"The purpose of the bill is to rob the electors of their liberties-to enable a minority of voters to elect a majority of parliamentary representatives. Why do the tory leaders insist upon forcing this odious measure - which every independent man and newspaper in this country has condemned - upon the attention of parliament while more important legislation is neglected. Should party measures have precedence over the regular work of parliament? The torry bosses say yes. But it is the duty of the reformers to resist to the utmost of their power all attempts on the part of the majority to stifle public opinion. If the tories persist in dropping measures of general importance in order to force a partizan gerrymandering scheme through parliament they will find their game thwarted. Let them drop their infamous project and allow the proper business of parliament to proceed.

HON. EDWARD BLAKE has been offered a seat in the Imperial parliament for an after spending the night and part of Sun-Irish constituency. He may not have been possessed of the requisite qualifications necessary to lead against an able tactician like Sir John McDonald, one who would stop at nothing to gain his ends, but in a purer atmosphere such as that at Westminister, Blake may find that position most suitable to him.

Mr. Blake's acceptance causes him to give up a law practice of \$25,000, but, perhaps, he may offset this by seeking admission to the English bar.

The offer is an honor to Canada and to her public men, and the hon. Mr. Blake will at once take an honorable position among the best parliamentary debators.

THE republicans have had their innings and have chosen Harrison as their presidential candidate. Next week the democrats hold a convention at Chicago when a choice will be made between Cleveland and Hill as the nominee for that party with the odds strongly in favor of Cleveland. Cleveland was thought to have been a good president when in that position having as many friends on this side the line as any former president. The contest will be watched closely here. The fight will be not man against man nor party against party, but protection versus reciprocity.
