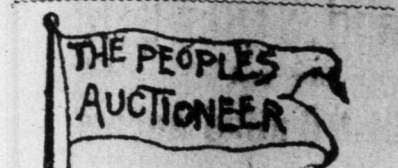

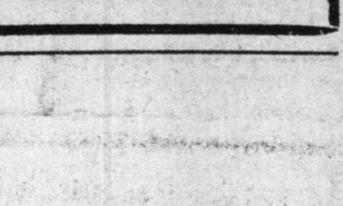

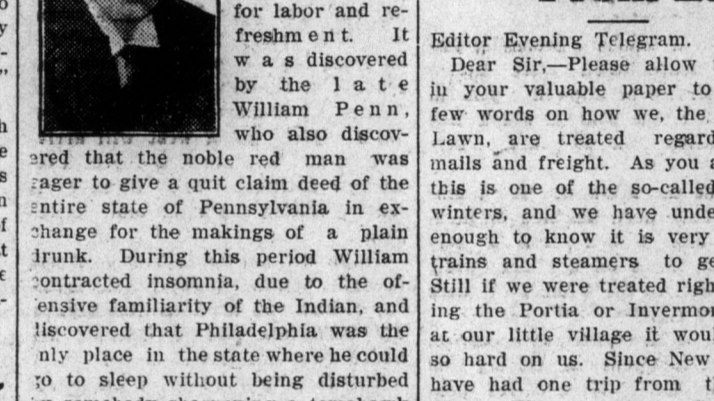

Household Notes.

To clean mirrors dip a piece of soft cloth into alcohol and rub lightly. When frying mush, dip the pieces first in white of egg to make them crisp. Emery powder and oil made into a paste is excellent to clean steel knives. Scissors will be found much more convenient for shredding lettuce than a knife. To heat the whites of eggs stiff, always have them cold and add a pinch of salt. Bananas and peanuts in combination make a tasty salad. Serve with mayonnaise. Prunes are greatly improved if a little cider is added to the water in which they are cooked. Open canned fruit or vegetables and pour into a dish several hours before they are served. A gas stove should be wiped off each time it is used and washed with turpentine once a week. Creamed cauliflower makes a dish as tasty as it is satisfying to the eye. To clean pewter, wash it with hot water, rub it with fine sand, and when dry, polish with leather. Tie a piece of lemon on a corn every night for five nights and it will generally cause it to drop out. To prevent eyeglasses "steaming" in cold weather, rub with vaseline and polish with a silk handkerchief. To iron embroidery, the iron should be applied on the wrong side and a thick ironing blanket used. If one needs a door stop and there is not one at hand, a large spool nailed in position will answer every purpose. To remove odor of fish or onions from the frying pan put in vinegar and heat until scalding and then wash out. Ink stains on handkerchiefs, etc., may often be soaked out in milk, but the sooner they are dealt with the better. If a piece of paraffine paper is wrapped around the knife blade it will cut butter without making it crumble. For creaming butter or butter and sugar, a perforated spoon will be found more convenient than a fork of the hand. A baker says that a cupful of liquid yeast is equivalent to half a compressed yeast cake or a whole dry yeast cake.

What Will St. Valentine's Day Bring Forth?

IT IS SAID THAT THE GOVERNMENT'S NEW PENSION SCHEME FOR TEACHERS HAS BEEN DROPPED, AND THAT THE PROPOSED LEGISLATION WILL NOT BE INTRODUCED.

It may be remembered that about Christmas Eve last, the Tory newspapers announced with a great flourish that the Government had determined to provide pensions for aged and incapacitated teachers on a most liberal scale, and to deal with them as if they were the most favoured of Civil servants. The broad outlines of the scheme were published, and the announcement was made that the pensions were to be paid out of the revenue, the fund already accumulated being taken over by the Government. Legislation was to be introduced this session and indeed the Teachers' Pension Bill was to be the chief measure of the forthcoming session. The announcement did not meet with the reception among the public which was anticipated. Indeed, the Government members from the North, we are told, have given it as their opinion that it was not only received with no en-

thusiasm by the public, but with positive hostility. This led, we are informed, a number of members of the Government to change their attitude to the scheme, and to treat it with hostility, so much so that the Executive, it is reported, were seriously divided on the question, whether it was politic to proceed with the new scheme. It is also reported that the party schism could only be healed by dropping the measure, and that the proposed bill will not be introduced into the Legislature this session.

The short outline of the scheme, given in the Daily News of Dec. 23rd, 1911, was as follows:—

"1. That teachers may retire on a pension after 30 years of service, provided that they have reached the age of 55.

"2. That the rate of pensions be two-thirds of average salary during last ten years of service.

"3. (a) That teachers becoming disabled or incapacitated after fifteen years of service be allowed a pension of one-half of the pension which they would receive after 30 years of service.

(b) That the allowance for teachers who have been disabled or incapacitated after fifteen years of service be arranged on a sliding scale in proportion to the number of years of service; e.g.

During 15th year of service, 15-30ths of full pension. During 16th year of service, 16-30ths of full pension. During 17th year of service, 17-30ths of full pension, and so on.

(c) That when a teacher has reached the age of 60, he shall, if he wishes to be considered for purposes of pension, be incapacitated, and shall receive pension pro rata.

"4. That the pensions be paid out of the Revenue of the Colony.

(a) That the present Teachers' Pension Scheme be discontinued, and that the accumulated funds, amounting to nearly \$60,000, be handed over to the Government as a nucleus from which to pay the proposed new pensions; and (b) that teachers continue to pay the same premiums as under the present scheme, and (c) that the conditions of withdrawal and forfeiture remain as under the present scheme."

Wednesday, the 14th, is St. Valentine's Day, and also the day when the Legislature will meet, and the Government programme will be officially announced. It should at that time be seen whether teachers are to have the valentin we have mentioned in place of Christmas Box promised on December 23rd, 1911.

The Police Court.

Today the Magistrate's Court was again thronged as the case of Kim Lee, Hop Wah, and other Chinamen against Messrs. Cunningham and Keough for assault was being heard. The hearing of the case against Keough occupied the attention of Judge Knight all the forenoon and had not concluded at 2 p.m. The evidence of the Chinamen was taken, one of their comrades, John Joe, acting as interpreter. The men stated that the two men accused whom they each positively identified, came to the laundry at the foot of Casey St. on the night in question and demanded a parcel of laundry. As they had no check this was refused, and thereupon both assaulted and beat them. Hop Wah, they say, was hit with a block of wood and knocked senseless and has since been very ill. He was badly cut and bruised, and the evidence of Dr. Macpherson who attended him showed that the man was for a while in a dangerous condition and the outcome might have been fatal to him. The evidence of Const. Squibb was also taken as well as that of both the accused, and at 2.30 the matter had not come to a conclusion. Messrs. F. J. Morris, K.C., and Mr. W. J. Higgins appeared for the Chinamen, and Kent, K.C., and W. J. McNelly for the accused. The case against Keough was dismissed and the other case postponed till to-morrow.

Supt. Replies to Mr. Dover.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Sir,—In last evening's issue of your newspaper appeared a letter from Wm. J. Dover, of Grand Falls, in which amongst others is a complaint that "for the second time since last fall I am to-day unable to avail myself of the Money Order system to mail urgent remittances, because as this complaint was in the office."

As this complaint would, if unanswered, reflect very seriously on the operation of the Money Order branch, I hasten to make a reply which will show that there is absolutely no cause for complaint against said branch.

On January 25th a requisition was received from Postmaster at Grand Falls for Money Order Forms. On January 27 we mailed said forms, which were sent by express of following evening, Sunday, the 28th. Under ordinary circumstances those forms would have reached Grand Falls on the 29th, but because of the snow conditions the express could not get beyond Holyrood, and was ordered back to St. John's. The next express was despatched on Thursday, Feb. 1st, and reached Grand Falls at 6 p.m. on the 2nd. The forms were sent by this express and received by the Postmaster.

The forms did not give out till 7 p.m. Feb. 1st, and between then and the 6 p.m. the following day the office was without forms.

From the foregoing it must be apparent that the forms were ordered and despatched sufficiently far in advance, and would have reached Grand Falls several days before they were needed but for the snow conditions which prevented the express from getting through. Further, Mr. Dover was informed by the Postmaster of the cause of delay, and in view of such explanation his complaint is actuated by animus which is incomprehensible.

The charge that on a previous occasion he was unable to obtain a Money Order is so vague as not to need a reply.

I might remark that no complaint has reached me from Mr. Dover relative to Money Order matters, nor has any been received by the Postmaster General.

The other matters referred to in his letter do not come within the scope of my authority.

Make Lumber From Waste Paper.

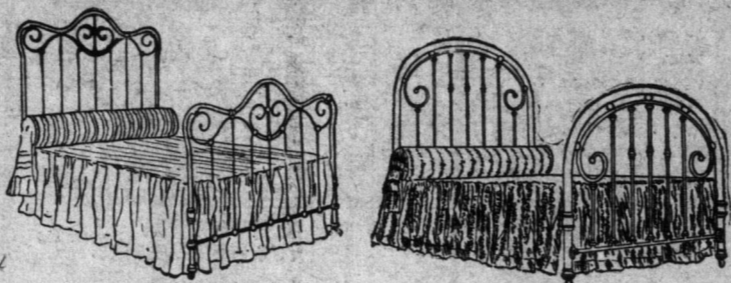
Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 27.—"So nearly perfect is artificial lumber made from paper there is no longer cause for great worry over forest conservation," says Mr. B. White, chairman of the executive committee of the National Conservation Congress.

He has just returned from a trip through the Eastern States. Much of his time there was spent investigating the manufacture of "lumber" from paper.

"A superior quality of artificial lumber can be manufactured cheaper than natural lumber can be grown," he said. "Taking 57 per cent. waste paper, 22 per cent. straw, 5 per cent. lute, and 16 per cent. wood fibre, a ton of fibre board, one-fourth of an inch thick, or 1,100 feet of inch lumber can be produced."

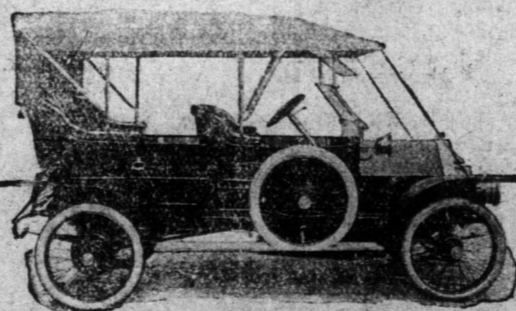

Home Politics.

Special Evening Telegram, BELFAST, To-day.

The self-denying resolutions passed by the Unionists and Orangemen give promise of a peaceful meeting on February 8th, when Churchill and Redmond will deliver addresses before the Ulsterites on the question of Home Rule for Ireland. The Unionists profess to be satisfied with having forced Churchill to speak in the Nationalist quarter in a ring fenced by bayonets. The Liberal Association proposed to the Unionist Council that both should cancel their engagements in the Ulster Hall for February 7th and 8th. The decision on this matter will be taken to-day. The project of a general election during the year is discussed on all sides without any real confidence. Extreme radicals assert that they will be well pleased if the Government goes down prematurely on the Persian question or on a snap division on the Suffrage issue, since in such a case the Unionists will come in with an inadequate majority and to be forced to introduce a measure of Tariff Reform and to be speedily swept out by an uprising under Lloyd George against food taxes. Cautious Tories on the other hand dread an early election, because they cannot count upon having a majority large enough for resolute action on Tariff Reforms. They admit there is a temporary reaction in favor of insurance, due to the recognition given to friendly societies. The truth is they are highly favored, and working people considerably benefited. Thus it is the Opposition prefers a postponement on the election until autumn, when the Insurance Act will be in full force and all classes will be irritated and annoyed by it. Under such circumstances Tories would have a reasonable expectation of carrying the country with a thumping majority and have leisure for working out a comprehensive scheme of Tariff Reform.

The Bavarian Elections.

Special to Evening Telegram, MUNICH, To-day. The Diet elections resulted in considerable losses to Clericals and Conservatives and gains to Liberals and Socialists. The new house will be constituted as follows:—Clericals, 87; Conservatives, 7; Liberals, 35; Socialists, 30; Peasant League, 4.

Shuster Got Big Ovation in London.

Blames Russia for Wrecking Persia's Constitutional Government.

London, Jan. 29.—W. Morgan Shuster received a remarkable ovation and his claim for Persian independence was enthusiastically cheered at a banquet which the Persian Committee, composed of members of the House of Commons and other prominent men, gave in honor of the American ex-Treasurer-General of Persia at the Savoy Hotel to-night. A representative company of two hundred listened to a detailed narrative of the wrecking of Persia's constitutional Government. He placed the entire responsibility upon Russian antagonism to a strong independent Persia, and made it plain that he thought the British people had been deceived regarding the facts. He declared that 99 per cent. of the disorders charged as a partial excuse for intervention had been imported by Russia.

No News of the Kamfjord

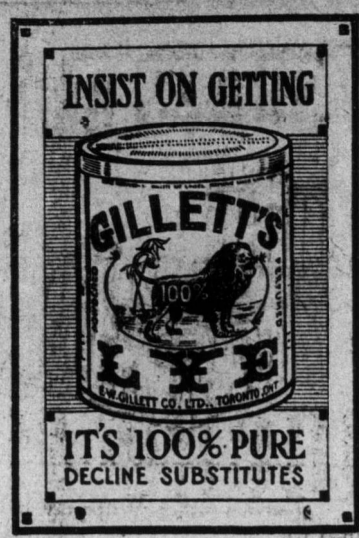

Hebert Decision Coming Soon

A rumor being current in the Court House that judgment in the famous Hebert marriage case would be rendered shortly, a "Witness" reporter made inquiries at Mr. Justice Charbonneau's chamber this morning. His Lordship stated that it would be a fortnight at least before he would be in a position to announce his decision.

He was told that the people of Toronto and vicinity were clamoring for some information on the case, at which he smiled. He stated that judgment would be in French. The reporter observed that the English were more interested in the case than their French compatriots. Judge Charbonneau's retort was quick and decisive: "I am not giving this judgment for the English people; I am simply doing my duty."
Mr. Justice Charbonneau has been working on this case for several weeks, and as the fate of the Ne Temere decree practically depends on his decision, the whole of Canada, naturally, is awaiting an announcement with anxiety. When the Ne Temere Bill came before the House of Commons last week, Sir Wilfrid Laurier recommended that the matter be left to the courts for a decision, especially as Mr. Justice Charbonneau was about to give judgment in the Hebert case.—Montreal Witness.

OLSON Versus BERRY To-night.

Two Vessels Are Missing.

Grave fears are now expressed for the safety of two vessels, the Dorothy Louise, Capt. Hiscock, and the Reliance, both of which are now out over 80 days from Cadiz to Grand Bank, laden with salt. Both are manned by 12 men, 6 in each, and all are Newfoundlanders. The hope, however, is expressed that these vessels like the Lady St. John's, which quit into Salsombr for a few days, met bad weather at the beginning of the voyage, became damaged, and will yet be heard of after making a port on the other side for repairs.

The King and Queen met with a great reception from the people on their return to London. After a short stay in England, they will start on a round of State visits in European countries.

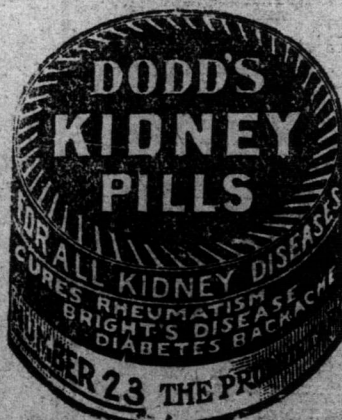

All loyal Unionists are requested to do everything in their power to prevent any act which might reflect on the Unionists' cause. The Grand Orange Lodge adopted a resolution not to interfere with Churchill.

BERLIN, Feb. 5.
The evident effort which is being made both in Berlin and London to bring about the re-establishment of cordial relations between Britain and Germany, and the willingness of the former to sanction the desire of the latter to extend her possessions in Africa and purchase Portuguese and Belgian territory, is likely to furnish a foundation for the friendliest exchanges. An evidence that Germany is willing to meet Britain half way is afforded by the publication in Berlin of an article, attributed to a leading diplomat, which gives reasons why an entente between the two countries is both necessary and desirable.

LONDON, Feb. 5.
Indignation is rapidly growing because of the sentence imposed upon Bertrand Stewart, a prominent London lawyer, who recently at Leipzig was found guilty of espionage and was ordered to be confined in the fortress for three and one-half years. It is suggested that a movement be organized by British tourists to boycott all German holiday resorts as a protest against what is almost universally characterized by newspapers as a judicial scandal and a gross miscarriage of justice. The feeling against Germany, which had been subsiding of late, has become more embittered than ever.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Feb. 5.
It is grotesque to suppose that Sun Yat Sen is dictating terms, or that the Throne will offer a blind submission to the Nanking Government, says a Peking despatch to the Daily Telegraph. What is really happening is that Yuan Shi Kai, by brilliant cross-play, has reduced both the Manchu extremists and the Republican extremists to virtual powerlessness; is building up a great middle party, and is arranging a purely Chinese solution for the present difficulty. The abdication edict, says the correspondent, will be followed by edicts proclaiming the Emperor's sacrosanct office to be hereditary, and not connected with politics; affirming sacrificial and other ceremonies for the preservation of the Confucian code, and the Imperial right of conferring titles. After the Commonwealth is organized, the Manchu Banner organization will be dissolved and commutation of pensions will follow.

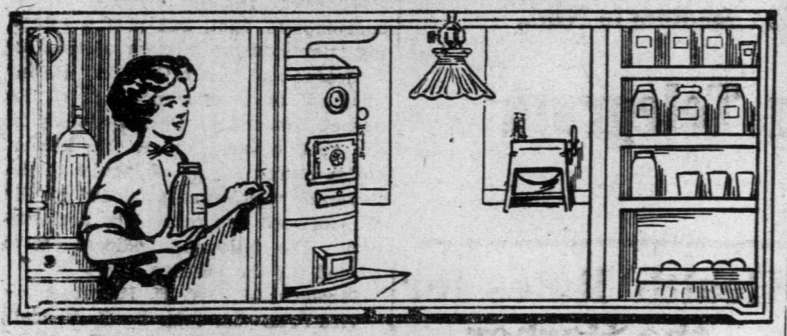
