# Prohibition Passes Second Reading by Unanimous Vote of the House.

HALIFAX, February 25—H. W. Corning's Bill to Amend the Nova Scotia Temperance Act, so as to make the City of Halifax prohibition territory, was given its second reading at yesterday's meeting of the Legislative Assembly with but little discussion and without division, and was referred to the Committee on Law Amendments.

The interest of the public in the proposal to make Halifax a prohibition city was evidenced by the unusually large number of visitors who filled the galleries and the seats on the floor of the Assembly, to follow the expected debate.

Mr. Corning moved the second reading in a brief but earnest and strave htforward speech. Having already dealt fully with the subject of ten perance reform in the debate on the address, he felt that it was una cessary for him to repeat the arguments which rendered the adoption of prohibition in Halifax city so ungent at the present time. He felt it to be his duty to introduce the "Halifax amendment" to be Nova Scotia Temperance Act, as soon as Premier Murray had declared that the Government did not intend to bring down such a neasure on its own bebalt. Referring to Mr. Ralston's appeal to the members, on the first day of the present session, to join hands for the cause of Empire, Mr. Corning appealed to his fellow members to respond to the patriotic sentiments of the member for Cumberland, by giving a unanimous vote for the second red ling of the Bill, and co-operating to enact it into law before the 15th day of March. He expressed the conviction that, in adopting such a course, they would be responding to the overwhelding sentiment of the Province, and at the same time they woul perform a real service, not only to the city of Halifax and the Province of Nova Scotia, but also to the Empire to which we re all so proud to belong.

Mr. Corning reminded the House that there was to be a meeting of the Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance in Halifax on the 16th of next month, when the members of thit body hoped and believed the Legislature would be found to have followed the wishes of the great majority of the people, in eacting a prohibition law that would be operative in Halifax as in other parts of the Province. "Let us not fail the members of the Alliance in this matter," said the member for Yarmuoth, "and let us act promptly and unitedly in placing this law on the statute books, so that, when that meeting takes place, it may be to celebrate "prohibition day" for the Province of Nova Scotia"

Mr. Corning concluded with an appeal to the House to al-

Mr. Corning concluded with an appeal to the House to allow the Bill to be sent to the Committee of Law Amendment without division.

Hon. G. E. Faulkner said that he would not raise any objection to the Bill at this stage, but took the opportunity to say that the fact that it was being referred to the Committee without a division did not mean that all the members favored

Mr. Finn took practically the same stand. To voting for the second reading in order to get the Bill into committee, he would hold himself free, and so would other members of the House, to vote for or against it according to their judgment at a later stage. He expressed the hope that both sides would have on opportunity to be heard by the committee before the matter was finally disposed off.

Hon. Mr. Murray made a similar statement. While he favored the sending of the Bill to the Committee, he wished it to be understood that discussion could take place later on the principle of the measure

The motion was accordingly carried by the unanimous

The motion was accordingly carried by the unanimous vote of the House As soon as the speaker declared the motion carried, Mr. Corning rose and led in the singing of the national anthem. Immediately all the members and visitors in the galleries rose to their feet and the strains of the national anthem were sung with such heartiness by members of the House and the spectators present that it could be heard far beyond the confines of the building.
