

Diamonds that Dance.

Many people have been pazzled to understand why the diamonds worn in earrings by ladies nowadays maintain such a ceaseless quivering motion. It makes no difference that the head of the wear er is in perfect repose, and that she is even speechless, and, therefore, exerting no muscle of face or gem. The secret is in the setting of the diamond, and the method is a patent device. The patentee is reaping a royalty of \$50 apieco from every manufacturing jeweller to whom he sells the privilege of using it. The stone is set in the usual manner, except that the band, like the handle of a diminutive basket, is attached to the framework. On the under side of this band is a cup like cavity. On the lower part of the hoop is a projecting pin pointed with rhodium, a metal which never wears out-somewhat like the iridium with which golden pens are tipped. Now, when the diamonds are put in position on the hoop, the rhodium point projects into the cup. 




