LONDON, MAY 7 .-- 5 P.M. -- THE LUSITANIA WAS SUNK OFF OLD HEAD, KINSALE BY A TORPEDO. ASSISTANCE HAS BEEN SENT TO HER.

The Cunard Line officials would only admit this afternoon that they had received a despatch from London that the Lusitania had been torpedoed at 2 o'clock this morning off Kinsale and had sunk thirty minutes later. Kinsale, off which the Lusitana was torpedoed, is a seaport of Ireland, 13 miles southwest of Cork. It lies near the entrance of St. George's channel, between Ireland and England, through which transatlantic vessels pass on their way to Liverpool.

NEW YORK, May 7 .- The New York office of the Cunard Line announced this afternoon that the Lusitania had been sunk.

The Lusitania sailed last Saturday from N ew York and is due in Liverpool to-day. When the Lusitania sailed she had aboard 1,310 passengers. Some nervousness had been caused because of the publication in the morning papers of Saturday of an advertisement warning intending travellers that a state of war existed between Germany and Great Britain and her allies; that the zone of war includes the waters adjacent to the British Isles, that in accordance with notice given by the German Government vessels flying the flag of Gr eat Britain are liable to destruction in those waters, and that travelers sailing in the war zone on ships of Grat Britain or her allies do so at their own risk. This advertisement was signed "Imperial German Embassy." The warning apparently did not cause any cancellations, for the ship sailed with a very full passenger list. Charles P. Sumner, general agent of the Cunard Line, was at the pier and in a statement made then said that the voyage of the Lusitania would not be attended by any risk whatever, as the liner had a speed of twenty-five and a half knots and was provided with unusually water-tight bulkheads.

LONDON, May 7, 5.50 p.m.-The manager of the Cunard Company has informed the Liverpool Evening Express that he received this after noon the following message from the wireless station at Old Head, Kinsale:

"The Lusitania was sunk by a submarine at 2.33 this afternoon, eight miles south by west of this point.

"It is believed that her passengers are safe. No details of how they may have been rescued, however, are at hand. One message received here says:

"It is not known how many of the Lusitania's passengers were saved."







CANADA'S CENTURY. The United States Census Bureau has just announced that the population of that country has just passed the one hundred million mark. In population the United States follows the British Empire, China and Russia. The British Empire has about 425,000,000, China an estimated population at from 350,000,000 to 400,000,000, while Russia has a population of 160,000,000. As a self-contained country only China, Russia and India have larger populations than the United States.

A century ago, as the Montreal Journal of Commerce very aptly points out, the United States had a population of about eight millionsthe same as Canada has at the present time. During the past hundred year the United States was the Mecca for the land-hungry of Europe, which with the natural increase of her owr people, brought up the total number of inhabitants to the present proportions. It is only reasonable to expect that Canada will duplicate this record in the twentieth century. There is now a greater scarcity of free land than was the case when the United States was settled, and, as a matter of fact, Canada possesses almost the last free lands in the world. After the war we may expect to find millions of people turning their eyes in our direction, and our population should increase faster than did that of the United States, not only because we possess the last great wheat-growing area, but because means of transportation make it much easier to get on to the land than was the case fifty or one hundred years ago. To-day the emigrant from continental Europe is carried without hardships or inconveniences from his old home to a prairie farm. A century ago such a journey was fraught with untold difficulties and required almost superhuman courage. The pessimists who believe that Canada is not making rapid progress should look back and remember that one hundred years ago the United States was occupying a far less favorable position than Canada occupies to-day.
