Pastor Invents Drama.
REV. A. T. KEMPTON, OF CAMBRIDGE, MASS STAGE SETTINGS, IMPRESSIONS, AND ALL CHARACTERS HIMSELF.
(Boston Post, January 31, 1914.)
The dramatized sermon has come to the Broadway Baptist Church, Cambridge. The minister, the Rev. A. T. Kempton, student of practical theology and devotee of dramatic work, now writes his sermons in dramatic form, assisted by his wife, and presents them with all the proper electrical effects, impressing all the characters himself.
With a white sheeted operating table in place of the church pulpit, and surrounded by a complete stage setting representing a physician's office, the Rev. Mr. Kempton will present tomorrow night his second dramatic sermon entitled, 'The Fight for Life'—INVENTED DRAMA SERMON.
For some time past the ministers of Cambridge have faced a steady decline in their Sunday night congregations. Several churches have been closed temporarily, others have combined with stronger churches.
Observing the signs of the times the Rev. Mr. Kempton, of the Broadway Baptist Church, Cambridge, started months ago to study the problem. The result is the drama sermon, which is believed to be the greatest innovation in preaching since Charles Sheldon drew crowds to his church with a series of story sermons, afterwards printed as the novel, 'The Hired Man'.
Last Sunday the dramatized sermon presented his first drama. It was entitled 'How John Hunter Spent His Last Sunday Evening of the Old Year.' The pulpit and rail about the rostrum had been removed. The platform was a stage representing the cosy den in John Hunter's home. The steropticon in the gallery served as a spot or shadow light.
The church was dark. Only the stage was lighted. The choir on an outside stairway sang as Hunter heard the church choir next door to his home. Everything was complete even to the booming of the chimes as the playlet scene reached its dramatic climax at the dying of the old year.
HEARD HIS FIRST ADDRESS.
Last night Mr. Kempton said that when he came out on the platform he was more afraid than he had ever been before. His audience was more than double the usual Sunday night number and he feared that his lesson would not be taken seriously. Before he was through there were people in tears.
Tomorrow night Mr. Kempton will appear as Dr. John Ross in his office. Three patients, a man who is the head of a boys' school, a boy who is rapidly growing blind, and a disolute man who turns out to be the father of the boy, consult the doctor.
On the pupil-stage will be a desk, telephone, fireplace and other furniture. At one side will be the operating table, with a drop light shining on it. X ray photographs, microscopes and blood test slides will lend reality. They are used in showing the father of the little blind boy the hopeless nature of his ailment.

\$100,000 for Acadia College.
THE BEQUEST WAS MADE BY MISS MARY CRAMP.
The Maritime Baptist last week contained an appreciation of Miss Mary Cramp, by Rev. Joseph Sullivan, D.D. Miss Cramp, died on December 14th, last. She was a daughter of the late R. v. J. M. Cramp, D.D., who in 1851 was appointed President of Acadia College and rendered that great Baptist educational institution, and the denomination, years of valuable service. A brother of Miss Cramp was the late Mr. George B. Cramp, K.C., one of the best known lawyers in Montreal.
Dr. Sullivan says: 'Miss Cramp was a devoted Christian woman; a loyal, because an intelligent and well-informed Baptist; she loved the House of God and the place where prayer was wont to be made. When her health permitted she regularly attended the Sunday service and the mid-week meeting for prayer in Olivet Baptist Church. During her long illness it was my privilege to minister to her. She was most courteous in her acknowledgment of the slightest service rendered to her.
'In the bestowal of a considerable fortune she and her brother, roomed based their servants, made provision for their relatives, for mission work, and for the hospital in which they were interested, \$100,000 being left to the Maritime Hospital and \$100,000 to the Montreal General Hospital. McGill University was left something over \$100,000, Acadia College, we are glad to state, received \$100,000. Both also left small legacies to Olivet Church as tokens of interest and esteem.'

PURITY
The advent of the steel pen dates back to about 100 years ago, when steel pens of the barred type—that is with the holder and pen in one piece—were made and sold for 20 cents, says The Bits.
To James Perry belongs the credit of bringing steel pens into general use. He began pen making in Manchester in 1819, and ultimately developed the pen trade in London by the prominent Birmingham makers, Mitchell, Gilliot and Mason caused a revolution in the trade by machine made pens.
The greatest improvement in the manufacture was the adoption of a 'recess hand press' for the cutting out of pens. By means of this process one man can cut as many as 42,000 blanks a day.
The shape is given to the blanks of course, by the dies in the types of pen. In fact, the metal pen which characterized the old fashioned goose quill pen.
This was remedied, however, by the side splits which we see in pens to day and for many years the method of slitting the pens by means of a press was kept secret by those famous pen makers, Gilliot and Mason.
Briefly, the method of manufacture is as follows: The blanks are pierced and the slits cut after which the pen requires to be softened by annealing. Then they are raised and hardened, scoured with acid, colored, varnished and dried, girls afterward looking over the pens through aside the faulty ones and packing the good ones into boxes ready for sale.
How the trade has grown may be gathered from the fact that in 1839 steel pens were not generally known, but in 1849 the trade was a leading Rand.

Editorial Notes.

The Nova Scotia Legislature will meet on Thursday, Feb. 19th.

'Reviver' and 'rotator' are said to be the longest words in the English language that spell backward and forward just alike.

The tremendous increase in the volume and value of the trade of the Dominion during the last year, as shown by the Government returns, cannot fail to create a most favorable impression, both in this country and in other parts of the world. The year which has been characterized by an unparalleled and world wide financial stringency, there should have been an increase in business over any previous year of upwards of \$12,000,000, is a fact that can only be regarded as indicating as clearly as possible the feeling of confidence which prevails in the people.

As indicating the rapidity with which the motor car is supplanting the horse, it is noted in the Board of Trade's London Traffic report that on a certain selected day in July of last year observations, taken at 99 points on the main roads leading out of London, disclosed the fact that of the total bulk of passenger traffic only 6 per cent was motor traffic, and only 6 per cent horse-drawn vehicles. This would seem to preface the rapid and total extinction of horse-drawn passenger traffic, in the course of a few years, in London, and what is true of London is rapidly becoming true of all large cities.

The big steamer lines under the British flag are rapidly growing bigger. The tonnage permit must now be awarded to the British India line, which has a fleet of 151 vessels aggregating 743,087 gross tons. Second comes the Elderline lines so-called, with 131 vessels of 598,123 gross tons. The famous P. & O. has fallen to third place. The lines with which we are most familiar are being passed by the great Oriental combinations. The White Star ranks fifth, the Furness Line sixth, and the Leyland ninth. The Cunarders hold the twelfth place, as they did last year. The swifter passenger service all appear to have been exceeded in the competition for the tonnage permits by fleets that do a long-distance freight business.

At a meeting of the Empire Club in Toronto the other day, Mr. C. C. James, a member of the Royal Commission on the high cost of living, in the course of an address, asked: 'Why do we have to ramble the world to feed ourselves in Toronto?' He cited Prince Edward Island as a place which knew nothing of the hard times experienced by the rest of Canada, and gave the reason for this happy state of affairs that in that province '54 per cent of the population is on land, while British Columbia which is feeling the pinch of hard times has 24 per cent of its population on the farms.' Mr. James urged that every theological college in the Dominion should provide special instruction in agricultural matters and that every minister of the gospel should know something of farming questions.

Much of the music given at the formal gatherings in the Zenier studio Sunday afternoons is new in character, so at least in this particular, familiarity is not the misapprehension of the popularity of these assemblies which have become a delightful feature in the local music world, many of the most gifted men and women of the city, vocalists and instrumentalists, being found there every week. Sunday afternoon was specially attractive, the host, himself opening the fine program with the following piano numbers: 'Soiree de Vienne, Nos. 4 to 6,' of Schubert-Liszt and 'Valse à Major,' of Moszkowski. He also played the accompaniments for the charming songs sung by Paul Roper, who first gave several Irish ballads by Thomas Moore, 'The Birthday of a King of Neidlinger,' and 'Benedict's Stream,' after which he was persuaded to sing again, Chaminade's 'Invocation,' and two selections from 'The Messiah,' being in strong contrast to the dainty melodies which showed the beauty and charm with which he could sing ballads, said to be among the most difficult songs to render perfectly, while in the grander selections his rich baritone voice astonished his hearers with its depth, range and quality. As a singer Mr. Roper has great art in phrasing and manner, and his fine enunciation allows no syllable to escape. This young artist is bound to have a career. Already his fame has gone abroad and he has been approached with regard to appearances with some of the leading musical organizations of the South for the May Festival season, and he is studying roles with Mr. Zenier. The beautiful program ended, a charming social time followed, Mr. Zenier inviting his guests into his library where a delicious menu was informally served: omelets with whipped cream, various kinds of sandwiches and cakes, 'chariot cup,' Charlotte russe, strawberries and mints. Not least among the attractions of these Sunday musicales is the rare charm of the rooms with their handsome Oriental rugs and furnishings from India, and various countries in the Orient and in Europe, as well as numerous exquisite antique pieces of the most celebrated cabinet makers in America, the library with its cases of rare books, paintings and cabinets of old china appealing most strongly to some while the music specialist revels in two fine grand pianos in the lesson room.—The Charlottetown (N.C.) Evening Post.

Speaking at Winnipeg in 1904, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said:—'When the Liberal party are in power they will at once give a measure of freedom of trade, and step by step they will follow it up, and if God spares our lives we shall progress steadily until we have it as full as Great Britain has it. I come before you tonight to preach to you this new gospel of Free Trade. I denounce to you the policy of protection as bond age, yea bondage, and I refer to it as bondage in the same way as American slavery was bondage. Sir, our policy is freedom of trade such as exist in England, such as is practiced in Great Britain.'

Two years later Sir Wilfrid stated in a letter the following:—'Whether a policy of absolute freedom of trade would or would not be injurious to the manufacturing industries of this country is a question on which I will not stop to discuss here. There is no occasion for such a discussion, as the intention of the liberal party is not and never was to establish Free Trade in this country.'
