Regular Meeting Town Council

An Annual Tax of \$5.00 Will be Levied on Every Sewerage Connection.

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held on Thursday evening January 15th. Mayor Doyle presided; and Ald. Ritchie was the only absentee.

A telegram from Sackville and a letter from Sussex was read urging the town to send a representative to attend a meeting of the Public Utilities at St. John on Jan. 21st. Ald. Durick was appointed such representative.

A letter from the School Board asking the support of the Council in an appreciation to the Legislature for authority to issue \$35,000 was read; and on motion the matter was allowed to lie over till next meeting.

Pursuant to notice it was moved by Ald. Crocker seconded by Ald. Durick, and carried: That By-law No. 21 be amended by striking out Section No. 22 thereof and substituting thereof the following:—

"That any person or persons wishing to make an entrance into any sewer shall pay an entrance fee of \$2.00 and cost of pipe and laying of same, an annual tax of \$5.00 per year shall be assessed and levied on every sewerage connection. An annual tax of \$2.00 per year shall be assessed and levied on every building lot of one hundred feet frontage or less bordering on any street in the said town along which a sewer has been laid.

The police situation was discussed but no action was taken.
The Mayor suggested that the Council consider some means towards improving our roads and sidewalks and after discussion it was moved by Ald. Durick, seconded by Ald. Russell and carried, that the Public Works Com. be authorized to get opinions on the best mode of building roads with approximate cost of constructing same and have them ready to present to the people at the election in April next.
Adjourned.

Explanation For The High Price Of Clothing

London, Jan 26—The central profecting committee had an explanation given it of the exorbitant clothing charges. In giving evidence, Mr MacKinder said that the Yorkshire spinners wool profits ranged from four hundred to thirty-two hundred per cent, over the war office profit allowed on yarn. Sydney Webb said that when the report of the committee on worsted yarns was issued and the public got to know that actual facts from the firm's books of the profits made by the worsted spinners and other sections the trade would be executed. What was happening in worsted yarns was happening in cotton and white metals.

More Insurance Paid Than in Year Of The Explosion

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 26—Insurance companies doing business in Halifax have given notice of an advance in rates, basing their demands upon the facts that Halifax is in danger of a conflagration because of unsatisfactory conditions affecting water supply wiring, and buildings. Recommendations of the National Board of Underwriters in 1915 have not been carried out by the civic authorities and six million gallons of water are wasted every day. More striking of all is the statement that the per capita loss in Halifax during 1919 was ten dollars a head as against three dollars per capita in Canada and the amount paid out in insurance losses during the year was \$800,000 greater than the year of the explosion. The present year has been equally disastrous and to date the insurance losses have been \$150,000. The advance will be twenty-five per cent on mercantile risks.

ROMANTIC OLD EMPIRE

AUSTRIA BROKEN ASUNDER BY PEACE PACT.

History of the Country Was That of the Hapsburg Dynasty and Austria Was Never a Nation in the Modern Sense of That Word—The Rise and Fall of the Holy Roman Empire.

THE handing over of the peace treaty to the Austrian delegates at St. Germain—have marked the end of what was perhaps the proudest and most romantic of modern empires. Unlike modern Germany, the loyalty with which Austria inspired its subjects and partisans did not lean on a superior material grandeur and technical organization but on a sentimental background of historical memories and associations. Austria was the successor of the Holy Roman Empire—that is, the successor of a fiction, the supreme political anachronism in the twentieth century.

Austria has never been a nation. It begins in the ninth century as a military frontier of the Frankish Empire; it became later the family estate, first of the Babenbergs, then of the Hapsburgs. In the first half of the seventeenth century it was the armed camp of counter reformation of militant Catholicism; in the second half the standard bearer of Christian Europe against the Turk; in the first half of the nineteenth century, the spirit behind the Holy Alliance; in the last fifty years the outpost of German militarism on its road to Constantinople. But it has never been a nation, rather, its existence was a negation of the national idea, and it was the victory of the principle of nationality, also called the self-determination of peoples, which sealed its fate.

The history of Austria is the history of the Hapsburgs. The Babenbergs, who in the tenth century received the "Ostmark," or Eastern margravate, of Bavaria as a fief from Emperor Otto the Great, built up, in the struggles of three centuries, the nucleus of the Austrian state merely to prepare the way for the advent of the Hapsburgs. Austrian history begins in 1282 when Rudolf, the first Hapsburg emperor, installed his sons Rudolf and Albert as dukes of Austria and Styria.

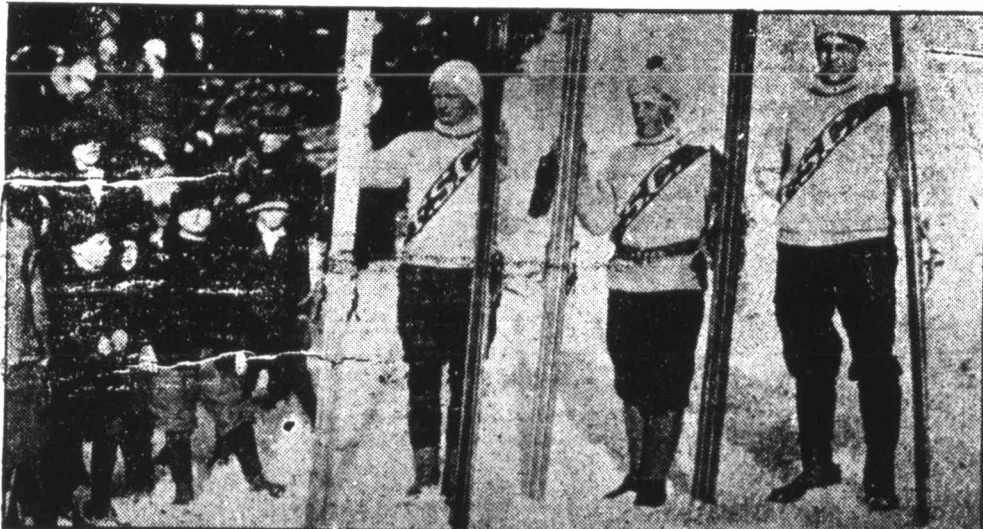

Top of the World Carnival



Banff is to have an elaborate winter carnival this year, and will be on foot from February 2nd to the fourteenth inclusive. Situated as it is in the Canadian Pacific Rockies and surrounded by the grandeur of Tunnel Mountain, Rundle Mountain, and Sulphur Mountain, Banff, the national resort, is fast becoming the centre of winter sport in Canada, as Christiansia in Norway. It is a perfect winter playground with its natural mountain slides and ideal skings. The preparations for the carnival this year are on a larger and broader scale than previous years; the aim being to make Banff attractive in winter as it is in the summer. In one aspect the visitor will find combined summer and winter amusement in the hot sulphur springs, which give one the privilege of swimming out in the open with the thermometer above or even below zero, in not tepid but warm water.

The spirit of the carnival will again have full sway throughout the town, and those who arrive at night will find themselves in a veritable fairyland. Colored lights are to be strung across the streets, down the famous toboggan slide, and on the rinks in thousands giving a great gala effect.

The list of amusements is a long one. There are hockey and curling matches, toboggan races, snowshoe and ski races. The ski jumping this year promises to be one of the big events, for a new jump has been built costing several hundred dollars, and some of the best skiers in Canada will take part in the competitions. The Foxey ski races are on the programme, and will doubtless create much excitement. Snow shoe tramps have been planned and lunch will be served at the game warden's cabin. Those exhilarating tramps are conducted by men who know every inch of the country. The carnival will be just one continued round of safety and anyone who imagines the world in the mountains to be dead in the winter will have a pleasant sur-



prise. Rivers, brooks, cascades and falls are all pursuing their merry course, as in the summer except in a few occasional spots. The animals are not huddled up inside their burrows or seeking shelter away from the wind, but roam about as in summer. The carnival will be opened by the Superintendent of the National Park, and a special programme has been arranged for each day and will conclude with a snowed ball and distribution of prizes. There are three comfortable hotels which remain open throughout the winter. The carnival and bonspiel at Banff are becoming amongst the most important and widely known events of the Canadian Winter, and will attract thousands to see "The Top of the World" in the winter. Nature is at her best at this time of the year. Instead of being dead Banff will be very much alive.

The Proposal To Close The Straits Of Belle Isle

W. Hyndman, Charlottetown, P. E. I., has written the local press as follows: I am satisfied that no sane man having a personal knowledge of the conditions existing in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Straits of Belle Isle would for one moment give favorable support to the proposal to close the Straits of Belle Isle, and thereby to cause a great change in climatic conditions in the Maritime Provinces.

Some years ago, when I was an assistant in the hydrographic survey of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Newfoundland, working under the British Hydrographic Department, I spent two summers in the Straits of Belle Isle surveying those straits and the adjacent coasts of Labrador and Newfoundland. During those two seasons recording the currents of the straits our particular attention was given to and the action of this Arctic current.

We found that the flow of water from the River St. Lawrence, the Miramichi, and other rivers emptying into the gulf caused a continuous flow of the Straits of Belle Isle to be out to the Atlantic, and there was no current coming in. The consequence was that there was no flow of ice from the Arctic currents inwards through the straits, and in those two summers we only saw two small icebergs enter the straits, and they were driven by a heavy easterly gale which lasted three or four days. The fact is that the Arctic current which comes down along the Labrador coast and east coast of Newfoundland is so wide, deep, and swift that it pays no attention to the Straits of Belle Isle; besides the constant outflow of water from the gulf to the Atlantic prevents it having any effect.

To close the Straits of Belle Isle, would, in my opinion, have a disastrous effect upon the climate and inhabitants of the gulf coasts and Prince Edward Island. The ice of the northern part of the gulf is now carried out with the outgoing current of the straits, which, if closed, would remain in the gulf until late in the summer, and have an exceedingly bad influence upon the farming portions of those coasts. The Gulf stream which passes eastbound some 120 miles south of Nova Scotia and Newfoundland would not be affected in the slightest degree by the closing of the Straits of Belle Isle.

I sincerely trust that before the Canadian Government take any steps such as have been recommended, it will consult the British Hydrographic Office in London, where I am satisfied my contentions will be fully upheld.

Forty-One Years at the Throttle

Forty-one years of continuous service as locomotive engineer without one accident to mar his work is the remarkable record established by Mr. Lew Patrick of Revelstoke, B. C., and previous to October 31, 1919, an engineer operating trains out of Revelstoke on the mountain division of the Canadian Pacific Railway main line.

Mr. Patrick's record is one that it will be hard to duplicate. He is a man still hale and hearty and in full enjoyment of his strength and faculties but has decided to take a rest from the long strain of his railroad duties.

He is one of the pioneers who came west with the railroad and developed as it developed. Starting with the Canadian Pacific at St. Boniface Manitoba, when a young man of twenty-five years of age he passed successfully through the occupations of brakeman, conductor, fireman, and engineer during the first year of his service. His first engine was one of the old, wood-burner type and he has seen railway motive power develop from that stage through coal burners of various grades to the latest type of oil-burning mogul. As engines developed Mr. Patrick kept pace and operated them as fast as they came.

He was working on construction trains in British Columbia, and was present at the summit when Lord Strathcona drove the last spike that linked the Atlantic with the Pacific ocean. Since then Mr. Patrick has been driving engines on the mountain sections. From June, 1896 to the spring of 1918 he was driver on the fast Imperial Limited passenger trains. On those alone he has carried tens of thousands of passengers in safety. Perhaps no one man in the service of the great railway company has carried more people than he has. Long before he retired from active service his reputation as the safest engineer of the whole country had gone abroad. People liked to know they were to be drawn by Lew Patrick, because it meant that the chances of accident had been reduced to the minimum. Though the Canadian Pacific Railway Company points with pride to its own wonderful record in protecting the lives of its passengers, and its own reputation in this regard has always been very high among railroad men and the travelling public, yet to know that Lew Patrick was at the throttle was added assurance to those who knew.

Mr. Patrick is an example of the splendid type developed by the railroad service. His duty to his company and his passengers was his governing influence. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company through the whole range of officials and employees, presiding to the new mountain line made in the record of his long service.

Mr. Patrick was born in South Berwick, N. B., and followed the same occupation until he went west to railroad. He was married in 1894, and has three children, Miss Jean and Mrs. Jean Patrick of Vancouver, and Mrs. E. Boyce of Calgary, Alberta.



Hospital Aid Society Meeting

The annual meeting of the Miramichi Hospital Aid was held in the Miramichi Hospital, Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock for usual business and election of officers. The President Mrs. L. H. MacLean in the chair. Owing to illness Mrs. C. Hayward, Secretary, was unable to be present. Mrs. W. F. Copp was appointed secretary pro-tem.

After conducting the usual business the president addressed the aid as follows:

Ladies and Members of the Aid: About one year ago we organized as a Ladies' Aid to the Miramichi Hospital and together we have worked to the end that all necessities for the hospital that we could provide, should be supplied. Not only so but we have organized branches in Chatham Millerton, Whitneyville and Blackville and enlisted scattered helpers in Bay du Vin and Hardwick, all of which are doing good work and assisting very materially excepting Blackville, which has suspended operations temporarily.

When the aid was organized, we found the hospital much in need of many things. To the supplying of these we have applied ourselves with a fair amount of energy and have been instrumental in supplying such things as mattresses, blankets, sheets, napkins, tray cloths, gowns, electric fixtures, china, flat silver, model doll for nurses training department, pantry supplies, etc.

Our showing for 1919 is indeed remarkable and especially so in view of the fact that this is our first year and some time was required to complete organization. All money has been gathered without any special effort being put forth by the membership as a whole, excepting a tea, during my absence in the fall. This speaks encouragingly for the future. We believe the old adage that "well begun is half done", hence we can confidently look forward, if each member plays the part, to even greater things in the future. For not only has the Aid provided the above material things, but it has also advertised and popularized the hospital in a degree that it has not been hitherto. Also by organizing auxiliaries in different localities of the country, it has assured a wider co-operation as well as a wider advertisement.

Much more can be done in extending this organization and the aid has thus demonstrated that it is quite capable of reaching out to the different parts of the county and together with the Board can handle and use satisfactorily all the available and possible support that can come from the county to the hospital.

It is therefore of the greatest importance that we maintain the Miramichi Hospital Aid at its greatest strength and most complete efficiency, letting nothing sidetrack us in our devotion to the hospital. This is the day of amalgamation and unifying of forces and it is our business to concentrate all our energies upon the aid, if we desire the real success of the Miramichi Hospital. The incoming officers no doubt will look after the future of the work, realizing, as no doubt they will, that this is very important to the existence and efficiency of the Aid.

Before retiring from the presidency of this Aid I wish to thank all those who have heartily co-operated with me in making the year such a proud success. Undoubtedly I might have been able to do more for the aid had not illness in my family called me to Philadelphia for so long a period in the fall.

In retiring let me ask you to give a whole-hearted support to the incoming president, aiding to the very best of your ability, that all things may be done decently in order and efficiency, forgetting every other thing in connection, but its success to the end for which it was formed. This hearty and sympathetic co-operation is of the utmost importance if we are to keep our forces together enlisting the best energy of the members.

I would specially mention the hearty co-operation given to me by our able and efficient secretary and treasurer, Mesdames C. Hayward and C. C. Hubbard, making my work easier and more satisfactory.

Thanking you again for the honor conferred on me a year ago as President, I would ask you now to proceed in the election of my successor and other officers of this society.

Mrs. MacLean's address which was earnest and impressive

A Fresh-water Seal.

The seal is a typical marine animal, and hence the occurrence of a species of phoca in Lake Baikal, which is of fresh water and has no connection with the sea, is of special interest. Dr. Charles Hose has obtained skins and skulls of two specimens of the Baikal seal, which have been offered to the Museum of Natural History, where the species have not hitherto been represented. It is the only seal which habitually lives in fresh water, though the common seal will often resort to estuaries, and even ascend rivers, as one did some time ago in the Trent, as far up as Hazleford, where it was shot. The Vikare seal, again common in the Arctic regions, and also found in the north of the Baltic, occurs in Lakes Ladoga and Onega. It is able, however, to reach these from the Baltic by means of the Rivers Neva and Svir. The Baikal seals, on the other hand, have no communication with the ocean. Their occurrences in Lake Baikal, along with abundant salmon, point to a change in the physical geography of the district. They suggest that in former times an arm of the sea stretched from the Arctic Ocean to the site of the present lake.—Family Herald.

An Elephant's Teeth.

The elephant has what a dentist calls "magazine gun teeth" because of the surplus teeth that when the big tusks wear off a front tooth is replaced by the one just behind it. 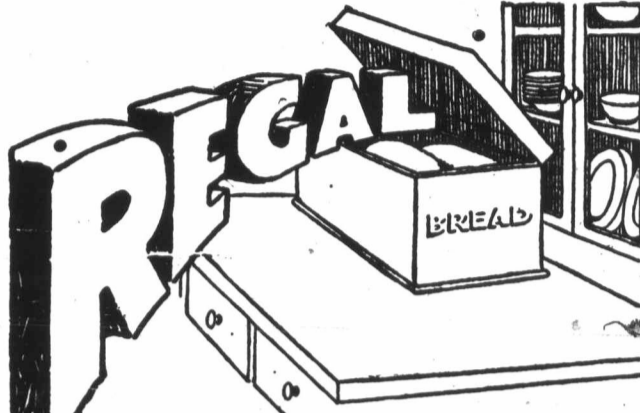

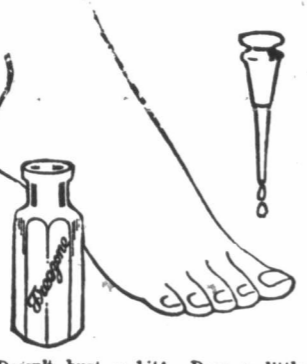

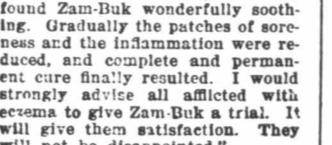
