I know that the people of Prince Edward Island are not going to come here many more years to ask to have these grievances remedied. Here is a grievance that could have been remedied by the payment out of the public treasury of a few dol lars of public money. The government could have got ten, fifteen or twenty boats to carry the mails over, but they were so near and parsimonious that they refused to employ any boat except the four five or six boats which they own themselves.
