of all these colonies have.so rapidly increased of late years, and the removal of trade restrictions has made them, in so.great a degree self-sustaining, that it appears to the Government of Canada exceedingly important to bind still more closely, the ties of their common allegiance to the British Crown, and to obtain for general purposes such anidentity in legislation as may serve to consolidate their growing power, thus raising under the protection of the

Empire, an important confederation on the North American Continent.

At present, each colony is totally distinct in its Government, in its castoms and trade and its general legislation. To each other no greater facilities are extended than to any Foreign State, and the only common tie is that which binds all to the British Crown. This state of things is considered to be neither promotive of the physical prosperity of all, nor of that moral union which ought to be preserved in the presence of the powerful confederation of the United States.

With a population of three and a half millions, with a foreign commerce exceeding 25 millions sterling, and a commercial marine inferior in extent only to those of Great Britain and the United States, it is in the power of the Imperial Government by sanctioning a confe deration of these Provinces, to constitute a dependency of the Empire, valuable in time of peace, and powerful in the event of war, forever removing the fear that these colonies may ultimately serve to swell the power of another nation.

In the case of the Australian Colonies, the Imperial Government have consented to their discussion of the question of Confederation, although the reasons for it, as relates to the Empire, can scarcely be either so urgent or so important as those which affect British North America.

The Government of Canada do not desire to represent the feelings of the other Provincestheir application is confined to the request that the Imperial Government will be pleased to authorise a meeting of delegates on behalf of each Colony, and of Upper and Lower Canada respectively, for the purpose of considering the subject of a Federative Union, and reporting. on the principles on which the same could pro perly be based.

That such delegates should be appointed by, the Executive Government of each Colony, and meet with as little delay as possible.

That, the report of such delegates should be, addressed to the Secretary of State, for the Colonies, and that a copy of it, as soon as it is prepared, should be placed in the hands of the, Governor and Lieutenant Governor of each Colony, in order that he may lay the same before the Provincial: Parliaments, with as little. delay as possible.

Upon the report of such Delegates, it will be fir Her Majesty's Government to decide whether the interests of the Empire will be mromoted by Confederation, and to direct the action of the Imperial Parliament thereon, with the concurrence of the Legislatures of the respective Colonies.

## Documents regarding the Fishery Reserves' Bill.

Downing Street, 20th October, 1858.
Sir ;
I have received your Despatch enclosing authenticated copies of an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, intituled "An Act relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island."

After a careful consideration of the documents relating to that Act, including the remonstrances to which (as my predecessor would seem to have anticipated) it has given occasion, I find it wholly impossible to recommend that it should receive Her Majesty's sanction.

The facts of the case I understand to be the following:-

By certain orders in Council of 1764 and 1767, the Governor of Prince Edward Island was directed to grant the lands in that Colony to various persons subject to a reservation of ''liberty to all His Majesty's subjects in general of carrying on a free Fishery on the Coasts, and of erecting stages and other necessary buildings within the distance of 500 feet from high water mark."

In parts of the Island the land was actually granted on these terms but in other parts the grants instead of reserving a right of entry for certain purposes to His Majesty's subjects, reserved the land itself ( 500 feet from high water mark) "f for the disposal of His Majesty" "t to erect stages and other buildings for carrying on the Fisheries." I understand, however, that for a long series of years-I may almost say for generations-no distinction was in fact made between these two classes of grants, the strip
of 500 feet being in all cases alike, treated as belonging to the grantee of the adjoining land, that the owners have leased it, improved it, incorporated it into farms, built upon it, and above all, that they have paid taxes on it as or their own property, which taxes the Government have received. Under these circumstances it appears to have been the opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown in England and of the Supreme Court in Prince Edward Island, that when the "disposal" of the Fishery Reserves was secured to Her Majesty by the deed of grant, the actual property of the land remained, and notwithstanding the long adverse occupancy, still remains vested in the Crown. The Act now forwarded is passed in reliance upon these opinions, and, while saving the existing rights of the Crown, provides that wherever such reserves have been leased by the reputed owner to any tenant, the tenant shall be relieved from the liability to pay rent for them.

Now in the first place, the revival of an obsolete claim of this kind, however tenable in strict Law, is open to objections of great force. The old maxim that " time does not run against the Crown" has been found in England so invidious in its application-so unjust in its con-sequences-so prejudicial to the free use of property and the consequent developement of wealth and industry, that it has been long since legally annulled in the mother country and for the most part practically abandcned in her Dependencies ; any right, therefore, which requires the support of that maxim should be exercised with great consideration for persons who for long periods have been allowed: perhaps even encouraged, by the laches of the Government to consider themselves the owners of

property and this applies with peculiar force where, as in the present case, the Government has actually enforced against those persons the liabilities of landowners, and where there appeats some reason to doubt whether the rights which it is now proposed to enforce were not unintentionally reserved to the Crown. I do not say what terms could be equitably offered in this or any other case to reputed owners, as these terms must vary indefinitely with circumstances; but as a general rule they should certainly include, in respect of land not required for any public purpose, a right of pre-emption on reasonable terms, and, if so required, compensation for any improvements effected on the properiy.

Subject to qualifications of this kind the assertion for the benefit of the public, of the Crown's title to those lands might, under certain circumstances be defensible or even necessary. Not so the Act forwarded, which does not resume the land for the Queen who is their owner, but by the abolition of rent, practically transfers them to the tenants, who have no right whatever to them except that which they derive from their landlords. It is with deep regret that I regard in this Act a symptom of the same contest between classes which has led to former Acts on the part of the Legislatare of Prince Edward Island, which one of my Predecessors so emphatically disapproved. And I could earnestly wish that instead of propounding measures which I am convinced that no English Minister can sanction, the Legislature would devote its attention to some feasible scheme for settling those local questions which have caused so much disquietude in the Island. To the expediency of such a settlement I am fully alive. Most gladly would I co-operate in measures by which it may be practically obtained in a spirit of conciliation and fairness to all parties ; and the subject is engaging my anxious deliberation. But meantime I cannot advise that Her Majesty's consent should be given to a Law which enforces for the benefit of private individuals, rights of the Crown which could not properly be enforced with so much rigour even in the interest of the public. Is the absence of such consent, the Act will of course remain inoperative.

## Mr Lord ;

We the undersigned Proprietors of Land in this Island, respectfully beg leave to represent to yeur Lordship, that, in the Session which has recently terminated, a Bill of a most prejudicial and unconstitutional character seriously affecting the relative position of Landlord and Tenant, has been passed by the local Legislature, intituled "An Act relating to the Fishery Reserves ic tàis Island."

It appears that a draft copy of this Bill accompanied by the recommendation of the Lient. Governor, was by His Excellency transmitted to the Colonial Department on the 2d February, 1857, the receipt whereof was acknowledged by the Right Honorable Mr. Labouchere in a Despatch dated the 27 th March, of which the following is an Extract:
"I have to inform you that Her Majesty"s Government have no objection to the introduction of the measure which they hope may prove a serviceable one. but they cannot pledge themselves to advise Her Majesty to sanction it, until they have had an opportanity of considering any objections which parties interested in its provisions, may have to make to it, which said parties will be able to do while it is passing through the Legislature."

It did not come to the knowledge of the parties whose interests would be affected by the Bill that any correspondence had taken place with the Colonial department until after its introduction into the House of Assembly, when a motion was made for its production; this motion was negatived by the supporters of the Goverament, as will be seen by reference to a copy of the Journal herewith transmitted, and it was not until after the Bill had passed to a second reading, that the correspondence in question was produced.

Convinced by past experience, that any attempt to oppose the passing of this or any other Bill, affecting the rights of property in its progress through the Legislatare, during the present administration of the Government, would have proved utterly futile and unavailing; and feeling ourselves in common with other proprietors and occupants of land deeply ag-
grieved and our interests materially prejudiced by the provisions of the Bill in question, we have determined to petition Her Majesty to refuse Her sanction to it, and we are preparing a memorial to that effect, which, when completed, shail be transmitted without any unnecessary delay.

We have, therefore, respectfully to request that your Lordship will be pleased to refrain from presenting the Bill intituled "An Act relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island" for Her Majesty's decision thereon, until an opporturity has been afforded us and other Propriet.ors of land in this Island of submitting for the consideration of Her Majesty's Government our objections to the final passing of the same, and the reasons upon which these objections are founded.

In the meantime we beg to submit for the information of your Lordship, copy of a protest of the Hon. William Forgan against the passing of the Bill in the Legislative Council; that gentleman being one of two members only, representing Township property to any material extent in that honorable body, the other member the Hon. Edward Haythorne having been absent during the whole of the Session from indisposition.

Mr. Forgan's protest points out in the clearest manner the manifest injustice of the measure, as also the evils which will accrue to both Proprietors and Tenants should the Bill in question be suffered to become the Law of the Island.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELILENT MAJESTY.
The Humble Petition and Memorial of the undersigned Proprietors of Land in Prince Edward Island.

## Most respectrully sheweth-

1. That in the Reign of Your Majesty's Royal predecessor and grandfather, King George the Third, this Island (then called the Island of St. John) was divided into Sixtyseven Townships, of Twenty thousand acres each, agreeably to a plan thereof approved of by His Majesty in Council the 9th day of May, 1764, and that on the 26th day of August, 1767, His Majesty was pleased to approve and confirm the proceedings of the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations with respect to the granting the said Townships; a copy of which proceedings was sent to the Governor or Commander-in-Chief of the Province of Nova Scotia (of which Province this Island then formed a part), with directions to him to carry the several regulations therein contained into execation, and to pass grants of the respective Townships in the said Island to the several persons who were entitled thereto, "apon they or their Agents producing an order from His Majesty in Council for that purpose."
2. That many of the persons named in such orders, in whose behalf grants were to be issued, were officers in the Army and Navy, who had served in the preceeding war, or persons who were otherwise deserving of His Majesty's favor.
3. That one of the regulations of the Lords of Trade and Plantations is as follows:
"That in order to promote and encourage the Fishery for which many parts of this Island are conveniently situated, there be a clause inserted in the grant of each Township that abuts upon the sea shore, containing a reservation of liberty to all His Majesty's subjects in general, of carrying on a free Fishery on the coasts of the said Townships, and of erecting stages and other necessary buildings for the said Fishery, within the distance of five handred feet from high water mark."
4. That a copy of this regulation was furnished to the Lieutenant Governor of this Island in the year 1769 (when this Island was erected into a separate Government), and that this regulation has never been rescinded or altered.
5. That in passing the Grants or Patents of the several Townships, this regalation respecting the Fishery has been in some instances strictly complied with, in some materially altered, and in others entirely disregarded.
6. That on the First day of April, in this present year, a Bill intituled "An Act relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island," having passed the local Legislature, was assented to in the name of Your Majesty, by the Lieutenant Governor-subject, however, to a clause suspending its operation until Your Majesty's pleasure shall be made known thereon.
7. Your Memorialists, considering the said Bill, besides being partial and oppressive, to be uncalled for, and intended to subserve party purposes rather than to promote the true interests of Your Majesty's subjects in this Island, most humbly submit that the said Bill ought not to receive the Royal assent, for the following, among many other reasons:
8. Because, although it is perfectly true, as recited in the preamble to the said Bill, that there is in some of the Grants or Patents of Townships in this Island, a clause reserving for the disposal of His Majesty, five hundred feet from highwater mark on the coast of the tracts of land thereby granted, to erect stages and other necessary buildings for carrying on the Fisheries; yet such clause hath hitherto been held as not reserving the soil, but only an easement to the Crown to enter upon the said five hundred feet for the purpose of the Fisheries therein mentioned, and for no other purpose.
9. That such was the understanding of the Government, as well as of the original grantees, is evident from the fact, that Quit Rents due to the Crown have been demanded and received for the whole number of acres contained in each Township, including such reserves, and that to this day, the proprietors, owners and occupants pay and have paid annually, into the public Treasury for the last twenty-six years, under local statutes, an acreable land tax or assessment for the same.
10. That so long ago as the year 1809 a similar land tax or assessment was laid upon all the Townships lands in this Island and rigidy enforced, without expecting the five hundred feet from high water mark reseved for the purposes of the Fisheries.
11. That in consequence of this well understood interpretation of the clause of reserve,
acquiesced in by all parties from the date of passing the Grants or Patents, a period of nearly ninety years, the grantees, as well as their heirs or assigns, and those claiming under them, and those who have purchased under executions upon judgments at law, have sold and leased portions of these Township lands abutting on the sel, comprising so much of the said reservations as fronts the respective holdings of the p $r$ las us or teman's, f which $p$ rtion: they have been in the quiet and undisturbed possession for a long series of years, and have roluntarily paid or been compelled to pay their proportion of the land tax or assessment for the sa:ne.
12. That in almost every case, the origi al settler was compelled of $n$ cessity, to commence his improvements from the water's edge, the sea being for many years, for want of roads, the only means of communication with each other, that the inhabitants were possessed of; and that, consequently, parts of these Fishery reserves, as they are termed in $t$ e said Bill, have been from the first settlement of the Island inclosed and cultivated, and wharfs, mills, stores and habitations have been erected thereon, and that these improvements have been made openly and continually without any interruption from the Government until the year 1857.
13. That in rery many instances these improvements have been made upon lands totally unfit for erecting stages and other buildings for carrying on the Fisheries, and which lands, therefore, could never have been contemplated being used for those purposes.
14. That the leasehold and freehold interests in these lands, so sold or leased, hare been from time to time resold or otherwise disposed of, or have passed to the present occupants by inheritance or will, or by process of law, and that the baildings and improvements thereon, together with the circumstance of their adjoining the sea, have constituted the most material part of their value, and formed the principal inducement to purchasers, when put up for sale.
15. That if the Bill is suffered to become the law of the Island, it will be in the power of the local Government to dispossess all or any of the parties occupying parts of such reserves, or to compel them to become tenants at will, of the Government, for lands which they now hold either in freekold or by a tenure for 999 years.
16. Your Memorialists have learned from copies of Despatches laid before the Assembly by the Lieutenant Governor, daring the Session in which the Bill in question was passed, that the local Government rely on the opinion of Sir Frederick Pollock and Sir William Follett, Your Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor General in the year 1843, as decisive of the right of the Crown to the fee simple of the land in question.
17. Your Mcmorialists, however, beg leare to state that in the case submitted to these learned gentlemen, no notice was taken of the unauthorized departure by some of the Governors of Nova Scotia and of Prince Edward Island from the tenor of the instructions of 1767 ; but that on the contrary they were led to believe that the reservations relative to the Fisheries, were made agreeably to these instructions, whereas such is not the fact; and this discrepancy, it is humbly submitted, should have formed part of the case, and the opinion of the Attorney and Solicitor General required as to what would be the legal effect of this departure from the terms of the respective orders of the King in Council, on the clause of reservation, upon which the Bill in question is founded.
18. That as in the opinion of the above named gentlemen, "the words in the clause of reservation are sufficient to except the soilitself, but that these words may be controverted if there is an intention apparent from the whole of the deed that an easement only to enter, for the purpose of the Fishery, should be reserved to the Crown :" it is respectfally submitted, that the Order of the King in Council under seal for granting the Townships, and the regulations therein referred to, constituting the foundation of the Grant or Patent, and being the suthority for its passing the public seal of the Province or Island, may and ought to be resorted to, for the parpose of ascertaining what were the real intentions of the grantor in making such reservation.
19. That the intention apparent from the Order in Council (a copy of one of which is hereto annexed, marked [A]), and the regulations of the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations therein referred to, will effectually controvert the words in the Patent, and prove conclusively that it was not the intention of the grantor that the right to the soil should be reserved, and that, only an easement to enter
upon the five hundred feet of the coast, for the purposes of the Fishery, should be considered as being by the said clause reserved to the Crown.
20. That the attempt to pass a Bill of this description at this peculiar period, is most unfair and unjust, inasmuch as there is now an action pending in Your Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature in this Island, respecting the right now claimed by the Crown to the fee simple of such reserves, and that such action is still undetermined, as appears by the decision of the said Court on a motion for a new trial hereunto annexed, marked [B.]
21. That the interfering by legislative enactment between landlord and tenant, for the purpose of releasing the latter from his obligation to pay rent for land, of which he is still in possession under his lease, while the landlord's title to the land has not been invalidated by a legal decision, is unconstitutional, contrary to the practice of Parliament, and repugnant to every principle of law, justice and equity, and, if allowed, would form a dangerous precedent in future legislation.
22. That if the Bill pass into a law, it will rest in the local Government, an unlimited control over these reserves, and thereby place in the hands of the administrators of such Government, an irresponsible power capable of being used for the most unconstitutional purposes.
23. That it is well known, that your Memorialists labor under the disadvantage of being virtually unrepresented in the Legislature of the Island, a large majority in the House of Assembly being composed of persons having little real estate, and for a number of years past, openly endeavoring to injure the proprietary interests, and to harass the owners of Tornship lands by passing Bills of the like unconstitutional nature with the present, for the arowed purpose of compelling them to dispose of their lands to the local Government at prices far below their real value; while in the Legislative Council, as at present constituted, Township property is represented by only two of its members, the Hon. E. Haythorne and the Hon. W. Forgan. To the annexed protest of the latter against the passing of the Bill, marked [C], pointing out some of the peculiar evils which will be the certain result, if it is suffered to go into operation, your Memorialists crave leave to refer.

Your Memorialists, therefore, with the fullest confidence in the justice of Your Majesty, and persuadea that Your Majesty will refuse your sanction to a measure which, while it will inevitably tend to injure or oppress individuals, is, at the same time, uncalled for, unjust and unconstitutional, most humbly pray that Your Majesty will be pleased to signify Your Majesty's disallowance of the sail Bill of the Legislature of Prince Edmard Island, intituled "An Act relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island.'

WHEREAS His Majesty was this day pleased by his Order in Council to approve and confirm the proceedings of the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, upon a plan which had been approved of by His Majesty in Council on the 9th of May, 1764, for the settlement of the Island of Saint John, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, in North America, and to order that a copy of the said proceedings should be transmitted to the Governor or Com-mander-in-Chief of the Province of Nova Scotia, with directions to him to carry the several regulations therein contained into execution, and to pass grants of the respective Townships in the said Island to the several persons who are entitled thereto, upon they or their Agents producing an order from His Majesty in Council for that purpose. His Majesty doth hereby order, with the advice of his Privy Council, that the Governor or Commander-in-chief of the Province of Nova Scotia, for the time being, do forthwith, upon this order being produced to him, pass a grant, under the seal of the said Province, of the Township marked No. 20 in the survey of the said Island, to Theodore Holtain and Thomas Basset, Esquire, Captain, under the conditions and regulations contained in the aforementioned proceedings of the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, approved of this day by His Majesty in Council.

## Decision of the Supreme Court, RESPECTING FISHERY RESERVES.

March Term, King's County, Tuesday, March 9:h, 1855.
The Queen vs Cox.-This was an Information filed by the Attorney General, for intrusion on land called the Fishery Reserves. The locus in quo is situated partly on the shore of St. Peter's Bay and partly on the Morell River, and forms part of Townships Nos. 39 and 40. In 1769, these Townships were granted to Spence and others, and Fraser, and in each of these Grants is contained the following clause of reservation: "And further saving and reserving for the disposal of His Majesty, his heirs and successors, 500 feet from high-water mark, on the coast of the tract of land hereby granted, to erect stages and other necessary buildings to carry on the Fishery." Under this clause the Crown claims 69 acres fronting on the Bay, and 69 acres on the Morell River, in which the tide ebbs and flows.

On the trial, the Jury were directed that under this reservation the land fronting on the Bay was excepted, and belonged to the Crown, but that fronting on the River was not excepted, and passed to the grantee. The Jary, notwithstand, found for the Crown for the whole.

The point now to be decided is, whether the 69 acres fronting on the Morell River is embraced within the reserve, as many of the Grants of Township lands in the Island, contain a similar reservation. The decision of the question thus raised is one of considerable importance.

In legal construction, the term "sea shore" applies to all land over which the ordinary tides flow and re-flow; and as, under that definition, wherever a high-water mark exists, the "sea shore' in contemplation of law extends, if the words "high-water mark" in these Grants are construed as designating both the "sea-shore" along which the reservations were to extend, and also the point on the shore from which the 500 feet is to be measured, the land fronting on this tidal river would be clearly comprised within the reservation. But the construction of Grants, like other Instruments, depends on the intention of the grantor; and a knowledge of the nature or peculiazities of the subjectmatter of the Grants is sometimes essential, in order to ascertain the sense and meaning in
which particular words are intended to be ased. The reservation, in the Grants in question, is expressed to be made for the purpose of enabling his Majesty to dispose of the lands reserved for a particular purpose, riz: to erect stages and other necessary buildings for carrying on the fisheries. The object, in making this reservation, evidently was to promote and encourage the development of a great source of national wealth, by affording facilities and conveniencies to those who might embark in the fisheries. Along the coasts on the open sea, and also in the Bays of this Island, very valuable cod and other fisheries exist, in prosecuting which, stages and other buildings covering a considerable extent of gr.und are nccessary, and an those shores, therefore, such a reservation might prove a valuable privilege to fishermen. But the rivers, corresponding to the size of the Island, are on a diminutive scale, while, from the general flat formation of the country, the tides ebb and flow many miles up all the rivers, and almost to the sources of miny others. We cannot be ignorant of what every one acquainted with the country knows, that no fisheries exist in those rivers of a description to require any such extensive reservations, to erect stages or other buildings for carrying them on. In fact, in such situations, the reservation for fishing purposes would be useless.

We must not assume the Crown to have been ignorant of the nature of the country it was granting away ; and it seems to us that, under such circumstances, the clause reserving a certain space from high-water mark on the coast, for the purpose of carrying on a fishery, must have been intended to apply only to those parts of the Townships popularly known astecoast," viz : the shore of the open sea and the bays ond inlets of the sea, along which only, any fisherics existed for which such reservations could be necessary; and that it could not have been meant to extend to rivers where a large extent of ground would then be appropriated to a purpose for which it would be of no practical usc.

But it appears to us that, without drawing on our local knowledge of the country, the language of the rescrvation itself, when taken altogether, will not bear so extensive a construction as is contended for. The words of the reservation are, "five hundred feet from high-water mark on the coast of the tract hereby granted." Now, if the reservation was
intended to extend to all tidal rivers, or to every place where the tide ebbed and flowed, why was the word "coast" used, since the words "five hundred fect from high-water mark" would have extended to all places where a highwater mark could be found ? If, therefore, the words "on the coast" were not intended to confine the description of the premises reserved within narrower limits than the words "highwater mark" would have done, they seem to us to have no meaning, or, at most, are mere surplusage ; but, in construing an Instrument, no words should be rejected if a sensible construction can be putupon them. The term"coast," in its popular sense, is, we believe, applied to land fronting on the open sea, or inlets of the sea or bays, but is never applied to that fronting on rivers; and taking the word in that sense, it appears to us evidently used to contradistinguish high-water mark on what is popularly called the coast, from high-water mark on the rivers, and to limit the reservation to the former, and prevent its extending to the latter. On these grounds, we think the land fronting on Morell River is not included in the reserve, but passed to the grantee.

Another ground on which a new trial is moved for is, that the verdict is contrary to the evidence, in finding for the whole five handred feet, whereas a considerable portion of it was proved ta have been washed away by encroachment of the sea. That the sea had encroached to a considerable extent was proved beyond all question; but the evidence as to the extent of that encroachment was conflicting, some of the witnesses estimating it, on the average, at one foot, and others at four feet per annum. It was admitted by the Attorney General that whatever part of the five hundred feet had been so lost must be deducted; the Jury, however, found for the whole. On both these grounds, therefore, we think tho Rule for a new trial must be absolute.

Several other points were raised; but as they were disposed of during the argument, it is annccossary to advert to thema. Let the rule be made absolute.

## Dissentient from the passing of a Bill entitled

 "An Act relating to the Fishery Reserves in this Island."First, Because the object and intention of the Crown in making the Reserves, as expressed in the Order of His late Majesty King George the Third in Council, of the 26th day of Angust, 1767, was merely to secure a liberty to fishermen in such places as might, from time to time, be required, leaving the proprietors and occupiers of the land in the rear, to enjoy the land over which the liberty was reserved, until it might be actually required by fishermen. The previsions of this Bill go to dispossess the proprietors, of the rents and profits, and to enable the Government, at its will, to deprive the occupiers, of the use of the land before it is required for that purpose, and the greater part of which never will or can be required. It is, in effect, a Bill to abrogate the original agreement and understanding between the Crown and Grantees, and which have been acted on ever since the dates of the Grants, inasmuch as the proprietors have, on the faith of that agreement and understanding, dealt with the land contained in the Reserves, (subject to such liberty for Fisheries), as their own; and the Government of the Colony has acquiesced in such understanding and dealing, by exacting Quit Rents and Land Tax for them.

Secondly, Because, even sapposing the Crown to have the right to take the land reserved before it is required for the parpose named, the provisions of the Bill are still most objectionable, inasmuch as the Leases contain a clause whereby the tenant agrees to take the land, subject to the exceptions and reservations contained in the original Grants. By the express contract, therefore, between the landlord and tenant, the latter agrees to pay for all the land leased, and to the risk of having his enjoyment of the (500) Five handred feet in front of his farm interrupted by fishermen. Because, therefore, the Bill expressly abrogates and renders void this clause in the Leases, it is most dangerous in principle, and wholly anconstitutional ; and, because rendering these clanses void, will prove very in-
because, if Acts nallifying previous contracts were once permitted, confidence in all securities and contracts would be shaken.

Thirdly, Because, by thus nullifying a part of the contract between landlord and tenant, difficalties will be thrown in the way of the former in recovering rent for the residue of the land, inasmuch as the tenant, by keeping his stock, \&c., on the reserve, may prevent its being distrained on, a distress, under the existing laws, being only permitted to be used on the land out of which the rent is payable; and because the Bill, while it abolishes the contracts between landlords and their tenants,-which, in many cases, have been acted on for forty or fifty years, -makes no sufficient provision to secure to the landlord his remedy, by distress, for the rent of the residue.

Fourthly, Because, a large part of the reserves having been in many places washed away by the action of the sea, almost every Lease to which the Reserve extends will be the subject of an action at Law before the extent of the remainder can be ascertained. And because a verdict as to the extent of the Reserves in one action would not be final and conclusive between the same parties, inasmuch as their precise boundaries might again be disputed, under the plea of Assessment, in an action for subsequent rent; and because no provision being made for ascertaining and marking off the boundaries of the Resarves, different juries might and would differ as to the boundaries between them and the lands in the rear, and also in the precise points at the entrance of Rivers, Bays and Creeks to which they extend; and because an Act which will give rise to such an extraordinary number of actions, without making any provision for the final adjustment of the disputes it causes, is most impolitic ; and because the protecting clause in the Leases being abrogated by the ex post facto operations of this Bill, the Landlord would be unjustly exposed to most expensive and harassing litigation respecting the apportionment of the rent; and beoause the Tenants having taken the land subject to the Reserve, and never having been or likely to be disturbed in their occupations, there exists no just pretence for absolving them from their obligation, or for any legislation on their bebalf.

Fifthly, Because any legislation resrecting the Fishery Reserves should be direct, and not, like the present Bill, to abrogate contracts
between Landlord and Tenant; but to the ascertaining and defining the precise boundaries and limits of the Reserves, by which disputes and litigation would be prevented, and a subject chiefly useful to political agitation finally set at rest.

Sixthly, Because if legislative interference could properly be interposed to effect an apportionment of the rent, contrary to the Agreement contained in the Leases, it would be most unreasonable to do more than to permit an apportionment where the Tenant had been actually evicted by a fisherman, -and then only, for so much as had been taken for fishing parposes, and for so long only, as it was retained for those purposes; and because even that interference in the present instance would be impolitic, as the privileges and advatages of shore farms amply compensate the Tenants for any interruption they might be subjected to over the Fishery Reserves; and because, al re of their advantages, the tenants agreed to take them subject to the reservations. And because if the Landlords before granting leases, had supposed this important clause would be thus abrogated, they might have secured themselves by excepting the Reserves from the piece of land or quantity of acres demised, and reserving a higher rent for the residue of the land in the rear, an agreement to which every tenant would no doubt have assented , as he would really enjoy the piece in front until it was wanted for fishing purposes, whether it was included in the boundaries of his lease or not, and it would therefore be immaterial to him, whether he agreed to pay five pounds for eighty acres, excluding the reserve, or five pounds for a hundred acres including the reserve, with a clause that he took the hundred acres subject to the interruption of the Fishery Reservation.

Seventhly, Because the operation of this Bill will make Freeholders and Leaseholders occupying the Reserves mere Tenants at will to the Government for the time being, and thereby subject persons hostile to any existing Government to extraordinary exactions, and to grevious annoyance and oppression; and because the Freeholders and Leaseholders of farms to which the Reserves extend are now secured by their Deeds and Leases in their possession subject to interruption for a parpose which they will never, in many instances, be required for ; and because it is therefore most unjust to deprive
them of that security, and to make them mere Tenants at will, at the pleasure of any Government or other Authority whatever.

Eighthly, Because, in the Fifth clause of the Bill, a right is assigned to the Government to use and lease the Reserves for other than fishing purposes; and because such assumed right is contrary to the said Order in Council, and to the reservation recited in the Preamble of the said Bill; and because the Crown has no right to lease the reserves, or to use or authorize their being used for any purpose except the erection of stages and other necessary buildings for carrying on the Fisheries.

## Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, 18th May, 1858.

## My Lord;

I respectfully beg leave to hand to your Lordship copies of two documents entrusted to me for that purpose. The originals which I have shown to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor are scarcely in a fit state to be transmitted to your Lordship, being soiled by passing through hard-working hands. I believe His Excellency will do me the justice to say that lie is satisfied that these documents are genaine; several of the parties who have signed them are the most honest, industrious, and intelligent farmers with whom I have met during the twelve years that I have been the resident owner of about eighty thousand acres of land in this Colony, with the best opportunity to know and judge the character of individuals, they deeply feel the serious injury and injustice with which the occupants of shore farms affected by the Fishery Reserves Bill are threatened, in being deprived of their rights over the fronts of their farms, upon which their dwelling houses and barns are for the most part situated; they feel this threatened injustice the more because the greater portion of those fronts are totally inelligible for the purpose of Fisheries, and that with rare exceptions, there is no bona fide demand for Fishirg stations, although wherever such demand has occurred, there neither has been, nor is likely to be, any difficulty in supplying it. I may observe that, not
long since, while the citizens of the United States were debarred from fishing within three miles of our coast, the Legislature of this Island were very desirous that Her Majesty's Government should withdraw that prohibition, and this apon the alleged ground that; the inhabitants of this Island could not beinduced to neglect their farms by going to fish in person for themselves. Having had the honor to join with other Proprietors in a Memorial and Petition against the "Fishery Reserves Bill." I shall now merely state that the said Bill is most certainly a continuation of the "series of transactions" referred to by the Right Hon. II. Labuachere late Socretary of State for the Colonies, in his Despatch to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor Daly, dated December 21st, 1855, on the reasons for refusing the Royal Assent to a Bill passed both branches of our Legislature, for taxing the Rent Rolls of all Proprietors of more than 500 acres of land, irrespentive of whether the rents were paid or not; and to another Bill similarly passed entitled "An Act to secure compensation to Tenants" of which Sir George Grey in his Despatch dated November 17th, 1855, stated that "، it was one to which Her Majesty's Assent must be refused, because its plain and direct tendency is to transfer property in land from the owner to the Tenint." The following is an extract from the Right Honble. H. Labouchere's Despatch above referred to. "I have at the same time found it necessary to review the series of transactions extending over a long period of years, which are marked by the continued efforts of a large portion of the resident inhabitants of the Island, either to abolish altogether, or materially to curtail the rights of the owners of landed property." Thus far Mr. Labouchere.

I believe this Colony is the solitary instance in Her Majesty's Dominions wherein the possession of landed property to such an extent as to give the possessor a great and vital interest in land, operates as an insuperable bar and disqualification, preventing the owner of such property from occupying his proper and legitimate place in the Legislative Council, according to all English and constitational ideas of representative Government ; thas the Legislative Council of this Island has become the mere echo of the House of Assembly elected by universal suffrage, leaving to me and others aggrieved
by the " Fishery Reserves Bill," or by other oractmentsmade in a similar spirit, no resource but an appeal to Her Majesty's Home Government, to which we respectfolly and confidently resort for justice and protection.

We the undersigned Tenants Freeholders, and actual occupiers of Farms in Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, learn with deep dissatisfaction and dismay that a certain Bill has passed the Legislature and Executive Government of this Island, the effect of which will be to deprive all persons who have shore farms of that right which, whether as Tenants or Freeholders, they justly possess over the fronts of their several farms; said Bill, we learn is to be called "The Fishery Reserves Bill." We consider its tendency to be utterly detrimental and ruinous to all who hold shore farms, and also that it is utterly anjust in principle. We most earnestly pray that Her Majesty's Home Government will be pleased to disallow and annul the same and to prevent its passing into law. We respectfully request that Robert Brace Stewart Esqr. will take the necessary measures for conveying this expression of our feelings on this subject, through the medium of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to Her Majesty's Home Government in England. Those of us who are Tenants have the fronts of our farms included in our leases, at the same rate per acre, as the rest of our land, namely one shilling per acre. It trould indeen be a most grievous injury to us to place the disposal of those fronts of our farms, and the rent to be fixed apon them, at the will and pleasure of either the present or any otber government.

The Petition of Charles Wright, of Charlottetown, in Prince Ediward Island,

## Humbly shemeta-

That your Petitioner is seised in fee simple, by inheritance, of one hundred and sixty-six acres acres of land, on Lct or Township No. 50 in Island.

That the said Land is part of four hundred and twelve acres conveyed in 1783 subject to the conditions of the original grant, by Walter Patterson, Esquire, Governor of the Island to John Throckmorton, Esquire, an American Loyalist, who had served as Lieutenant in the King's Rangers during the War of independence ; and who on coming to this Island, received several allotments of loyalist's lands on the said Township from the said Walter Patterson; which are described as having been given, partly " in consideration of the losses and services of the said John Thrcckmorton, and on account of his loyalty and attachment to his present Majesty and his Government, sc. \&c."

That the said John Throckmorton, settled on the said land immediately upon recuiving a title to the same, and erected a dwelling House, Mill, and other brildings thereon; and your petitioner can show proof that the chief portion of the water frontage thereof, has been enclosed and cultivated under an undisturbed title, for upwards of seventy years.

That in 1807, the said John Throckmorton for a valuable consideration, conveyed the fee simple of the said tract and premises to 12

Thomas Wright and Charles Wright, Esquires, (the father and grandfather of your Petitioner both deceased) as tenants in common, and the said Thomas Wright was for several years previously, the lessee and occupant of the said premises, whereon he resided till his death in 1812.

That your Petitioner's father, the late Charles Wright, also resided on the said premises for several years, and at his decease in 1828, he demised his interest $t$ erein as a provision for his widow, with remainder in fee to your Petitioner ; and your Petitioner accordingly became seised thereof, on the decease of his Mother, January 15th, 1850.
That during the temporary abseuce of your Petitioner from the said Island, his said Mother had granted leases of portions of the said premises, (in which your Petitioner has since concurred,) and more especially of one tract of fifty acres, fronting on the shore of Pownal Bay, with the buildings thereon erected, she gave a lease for a term of years, nine of which are yet unespired.
That your Petitioner views with apprehension the unusual tendency of a Bill lately passed by the local Legislature, intituled, "An Act relating to the Fishery heserves in this Island," which goes to affect the rent reserved on his said farm by entitling the tenant to a deduction of such rent, in respect to a portion of the land leased, not exceeding 500 feet high water mark, which water frontage is esteemed the most valuable part of the said premises. And your Petitioner humbly begs leave to submit, that the agitation of the Fishery Reserves question is impolitic, and the Act referred to highly ohjectionable, for the following among many other reasons :

1. Because it makes no distinction between Tenimts who have entered on wilderness lands, under leases for a long endurance, and such as have taken cultivated farms for a limited term of years, and are bound by special covenants to surrender quiet and peaceable possession at the expiration of the term, of all and singular the premises demised, which may include valuable buildings and privileges, extending perhaps to the water's edge.
2. Beoanse at the determination of the lease, in such cases, the Landlord may find a difficulty in re-entering on that portion of the land for which a discharge for rent has been obtained
under the Act; though the whole premises, previous to the demise, may have been enclosed and cultivated under the same title for a long course of years, and the Tenant himself, during all the term, may have had undisturbed use of every acre thereof. And there seems nothing in the Act to hinder the Tenant, after the expiration of the term, from still holding possession of the said Reserves, or any builhings thereon erected to the prejudice of the Lessor; as an action of cjectiment might not well be sustained for land discharged from liability for rent, under the provisions of the Act.
3. Because the certificate of a sworn surveyor entitles the Tenant to claim a discharge for a portion of the rent rescreci, the exact amomet of which will, in all probability, be a fruitful source of litigation as in most cases it may be difficult, if not impossible, to determine what quantity of the Fishery Reserve lands has been washed away by the sea since the dates of the original grants. But that a certain portion of the coast annually disappears, from various natural causes, was clearly proved in the case of the Governi:: ent versus Cox recently tried in King's County but not yet brought to a successtul issue by the Government, as among other difficult points to settle, the evidence varied considerably as to the quantity of land to be deducted for such causes, and the verdict of the Jury being contrary to the evidence an order has been granted for a new trial.
4. Because shipbuilding to a considerable extent is carried on in the Island, and forms a profitable source of employment to a large elass of colonists resident therein, and in many cases shipyards are unavoidably situated on Fishery Reserve lands, and it is neither desirable nor proper that Her Majesty's subjects, engaged in such pursuits, should be subjected to costly and vexatious litigation on the part of the local authorities; as in the case now pending of Mr. J. B. Cox, whose valuable and extensive shipbuilding establishment is on part of the land for which an information for intrusion was filed by the Attorney Gencral, on the plea of its bring Fishery Reserves, though not yet required for that purpose nor ever likely to be so being situated on the b.rders of the Morell River, a narrow inland stream.
5. The order in Council referred to in the Mandamuses, by virtue of which the grants were issued, is couched in the following words:
"That in order to promote and encourage the Fishery, for which many parts of this Island are conveniently situated, there be a clause in the grant of each Township that abuts upon the sea shore, containing a reservation of liberty to all His Majesty's subjects in general of carrying on a free Fishery on the coasts of the said Township and of erecting stages and other necessary buildings for the said fishery within the distance of 500 feet from high water mark."

This order was strictly followed in the original grants of only eleven Townships, one of which has been revestel in the Crown, and regranted in small parcels without any observance of the order, and it has been urged with much plausibility, that the thirty-one Townships affected by the Bill were granted with a reservation to the Crown, at th: instance and solicitation of the Grancees themselves; whose lands, according to the tern of the order might be trespassed upon at pleasure by any person styling himself a Fisherman And the Grantees therefore sought rather to rely on the protection of the Crown to guard the privileges involved in the reservations from being abused to their prejudice, by placing the occupation of the said reserves under such restrictions as might carry out the true intent and mea ing of the order with justice to all parties. And a license from the lieut. Governor has heretofore been helo' requisite to authorise the occupation of Reserve lands when required for carrying on a Fishery.
6. Because by returns made to the Assea. bly and published in the Legislative Journals for 1839 the accuracy of which may be relied on, there seems to h $2 v e$ been but four such licences granted since the settlement of the Island up to the end of the year 1832 and but two more to the 4th of July, 1837. 'I hese latter were granted by Sir Charles Fitzroy as appears by a Despatch (marked separate) to Lord Glonelg dated the 8th of January, 1838, from which the following is an extract: "Since my arrival in the Colony I have taken upon myself to grant licenses of occupation of these Reserves in two cases where the applicants were Freeholders to the extent of the fronts of their farms. I have also had numerous applications made to me very recently by Tenants for similar licenses, but conceiving that these licenses were to be used with a view of defeating the Landlord's claim for rent, and not for the bona
fide purpose of carrying on a Fishery, I have declined issuing any forther licenses until I reeeive your Loriships instructions on the subjuct." It therefore appears that the long established prineiple which induced Sir Charles Fitzroy to derline complying with the further applications for su.h licenses, is not recognised under the system of legislation which has produced the present Bill. As the Attorney General's letter, riated January 1857, which ras transmitted with the draft Bill by the Licutenant Governor to the Colonial Office, contains the following statement. "It is urged that a measure discharging tenants from payment of so math rent reserved by the ir leases as arises and aterurs in respect of Fishery 1.eserve land is just and expedient." The Bill, therefore, as framed will accomplish that object by "diseharging the tenant from paying rent for such lands" as explained by the Attorney General but not one of its enacting clauses "prohibits any person unle.s by license of the Government, from taking possession of the Fishery Reserves."

The fourth section of the Bill, as published in the Royal Gazette, simply provides that the Government shall not by this or any other Act of the General Assembly be divested of any existing right heretofore exercised over these Reserves; and if the draft submitted to the late Secretary of State contained a prohibitory clause of the nature implied, it certainly does not appear in the measure since passed by the Legislature.
7. Because another statement in the Attorney General's said letter does not seem to be fully borne out by facts, the words are as fol-lows:-" It appears to be unnecessary on the present occasion, to enter into any lengthened statement respecting the Fishery Reserves of this Island and the many disputes and discussions of which they have been the subject, from the dates of the first grants of the Township lands in this Island (A. D. 1769,) down to the present time." That this matter among others, has been frequently discussed by agitators is freely admitted, but proof of the " many dispates" it has given rise to is not so easily discovered, for in cases where licenses of occupation have been granted by the Lieut. Governor for the time being, for the bona fide purpose of establishing a Fishery, in terms expressed by the grants, the right to do so has never been
questioned, by any owner of Township lands or agent ingthis Colony. Two actions only have been brought in the Supreme Court respecting such Reserves, and these by the same Government whose law officer makes the assertion above quoted, and on the 6th of April last, 0 party claiming a Fishery Reserve, without showing al icense was summarely conicted before two Magistrates of a trespass on lands where it was adjudged the Reserves do not extend, as being situated on the border of an inland lake or salt water lagoon; and these it is believed, form the sum total of disputes arising out of this alleged grievance. Full returns of the number of licenses granted since 1839 are not readily obtainable, as they were moved for towards the close of last Session, and it was stated by a member of the Government that they could not be furnished till the ensuing one. By the Census returns of 1854 it appears there were but thirtyseven Fishing Establishments on the whole Island at that time; and it is not likely that all these were on Fishery Reserves lands, as private property frequently affords more eligible stations for that purpose.
8. Because while the Bill discharges the Tenant from liability for rent which he has solemnly covenanted to pay, it makes no provision for the future management or better regulation of the Reserve lands, or the settlement of various points involved in the main question, as for instance how far the Reserves shall extend; for in the opinion of Sir Frederick Pollock given in reference to this question " the word coasts has no clearly defined legal meaning," but all such points are left to be settled by future actions at Latw, or otherwise as it may happen. And while the enacting clauses of the Bill are cautiously guarded against direct interference with any parties save Landlord and Tenant, to the serious detriment of the former, the small Freeholder occupying his own land is neither likely to be injured nor protected by it; and these it is submitted afford strong grounds for thinking that the measure is in fact a political manœuvre, brought forward with a view to the popularity of its supporters at the forthcoming General Election; as it is an argument freely advanced and pretty generally received, among a certain class in this Island, that whatsoever tends to injure the Landlords mast obviously benefit the Tenant. But the Bill, if allowed to become Law, may hereafter afford a
pretext for some further measure giving the local Government undue influence over the occupants of Fishery Reserve lands, and the soil adjoining thereto.
9. Because these lands hive always, hitherto, been liable to assessment in common with other Township lands, under various Acts of the Assembly, for levying assessments on all lands in this Colony, and payment thereof has been rigorously enforced without any distinction as to Fishery Reserves, by virtue of such Acts of the Assembly; and because the present Chief Justice of the Island, when Attorney General submitted an opinion on the Fishery Reserve question to a Committee of the Legislative Council, which opinion with those of the Solicitor (General, (now Judge Peters,) anl the late Charles Binns Esqr., a Burrister of long practice in this Colony, appear in the Journals of that body for 1839, and all seem in favor of protection to the grantees. The Attorney General, in support of this opinion, quotes the following passage from a high legal authority. "The rule that Grants shall be construed most favorably for the King is subject to many limitations and exceptions. In the first place no strained or extravagant construction is to be made in favour of the King. If the intention be obvious, Royal Grants are to receive a fair and liberal construction." The Solicitor General says: "I am well aware of the great mischief this Reserve will occasion, by subjecting the best cultivated parts of the most fertile farms to useless interruption through pretended exercises of the right," and he further adds "the grantee might have an equity to prevent the Crown's disposing of it in a way more injurious to him than the purpose for which it was reserved." What follows is from the opinion of Mr. Binns in reference to the same subject. "The grant reserves the Quit Rent on the entire 20,00 acres and I believe payment has always been exacted to that extent, and it is a maxim that the King's grant shall be construed for his honour, and generally in favor of the grantee ; now it would not by any means accord with this maxim to exact and receive quit rent and taxes for a large quantity of land (and most valuable front lands too,) from a grantee who at the same time is by some, said to have no interest in it.
10. Because the Act is inconsistent with the principle of English jurisprudence, and there-
fo:e onglit not to pass into a law, as former Acts of the Assembly have been refused the Royal sanction on such grounds ; and in an opinion of the Crown Law Officers of England, transmitted by the Duke of Newcastle to Sir A. Bannerman, with Despatch No. 2 of the 28th December, 1852, for His Excellency's guidance in reference to a measure involving a similar principle the rule is thus laid down. "It is an established maxim of the laws of" England, founded upon the plainest principles of justice and convenience, that no tenant shall be permitted to question the title of the Landlord from whim he has taken the premises; when the Landlord sues for rent or distrains, he makes a couclusive case by merely shewing that the Tenant took the premises from him and his title cannot be inquired into." "Signed W. Iome, J. Campbell."

And your Petitioner humbly begs leave to observe that the Glebe lands on all the Townships having been sold under an Act of the Assembly, an application was made to him respecting a piece of ground for a Church for St. John's Parish, and the site previously selectend for the building was along side the water, near a graveyard arjoining your Petitioner's said farm ; and your Petitioner, in conjunction with his mother, accordingly executed a Deed in 1848, conveying a piece of land in trust for the uses required ; your Petitioner believing, as he still does, that he had a right of disposal ovor such laud, and not by any means foreseeing the extent to which Legislative action against Township property could be carried in this Colony. And the Church now erected within the limits of the said Fishery Reservation, was duly consecrated to the Worship of God according to the rules of the Established Church of England, by the late Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, and is the ouly Church of that denomination in St. John's Parish, comprising five Townships. Your Lordship's Petitioner, therefore, humbly olaims such protection in reference to the said transaction as may be held consistent with the dignity of the Crown, and the interests of Religion in this Colony.

That no part of your Petitioners said farm is ever likely to be needed for a Fishery, as it is situated at the head of Pownal Bay, which empties into a larger inlet or Bay called the Hillsborough, and the and the water of Pownal Bay is shoal to a great distance, and it will

appear by a plan hereunto annexed, that the whole front of the said farm does not exceed twenty acres or thereabout, allowing full " 500 feet from high water mark."

That permission to hold Fishery Reserves in perpetuity to individuals owning farms in the rear thereof, is not unprecedented in this Colony, as may be inferred from Sir Charles Fitzroy's Despatch and other documents before mentioned, and your Petitioner believes that further cases of a like nature will appear when full returns on this subject are mane known to the public.

That your Petitioner's deceased father and grandfather were both servants of the Crown, and he may be allowed to observe that his grandfather's interest in the said purchase from the aforesaid John Throckmorton was all the real property he died possessed of, after fortyeight years of his life spent in the public service, in various parts of the British North American Dominions.

That a suspending clause is added to the 13
aforesaid Act, rendering Her Majesty's sanction requisite to give it the operation of Law, and should such Royal allowance not be withheld, your Petitioner humbly prays that, in consideration of the foregoing circumstances, your Lordship will be pleased to direct the Lieut. Governor of the said Island either to pass a grant free from reservation, or a lease in perpetuity at a nominal rent to your Petitioner, of five hundred feet from high water mark along the front of his said farm or of as much thereof as may be liable to the operation of the said Act. And that otherwise your Lordship will be pleased to recognise your Petitioner's claim to a fair pecuniary compensation for whatever loss or injury he may sustain by reason of a revival of any obsolete claims to the Fishery Reserves aforesaid, by the Government of this Island, in as far as they may affect his said farm.

## Remarks.

## IMPOST ACCOUNTS.

The Accounts as furnished by the different Collectors have been carcfully andited and classified, errors marked in red ink on the face of the Accounts themselves, and the result presented at page 46. The number of such errors must not be supposed to indicate carelessness or want of expertness in Arithmetical calculation on the part of the Collectors. In the present system of keeping their Books, not only can no degree of diligence guard against occasional error, but with the extension of our trade the number of errors may be expected to iucrease in a corresponding or even greater ratio. The magnitude of this ovil cannot be estimated by the number of Pounds, Shillings and Pence either in excess or defect. Respectable Mercantile firms, and still more, Banks, consider no pains ill bestowed which diminish the risk of error. The only adequate protection ever yet discovered consists in what is termed the system of Double Entry. This simple and beautiful contrivance enables the Accountant himself to detect and rectify any errors he may have committed in the first instance, or to verify his results if none have been committed. To the Inporter it offers the comfortable assurance that there is no uncertainty whatever in the transaction, that while nothing less than what is right will be accepted, nothing more will be demanded. And thus not the least of its adrantages would be to elevate the standard of Commercial morality amongst us. $\Lambda$ result so desirable cannot be of course accomplished without some additional labour. The difference in this respect, however, is not so great as is gencrally supposed; very frequently more pains are bestowed in the vain attempt to eliminate error by the old method than would procure certainty in that How recommended. Perhaps it would be too much to expect the Collectors of some of the smaller outports to be able to keep their accounts by double entry; but this need not prevent its iutroduction into the Custom Houses of Charlottetown, Georgetown, Bedeque, and perhaps a few others.

In the Impost Accounts, as in all others, no rcference was made to the 'Treasurer's books until after having arrived at a final result for ourselves. On comparing results in this case, an extraordinary, and, it is to be hoped, hitherto unheard of circumstance, was brought to our notice. The Collector for the Port of Pinette forwarded to the Treasury a Bond unaccompanied with the usual return. Nithough repeatedly requested to send in the account, he has refused we neglected to do so-thus at once rendering the classification incomplete, and exposing to arare suspicion his own character for probity.

## LIGIIT AND ANCHORAGE DUES.

The manner of making returns for this branch of the public service is most unsatisfactory. The practice is to hand in a simple list containing the name and tonnage of the Vessels with the amount charged. Such a list affords no adequate means of testing its correctness beyond the mere addition.

A Book, prepared in accordance with the Schedule to 19 Vic. cap. 14, should be furnished to the different Collectors. The Counterfoil should be signed by the Master or other Officer in charge of the Vessel.

PREVENTIVE OFFICERS, \&c.
Nearly all that has been said under the preceding head applics equally tr, the disbursements to Preventive Officers. In most cases all that is submitted by way of voucher is a simple receipt for the amount. In a simple business transaction between individua!s, and where both

## TREASURY.

The dutics of this Department, at all times sufficiently onerous, have been greatly increased during the past year. It was not, therefore, without much consideration that any additional labour has been imposed. On examining the method of keeping the books, so little was found wanting to complete the system of Double Entry, that it was thought we might, without overstepping the limits of our duty, propose its adoption.

The suggestion, having been cheerfully complied with, the system as regards this Department may be regarded as now complete. Henceforth the financial state of the Colony can at any time be ascertained with great ease, and from the Treasurer's Books alone.

## THE WARRANT BOOK.

This Book, shewing, as it does, the entire expenditure, should be regularly posted every month, to enable the Treasurer to carry out the new arrangement. It will be necessary that no entry be made in this book before the precise sum can be ascertained. With a view to the accommodation of the public, a subdivision of Warrants has been adopted during the past year. This has been attended with the following disadvantages:

1st. It has largely increased the labour of the Clerk of the Council, and nearly doubled that of the Treasurer.

2nd. Whilst adding considerably to the duties of the Auditors, it will swell the Journal of the Assembly, and entail other expenses for Public Printing.

3rd. It must have had the effect of depreciating Warrants ; the Capitalist who adopts this mode of investment naturally prefers large to small Warrants. Persons holding some of the issue of former years, bearing only five per cent., have been known to decline exchanging them for small Warrants of last year's issue, though bearing six per cent. This is further borne out by the fact, that small Warrants have been more depreciated than larger ones; and that small Warrants have found their way into the hands of Capitalists, will be manifest from an inspection of the list, pages 27 to 69, whence it appears that of the issue of 1858 there are still outstandfing no fewer than 543, for sums less than ten pounds.

## SCHOOL VISITER'S REPORT

## FOR THE YEAR 1858.

## Letter from the Board of Education to the Hon. the House of Assembly, on the subject of School Attendence.

Board of Education, P. E. Island, 2d May, 1859.

The Board of Education, in the exercise of the duty assigned it by the Act 15th Vic. cap. 15, transmit to the Legislature the following extracts of the Reports of the Sihool Visitors up to the present date.

In revising the Report marked No. 2, the Buard deems it its duty to submit the views which the experience, more especially of the past year, has led it to entertain on the very important subject of school attendance, as affecting alike the interests of the rising generation, the remuneration of Teachers, and the success and stability of the whole system of public instruction in the Free Schools of the Colony,

Although the average daily attendance required by the Act is sufficiently low, being only one-half the minimum number of pupils of school age necessary to form a District, and although the words of the Act are precise, yet that difinculties have arisen in its:administration is shown by the number of petitions now before the Legislature arising out of questions concerning average, as well as from the following analysis derived from the experience of the past three years. The principles of interpretation and of administration which guided the Board, are deduced from the "Minutes."

1. In an agricultural country, and where, moreover, the climate is one of extremes, the weekly and monthly average attendance at
school is necessarily very flactuating. This in ordinary cases is sufficiently provided for by the Act wioh rests the average attendance on that of the entire six months. But in the case of removal of the teacher from ill health or death, before the expiration of the yearly or half yearly term, the average will be above or below the standard, according to the season of the year at which the interruption may occur. For, a school which during the autumn has an average of only fifteen, may, during the succeeding three months, so far compensate as to raise it to twenty-five ; that is, five above the standard. Is the Teacher, in such a case, to be paid a proportion of his salary, or is he to go entirely unrewarded? This question the Board decided in the affirmative.
2. Besides the periodic fluctuation just referred to, the average is sometimes liable to fall below the standard from the prevalence of epidemic or contagious diseases, such as measels, small-pox, or scarlet fever. Suppose in such a case, as has more than once happened, the average falls to nineteen, or even eighteen, is the Board to consider its hands tied up, and the teacher to go unremunerated? Without the concurrence of the Board he cannot abandon his post. For the Board to give its assent would be to aggravate the sufferings of a district already sorely tried; to visit with unmerited punishment those whom the epidemic may have spared! To withhold its assent, on the other
hand, would be to compel a public servant to remain at his post without being in a position to pay him.
3. Suppose the inhabitants of any district act in strict conformity with the law in having the boundaries defined, selecting the site, \&c., but a contumacious minority rise up in opposition, choose a site for themselves, and in utter disregard of the law, build a school-house in opposition to that regularly established,-if, in such a case, the average of the District School fall below the standard by a small fraction, is it to be excluded from all participation in the benefit of the Act? To do so, in the opinion of the Board, would be to treat alike those who disregard and those who obey the laws-to perpetuate a feud in the district which would more than neutralise the good effects of the Free Education Act, and to hold up to other districts an easy method whereby the poople at large might be deprived of the blessings of Elucation, by the factious opposition of a !ew. To sustain the lovers of law and order darin: a temporary depression of the average, mast have the contrary effect, and result in the final submission of the malcontents.

Wherever the deficieney was not owing to any of the causes just enamerated, the average required by the Act has been strictly insisted on, and is rigidly enfurced as the imperfect means placed at the dieposal of the Board by tho Legislature would permit. So mems have been left untried to sectere a faithful record of the daily attenlance. The Teacher is required by the regulations to notify the Board whenever the average of the preceding three months fall belew that required by the $\Lambda$ ct. On the receipt of any such ootice, the following circular was transmitted to the Teacher:

## " Education Office,

" Sir ;
" I am directed by the Buard to inform you, that unless your school keeps up the average required by the Act, you cannot obtain your salary for any time you may teach after the date of this communication. If, therefore, the people of that District are so little alive to their own interests as not to support the school as they ought, by sending the children regularly, you have no other alternativo than to close the ischool, or look to the people themselves for your salary. Remember, also, that any attempt
to falsify the Register for the purpose of in. creasing the average, may subject the teacher not only to the loss of his salary but of his licence.
"I have the honor to be, \&c. \&c."
On such principles, had the Free Education Act been administered from its introduction to the 27 th of January last. From the records of the Board we find that between the 26th of June, 1856, and the date of the monthly meeting in January, 1859, there had been altogether twenty-five cases relating to average, adjudicated on. Of these, five only were allowed; the others disallowed. On the day last named, however, there came before the Board eight Registers, with arerages ranging only from $16 \frac{1}{2}$ to 19 51-61, on which it was ordered "That the Board cannot grant certificates for salary in any of the preceding cases under the express conditions of the 21st section of the Act 17th Vic. cap. 3, but that the Board will entertain petitions from the Teachers and School Trustees respectively, so far as to recommend their cases to the favorable consideration of the Lieutenant Governor in Council. * * * The Board will not in future interfere with the operation of the clause regarding the daily average attendance at Schools."

This reversal of its former practice was not acquiesced in by all the members, and on the grounds already stated. Petitions were in consequence, presented to the Exccutive Government, and the same rate of remuneration obtained as in the case of minor Districts. This decision having failed to mect what they deemed the justice of the case, the people have, as a last resource, applied to the Legislature for the balance of the $\not \dot{x}^{\prime} 25$. This affords a good opportunity of finally settling the matter. A simple Resolution will be sufficient to declare whether the principles which have hitherto guided the Board are souad, or whether the recent decision of the majority of the members, as expressed in the above Resolution, meets the concurrence of the Legislatare. In coming to a decision on this vexed question, it shall be borne in mind that the discretionary power in certain cases, hitherto exercised, as has been shown with such caution, is still believed by a minority of the members to be essential to the successful working of the Act, and that sufficient occasions will not be wanting to vindicate the supremacy of

Parliament, without converting it into a Court of appeal for settling matters of detail.

A tiibunal which condescends not to make itself acquainted with the facts of the case, may impress with an idea of its power-it can seldom excite our admiration at the justice of its decisions.

Hoping that you will deem it your duty to review them carcfully, to the end that you may pass judgment upon them according to your estimation of their worth; and that, afterwards, accompanied by your own remarks thereon, they may, as the law directs, he laid before the Legislature for their consideration.

Remarks, prefatory to the Report in detail of the Inspections of District Schools, made by R. B. Irving, Acting Visitor of Schools, from 1st October, 1858. to 28th April, 1859.

A wise Siate has no interest nearer the heart than the Education of its youth ; and most justly does it regard the Common School as the only appropriate agent of modern and popular civilization-as the only means by which the real Education of the people can be effected. This proposition is one which is now received as an axiom in every country in which the efficacy of the Common School has been fairly tested.

Not long ago, however, many educated and leading men, even among those who are called "s the higher classes," in the British Empire,
steadfastly held that to educate " the people" would be to introduce confusion and anarchy into the state, to the complete destruction of good order, of due subordination, of submission to the laws, and of respect for those invested with executive authority; and would in fact by the diminution of its greatness, and by the annibilation of its industrial success and commercial prosperity, directly tend to nothing less than the rapid decline and ultimate ruin of the empire.

Such men, such narrow- minded reasoners and blind deducers of consequences, in opposing and withstanding every scheme for national education, declared that the people were possessed of a vastly greater amount of knowledge than was good for them, and maintained that education served only to make them discontented with their callings and disrespectful to their superiors.

Happily now, however, in the empire of Great Britain at least,-with which alone, on this subject, we have, at present, any direct concern, - fer, very fer men of rank, power, intellect, and education, are to be found blindly endeavouring to stay the march of universal progress. And even the few who may still retain the exclusive notions of the last century-the pride of birth, the honor attached to all ancient proprietors of land, the repugnance to " new men," and the abject deference exacted of the poor, who were, and still are in some cases treated as an inferior order of men, born to administer to the luxuries of the fem, and counted as having no interests of their own beyond what a miserable shift at existence was enough to satisfyare now thoroughly convinced that, even although they might endeavor to impede the progress of popular education, their efforts to that end would be as futile as would be those of any human power to arrest the emotion of our planet as it turns to meet the beams of day.

British statesmen and senators are now most happily uninfluenced by the foolish and exclusive notions of the bygone age; and, instead ol thinking or acting as if they thought that to cducate "the people" would be to teach then "t to pick and steal," to read bad books, and to become athiests and rebels, they who among them are the most distinguished for all the truly ennobling attributes of man, are they who most clearly perceive and distinctly acknowledge that, although when the clouds of ignorance are dispelled by the radiance of knowledge, the

strength of the tyrant and the power of the oppressor will tremble, yet the authority of just and equal lars and of good government will remain immovable.

But pablic education, that is the general education of the people, has not yet, in England, been provided for, to the general satisfaction, notwithstanding all that has been done by its truly enlightened and philanthropic advocates, both in and out of Parliament, for its diffusion on a just and permanent foundation; and although the State and individuals are competing with each other, and striving to the utimost of their ability for the establishment of Schools, and there is annually expended $£ 1,-$ 000,000 of the public funds of the country for the same purpose, "copinion," as Lord John Russell expresses it, " is still in the gristle on this subject in England;" and, in consequence of this, "a Royal Commission is at present engaged in cnquiring into the present state of the education of all classes in England and Wales, and upon the fair and impartial display of facts expected from it, parliament and the nation will have to decide. Diversity of creeds, sects, and denominations, and their jealous rivalry and opposition to one another, have, no doubt, kept this great and momentous question so long unsettled in England; and it is much to be feared that the same causes, continuing to operate, will for a long time, prevent its hippy solution."

When thus the foremost, the most powerful, the richest, and the most enlightened nation of the earth, has, with all its carnestness for the establishment cf one common system of school education for its youth, been, hitherto, by such conflicting influences, disappointed of its attainment, bave we not the greatest reason to be proud of and thankful for that comprehensive wisdom which devised, and that truly Christian and patriotic policy which, notivithstanding the diversity of creeds which obtains in the Colony, induced our Legislature and the poople at large to acquiesce in the establishment and maintenance of our non-sectarian and non-political system of Free Education-of the salutary working of which we have already had so much happy experience!

In sustaining the position that nothing but general prosperity, virtue and happiness are the genuine and direct results of good and thorough education of a people, Lord John

Russel, in his inaugural before the National Association for the promotion of Social Science, lately held in Liverpool, England, expresses himself thus:
"I will not waste your time in examining and refuting the objections which have been made to the general education of the people. It may suffice for me to say that it is education which enables the Scoth labourer's son to compete with the most favoured of his contemporaries, to rise to the highest posts of dignity and power, and to scale the loftiest eminences of science. It is education which enables the United States of America to proceed in their wonderful career, upheld by the most popular institutions, without serious disturbance of law and order. It is education which, in England, has mainly prevented such tumults as, forty years ago, broke the peace and alarmed the minds of this country; it is education which has bound the mass of the people to the Throne by the links of an enlightened loyalty."

In Canada, School Inspectors speak of men now living who, although of " lowly birth and parcntage obscure," have, through common school education and persererance, raised themselves to the highest situations, religious and political, in the province.

To these undeniable assertions indicative of the amazing amount and wonderful extent of individual and public benefit which popular education bas; within the last forty years, conferred upon our fellow subjects in other parts of the British Empire, I now refer as affording us the most encouraging evidences of what may most beneficially and happily be accomplished among ourselves, if we steadily continue to uphold, and wisely study to perfect or improve our admirable system of Free Education.

The working of the system may, I feel convinced, be greatly improved; but, I venture to predict that, if no adverse circumstances arise to impede or arrest the progress of education under it, now happily perceptible even in the least faroured localities of the Island, soon shall we be able, with equal truth, to say that the distinctions arising from mere accidents of birth and position, which too long, in this Colony, made it appear as if one class of men -and that the great majority-were born to be mere " hewers of wood and drawers of water," whilst another-and that us to number, of most insignificant amount-were the heriditary lords
and rulers of the Island,-have for ever disappeared before the light of general education, and that here are no longer recognised any distinctions or differences between one man and another, save such as Pope indicates, in the following expressive line, as properly dividing men into two distinct classes, and shewing that to which any individual belongs, -

Worth makes the man, and want of it the fellow.
Statesmen-men worthy of the name-British statesmen especially, now act under the thorough conviction that in order to entitle themselves to genuine respect and positive honor while living, and to eusure, their names being handed down to posterity amongst those of the truly great and good, amongst those of the real benefactors of mankind, they can do so by no other means than the most active manifestation of an unquestionably philanthropic appreciation of the jast rights and privileges of the people, which in no way can they evidence more convincingly than by their full recognition of the undeniable and most important truth, that Education was never intended to bo the monopoly of the rich, but that educational institutions, to be the pride and glory of States mast dispence their bencfits to all branches of their citizens.

By the Free Education Act, education is become a birth-right, and placed within the reach of every child among us. Reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, geography, and book-keeping, with the addition of algebra, geometry, trigonometry, surveying, and navigation, are the scholastic attainments which way now be acquired, in many, if not most of oir District Schools; and although these branches of education are but a few, a very fer of the many which spring from the great tres of knowledge, yet are they, with virtuous dispositions, a sufficient foundation for such moral and intellectual habits as constitute the source and foundation of success and eminence in life.

The course of District School Education, as prescribed, or conteneplated by the Act, if enlarged, as, in my opinion, it certainly ought to be, by the addition of declamation to reading, of drawing to writing, of composition to gram: mar, and of geology and mineralogy to geography; and, independently, in extension of the course-of Astronomy, Natural Philosophy, General History, Government or Constitation of Great Britain, Political Economy, Botany, Chemistry, Natural History, Physiology and

Singing, would be amply comprehensive for the requirements of the country; bat, until it shall have been so cxtended and improved, it must, I think, be considered defective by every competent judge.

## RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

In several of the Schools which I have visited, the business of taition commences, every morning, with prayer, and the reading by pupils, in class, of a portion of the New Testament. In such schools the business of the day is generally, but not always, also concluded with prayer. In a few, the Teachers read daily, to the pupils, passages from the Old or New Testament; and, in a few others, no form of prayer is used, either at the opening or at the closing of school ; and in these, neither is the Bible read at all. In no School District, however, the school of which I have visited, does the least dissatisfaction exist, so far as I have been able to ascertain, either on account of the practice of the offering up of prayers and the reading of the Scriptures in schools, or in consequence of the neglect therein of these religious cxercises or observances. The good sense of the peopie has taught them, as I think always would, if they were left to its free exercise and guidance, that this matter or question should not be one of legislation so much as one of mutual voluntary arrangement between the Trustces (the representatives of the parents) and the Teacher; but that, whether any religious exercises in schoci be sanctioned or not, the raciples of reirgion and morality should be inculcated upon all the young persons who compose it. On this subject I have, wherever I have lectured since my appointment to the office of School Visiter, expressed myself as follows.

With regard to the extent and nature of the religious instruction which ought, in my opinion, to be imparted to children in mixed schools or in schools in which the masters and the parents of the children belong to different denominations of Christians, it would, I think, amount to perfidy and a betrayal of trust of the most grievous character were a teacher to endeavour to indoctrinate the minds of his scholars according to his own peculiar religious views, or the distinguishing tenets of the Christian denomination or church of which he is a member. With respect to modes of faith and points of doctrine, touching which diversity of opinion obtains among Christians, a teacher ought in schools to

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refrain from all teaching and comment, and most scrupulously and conscientiously confine himself, it he enters upon the subject of religion at all, to the setting forth and the enforcing of those great and leading truths of Christianity which :are acknowledged and received by all who call themselves by the name of the divine author of our faith. In fact, in mised scheols, that is in schools in which the teachers and the parents of the children do not all belong to the same Christian denomination or church, the Holy Scriptures, if read at all, ought to be reau without any-even the most distant-approani to anything like doctrinal teaching or ezpojition; and, to the simple reauing, not one word ought to be added, by the teacher, beyond mere explanation of words, historical or geographical information, or explanations concerning the peculiar laws, customs, and manners of ancient tastern nations spoken of in the Bikle, if he is able to afford them readily and correctly.

Some may be of opinion that the religious instruction imparted to the children, by their Sabbath school teachers and by their paronts at home, is or ought to be quite suificient for the sowing of the good seed in their hearts; and so, perhaps, in some cascs it may be. I think, however, that gencrally if no attempls ise made to impress the precepts of religion upon their hearts and minds-to instil into them the principles of piety, justice, and a sacred regard for truth, love of their coantry, humanity, and universal benevolenes, sumbity: indastry, frugality, chastity, bodoration and tenperanceexcept in Sablath schonls, in chate or is their own homes, the consequanes, in mary instances will be, that chinhen wiil, bwerer crmanously, imbibe the notion that me: ingn, ike theirsunday clothes, is only for Swalays and wema lays or times of particular or spewin religions oldization; and that as the:: Sumbay garments ere, so religion is best laid asiue for the rest of the week, or at all other times, as being incon:cnient or unsuitable for common or erery-day wear or use. If children never hear of God and Christ, of heaven and hell in school, they will, I think, be in great danger of being led into practical unbelief-of being in a manner practically taught that religion has no necessary connexion with their education, the culture of their minds, or the improvement and application of their talents. Schoolmasters are to their scholars, during the hours of tuition, instead of
their natural parents their scholars should be children of their adoption, and in their practice, as parental teachers, they ought cever to remember that God requires them " to keep the words which he bas commanded them in their hearts-to teach them diligently to their chil-dren-to talk of them when they sit in their houses, and when they walk by the way, and wien they lie down, and when they rise up." Deù 6th ch., v. 6 \& 7. To their parents and apiritual pastors, however, ought to be left the imparting of peculiar tenets in religion ; for indeed : the constitution or order of discipline of cach religious persuasion enjoins upon its pastors and members to teach the summary of religious faith and practice required to be taught to the children of the nembers of each such persuasion." Therefore, to impose upon any o. our District Teachers the teaching of the catechism of any religious persuasion is not only taxing him with a work of supererogation, but a direct interference with the disciplinary order ef each religious persuasion; and were such teaching provided for by law, it would, to use the language of Mr. Ryerson, the Chiel Superintendant of Schools in Upper Canada, be - not a providing by law for the extension of religious insiruction and the promotion of Christian morality; but a providing by latw for the neglect of pastoral and parental duty, by transferring to the common school teacher the duties which their church enjoins upon them, :nd the sanctioning immoralities in pastors and arce:s, - which must, in a high degree, be inurious to the interests of public morals no less than to the interests of children and of the Districi Sehools. The theory, therefore, of lenominational day schools is as inexpedient on religions grounds as it is on the grounds of economy and cducational extension. Economy $: 3$ well as patriotism requires that the schools established for all should be open to all upon equal terms, and upon principles common to all - Jeaving to each religfous persuasion the performance of its own recognized and appropriate duties in the teaching of its own catechism to its own children. Surely it is not the province of government to usurp the functions of the: religious persuasions of the country; but it should recognize their existence, and therefore not provide for denominational teaching to the pupils in the common schools, any more than it should provide such pupils with daily food and
:aiment, or weekly preaching or places of worship. As the state recognizes the existence of parents. and the performance of parental duties by not providing children with what should be provided by their parents-namely, clothing and food,-so should it recognize the existence of the religious persuasions and the performance of their duties by not providing for the teaching in the schools of that which each religious persuasion declares should be taught by its own ministers and the parents of its children.

I am persuaded that the religious interests of youth will be much more effectually cared for and advanced by insisting that each religious persuasion shall fulfil its acknowledged rules and obligations for the religious instruction of its orn youth, than by any attempt to convert for that purpose the common day schools into denominational ones, and thus legislate for the neglect of duty on the part of pastors and parents of the different religious persuasions. The common day school and its teacher ought not to be burthened with duties which belong to the pastor, the parent, and the church. This opini, n, I believe, prevails among many Christ. ians in thi; Island; for in the course of my professional risitations, I have found that in every Protestant district, in which the heads and adult members of families profess to hold the IIoly Suriptures in greater reverence than Protestants of other denominations may seem to do, there is nothing to which the people appear to have a stronger objection, as Christians, than to school teachers presuming to interpret or comment upon any passage of Holy Writ in school ; and, further, such Christians when they are the majority in a School District, will not allow the prayers prescribed foy the Board of Elucation to be used in the school. The Edacation of the youth of the country consists not merely of what is taught in the day school, but aleo of what is taught at home by the parents and in the church by the pastor. And if the religious part of the education of youth is, in any instance, neglected or defective, the blame rests with the pastors and parents concerned, who, by such neglect, have violated their own religious canons or rules, as well as the express commands of the Holy Seriptures. In all such cases pastors and parents aie the responsible, as well as the guilty parties, and not the teacher of the district school or the school system.

A denominational college-or denominational colleges-however, may, with the greatest propriety, receive public aid, when the aid afforded is for the advancement of science and literature alone, because such colleges, where they exist, are the most economical, effecient, and available agencies for teaching the higher branches of education in a country; but such aid is not, and ought not to be given until after a large outlay has been made by its projectors in the procuring of premises, erecting or procurirg and furnishing buildings, and the employment of professors and teachers-evincive of the intelligence, disposition, and enterprise of a large section of the community to establish and sustain such an institution.
In connexion with this question, I am very glad to be able to state, for general information, that the difficulty concerning the exclusion of the Bible from the Normal School has at length, very happily, been got over. A Resolution which proceeded from the Board of Education, and which was, after some slight modification, adopted by the Executive Council, has, I trust, set it at rest for ever.

By this regulation, it is made quite evident that both the Board of Education and the Executive Council recognize the desirablentss of afforaing, as far as possible, to the schulars in the public schools of this Island, the benefit and adrantage of a religious and uoral, as well as of a literary education.

## TRUSTEES.

The labours devolved upon School Trustees by the Education Act-labours, however, rather implied than expressed in the Act-are most onerous in their nature; and, were they ably, faithfully, and fully discharged, they would h, of the highest value; for their constant stipervision of the schools woald keep the machinery by which education is to be effected, in good order, and in constant and successful operation, and secure to teachers what the earnest and faithful among them so much require, to prevent that flagging of the spirit and that feeling of despondence which disregard for their services, amounting almost to contempt both for the individuals and their calling, is so apt to occasion,-I mean the generous sympathy and hearty co-operation of parents, without which no teacher can reasonably hope for much success in his profession.

In the first place, it is the duty of the Trustees of a District Free School, to tise care that, when a new School-Louse is to be crected, the building shall be in every respect what the Education Act requires a District School-house to be, or contemplates its being; and that, when the building shall have been properly finished, it shall be suit:ibly furnished. They should next make provision for the regular sweeping, dusting, \&c., of the school-roven and the furniture ; in winter, and at all other times when a fire is required in it, taking care that the school shall be supplied with is eufficient quantity of good firerood, ready cut and split for use, and that the fire shall be regulanly male at a stated hour every morning-in winter carly enough to admit of the room's being well warmed before the time for opening the school.

As regards the old log school-houses-and the greater part of those which I have inspected are of this chass-from the fact of their being imperfectly finished as they at first were, so liable to derangement and decay, ceven a more scrupulous attention to their condition should be :equirel fom trustees than seems to be necessary with respeet to that of those of a new and better ronstruction; and the wery insufle ient, not to ay shameful state-as, however, with respect to sme, I leel I naght to say-in which I have fond way of them, affords but too mach
 an frebe i: whase milst surh school-howses as shat to exist, can be bat little coneerned ion the wioncement of pmpalar chacation. In fat, wath a one it might almost appear as if an athenp were actually beins made to ascertain the utas: amount of dishdrantages, inconrenicaecs, and discouragement, under which anything like aceful or necessary education can be prosecated, ur that teachers can be made to endure, rather than abandon their profession. meties of scion taustees fuather considered.

I :m very well aware that, whilst in some Schoul Districts men properly qualified to discharge the duties of school trastees are to be foum, yet in others it is very difficult, if not impossible, to find men possessed of such educational acquirements as can fairly be considered sufficient to enable them to discharge the duties and obligations imposed upon such officials by the law. I am aware also, that this general paucity, in our rural school districts, of men capable of properly acquitting themselves of the
duties of school trastees, has-through the same indiriduals having from sheer necessity been again and again elected to the trustceship-rendered the discharge of its obligations a very burthensome and disagreeable duty, particularly when it has been found necessary to enforce payment by legal assessment.

The non-fulfilment of their duties by school trustees, - whether, as to the past, it may have proceeded from a want of proper educational qualifications on the part of those elected to the office, or whether it may have been attributable to the disinclination to the proper fulfilment of them arising from a dread of exciting the illwill of the defaulters,-might, I am fully persuaded, be effectually guarded against by such an anendment of the law as I have now to suggest.

At the commencement of the scholastic or school year-which, as I shall by and by endearour to shew should be the same day in all the districts throughout the Island—let it, by law, be made imperative upen the inhabitants of every school district to hold a public meeting, duly convened, for the purpose of ascertaining who amongst them are the best qualified to discharge the duties of school trustees; and let a list, alphabetical or otherwise, of such individuals, fairly and fully comprehensive, be made out; and this having been done, let, in pursuance of a further provision of the law, the individuals composing such list be required to scrve in such capacity in due rotation, under certain liability to a clearly defined and suitable penalty for non-compliance with such requirement of the law, and for every instance of culpable nergect in the fulfilment of any of the important duties so devolved upon them.

The principle which I rould, in this manner, have called into operation-compulsory as it is -is oy no means at variance with the spirit of our free institutions; but, on the contrary, is absolutely necessary for.their preservation, as scores of instances might casily be adduced to prove.

The duties of schocl trustees are properly defined in the la was it at present exists; but, for want of a penalty for non-performance, they, especially as respects the most important of them all, quarterly examinations of the schools, have scarcely in any instance being duly and properly discharged.

The holding of quarterly examinations by the
trustees of the schools, and their frequent inspection of the teachers' Registers, must be held io be duties of paramount importance; and, if enjoined under penalty, as they ought to be, every neglect of them should unfailingly draw down upon the defariters the full legal panishment provided fur it. This penalty or punishment might be either a pecuniary fine, to be paid by the individuals against whom neglect of oficial duties might be proved, or a closing of the school for a certain season, as a general punishment of the inhabitants for their culpable disregard of their own and their children's welfare, as dependent unon the progress of popular education-the teacher, however, not to be involved in sach punishment, unless he shall, at the same time, have been culpably remiss in the discharge of his own especial duties.

Of the quarterly examinations, the teackers themselves should alwaysbe the chief conductors, because when so conducted, they would afford not only convincing evidences of the progress made, or being made, by the pupils in their several studies, but would also be a fair means of testing the professional abilities and qualifications of the teachers themselves. I say the teachers themselves should always be the chief conductors of these examinations; but I do not mean that they should be the sole examinators. On the contrary, I consider it to be the duty of trustees and parents, at such examinations, when capable of taking part therein, to do so, in a subordinate manner, to the extent of their abilities. Such participation therein rould seldom fail to enliven the pupils, and to call forth the most favorable and pleasing display of their mental acquirements. However, in all ciases to secure suvh quarterly examinations of the schools and such records of these examinations in the trustees' books as might altogether be depended upon for ascertaining the real characters both of the schools and of the teachers, for the information of the Board of Education and the Legislature, endeavours should always be made-and, when duly and earnestly made, they would almost invariably prove successful, -to procure the attendance at these examinations, and the active countenance and guidance therein of some one or more ministers of religion, medical practitioners, or other men of superior education, who are located in different sections of the country; for I am persuaded that, unless
some inevitable hinderance or insamemitable obstacle stood in the way, no minister of Christ would decline an invitation to take part in a work so much in accordance with the character of his sacred mission; and achither do I believe that any truly respectable medieal practitioner, or any other worthy or cstimable member of society, possessed of an edmented or cultivated mind would, whatever his calling or occupation, refuse, unless restrained by some unusual or unizoidable exaction of duty of another lind, to acknowle,'ge in a proper spiritthe compliment of a request to lend his aid to render, for the public good, such an examination, as comprehensive, as beneficial, and as encouraging as it ought to bc.
"Form of Agrcement with Teacher," and "Teachers' Certificate to obtain Salary,"neither of which is in accordance with the letter and spirit of the law.
First, with respect to the Form of Agreement with Teacher. All will admit that where there is a contract both parties should be equally bound, and neither should have an advantage over the other. This principle of even-handed justice is, however, very far from being observed in the form of Agreement untler consideration. By sec. 21, 17th Vic., cap. 3, it is provided that no teacher shall be entitled to his half year's salary, unless during the half year the average daily attendance shall have amounted to twenty. Now, is not a moment's reflection sufficient to shew that no teacher can possibly have it in his power to compel such, or indeed, any other attendance of pupils? And is it not quite as obviously true that, although the average daily attendance of pupils may-owing to causes over which the teacher had no control whatever-have been below the amount required by law, he may nevertheless have conducted his school, duly, faithfully, and punctually, in conformity with the statutes of the Island, and the rules and regulations of the Board of Education for and during the term -six months-for which he ought to receive a certain specific allowance. Most certainly. And yet the teacher-owing to the unfair manner in which he is dealt with in the agreement -is to suffer the loss of his half-year's salary, in the event of his not having had the prescribed daily average attendance of pupils for the six months, although he may have fully, faith-
fully, and efficiently acquitted himself of every obligation imposed upon him by the agreement.

Great and monstrous indeed is the injustice to which teachers may thus, according to the strict letter of the law, be subjected. If then I have fairly stated the case, as I think I have, the necessity of such an amendment of the law, on this point, as that suggested by me-an amendment which would render its operation, in such particular, perfectly just and reasonable -must be imperatively demanded; and, fortunately, it may very easily be effected. The prescribed "Form of Agreement with Teacher," if amended so as to make it personally obligatory upon the Trustees, for themselves and the other inhabitants of the School District, who may be liable to assessment on account of the school, strictly and fully to do their duty in keeping up the requisite attendance of pupils, would of itself secure the romplete and satisfactory working of our present system of popular education. According to the present form of agreement, the trustees loosely engage "to keep in as regular attendance as possible all the scholars resident in the said district." Now, I humbly submit that an obligation so worded is, in fact, no obligation at all. To render the obligation effectually binding upon the trustees, they should, by law, be positively required to engage-not as now, " to keep in as regular attendance as possible all the scholars resident in the district," but to keep up the full average daily attendance of scholars required by the law, unless the prevalence of epedemic or contagions disease in the district, shall render it imposible for them to do so ; and, in case they shall fail to keep up the average daily attendance of scholars required by law, except as above excepted, although the teacher shall have fully and faithfully performed his part of the agreement, and they shall not, on account of the average daily attendance having fallen below the amount required by the law, be able to grant him (the teacher) the certificates necessary to enable him to receive the allorance to which he would, othervise, be entitled from the treasury of the Island, then, and in every such case, the trustees shall be bound in a suitable penal sum to pay to the teacher immediately the full amount of the allowance which, otherwise, he would have been entitled to draw from the treasury of the Island-the amount to be finally raised
by assessment of themselves and others liabl. to assessments on account of the school.

Some, perhaps many, in the cuuntry, would object to this proposed amendment, as being of too stringent a nature as respects school trustees. Reasonable and right-thinking men-men wh. set a just value upon popular education-woull, however, I am persuaded, think otherwise, and cheerfully acquiesce in its operation should it become law. Such men would, I doubt not, readily perceive, on duly considering it, that its direct effect on the one hand would be at once to close schoolsin settlements in which they are either not required or not deserved; and, on the other, to cause them to be faithfully and zealously sastained in all districts in which they are really required and truly desired.

I could very easily argue further in support of it; but as these observations and suggestions have already extended to considerable length, I shall now leave it, without further remark, to the rise consideration and sound judgment of those to whom especially it is intended to be submitted ; that is, first to the Board of Ellecation, and next to the Legislature;-to the first, to recommend its adoption in practice, if they concur with me in opinion concerning it : and to the other, to make it law, if they approve of it.

If this proposed amendment of the "Form or: Agreement with Teacher" be adopted, it will be nccessary also slightly to amend the "Form of the Teacher's Certificate to obtain Salary:" $A s$ the form of this certificate now stands, the trustces, thereby certify that the teacher " hasdiligently, faithfully and soberly discharged his duties during the last months, as teacher of our school, and has duly kept a journal of the said school during the said period." The amendment in such case necessary in sach certificate would be to this effect: "and the arerage daily attendance of pupils during the s:id period has been trenty," or more if the fact be so. By the by, the Board of Education will find, on reference to 17 th Vic. cap. 3, sec. 36, something like a rule or precedent for this proposed amendment of the "Form of the Teacher's Certificate to obtain salary." It is there expressly declared that no teacher in Charlottetown shall be entitled to receive a salary unless he or she shall hare taught at least thirty scholars, and such must be specified in the respective certificates And to this, with
much propriety, I may add, that if such precision as, in such case, to the number of pupils taught by any district teacher in Charlottetown, be just and necessary-and I think it is unquestionably so-many circumstances concur in shewing that it is still more required as respects our rural district schools.

## GENERAL CONDITION OFOUR DISTRICT SCHOOLS.

The state of popular education in Prince Edward Island, notwithstanding the great exertions which have been made to advance it, is still very low in some parts of the country. I may, however, I believe, safely say thit the general condition of our district schools is satisfactory and encouraging. The character of thr, schools is much superior, and the teachers are of a superior order, both as regards theirmoral characters and their intellectual attainments, compared with whatthey were before the introduction of the Free School system. We may now indeed look with the greatest satisfaction upon the very high characters of many of our teachers, and rejoice in the improvement in their pecuniary position. What was once the incubus of the profession in this Island has been removed; scarcely one, perhaps I wight truly say not one, individu:l of really intemperate habits, is now to be found among our teachers; and, at our present rate of progress, the day cannot be far distant when the designation of a teacher will associate with it the true moral and intellectual idea of " the gentleman."

By the improvement of the teacher's pecuniary position, here and elsewhere, has been solvid a great moral problem-by it a mystery in man's moral nature has been cleared up-a problem and a mystery which had long puzzled and perplexed many of the most keenly scrutinizing among our moril censors. It has proved that many men-men naturally endowed with the most amiable dispositions, men at all times capable of clearly discerning what is right from what is wrong-nay more, men who love what is right, even whilst doing what is wrong -men who are qualified to render the mott valuable and honorable services to their fellow creatures, -men who, withal, are unfortunately possessed of a full conviction of their own worth, maythrough the oppressive and crushing weight of public injustice, through feeling themselves doomed, as it were, by an irrecoverable decree, to toil, althoưh usefully, through life, like
unrequited and despised slaves-be so broken and degraded in spirit, so sunk and debased in their own estimation, so hopeless and reckless, as actually in the end, to seem to casual observers, to be worthy of no oetter fate than the galling bondage, poverty, and degradation they have, however unjustly, been made to endure ; and further, it has proved that such men, when once fairly relievedfrom the bondage and misery by which they have been debased and vilified, and when placed in positions of moderate competency and comparative independence, may be found truly worthy of being ranked among the most meritorious benefactors of our species. May it also teach us the lesson which nearly all seem to have so much need to learn-although Christ so plainly taught it-that the best way to improve men's characters and to reclaim the erring, is earnestly to endeavor to do them substantial good; and that, very frequently, freely to accord to individuals the fulfilment of pecuniary remuneration, respect and confidence, to which in the positions which they occupy, they ought to be entitled, is the very best means by which to render them most deservingly so!

I have said that since the introduction of the free school system, the characters both of the teachers and of the schools have become greatly superior to what they previously were; but, that no injustice may be done to certain teachers who, even under all the disadvantages and in spite of all the discouragements attendant upou the old system, faithfully and successfully acquitted themselves of the duties and oblig:ations imposed upon them under it, it must be admitted that such of these teachers as are still living and still in the profession, have, by no means, waned in honorable repute, althoug'?, of late, a fers young men of surpassing educitional acquirements and great natural aptitule for teaching have been added to our educational corps, and are individually securing to themselves a reputation superior to that of many others in the profession, but that they still stand deservedly high in the public estimation as talented, faithful, and successful instructors of youth.

Of the merits, both of such of the worthy veterans and of tho talented recruits in the service as have come under my observation, I have had great pleasure in making honorable records. These records may be found in their
proper places in the annexed detiniled report of my school visitations.

Towards the promotion of real popniar education, the Legislature have nobly done their part ; and, insufficient as the salaries which they have provided for teachers, are for the fair remaneration for such as are possessed of the higher order of qualifications required by the Free Education $\Lambda$ ct, it must yet be admittel that they have straincl their ability to the utmost in that resper. Still, however, grantiar that every teacher of the higher order were in the receipt of a salary of $£ 60$ per annum, may it not reasonably be asked, "What are $£ 60$ a year as an induccment for young men of energy and tale:t, (and none lacking these qualities should be employed) to derote themselves to the profession of teaching? Who can seriously contemplate a settlement for life, and the formation of domestic relations, with such a prospect as this before him ?" The effect of this inadequate remuneration of good teachers is, that men of the right character either shun the rocation as a poverty-stricken one, or else pursue it only antil they can leave it for more promising and lucrative engagements.

In order to induce men of learaing and other aecessary qualifications, contentedly, and thankfilly to settle down as rural District Teachers, ant merdy for a season, as birds of passage, but permanently, as bona-fide residents, due local nicuuragement must be given by the inhabitants it the rural districts thenselves. What, from :he scantiness of the public revenue, is left inwitlicient by the Logislature, must be made suificient by the wise libetality of the people themselves. If the people do indeed wish ..iacuation-the tree of knowledge-to grow up and flourish and extend its brauches, to throw its wholesome and protecting shade on all :around, and to scatter its fruits over the land, they must tend it with more care, and promote its growth with greater liberality and more decided earuestness. To this I will at present merely add, that the "suiting of the amount of remuneration to the rate of qualification by a judicious gradation of salaries," is, in my pinion, positively the thing most needful to be done at present with a view to the "bringing in of a better state of things;" and it ought to he done immediately. Too many of our te achers :are mere inexperienced and illiterate boys ; and the worst of it is that-uninfluenced by, anci
strangers to, such wistom :s thet poossessedand displayed by Plato, who, when asked how long he meant to be a disciple, saich, "As long as I am not ashamed of growisg better and wiser," -they think they have done enough to entitle them to rank among "the lights of the world," when they have secured their Licences. The preposterous practice of employing such boys as District Teachers, and allowing them as high a recompence for their labours as is paid to the very best and niost experienced of the profession, was yery justly condemned by the Rev. Mr. Fitzrerald, at a recent meeting of the Board of Ellucation; and, I believe, every other member of the Board thin present concurred with him in opinion respecting it. It can easily be shewn to be glaringly unjust on different grounds; and I therefore, hope it will soon be reformed.

## SCHOOL-HOUSES.

In calling attention to tra state of our District School-houses, I cann $\sim$ do better than to adopt the language of Thomas Cross, Esquire, M.D., one of the School Inspectors of Upper Canada, whose experience on this head seems to hare been closcly similar to my own, and whose opinions relative thereto are exactly such as I entertain myself. With that gentleman then I say, there is nothing which so truly and so elocquently conveys to the mind of a stranger the moral and social condition of the people amongst whom he is sojourning as the appearance and character of those honses devoted to the intellectual training of their youth. Thes stand as evidence of the liberality displayed in the support of that cause on which alone can be based a people's social happiness, or a country's prosperity. I have found that in many districts, little or no attention is paid to the appearance: or comfort of the School-houses; the buildings are insufficient, the internal arrangements are miserable, and the furniture very imperfect, and inconvenient. I have, in several instances, as may be seen by my detailed report, directed the attention of Trustecs to this important matter. In some, my suggestions have, I understand, been promptly attended to, whilst, in others, nothing, I believe, has beers done towards improvement. The necessity of every district's obtaining a freehold on which to place the School-house is moreover, I think apparent; but I know of only one in which this has been
done; this one is Carleton School, Cape Traverse. One acre well fenced and neatly laid out in shrubbery would not only add to the respectable appearance of the neighbourhood, but would also contribute to the enjoyment of the papils, and, by gising them early babits of taste and neatness, might mould their character to such habits in after life. Not one district school-house of all that I have visited, has apy play-ground attached to it ; and two only have the common convenience of a privy-a convenience which ought to be looked upon as essential to preserve that innate modesty which ought to characterize the minds of the youth of both sexes.

It might, one would think, be believed that, as an educational spirit advances among the people, they will become properly aroused to a just sense of the obligations under which they are placed to consult for the intellectual welfare of their children, and that, consequently, a marked improvement will take place in the character and appearance of their school buildings, and that a generous, emulation will prevade the inhabitants of every section to excel their neighbors in the external decorations and conveniences of those houses. Howerer, in my opinion, the only effectual means by which to secare really good and sufficient school-houses, is for the Legislature at once and finally to decide the matter by making the providing of a good, suitable, and suitably furnished schoolhouse, with all necessary appurtenances, a sinequa non. Let them expressly declare by law that, until this shall have been done in a District, the inhabitants thereof shallinot be enti-tled-as in fact bhey are not, even as the law now stands, if it be rightly interpreted and duly reted upon,-to any, of the peculiar advantages as respects Gevernment allowances to teachers, \&c., which the law confers upon those who have duly entitled themselves to them by a proper observance of the pre-requisites enjoined by the lew; and the much needed reformation in this respect will quickly be effected. Were the Legislature to act in this manner, there might, perhaps, be many loud complaints against it, in different sections of the country, for a time; but irritated parties, having given vent to their spleen, would, ere long, quietly submit to what they had, at first, considered their hard fate ; and soon perceive that the ondy effect of the legal compalsion had been to secure to them
and their children a great and lasting benefit.
The erection of a much superior class of school-houses, must, I again repeat, be insisted upon-must, in fact, with suitable farniture and epparatus be made a sine-qua-non-internal arrangements must be carefully stadied to suit practical utility, or it will be altogether impossible to introduce into our free schools the normalschool mode of training and teaching, and they will never become what they ought to be, sanctuaries for the training of children in intelligence and in moral and religious principles.

The fers really good, sufficient, respectable, and suitably farnished school-houses which, in the course of my official tours, I have visited, are duly noted in my detailed report; and it must be admitted they afford most pleasing eviaunces of the superior moral and social condition of the inhabitants of those districts in which they hare been erected.

## Proposal for making the Engagements of District

 Teachers all commence on the same day, or at the same period of the year.If that Section of the Education Act by which it is declared that no te:cher shall be entitled to his or her half-year's salary, unless he or she shall have taught, on an average, twenty scholars every day, for six months for which he or she may claim an allowance, is to be enforced in the manner in which, I think, I have shern it ought to be acted upon, it will be necessary, in order to afford to all teachers equally adrantageous opportunities for keeping up thcir averages, to add to the Act-in accordance with as suggestion of the Rer. Mr. Fitzgerald-a Section, providing that the engagements of all District Teachers-each of which mast be for no less a period than twelve months-shall commence on the same day or at the same period of thie year,-which day ar period might be either at the beginning of January or of Julys in every year. The necessity for such an amendment of the Act, will be evident from a moment'sconsideration of the fact that, in some School Districts, the attendance of scholars in the schools is very small in the winter months, awing to the inability of parents to provide their childree with suitablo winter clothing, although; in summer, it is above the average required by thie law; whilst in others, in which the inhabitants are in better or more comfortable circumstances, the attendance of papils in the schooks, during the
winter months is the greatest, and in summerowing to the practice of parents in keeping their children home, at that season, to assist them in their agricultural labours-it is the smallest.

By sach an alteration in the law, it is quite clear that teachers in the poorer districts would be piaced-as they ought, at all times, to be placed if possible-on almost as advantageous is footing for securing their full salaries, as their professional brethren in the richer districts.
Proposition for increasing the discretionary powers of the Board of Education, cs respects Teachers' Petitions for allowances when not entitled, according to law, to their full salaries, and other matters affecting the individual interests of Teachcrs.
The Board of Education, as it is at present, and as it has long been constituted, is distinguished, not only by superior talents and learning, but by great and unremitting zeal for the advancement of the educational interests of the Colony, tempered, on all occasions when they have to decide concerning the individual interests of teachers, by the most charitable, liberal, and honourable feelings; and I venture to hint that it would be well-not only for the purpose of procuring an immediate decision, which, in all cases of doubt and difficulty, is most desirable, but indeed on all other accounts,-were the Board to be empowered to award final judgment, after due investigation, in all cases of professional grievances, real or im:!ginary, in which teachers have hitherto been in the habit -as advised and permitted-of petitioning the Legislature for redress.

## NORMAL SCIOOL.

Upan the Normal School System of Training Teachers, as it is at present practised among us, and upon the advantages resulting from it, I would now remark at sone length, were it not that I am withheld from doing so by consideration of the unfavourable circumstances under which my observations would, in all probability; just at this time, be brought under the notice of the Legislature.

Under this head, therefore, I will merely observe that Stow's Training System-being, as he himself explains it, "primarily intended to provide an antidote to the exposed condition of youth and the demoralizing influences of large towns and rural villages "-would if applied
to general education, be found to be greatly retardative, instead of acclerative, of individual progress.

My observation of the practice of its laborretrenching principles, both in the Normal Schoot? itself and also in the two or three District Schools, visited by me, in which attempts have been made to carry these principles fully into practice, warrants my saying that, were it fully established and strictly acted upon in all our District Schools, it would, notwithstanding that there is much which is traly excellent and estimable in the system,-be, upon the whole, rather irjarious than beneficial to the interests of general education.

In simaltaneons or class taition, and in oral lessons on nataral science and the arts-the imparting of general knowledge-besides the accustoming of pupils to habits of scrupulous personal cleanliness and propriety, and of order, method, and regularity in all they do-consist the chief excellences of the system; and these, if combined, as, in my opinion, they very easily might be, with such successful and approved modes of general tuition and separate individual advancement, as are practised in the Sentral Academy and in all well conducted private Schools, would render our Free-School System of Education as nearly perfect as, I think, the most jeasonably sangaine with respect to the progress of popular education, can expect it will ever become.

Educated as I was in an English Academy of the highest repute and most extensive celebrity, and qualified, as I am, by forty years' experience of respectable and successful practice as a teacher, I hope I may be allowed to pronounce with some degree of confidence, both concerning the utility of the Normal School and the professional character of the Master of it. Seo Mr. Monk's report appended bereto.
A few of our Teachers who have been students in the Normal School, under the training of Mr. Monk, may thus-particularly through their having been possessed of natural aptitude for the conception and the discharge of the duties of a School-master-have been rendered much more efficient teachers than they would otherwise, perhaps, have been. The names of the teachers, -whose Schools I have visited,-who fairly come within this category, are Catherine Sencabaugh, Artemas Leard, David Walker, William Craig McKie, George Muttart, John

Currie, and James Irving. But it would be a monstrous absurdity to suppose that all the young men and young women-mere boys and girls in general-who have been under the training of Mr. Monk for only thrce months each, have, by such training, been perfected in the art of tuition; or even rendered capable of discharging the duties of District Teachers in a moderately satisfactory manner.

On this subject, a very forcible and elegant writer on Elucation, thus expresses himself: " A very common impression is, that any person of tolerable character, who has been through a school, and acquired the elements of the branches taught, is qualified to teach; as if the art of teaching were nothing more than pouring into the mind of another what has been poured into ours; as if they were no such thing as mind to act upon, habits to form, or character to influence." "To be qualified to discourse upon our moral and religious duties, a man must be educated by years of study; to be able to administer to the body in disease, he must be educated by 2 careful examination of the body in health and in disease, and of the effects pioduced on it by exteraal agents; to be able to make out a conveyance of property, or to draw a writ, he must be ellucated to it; to make a hat or a coat, to make a plough, to make a horse-shoe, he must be educated by years of apprenticeship; but to prepare a man to do all these things; to fill the mind with useful knowledge, to educate it to comprehend all the relations of society, to bring out all into full and harmonious action; to educate the moral nature, in which the very sentiment of duty resides, that it may be fitted for an honorable and worthy fulfilment of the public and priyate offices of life; to do all this is supposed to require no study, no apprenticeship, no preparation!"'

I need not insist upon the applicability of this observation to the present state of our District Schools, the mijority of which are entrusted to the management of inexperiencel, or untrained teachers. A moinent's consideration will enable any one who is at all qualified to judge in the matter, that to make a young man or a young woman a good teachers an: appren-ticeship-not of three months, but of years. must be necessary. The only way in which, it aeems to me, any remedy can be provided for this clamant evil, would be to effect a anion of the Normal School with the Central Academy;
and to allow the students being trained in the art of tuition under the Normal School Naster, to be excrised or employed, in some sort of regular succession, as apprentice assistants in teaching classes in the Academy, under the eye, not only of the Normal School Naster, but of the Head Master of the Academy, either until they should be sent forth from it with wellmerited diplomas, or else dismissed as unlikely to be ever, or at least in any reasonable time, entitled to licences, or certificates of sufficiency as teachers.

It is the opinion of the Board that before any candidate receives a licence he should provide a certificate from the Head Master of the Central Academy or from the Master of the Normal Schonl of his ability and skill in the art of teaching.

## SCHOOL VISITER.

Under this head also, I have been prepared to offer some observations, which, in my opinion, would be found worthy of the attention both of the Board of Education and of the Legislature ; but as circumstances are not, at this time, auspicious to their due consideration, I will, for the present, very briefly dispose of them.

The situation of School Visiter is one of the most important-nay, second, to none-in the Colony. The first care of the Government, thercfore, with respect to it, should, at all times, be to see that it is filled by an individual duly qualified, not only by educational acquirements, but also by all other attributes necessary to the befitting discharge of its onerous duties and most serious-ought I not to say sacred:?obligations; and, huving thus selected a suitable person to fill the office, then to see that the remuneration for the performance of the inuportant duties imposed upon him, shall be such as to enable him to discharge them in a truly respectable and independent manner.

On the principle that none but an experienced soldier or seamen, accustomed to commard, and to the discharge of the bighest duties of $:$ bis profession, could, on the one band, properly be appointed to review a regiment, or, on the other, be justly commissioned to inspect ${ }_{3}$ a ship of war ; so no one but a man, whese judgment, with respect to all matters directly bearing upon the science of teaching, has boen matured, and, in a manner, perfected, by a long course
of respectable and successful practice in the

Schools. And not only should the irdividual holding this appointment be a man of long practical, approved, and successful experience as a teacher of youth, but also a person of gentlemanly bearing, ouddress, manners, and conversation, and particularly of gentlemanly habits. Besides, he shoull, in an especial manner, be qualified to deliver lectu:es, in a popular style, on various scientific and literary subjects, and, above all, be able to labour successfully in this manner to the convincing of the people of the vast importance and iufluence of our common Schools, and to their enlightenreent as to the nature, dignity, and position of these institutions.

In the discharge of his duties, the individual occapying the highly important and honorable position of School Visiter, should be guided by higher and more ennobling motives than those which the mere emoluments of offie confer; but unless the amount of emoluments fairly correspond to the amount and importance of the diuties to be performed, and are such as to enable the Visiter to disregard, and to act independcotly of substantial firvours at the hands of those with whose interests he has to deal in the cupacity of a judge, the great probability is that, whilst receiving such favours, be they cither from the Teachers or Trustees of Schools, or from others having direct interest: in the Stho ls, he will, in many cases, from a sense of the obligations conferred upon him, be uniluly warped in his judgenent, and withheld from the faithful and just-because it would be a painful and ungrateful-discharge of his duty. The plain and simpl: fact is-as any man, by a very simple calculation mary convince himself-that the annual Salary of the School Visiter,-£200, -is a very insufficient remuneration for his services, unless he is still to be compelled, as our School Visiters have hitherto been, to throw himself upon the hospitality of the country, not only at the complete sacrifice of his iudependence, but, perhaps, in many instances, at that of his real efficiency also. The people of Prince Edward Island are not, I positively believe, cxceeded, even if they are equalled, in theextent and cordiality of their hospitality, by any other people upon the earth; and to be an object of their free exercise of it may be, nay, no doabt, is, frequently both highly pleasing and honora-
ble to the individual upon whom it is bestowed. But, when, from the low state of his filance:from his positive inability to defray his travelling expenses,-a man, as in the case of the Sclanl Visiter, is obliged to seek it, and it may be, obtrude himself upon the attentions of a family, who either may not wish, or may not be able conveniently to entertain him, he must -if he is a man capable of any thing like selfrespect, or dignified ser:iment-feel himself greatly humilitated anil degraded by the necessity. Surely the Goverament and the Legislature will see, and prictically acknowledge the necessity of rectifying or discarding this false and injurious cconomy with respect to the important and honorable office of Superintendent of Public Instruction!

I beg leave to acknowledge that, in the course of the preceding remarks, I have, in two ir three instances, incorporated with my own, some of the ideas of E. Ryerson, Esquire, Chiel Inspector of Schools in Upper Canad:, chiefly nnder the head, "Religious Instruction;" and also that, in other two cr three instances, I have made free use of some valuable hints which I have found in a work, entitled "The School and School-master," by George B. Einerson, A. M., of Massachusetts, U. S.

In concluding these remarks, I may, I trust, be permitted to state that, on reflecting on the manner in which I have discharged the important duties of School Visiter, during the short period for which I have held the appointment, I rejoice in the assurance afforded me by my own conscience that I have faithfully and zealousl $y$ acquitted inyself of all the obligations of my important trast, according to the best of my ability; and I have reason to believe that my officiad services, so far as they hare extended through the country, have been acceptable to the people.

In every District which I have visited, and particularly wherever I have sojourned for a night or longer, I have been ontertained with a degree of respect and kindness far exceeding my deserts. To the several warm-hearted individuals whose courtesy and hospitality have been most freely extended to me, I beg leave to retarn my most grateful acknowledgments, and the assurance that I shall ever gratefully cherish in my breast the pleasing remembrance of them.

## Normal. Scitool,

 Charlottetown, April 30th, 1859.
## Sir;

I have the honor herewith to present you a list of Stadents who have entered this Institution for the jenr 1858. Including the 61 reported to the late Inspector of Schools, the total number of persons enrolled as Normal Students up to the present Session is 88, of which 15 are females.

It affords me much pleasure to state that, there is a marked improvement in the acquirements of persons presenting themselres for admission as Students, which may be taken as an evidence of a corrcter understanding throughout the country of the object of this Institation: -that it is nut a mere seminary in which intending TLachers may simply attain knowledge, but one in which to acquire the art of communicating it. Although this is the specific aim of a Normal Scheol, opportunities of oidaining knowledge are amply provided. The Student listens to all the lessons given by the Master, and, with us, performs the same exercises as the senior classes in thic Model S:hool, in addition to practice in teaching. Altogether this department is in a much more satisfactory condition than when reported to your predecessor in December, 1857.

The quarterly abstracts of the Remisters of the Model School for 1858 furnished to the Board of Education, shew the average number of Girls to be 28, and of Boys, 43, -total average 71 , which is a decrease of about 20 under the previous year. This decrease is owing to the number of Girls being much less than formerly, the reason of winich I cannot assign. This dimunition is by no means to be regretted as a positive loss. Most of those of both sexes who have left belong to that flactuating class, which invariably attend what is called cheap education, where the advantages obtained are immeasureably above their cost, and are prized, cot according to their just value, but as they affect the pocket. This gives rise to the irregular, unpunctual class referred to, which forms the pest of a school, and of which the Model School is now fortunately tolerably frec; so that, with the exception of Saturdays, one day's attendance seldom presents a greater variation over another than 3 or 4.

I again deem it my duty to press the necessity for a Male Assistant. As I fully expressed my
views on this point in the report already alladed to, it is needless to add anything further, except to state that the progress of the pupils, and the general efficiency of the school increasingly demand the sppointment of a second master.

Reading, 46, 4 classes; good, and with understanding; meanings of words and spelling good. Writing, 22; fair specimens. Arithmetic, 14 ; fair in simple rules. Grammar, 8 ; well taught-fair knowledge for juniors. Geography, 8; fair. Dictation, 22. Other branches, 2; Latin Grammar-conjugated three verbs through most of the moods and tenses very correctly. Remarks-State could not be determined from the junior classes present. Asked for th: Register of the prerious quarter, and Mr. A. told me it was in the hands of trustees. -

Hillsborough, Charlottetown ; Ewen Amos, Teacher ; First or Lowest Class. Register, 32 ; present, 12. Reading, 32;2 classes; good, meanings and scope of lessons well understood. Writing, 26 ; fair; some specimens very good. Arithmetic, 23 ; quick and correct in this branch. Grammar, 8 , well tilught ; elements well understood. Geography, 27 ; very correct in outlines. Dictation, 15; no class present. Other branches, oral exercises, 12. Remarks -Order and discipline good. The master evidently a good and faithful teacher.

Rochfort, Charlottetown ; James Currie, Teacher ; Second or Highest class. Register, 47; average daily attendance, 37 . Reading, 47 ; very fair ; spelling correct; explanations and analysis creditable. Writing, 29; copy-books clean; specimens generally fair-some very good. Arithmetic, 24 ; in professed rules, ready and correct on their slates, although rather slow in mental calculations. Grammar, 14 ; fair knowledge ; parsing very correct. Geography, 17 ; fair knowledge of outlines Dictation, 8. Remarks-The examination upon the whole serred to show that much care and attention are bestowed upon his pupils by the teacher.

Pornal, Charlottetown; Edward Roche, Teacher; Second or Highest class Register, 147 ; present, 86 ; average daily attendance, 105. Reading, 147; 5 classes; well taught-scope and meaning of lessons duly comprehended ; analysis good. Writing, 73 ; generally goodsome specimens very good. Arithmetic, $56 ; 3$ clasjes; very good-ready and correct. Grammar, 35 ; verygood. Geography, 77 ; taught in a most successfulmanner ; the Geography of the Island well understood. Dictation, 42; regular. Other branches-Algebra, 3; Geometry, 1; Recitation, 53 ; one who recited Byron's Epitah on a Dog, did so with much propricty, taste and judgment. Remarks-Mr. Roche's abilities as a teacher are clearly of a very high order ; and the extent and variety of knowledge acquired by his pupils are surprising.

Kent Street, Charlottetown, Elizabeth McKinnon, Teacher; female. Register, 48 ; present, 45 ; average daily attendance, current quarter, 40 . Reading, $48 ; 5$ classes; spelling, 3 classes; reading distiuct and correct, with fair understanding; spelling and meanings good. Writing, 27 ; much abore average ability. Arithmetie, $25 ; 5$ classes; very creditable as far as Interest. Grammar, 2 classes; very fair. Geography, 1 class; very fair. Remarks-Order good; discipline junicious; all I saw and heard in the School spoke highly in favor of Miss alcKinnon, as an efficient, faithfinl, and zealous teacher.

Dunstaffnage ; David Walker, Teacher, First or Lowest class; Register, 54 ; present, 22 ; average daily attendance, 20. Reading, $54 ; 5$ classes; 11 in Sullivan's Spelling Book; explanation of passages read, good; spelling rery correct. Writing, 42; copy-books cleanspecimens fair, some very goo!. Arithmetic, 3 classes; highest in Cube Root; tolerably ready and correct. Grammar, S;2 classes; highest through Lennie-well taught. Geography, 21 ; 2 classes ; tolerably correct in general outlines. Dictation, 17 ; I class exercised regularly. Remarks-junior classes only present; the majority kept at home by their parents, to assist them in raising the potatoe crops; order good, and the School evidently well governed.

Suffolk Road; James McDonald, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Rcgister, 23-Boys 13, Girls 10 ; present, 7 ; average daily attendance, 16. Reading, 23 ; the children present being mere infants, they were not examined. Writing, 11; no copy-books in the School. Arithmetic, 11 ; no slates. Grammar, 8. Geography, 8. Remarks-The current quarter commenced on 30 th August, and will terminate 27 th November ; of this quarter the teacher has taught 3 whole weeks, this week being the fourth : Register has not been regularly kept, and the School sonms to be quite disorganized.

Sylney Street, Charlottetown ; Miss Macdonald, Teacher ; female. Register, 79 ; average daily attendance, 45. Reading, 79; 5 classes;-grood-meanings generally well understood; spelling very correct. Arithmetic, 35 ; 3 classes; in the simple rules very ready and correct,-a class in Interest made their calculations quite correctly; and with great readiness. Grammar, 12; well acquainted with Etymology. Geography, knowledge of-very creditable. Dictation, a class took down a rather difficult exercise with much readiness and great correctness. Remarks-The examination was highly creditable to Miss Macdonald, and plainly proved her to be a well qualified, diligent and conscientious teacher.

Belmont, or East Royalty ; Henry M. McLeod, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, 44 -Boys 25 , Girls 19 ; average daily attendance, 26. Reading, 44 ; good,-spelling and meanings very good; analysis good. Writing, 23; copy-books clean-writing fair: some specimens very good. Arithmetic, 30; tolerably ready and correct: in calculation of prices and Interest three or four shewed great dexterity: mental calculations once a week. Grammar, 19-2 classes; fair in Etymology : parsing, pretty fair. Geography, 34; well acquainted with general outlines. Dictation, 12; exercised once a week. Book-keeping, 2; books well kept. Other branches, Recitatiuns once a week. Remarks-Mr. McLeod is evidently a good and faithful teacher. All that I saw and heard in this School, was very creditable, both to teacher and scholars; and, I think, I may say to parents also.

Georgetown and all the Schools on Georgetown Road from Minchin's Point to Georgetown. Left Town to visit these Schools, on Tuesday, 12th October, 1858. Remarks-All these Schools were closed at the time I intended to visit them, that is between the 12th and 16 th instant, (October.) Cause of closing, pot: toe raising.

Sturgeon, Gasperaux. Remarks-Also closed, same cause.
Brudnell; James McLeod, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, 34-Boys 21, Girls 13 ; present, 5 ; average daily attendance, 27 . Reading, 34,-5 classes. Writing, 21 ; clean books,-style very grod. Arithmetic, 19,-3 classes ; highest in Mensuration (Gray). Grammar, 11,-2 classes; highest, through Rules of Syntax. Geography, 13 ; Chamber's Geographical Primer. Kemarks-School-room clean, comfortable, and well furnished. Present quarter commenced on the 11th. Could not ascertain the general state of the School, so few of the pupils being present.

Whim Road ; Donald Bethune, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, not kept; present, 6. Reading, indifferent: not understood. Writing, 12; no copy-books in the school room. Arithmetic, 6 in Practice : others beginners. Grammar-no class. Geography-no class. Remarks-No Trustees' Book kept. Three only of the Trustees can write. The children who were in School-5 boys and 1 girl-pronounced pretty well, considering that they scarcely understand or speak English at all, their mother tongue being Grelic. The School-house is new, but unfinished : in its present state, not fit to be occupied during the severity of the winter. The teacher is far from being an educated man; but, in such a Settlement, as speaking Gælic, by means of which he explains their lessons to the scholars, he is very serviceable.

St. Peter's Road ; Robert Robertson, Teacher; First or Lowest class. Register, 38-Boys 19, Girls 19 ; present, 9 : average daily attendance, 24 previous quarter, 17 current quarter. Reading, 38,-5 classes. Writing, 32. Arithmetic, 22. Grammar, 10. Geography, 21. Other branches, 32 in EIoly Scriptures. Remarks-Statistics from Register. From the small number present- 9 mere children-could not, from personal observation, ascertain the general state of the school.

Charlottetown Royalty West ; Daniel McKinlay, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, previous quarter not duly kept-none in school ; current quarter, 27,-Boys 20, Girls 7 ; average daily attendance, teacher can't tell-not made up : current quarter, 20. Reading, 27, - 5 classes; very bad, and without understanding: tried 5 of the 7 present, 2 of them boys, the elder 15 years of age, the younger, 10 : their spelling and meanings of words equally bad. Writing, 21 ; specimens poor. Arithmetic, $14,-3$ classes; hirhest in Cube Root: tried the two senior boys present in Practice, and found them very unskilful and incorrect. Grammar, the same two boys were tried, and found to have scarcely any knowledge of it. Geography, 12,-

2 classes; the same two boys were tried in Geography, and found to have as little knowledge of it as they have of Grammar. Book-keeping, 2; 5 practised in making out accounts on their slates. Remarks-Three weeks of the present quarter will have expired to-morrow, ( 23 rd October.) The School appears to be in a disorganized state. No entries of any kind made by the Trustees in the Record Book, althourh they are very respectable men. The majority of the scholars absent, assisting in raising potatoes. Admonished the teacher. School-house badly furnished, and much in need of repairs against winter.

Milton, Lot 32 ; Murdoch McLeod, Teacher ; First or Lowrest class. Register, 32—Boys 17, Girls 15 ; present, 6-Boys 2, Girls 4; arerage daily attendance, 11 ; for the previous quarter it was 21. Reading, 32,—5 classes; fair-spelling good. Writing, 23 ; copy-books clean, but the writing not good; the fault is in the system, the scholars being put into small hand too soon, and afrerwards practised in small hand only. Arithmetic, 30 ; mental calculations once a week. Grammar, 14.-2 classes. Geography, $24,-1$ class; Chambers' Geographical Primer. Dictation, 12,-1 class; once a week. Book-keeping, 2. (Hutton's) Books creditably kept. Other branches, Composition 7, Recitation, 2S. Remarks-The current balf-year commenced on the 11th Sept., 1858. The first two weeks were given as the racation, so that this half year, has been open only 4 weeks. The few children present being very young, did not examine them. Stalistics taken from the liegister.

Little York ; David Fcrguson, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, not duly kept,teacher says he fills it in at home: present, 6-Boys 2, Girls 4 : arerage daily attendance, previous quarter 19,-for 4 days current quarter, 16 ; and for one day in October, 8 . Reading, the two boys read in the New.'Testament, very badly: could not answer one question on the lesson,-ages, 10 years and 9 years. Writing, copy-books clean, and some specimens of writing by the elder girls quite superior in style. Arithmetic, tried the eldest girl ( 13 years old) in calculation of prices, and found her very inexpert, Geography, tried the eldest girlshe answered two or three questions. Classes for the current quarter, which commenced on the 11th September, not registered. Remarks-Present half-year commenced 12th June, and will end 4th December. First weck jn June, no school : the tcacher's father being sick, the Trustees gave him leave to go home for that time. Current quartercominenced 11 th September. Admonished the teacher, who, although he has been negligent of his duty in some respects, appears to be an amiable and sensible young man.

Cornwall, Lnt 32 ; Maleolm Darrach, Teacher: First or Lowest class. Register, current quarter 35-Boys 15, Crinls 20: previous quarter 70-Boys 34, Girls 36 ; arerage daily attendance, present to-laiy, 16—"oys 7, Girls 9. Readirg, 35; reading, spelling, and meanings, good. Writing, good. Grammar, indifferent. Gcography, indifferent. Dictation, 15 : none present. Book-keping, 3 : none present. Remarks-Monday, 1st November, 1858. Inspected this School this day. Number of pupils present, $16-7$ boys and 9 girls : eldest a girl of 14 years, and youngest a girl of 6 years. Tae School-house, which is new, is a good, substantial building, in all its dimensions conformable to the law. It is well furnished, and, in all respects, clean and comfortable. It is in fact a credit to the District. The senior pupils not baving yet returned to school since the close of the Fall Vacation, I have not been able to ascertain what progress has been made in their studies by the pupils generally. Judging by the few copy-books in school, I think writing is carefully and successfully taught by the teacher.

Dog River, Lot 31 ; John Livingstone, Teacher : First or Lowest class. Remarks-Register for the current quarter not filled in. Teacher opened school this quarter on the 22nd Sept., and taught until the. 15 th October, (the commencement of the Fall Holidays,) with an average daily attendance, he thinks, of 10 or 12 . Previous quarter-he opened school on the 13 th June, 43 on the Roll,- 19 boys and 24 girls. The potatoe-raising not being quite over in the District, the senior pupils have not yet returned to school since the termination of the vacation. The average daily attendance during the previous quarter bad not been ascertained by adding up, \&c., until it was struck at a little over 20 by me this day, 1st Nov., 1858. Left a notice to the Trustees to the effect that unless the School-house, which is greatly out of repair, be put
into a better condition, without unnecessary delay, and the same be forthwith certified to the Board of Education, the sehool will be closed.

New South Wiltshire; Charles Fowle, Teacher ; Register, 22-Boys 13, Girls 9 : average daily attendance, currentquarter, firstweek, 22. Reading, 22 . Arithmetic, 1 class-mere beginners. Grammar, 1. Geography, 4. Remarks-Tuesday, 2nd October, 1858. Visited this School this day. The Fall Vacation of 3 weeks ( 1 week extra having been given) terminated on Saturday, the 30th October ; but, as the potatoes have not yet been all raised in the District, the scholars have not yet returned to school. The Register and the Recora or Trustees' Book have been duly kept. Of the current quarter, which is the 3rd of Mr. Fowle's current engagement, school has been taught one week only, but the whole 22 attended every day. Their ages range between 5 and 11 years. The School-house is a good, comfortable and respectable one; and every thing in it and about it seems to be kept in good order and repair.

Ten Mile House ; Patrick McQuade, Teacher : First or Lowest class. Remarks-The school was closed, and had been so for more than a week, the teacher being unable to discharge his duties in consequence of his having a whitlow on one of his right-hand fingers.

Glenaladale ; William Callaghan, Teacher: First or Lowest class. Remarks-Reached this School-house at a little after 1 o'clock, p. m. Found it closed, and no signs of its having been open this day, (3rd November, 1858.)

Glenroy. Remark-Found this School-house closed.
St. Andrew's. Remarks-Early in the afternoon (10th Nov., 1858,) found this School closed : before 3 o'clock.

Cable Head; Ellen McKenzie, Teacher : female. Remarks-This Saturday (13th Nov., 1858,) being holiday, the School-house was closed, and the teacher was absent from the Settlement.

Goose River. No Teacher.
Big Bush, Lot 45 ; Donald McIntosh, Teacher : First or Lowest class. Remarks-Sehoolhouse closed, the teacher being from home.

Morell Rear, Lot 39 ; Simon Gill, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register. 66, being the number in the District : present to-day, 8,-Boys 3, Girls 5 ; average daily attendance, current quarter, 24. Reading, 56. Writing, 30 ; none of their copy-books in School-room, except one. Arithmetic, 23. Grammar, 3 : not present. Remarks-Thursday, 4th November, 1858. Visited this School this day. Number of children between the ages of 5 years and 16 years in the District, according to the Register, sixty six. Number present to-day, 8-3 boys and 5 girls; the eldest, 12 years and the youngest 5 years. Of the current quarter, which commenced 10th Sept., 1858, the master has taught 19 days, and the average daily attendance of pupils appears by the Register to have been, up to this date, (4th Nov.) to-day included, to have been 24. Besides the regular vacation of 2 weeks, the Trustees allowed the teacher a week extra, which he has to make up at the end of the quarter. The School-house is wretchedly furnished, and so greatly in need of repairs, that unless it shall be thoroughly repaired immediately, it cannot, with any thing like due regard to the comfort and health of the teacher and papils, be kept open during the ensuing winter. The Register must, in future, be kept exactly in the manner prescribed by the Board of Education. No Record or Trustees' Book kept. In future, one must be kept. The preceding is a copy of the Remarks endorsed on the School Register by me this day.

Morrell ; Artemas Morrow, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, 26-Boys 10; Giris 16 : present to-day, $10,-$ Boys 3, Girls 7 ; average daily attendance, 9 , Reading, 26-6 classes : fair, spelling and meanings good. Writing, 16 : creditable, some specimens very good. Arithmetic, 16 ; ready and correct in calculating Prices, Proportion, and Practice. Grammar, 7 : fair knowledge of Etymology. Geography, 9 or 10 ; fair in the outlines. Dictation, 8 or 9 ; twice a week on an average. Bookkeeping, 2. Remarks-Thursday, 4th November, 1858.: The current half-year, the last of the Teacher's engagement commenced on the 14th Sept., 1858. The school-house is a good, comfortable building; but it is indifferently furnished, as respects desks and benches; in fact, for the comforb and convenience of the children, both
should be altered and improved. Required the Trustees to cause these defects to be remedied, The teacher states that he commenced teaching this quarter on Thursday, 14th September, but did not begin to mark the daily attendance of pupils until the 6th October. From the 6th October to the 1st November-3 weeks-the school was closed; 2 weeks of this time being the autumnal vacation. The school was reopened on Monday, the 1st instant, and the arerage daily attendance since, up to this time, (4th Nov.,) to-day included, is 9 . The teacher is a young man of highly respectable appearance, modest, and sensible, and, as far as educational acquirements are in question, appears to be well qualified to teach, but he has been remiss in duty, not having strictly observed the Regulations of the Board of Education touching School Registers.

St. Peter's Old, Lot 39 ; Robert D. McEwen, Teacher; First or Lowiest class. Register, 28, -Boys 16 , Girls 12 ; present to-day, $16,-$ Boys 9 , Girls 7 ; average daily attendance, previous quarter, ending 91st Aug., over 21,-current quarter, to this date, over 19. Reading, 28 ; good, and with decided understanding. Writing, 14; books very clean-style rery good. Arithmetic, 14 ; in Practice, Interest and Fractions, very creditable. Grammar, 9 ; knowledge of grammatical construction of sentences, and of derivation, very accurate. Geography, 9 ; correct in the outlines,-well acquainted with divisions. Dictation, 9 ; oncc a week. Remarts -Friday, 5th Nov., 1858. Visited this School this day. Number of pupils present, 16-9 boys and 7 girls; all perfectly clean, well clad, and apparently cheerful and orderly.

Marie, Lot 40 ; John Foley, Teacher; First or Lowest class. Register, 19 ; average daily attendance, current quarter, 15 to date of this visit,-previous quarter, in 60 days, 202. Reading, 19-4 classes, reading, spelling, and meanings, fair. Writing, 9 ; some specimens fair,-writing paper very poor in quality. Arithmetic, 9 ; highest in Proportion,-pretty well in calculation of prices. Grammar, 2: through Etymology, -parsing, fair. Geography, just commencing. Dictation, 2,-once a week. Remarks-Friday, 5th November, 1S5S. 53 pupils on the Roll for the quarter which ended on the 16th October, 1858. Current quarter commenced 15th October, 1558 ; but the master did not commence teaching until the 25th October, 185S. He has taught in all, this quarter, 1 week of 5 days, and 4 days of the week which will end to-day. No Record Book is kept, and the Trustees, it seems, have been negligent in the discharge of their duties.

Midgelle, Lot 41 ; Henry Anderson, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, 30,-Boys 17, Girls 13 ; average daily attendance, current quarter, over 13 to this date; previcus quarter, over 20. Writing, fair,-some specimens rery good. Remarks-Namber present to-day only 6 - 1 boy and 5 girls-youngest 5 years, eldest 13 years. Gurrent quarter commenced 18th Sept., 1858. There is a Book called the Record or Trustees' Book, but it does not contain one record made by Trustees, School Visiter, or any other visiter. The School house is a new and superior one, but with the exception of one desk-a double one-it is badly furnished. The daily attendance has not been shewn, as itought to have been, by figures atthe foot of each column, although it has been indicated by the proper marks; by adding up, I find it has been over 13.

North Side St. Peter's Bay, Lot 40 and 41, Minor School ; Elizabeth McAulay, Teacher; female. Register, 32-Boys 15, Girls 17 ; present to-day, 17 -boys 10, Girls 7 ; average daily attendance, current quarter $22 \frac{1}{2}$, previous quarter over 20 on 43 days. Reading, 32,3 classes. Writing, 7 ; very good : large hand, round and small hands, pretty fair. Arithmetic, 5 ; highest-2 in Long Division. Grammar, 5. Geography, 5. Remarks-Friday, 5th Nov., 1858. Visited this School this day. Children cheerful, and apparently orderly and well behaved. The school-house, a new building, is of the proper dimensions, but it is not finished. it is neither plastered nor boarded, inside or outside. If not made comfortable before the setting in of winter, it will have to be closed. Left the following notice to the Trustees: "Unless the Trustees shall immediately cause the school-house to be finished, in the one way or the other, that is, inside or outside, it will not be at all fit to teach in during the severity of the approaching winter, and will, therefore, have to be closed." N. B.-The School was closed for 3 weeks, (besides the 2 weeks of vacation,) during which time of 3 weeks, the teacher was in Charlottetown. This lost time she will have to make up.

Cardigan Road, Lot 41; John Keenan, Teacher; First or Lowest class. Register, 45Boys 16, Girls 29; average daily attendance, current quarter, to this date, 22 . Reading, 45, - 4 classes: Writing, 11 ; copy-books not in the school-room. Arithmetic, 11 ; highest in Proportion. Grammar 11; through Etymology. Geography, 11; outlines. RemarksSaturday, 6th Nov., 1858. Register appears to have been duly kept; there is not, however, a Record or Trustees' Book in the school-room; and neither is one kept. Besides, the teacher has not the school-room, nor in his possession a copy of the School Acts now in operation. I have repeated the notice of 15th Sept., 1858, of my predecessor, Mr. McNeill, concerning the necessity of having the school-house repaired without delay, with this addition to it,-that, unless this notice be duly attended to forthwith, the Board of Education will, most probably, order the school to be closed.

Big Cape, Lot 42 ; Donald H. Macdonald, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, 21Boys 17, Girls 4 ; average daily attendance, current quarter, up to this date, 11 1-7. Reading, 21 ; fair, spelling and meanings good. Writing, 13 ; fair,-free style. Arithmetic, 13; expert and correct in Reduction, Proportion, Interest, and Vulgar Fractions. Grammar, 5; good in Etymology and parsing. Geography, 12; well acquainted with oatlines. Dictation, 5. Remarks-Monday, Sth Nov., 1858. Visited this school this day. Register duly kept. Trustees' Book-none. Mr. Macdonald's mode of teaching and the mild but firm discipline esercised by him over his pupils, are evidently very judicious and successful.

St. Margaret's Lot 44; Ronald Campbell, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, 53Boys 32, Girls 21. Reading, 53 ; very fair, with good understanding. Writing, 21 ; very fair-some specimens especially. Arithmetic, 9 ; ready and correct. Grammar, 8 ; very good, -parsing particularly good. Geography, 8 ; very good. Dictation, 8. Remarks-Monday, Sth Nov., 1858. Visited this school this day. Number present $24-14$ boys and 10 girls. The Register is duly kept; and order, method and regularity are very obserrable in all the arrangements of the school. The school-house, although unfinished, is comfortable, and pretty well furnished.

Red Point, Lot 46 ; Duncan Robertson, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Remarks-Previous quarter terminated 21st October, 185S: Teacher re-opened school to-day, (Wednesday, 10th Nov., IS5S,) having been allowed, besides the regular vacation of 2 weeks, 5 days more to admit the making of certain necessary repairs upon the school house. Only 2 pupils present to-day. Register not in the school-house : had been taken home by the teacher for the purpose, he said, of making out the average daily attendance of the previous quarter. The manuscript books of Arithmetic are the very best that I have hitherto seen in the District Schools.

Souris West, Lot 44 ; Mark Sweeney, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. Register, 40-Boys 21, Girls 19 ; average daily attendance, current quarter, over 24 to this date. Evidence of great order and regularity; and of a faithful discharge of duty on the part both of the teacher and of the trustees. School-house spacious, and, in all respects comfortable, except that the desks are too high.

The school-house is close and comfortable, being well buarded or lined inside ; but it is badly furnished. By the record of my visit, left in the School-house, the Trustees are respectfully requested to take notice that the furnishing of the new School-house, now in progress of completion, (to.be finished by the 1st of July, 1859,) must be made with a direct view to facilitate the practice of the Normal School system of training or tuition, otherwise it may not be reported as sufficient, that is of suitable accommodations, \&c. N. B.-The Trustees and other parties directly interested in the School, apprehensive that the daily average attendance of pupils, for the current half-year, will be below that required by law, are much afraid that, should the case be so, the Board of Education will close the School, and that the Teacher will be refused the certificate neeessary to enable him to draw his half-year's salary. In the summer quarter of the current half-year, the attendance fell below the required average, on account of the prevalence of Small Pox, as noted by my predecessor, Mr. McNeill ; anil now, in winter many of the children cannot attend for want of shoes, \&c., although there are, as I understand, over 40 children between the ages of 5 years and 16 years in the District. I harc, thercfore, told them that in my opinion the Board, giving due consideration to these facts, will, most likely, allow the School to continue open, and be willing to certify that the Teucher iscntitled to draw as much of his half-year's salary as shall be in due proportion to the arerage attendance as below 20.

The Schoolhouse is of the proper dimensions, well finished outside, but unfinished inside, being unceiled and the walls neither p'astered nor boarded. The desks and benches are of rather rude construction, and are awkwardly and inconveniently high.

It is however, still very far from being finished; and the reason assigned for this, is that the person who contracted to finish it failed to perform his contract.

Peters' Road, Catherine Sencabaugh, Teacher. Register, 44 ; Bnys 23 ; Girls 21-present to-day, 25 ; Boys 13, Girls 12. Average daily attendance current quarter to this date, 15 , nearly ; Reading, 44-5 classes; Writing 18; fair and clean ; Arithmetic, 13, highest in Co:1pound Division; Grammar, 2, Etymology; Geography, 1 Geographical Primer; Dictation, 7, three times a week. Scripture lessons every morning. Remarks:-Munday, 19th Jan. 1859. Visited this School this day. Register duly kept. There is, however, no 'Trus'ees' or Record Book, although in every other respect the rules and regulations of the Board of Education are duly complied with. The school is opened and closed with prayer-the prescribed forms. In personal appearance, the children are comfortable and respectable; they are wellbehaved; and the school seems to be well and successfully conducted. The teacher, however, complains of a want of school books, particularly of copies of Chambers' Gcographical Primer, which, she says, greatly retards the progress of her pupils. In this school there is one Micmac Indian, a boy of 14 years of age : he is comfortably clothed, healthy, cheerful, and tolerably intelligent. He appears to be quite at home among his school-fellows, aüd seems to be treated by them as a brother. He is beginning to read with a good deal of ease and correctness, and writes large hand very fairly.

The school-house is sufficient and very comfortable. The furniture, however, is not sufficient; for the desks are clumsy and inconvenient, and the benches are not what they ought to be. By a written notice, I called upon the Trustees to remedy these defects in the school furniture.

Left the following notice to the Trustees:-""The Trustees will please to take notice that, in the present wretched state of the School-house, the School is liable to be closed forthwith." Saturday, 29th Jan., 1859 :-The following is an extract from a letter of the Trustees of the said school, dated 24 th inst., and addressed to me, with respect to the said school :-
"Sir,-Wc have much pleasure in being able to state, that, at a meeting held at the Schoolhouse, 20th inst., we have decided upon crecting a new School-house, and tenders to complete it in December next are now taken in. Considering the great loss it would be to a District in which there are so many scholars, to close the school, you will please grant us the use of the old Sehool-house until the time above specificd, when we will have as good a School-house as any neighbouring District, and the favor will be gratefully acknowledged."

The School-house-a new erection-is not in such a state, as respects either the buihling or the furniture, as would warrant its being allowed to remain open, were it not that the people of the District are actually using their best endeavours to have it completed and made suffient. I have had a farer opportunity to judge of the merits of Mr. Brooks, as an educator of $;$ outh, than I have, as yet, generally had with respect to the Rural District Eeachers whose schools I have risited; and it is no more than simple justice to him to observe, in this recorl, that I :im convinced thut he is cmineutly well qualified to discharge all the inportant and onerous daties of a District Teacher of the class to which he belongs. He fully comprehends the mature and responsibilitics of the obligations which, as a District Teacher, it is incumbent upon him to discharge ; and as I have had opportunities to obserre that order, method, and regularity are manifested in criry thing over which he has eontrol, I have no hesitation in positively saying that his services, as a teacher in such a District as that in which he labours, cannot easily be too highly appreciated. I am the more particular in doing justice to Mr. Brooks in this record, thim I would perhaps otherwise be, because I observe that the School is not as well atended as it ought to be; and I especially desire to call the attention of the Trustees to the fact that if they fail to exert themselves successfully in procuring a lapger daily attendance of pupiis, the result will, in all probability, be not only highly detrimental to their own interests, as parents, and to those of other parents in the District. gencrally, but bear with peculiar hardship and injustice upon their worthy teacher, Mr. Brooks; for, should not the average daily attendince of pupils upon the half-year amount to twenty, it would be the disagrecable duty of the Buarl of Education, in compliance with the spirit and letter of the law, to close the School and to refuse, to Mr. Brooks, the certificate necessary to enable him to draw his salary for that time from the 'Treasury.

School-house not plastered or boarled inside ; otherwise might, perhaps, be accounted sufficient as a building. It is howerer, much too suall for the proper accommodation of the number of scholars generally taught in it. Furniture insufficient and inconvenient. The School is evidently well conducted ; the scholars are orderly, well-bchave:t, and scemingly very attentive to their studies.

Uigg ; DonaldMcDonald ; Teacher; Second or Highest Class. Register, 85-Boys 42, Girls 43. Present to-day, 60-Boys 36, Girls 24. Reading, 85 ; 5 classes. Writing, 60-generally rery good ; Arithmetic, 50-3 classes, highest through Grey, no M. S. books. Grammar, 30, 2 classes, Rules of Syntax, parsing, three times a week. Geography, 20-Gengraphical Primer and Stewart's Geography every other day. Dictation, 25-occasionally. Other branches-12 Geometry, Trigonumetry, no M. S. books; 10 Latib Grammar, Delectus and Cæsar, daily lesson; New Testament lesson daily. . Remarks-Friday, 11th February, 1859. Visited this School this day. Register properly kept. Rules and Regulations of the Board of Education duly observed. School-house excellent, the best, in, which I have as yet visited. Furniture good and convenicnt. Sihool opened and closed with prayer. The School is evidentiy well conducted by the teacher, Mr. Macdonald ; and the order, method and propriety observable in all connected with the government of it, affordsthe most satisfactory evidence of his great ability and fidelity in his proicssional capacity. In my opinion, Mr. Macdonald ought to be allowed an Assistant.

Murray Harbour Roald ; Kenneth MeKenzie, Teacher, First or Lowest Class. Register, 68 -Boys 49, Girls 19; Average daily attendance, current quarter to this date, 48 9-11. Reading, 68-5 classes. Writing 51, very fair; Arithmetic, 40-3 classes, highest through Gray; Grammar, 9, Syntax, parsing daily; Geography, 18-Geographical Primer and Maps, every other day. Dictation 12, occasionally. Other branches-3 Latin Grammar, 3 Algebra; New Testament lesson daily. Remarks-Friday, 11th February, 1859. Visited this School this day. Register regularly kept. Rules and Regulations of the Board of Education duly
obserred. School oper ed and closed with prayer. The school had becn dismissed for the day, about 10 minutes before I amived at the School-house, and it appeared that the cleck kept-in the School-house was just about so much faster than my watch.

Pisquid Road; Michael Curran, Teachor, (Normal School Stadent); First or Lowest,clase. Register, 43-Boys 21, Girls 22. Rcading, 43-4 classes. Writing, 15; rery fair 2 some specimens rery good. Arithmetic, 20-3 classes; highest, Discount and Cube Root. Grammar, 12; Etymology-second time ; parsing daily. Gengraphy, 12; Geographical Primer, daily. No Scripture lessons. Remarks-Saturday, 12th Fcb., 1859. Visited this School this day. Register duly kept. Rules and Regulations of the Board of Education duly observed. Schoot-house-one of the old ones-log building, unlined, but ceiled and very comfortable. Furnituze tolerably convenient, but it ought to be improved. A suitable deske is required for the Teacher. Notified the Trustees, requiring them to remedy these defects. Scholars of rery orderly demeanour and respectable appearance; seemingly well trained, docilc, and attentive to their studies. For the sufficiency of the School-house and suitableness of the School Furniture, and also for the good government and prosperous state of the Sihool, I believe I am fally warranted by facts in stating that the inhabitants of the District are much indebted to the truly wise, enlightened, and long approved liberality in the cause of Education, of Malcoln Forbes, Esquire, of Mount Pleasant.

Pownal or Central ; John Macdonald, Teacher ; First or Lowestclass. Remarke-Foand this School closed. On enquiry in the neighborhood, was informed that Teacher's engagement had expired some time in January last, and that the people of the District were not disposed to reengage him.

Mount Mellick, Lot 49; Alexander McNeill, Teacher; First or Lowest Clis:. On the Roll, 53 -Boys 23 , Girls 20 ; Average daily attendance current quarter, $20 \frac{1}{2}$ : present tof day 16 ; Reading, 53-5 classes, spelling and meanings, daily; Writing 45 , style verysuperior many specimens excellent; Arithmetic, 24, 3 classes, highest through Gray; Grammar 7,2 classes; highest Rules of Syntax, parsing daily. Geography, 12-Geographical Primer three times a week; Dictation 10, trice a week. Book-keeping, 4-Books exceedingly well kept. Remarks-Thursday, 10th February, 1859. Visited this School this day. The Register has Boen duly kept, and the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Education have been properly observed. The school is opened and closed with prayer-the prescribed forms. The scholars are evidently well-behaved, orderly and stadious, and all that fell under my observation having relation to the government of the school, gave me reason to believe that Mr. McNeill is not only a well-qualified, but also a very faithful and successful teacher of youth. The Schoolhouse is comfortable, and, in one sense, suffieient; but it is much too small for the proper accommodation of so many scholars as ore generally in attendance. The school furniture has been constructed and arranged with a goud deal of regard to the comfort and convenienge. of the pupils, but still it might easily be much improved, and indeed ought to be. Notified the Trustees to attend to this suggestion.

Seal River ; James O'Rielley, Teacher ; First or Lowest Class. Register, 24-Boys 19; Girls 5. Average daily attendance current quarter, 18 6-24-present to-day 13; Boys 9 ; Girls 4. Reading, 24-4 classes. Writing, 15-some specimens yery good; the teacher: himself is a superior penman. Arithmetic, $18-2$ classes ; M. S. books farr. Grammar, 9 -i2 classes. Geography, 6 ; Dictation, occasionally. No Scripture lessens; no prayers. . Remarks Thursday, 10 th February, 1859 . Visited this School this तay. The Register seems to have: been duly. kept, but the daily attendance for the last four days has not been indicated by figures at the foot of each column, and neither hare absences been indicated by the prescribed mask "ab" "The scholars who were present seemed to be orderly and well-behaved. School-housf suificient and comfortable. School furniture better, more saitable and convenient than Thavo generally found it in other schools which I have visited. I entered the School-house a littlo after 1 oclock and left it a little before 2 oclock, p-im. Some of the scholars present told rid the teacher was gone to get his dinnerot The facts which I have aboverecorded were denived frop my inspection of the Register, examination of manuscript books, and information comp
municated to me, in answer to questions pat by me, by two or three very intelligent boys, papils of the teacher. When I left the School-house the teacher was not returned. The average daily attendance, $186-24$, above indicated on the current quarter, ranges over a period of six weeks, but, daring that time, the Seiool appears, by the Register, to have been taught for only 24 days.

Hillsbo:ough, Sharlottetown ; Eiven Amos, Teacher ; First or Lowest class. RemarksMonday, 2list March, 1859. Intending to visit this S:hool this day, called at the Schoolhouse, which I found closed, about 11 o'clock, a. m. On enquiring in the immediate neighborhood, the reason of its being closed, I was informed that tie teacher was in Jail, which, I am sorry to say, I have since found to be a fact.

King's Square, Charlottetown ; John Arbackle, Teacher ; Second or Highest class. Register, 38; average daily attendance, current quarter, 30. Reading, 38 ; 1st., 2nd., 3rd. and 4th. books. Writing, 20 ; fair specinens. Arithmetic, 16-3 classes. Grammar, 8-2 classer. Geography, 5; outlines. Testament class daily, 24. Remarks-Monday, 21st March, 1859. Visited this School this day. Number present 32. Register duly kept. Some of the Scholars, I am sorry to be obliged to say, behaved very ill, even whilst I was present; so ill indeed that I could not forbear commenting upon their behaviour with some severity. Their insubordination must, I fear, be attributed chiefly to laxity of discipline-to a want of energy, decision, and dotermination on the part of the teacher, who, however, on the score of ability, acquiremente, and experience, is entitled to rank as one of the best teachers in the Island.

Orphan School, Grafton Street; Mrs. George Clarke, Teacher. Register, 13-Boys 7, Girls 6 ; average daily attenalance, current quarter, $615-17$. Reading, 13. Writing, 8. Arithmetic, 6. Remarks-Visited this School this day, Tuesday, 22nd March, 1859. Number on the Roll, 13-7 boys and 6 girls. The current quarter commenced on Monday, the 2Sth February, 1859. Average daily attendance, $6,15-17$. Mrs. Clark says the attendance during the late severe weather, fell below what it had usually previously been, and that she expects it will rise again as the weather shall become milder and pleasanter. In the Visiter's Book I observed a Record, made 5th September, 1856, by the Rev. Charles Lloyd, late Rector of Charlottetown Parish, the propriety of which, however strongly it may have been evidenced by the state of the School at that time, is fully as applicable to it at the present moment. In this Record, the rev. gentleman-after expressing his surprise that the boon of Free Education, perfectly carried out, should as indicated by the smallness of the attendance, be so little appreciatedsuggests the appointment of two or three philanthrophically disposed persons to make the requisite enquiries, and stir up negligent parents, for the purpose of giving more extended effect to the liberal views of the Legislature in establishing this School. A person betier qualified or more suitable and deserving in every way to be entrusted with the management of this School, than Mrs. Clarke, the present teacher of it, could not easily be found. Under her government; the Scholars are trained to the greatest propriety of behaviour : they are perfectly clean, comfortably clothed, cheerful, and, seemingly, carnest in learning. The progress made by some of them in reading and spelling, as tested by me this day, is very satisfactory. Eight of tho children write-four of them in copy-books and four on their slates only. Mrs. Clarke herself writes a very fine hand; and the copy-books prove that she teaches writing with much care and success. Six of the scholars cipher-the most advanced are in Long Division. Some of the children read in the 4th, some in the 3rd., some in the 2nd., and some in the 1st Book; some are only learning the alphabet. That a School so well, faithfully, and successfully taught, and on principles of perfectly free edacation, as this is, should not be better attended, can, I think. be accounted for only, either on the sapposition that the existence of the School is not sufficiently well known amongst the classes for the benefit of whose children it has been instituted; or else on that that parents amongst these elasses are not sufficiently alive to the interests of their children to avail themselves of it: And, in either case, the only means as it seems to me, by which the Schook can be made as useful as it'was intended, by the Legislature, it should be, and as it certainly might be, the carrying into effect the suggestion of the Rev. Mr. Moyd, to which I have above directly referred. The School is always opened with prayer ; and Mrs.

Clarke, afterwards, reads a portion of the Old Testament to her youthful charge. In the afternoon, all the children who are able to do so read, in class, a lesson from the New Testament.

Pownal Street, Female School; Miss Annie Scantlebury, Teacher. Remarks-Tuesday, 22d March, 1859. Number present, 13. This is the third time, since 1st October, 1858, that I have looked in upon this school ; but as it has not been established according to law, through the insufficiency of the number of scholars entered, or upon the Roll, their number at no time having exceeded 20 on the Roll, I have not conceived $i t$ to be my duty to notice it further than by requesting Miss Scantlebury, the teacher, to give me-as soon as she should have the number of pupils required by law to censtitute a school upon her roll-notice of the fact, to the end that it might be duly visited by me. $I^{"}$ :ss Scantlebury says that the average daily attendence on the six months during which she has kept the school open, has been 15. She further says, that the children who attend are very repectable, and also that she believes a sufficient namber to constitute a school according to law, would attend, if a room to teach in were taken in a more respectable quarter, and where some proper out-door conveniencés could be secured for the soholars.

Pursuant to instructions, I have visited the different places of trade in King's County engaged in the prosecation of the Fisheries, and have obtained the statistical information in the accompanying return.

\section*{APPENDIX (Q.)}

The small quantities of Fish taken at the places of trade in the Southern section of the County may be attributed to the proximity of that part of the Island to Pictou, owing to which the actual catchers take their Fish to that Market, in large boats, in quantities varying from twenty to sixty quintals.

You will perceive that the catch of Fish for the past Summer was much below an average, which circumstance, as far as I can learn, was solely owing to the unusual scarcity of the Fish last summer.

The quantity of Oil made at the establishment of J. Knight, Esq., in 1858, being 1730 gallons, which would be nearly at the rate of two gallons for every three quintals of Fish, may be taken as an average proportion, and is worth about 4 s per gallon.

The establishments on Lot 56 are yet in their infancy, that of McAulay \& Johnson being one year founded and that of Robert Howlett in the course of erection.

If there was any necessity for a second office or if the population was extensive, I would not take the liberty to name the matter to you, but as it is likely some addition will be made to the number where they are required it is a pity to curtinue any unnecessary expence on the department.

Report of Leo McDonald, Preventive Officer, regarding American Vessels refusing to pay Anchorage Duties.

\section*{TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.}

May it please Your Excellenct,
Having lately had a cruise to New London and Malpeque to ascertain how the American Fishermen comply with the Port regulations in paying Light and Anchorage Duty, I have to report to your Excellency that there is a likelihood of a large falling off in that part of the Revenue this season.
The Harbour Masters at both those places, complain that the most of the American, and many of the Nora Scotia men give them no satisfaction and it is impossible to put the law in force against them for they generally come into the Harbours in large numbers and are of a very lavless disposition.
In July last William McKay, Iight Daty Collector at Malpeque, seized an American Vessel and brought her up to Princetown Wharf but before he had got her secured she was rescued from him by several boats from the fleet, McKay and his crew were glad to beg their lives from them and say no more about it. Such is the conduct of the fishermen in general, and from my observations, it is my candid opinion that until there is an efficient Cutter employed to collect these dues our Revenue must abide by the loss.
I here subjoin a list of vessels that refused to pay, those names were taken in July.

\section*{TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.}

Sir, - In your despatch of the 8th inst., you wished to be acquainted with the particulars about the seizure of the American Schooner Atlanta, of Freemont. There being about 1 C .0 sail of Schooners in the Harbour, I hired four men in the boat, and as soon as they seen me coming the boats left this tessel, and all the reply that I got was, the Captain was not on board, so I peen I might as well leave them; and I rowed down to the Eastern end of the Harbour, near the entrance, and boarded the said Schooner Atlanta, and enquired for the Captain. There was a man walking the deck; and he told me, that he was the Captain. I asked him if he had paid the Light and Anchorage duty in any Port on the Island. He told me they was in no Port; so I told him I was the Collector, and he would have to pay it. He told me then that the Captain mas ashore, sick down at the East Point; and he began to give me abusive language. I asked him who brought the vessel here. He said it was him. He stated that it was no law. I demanded his papers as he would not tell me his neme; kut he said that he had none ; and then I told him his vessel was liable for seizure, when he gave nothing but threatening language. So I told him if he had charge of the ressel he must be the master, even if the Captain was ashore. He said he brought her up here. I told him I had heard plenty of yarns of that sort, and if he would not show me his papers or pay his duty, I would make a seizure of his vessel. He stated that I could not. So I called my men out of my boat, and I made a seizure of the Schooner Atlanta, of Freemont, of the turthen of about 60 tons, under the seventh clause of the Light and Anchorage Laws. So I had to get her under way to take her to a place of safety, and run her round to Princetown, on the 24th day of July, the forenoon. So the Captain was hailing all the rest of the fleet; so he jumped into his boat, leaving some hands on board. I got round safe to the Town, intending to put some men on board to keep everything secure until I got further advice; but a boat came up between Indian Island and the Town, and came on board for war. So I told them all I wanted was for them to pay the duty ; but they seemed more inclined to murder us then do that, and we had to quit the vessel as quick as possible. They got her under way and went down again, and I never seen anything of them since; and it is an utter impossibility to collect from them without there is some other mode adopted, for they will not payit; and I wasamongst 100 sail of them one day, and all I collected was 15s. They tell you the Captain is not on board which I knew to my knowledge they are, as they never lowered their boats from the stern of the vessels. That is all the particulars referring to the seizure,

The crews are as bad as the Captains, for they have to stand their share, and they lay out to baffle the Collectors off. I have been on board of vessels that was in Cascumpec, and would not p:ty it chere nor here ; and their conduct in general is everything but satisfactory., for they came ashore anil tear down people's fences, kill geese, break open doors and barns, and the people has to keep quite; for it is quite unsafe to be on the roads after night or even on the Sabbath day, as they carry about guns, fring them often.

\(\mathrm{Sin},-\mathrm{I}\) beg leave respectfully to report to you for the information of the Government, that on Thursilay last, the 25 th of November, three criminals confined in St. Eleanor's Jail, viz:William McFadyen, William Henderson and Clement Thebedoux, effected their escape, by undermining and removing the lower ends of the Posts of a portion of the Jail fence which was quite rotten and insecure. Every exertion was made during two days after the escape to recapture the above parties, but without success. I deem it my duty to report the above through you, to the Government, and to call their attention to the unsafe and decayed condition of the Jail fences.

\section*{Report of Leo McDonald, Preventive Officer.}

To His Excellency the Liedtenant Governor in Couxcil.
May it please your Excellency.
As a Preventive Officer for this Islaud, I beg leave to lay before your Excellency a few observations which came under my notice, as to the extent of illicittrade, carried on in different parts of the Island during the past season.

In July last, I seized on the road near the Head of St. Peter's Bay, two horseloads of smuggled goods, belonging to John McIntyre and others. They informed me that they landed them near the East Point, from a vessel from St. Pierre's; but refused to give up the name of the vessel. A short time after, Lauchlin Gillis, Preventive Officer, on Township 44, seized in the night, three casks of liquor, and some other goods, which had just been landed there. But the owners of the goods beat Mr. Gillis, and rescued all from him, but one cask of Gin, which he held on by till daylight, at the risk of his life, when he had it removed.

In the month of August, I seized in this Port, on board the Schooner "Odessa," Samuel Mutch, Master, from Sydney, Cape Breton, one cask Port Wine, which I disposed of according to law.

In September, I had a tour to New London and Malpeque, there does not appear to me to be much illicit trade carried on about those Ports, except what may be done by the American fishermen when they arrive at those places. But the Collectors of Aachorage Duties, complained of the difficulty of collecting the Harbour Dues, from the Americas fishing vessels, particulars of which I laid before your Excellency in a former Euport.

On the 27 th November last, I had the deposition of John Collman, Seaman, taken before Peter Macgowan, Esquire, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for Queen's County. He stated, that during the past summer, lie made three voyages from St. Pierre's to this Island, on board the Schooner "Challange," of Souris, Roderick Macdonald, Master ; that there was large quantities of liquor and other goods, illicitly landed from said vessel on her rifurn to this Island on each of her voyages. They always landed secretly and in the night, and before the vessel came into Port. Acting upon the Attorney Generals instructions, I proceeded immediately to Souris, with the intention of seizing the Schr. "Challenge," which was then on her last fall trip to St. Pierre's ; but rumours got afloat amongstMcDonald'sfriends as to my intentions. However, a few days after the Schr. "Challange" appeared at anchor in Colville Bay, it being head wind for her to get into Souris Harbour; and it appeared to me that McDonald was immediately warned of bis danger, for he remained on board all day, but went ashore after dark to consult his friends, and no doubt conscious of his own guilt, came to the conclusion that his only course to save himself and vessel was to leave the Island immediately, which he did early
on the following morning, the 10th December, after landing seven or eight of his crew and supercargo, with their luggage, without making any report at the Custom House, and put to sea with only one boy to work his vessel ; his crew having refused to go with him. He has since laid up his vessel for the winter, in the Gut of Canso.

The Schooner "Challenge," made tbree voyages to St. Pierre"s, besides those accounted for by John Collman; and I feel convinced from my knowledge of the parties concerned in her trade, that there was an extensive illicit business carried on with her all summer. Besides there were several other vessels of a very suspicious character, trading from the Eastern part, of King's County, to St. Pierre's, and the United States.

By the many advantages of carrying on an illicit trade around the Island, and smugglars are generally well posted up in their business. It is my opinion that we must look upon the protection of the Revenue, as a bad job until there is an efficient, Cutter fitted out to guard the coast.

I have been pretty much engaged lateily looking after Distillery's, both in town and country. I find it to be a branch of business that requires to be sharply looked after to keep it within the limits of the law.

No objection being made thereto ; but by Neil Campbell, and all the sompensation be required, that the other occupier of the land through which the new line of 1 lioad leads, should fence, or cause as many poles to be put up, as far as it interfered with his farm, and to which proposition the said occupiers acquiesced in. Ind, also, it is our opinion, that J. E. S. Bagnall, is entitled to the sum of five pounds, as is compensation for the old Road being shut up. \section*{Most Respecteully Sieweth.}

That your Petitioners having been informed, that a Commission were appointed by your Honorable Board, to report upon the practibility of altering the line of Road from Grand or Ellis River to Port Hill. Also the present position of the said Grand or Ellis River Ferry; and that said Commission reported in favour of said alteration.

That your Petitioners deem such an alteration as that contemplated, one of gross injustice to the travelling public, and but little advantage to a ferv individuals. That in the first place, the present position of the Ferry is the one most practicable in windy weather, which will be evidently seen on reference to the annexed plan. That when the wind is from the North and Northeast, and also Westwardly, the conveyance across the Ferry by Scows would be more easily accomplished at its present position than from the Sand Point to McKinnion's Point. That a Soow leaving the present Wharf at Lot 16, to cross with North or Eastwardly wind, it often occurs that IncKinnon's Point prevents her being driven up the River; whereas if she left the Sand Point on Lot 16 side, the place contemplated to cross to McKinnon's Point, she would inevitably be driven up the River. That on further reference, the same would apply to leaving the Lot 14 side, with the Black Point to leward on Lot 16 side.

That the present Road is good, and by a considerable distance the shortest in travelling, when compared with the contemplaced alteration as seen on the plan. That the alteration sought for increases the distance ; places a part of the Road through the swampy land, which would take both money and time to make it passable, and does not improve the convenience or utility of the Ferry.

That your Petitioners p:ay your Honorable Board to take the premises into your consideration, and disallow any interference with the present established Road and Ferry, which is most advantageous to Petitioners and the public in general.
