





Do not play in a manner liable to injure your opponent, either by kicking, pushing, charging violently or dangerously, or charging behind, or jumping at him, for the referee may think you did so intentionally, and penalize you for doing so, even to the extent of sending you to the club house. 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

Dr. Mawson's Bride Was Not Daunted When He Despaired for His Safety

Memories of the Antarctic horror are revived by the return to England of Dr. Mawson, the young Australian explorer, whose solitary journey over the snow and ice drifts early last year has been described by Sir Ernest Shackleton as "without parallel as a feat of human endurance." Dr. Mawson, who declares that his life was saved by the disaster of just missing peat it aloud. his ship, the Aurora, was welcomed at Victoria Station, London, by Sir Ernest, with the simple greeting, "How do, Mawson?" Dr. Mawson was accompanied by his wife, a tall handsome lady, who is making her visit to England under peculiarly romantic circumstances. It will be recalled that, while despairing of his safety in the blizzard-beaten tracks of the Antarctic, Dr Mawson cabled to the one who had promised to be his wife that she had better give him up, but this she refused to do, being content to wait and still cherish that love which has now won its reward. Dr. Mawson married the good lady before leaving Melbourne, and the happy couple are now spending their honeymoon in

Blessing in Disguise

In response to inquiries as to whe ther he had recovered from the effects of his terrible thirty days' struggle against cold and starvation after the death of his two companions, Dr.

Mawson replied: "I am pretty right TANGO OR HUSBAND, now, but not quite the same man again yet." In an interview with a special correspondent of Reuter's Agency, who travelled to England reached his base. "I had only a couple pounds of food left," he said. 
