Merchants' Day.

Wolfville merchants have arranged to make Tuesday of next week a special bargain day for their patrons. A detailed announcement of bargains offered appears on our first page this week.

The New York Mail and Express says: "Canada's coal system represents an investment of \$87,571,948, and a similar per capita enterprise would require an outlay of more than \$1,000,000,000."

The Manitoba election held on Thursday last resulted in the overthrow of Premier Greenway's Government. Two of the five cabinet officers were defeated.

A Child's History of Canada has just issued from the press written by Miss McNeill. The book is divided into four sections. The first comes down to the 16th century and the last closes the little work to the end of the 19th.

The Halifax Chronicle was sold on Tuesday, Dec. 6th, the purchaser being George E. Faulkner, who is considered as setting for B. F. Peason, of Halifax, and others. The Chronicle was founded 30 years ago by Hon. William Anson, of the late Premier's cabinet.

The Christmas number of the Windsor Magazine has reached our table. It is a splendid issue filled with beautiful illustrations and interesting reading. It is accompanied by a supplement in the shape of the brilliant novel "Mysterium Mr. Sabon," by F. Phillips Opperheim.

The Department of Island Revenue has issued a circular to all medical practitioners in Canada inviting their cooperation in the detection of adulteration in canned goods. The circular says: "The attention of the department has been called to the frequency with which illness attributed to the use of canned goods is mentioned in the daily papers."

A much-debated question is whether or not our universities are not producing more graduates than the various professions can employ. This will be discussed in three articles to be issued by The Youth's Companion, one from the point of view of the applied sciences, by Prof. Henry Horton, of the Stevens Institute of Technology; one from the point of view of a lawyer, by Prof. Isaac Rankin Russell, of the New York University Law School; and another on the question in the general aspects, by President J. B. Angell, of the University of Michigan.

The students of Dalhousie Law School, Halifax, gave a dinner at the Halifax Hotel on Wednesday evening which was a brilliant affair. Judges of the supreme court and leading members of the bar were among the guests, and representatives were present from other colleges. Acadia was represented by Mr. M. G. McNeil, who responded to the toast to "Slater Universities."

The Cornell University register for 1899-1900 would seem to show that Ezra Cornell's desire had been gratified. He said "I would found an institution where any person can find instruction in any study," and with its Academic Department, college of Agriculture, medicine, forestry, architecture, civil and mechanical engineering and veterinary sciences, Cornell is just such an institution.

A Maritime College of Agriculture.

The proposition made by the members of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick governments to establish a Maritime Agricultural College, to include technical training in agriculture, horticulture, mining, civil engineering, etc., appears to be a most progressive and commendable scheme. P. E. I. has also been invited to cooperate, and it is hoped will accept. The matter of location will be perhaps one of the most difficult to decide on.

We take it for granted that as the government of Nova Scotia had made arrangements last winter to amalgamate the Schools of Agriculture and Horticulture which we now have, and purchase a new farm upon which to locate a provincial college, that the larger institution will still be in this province. If the three provinces carry out the idea of location indicated by the agricultural committee to our government, and establish it on a model farm in that part of the province best adapted naturally and by environment, for the successful operation of such a school and farm, we hold that there can be no possible question as to which county in this province is entitled to its location.

We observed an account this week of some individual farmers in Kings taking \$5,000 for apples, \$1,400 for potatoes, in addition to the income from a large stock of dairy or beef cattle. This cannot be duplicated in any other county in the Maritime Provinces.

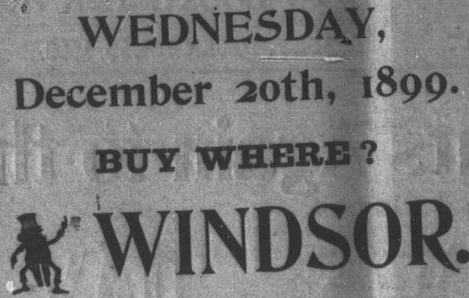
