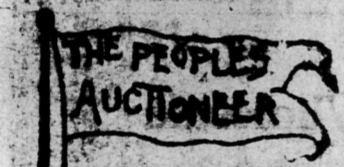

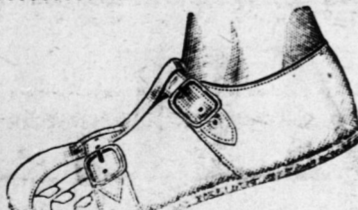

No Relief From High Taxation.

We have had drummed into our ears over and over again the growth in the revenue. The growth has by no means been confined to the Morris administration. It has gone on steadily since Sir Robert Bond took charge of the government in the spring of 1909. There is, however, a singular contrast in the nature of Tory comment on the rise of the revenue in the two periods. During the Bond regime increases in revenue and surpluses were declared by Tories to be bad financing and a harsh exacting of unnecessary taxes from the people. Increased revenue and large surpluses during the Morris regime are held by Tories to be evidence of good financing and a satisfactory administration.

When we come to look into the matter more closely we find there is also a marked contrast in the way the two administrations dealt with a buoyant revenue.

Sir Robert Bond was severely handicapped. He was faced with the blunders of the Railway Contract of 1898, and had to find money to get the country out of the mischief done by the Tory administration. He did this out of the buoyant revenues, and he put by a nest egg of \$500,000 to provide financial safety for the future against such trouble as befel the Tory administration of 1894. He provided well for the country's needs in light-houses, telegraphs and other public utilities, and in addition to this, he faced the problem of relieving as far as possible the prime necessities of life of high duties.

Now, mark the contrast, instead of Sir Edward Morris following the good work of Sir Robert Bond in this direction he abandoned it, and he has abandoned it too in face of a solemn pledge to reduce taxation so that it will bear equitably on the working classes. Nearly four years ago he promised solemnly to place on the free list such items as tea, sugar, pork and other prime necessities of life on which very heavy taxes are imposed.

The buoyant revenues have afforded

him abundant opportunities of doing it. Indeed it was only just to relieve the people of the heavy increase in taxation due to increases in price on imported articles. The people at present are paying more for goods than they were paying in 1908 and are paying far more as a consequence in taxation. Instead of being relieved of some of the burdens of taxation of 1908, they are to-day paying far more to the revenue than they did then. As a consequence people find it harder to live, and they are exasperated at finding the money which is being extorted unnecessarily from them wasted among government leaders.

Had to Take It.

On one occasion it is said Hon. Geo. E. Foster, rose to address a meeting eager to hear only Sir John Macdonald, then the idol of the Canadian Conservatives. Speaker after speaker had been silenced by groans and hisses, but Mr. Foster faced the tumult. "Gentlemen," he began, "I want to tell you a story. When I was a small boy the only way my old mammy could get me a sugar-plum afterwards. Now, there's your sugar-plum, Sir John Macdonald, but you've got to take your medicine first." And the audience did, and enjoyed it.

Like Mr. Tim Healey, however, Mr. Foster can lash with the tongue when the occasion calls for it. His opponents, indeed, dread his sarcasm and ridicule. Someone once wrote of him, "He towers above all others as the foremost conservative critic, but nobody loves him when he sits down." Yet in private life he is one of the most kindly of men.

Transplanting Plaice.

An experiment in transplanting plaice has been carried out successfully on the Dager Bank, England, as reported by the Marine Biological Association of Great Britain, says the New York "Tribune." The fish were taken from shallow, inshore waters to the better feeding places on the Dager, and from an average length of 8 1/2 inches grew in one year to 14 inches. In weight also the transplanted fish showed the results of the change by increasing nearly four times the original weight in 12 months, instead of only doubling it, as per the experience when left in the old inshore grounds. This is very important, as the large fish command a much higher price.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

A National Benefactor's Tomb.

A correspondent of the Times, signing himself "A Friend of the Donor," calls attention to the fact that the gravestone at Brompton Cemetery of Mr. John Jones, who died in 1882, and left to the nation his collection of works of art now in the Victoria and Albert Museum, bears no record of his munificence. Thinking it appropriate that an inscription should be placed there by the museum authorities, the "Friend of the Donor" saw the directors on October 10 last year, who received the proposition with sympathy. "It has taken," continues the "Friend of the Donor," "from that period to June 20 for a decision to be arrived at, and the following is an extract from the letter: "The Board of Education have had under consideration your suggestion that they should cause an inscription commemorative of the benefaction to the Victoria and Albert Museum of the late Mr. John Jones to be placed on his tombstone in Brompton Cemetery. I am directed to state that, while they sympathize with your proposal, they regret they cannot comply with your suggestion that they should record your appreciation of the generosity of Mr. Jones by means of an inscription on his tombstone." "No reason is given. The cost would be about £13, and, as mentioned, the gift is now valued at £1,000,000!"

Wins Race and Dies.

Youth Chided by His Friends Runs and Falls Dead on Track.

New York, Aug. 30.—Theodore Durge, aged 20, has been an active member of the Finnish S. & A. C. of Brooklyn. Three times a week the organization hold contests. Durge, who was a good athlete, never took part in the games. He said his heart was too weak. For his holding back he was often chided by his friends. This afternoon there was a 100-yard dash, for which the prize was a gold medal and Durge decided to run. Eight toed the mark, and Durge's friends gave him a cheer when they saw he had decided to make a test of his running powers. At the starting gun, Durge got off in the lead, and to the half-way mark held it by a slight margin. Then he spurred and his friends yelled when they saw he had a chance for the prize. With a final burst of speed he crossed the finish line a victor and the cheering grew. Suddenly he stopped and threw up his hands and fell backward. The shouting ceased and the crowd thronged about the fallen runner. His hand was clutching his breast. An ambulance was called from the Norwegian Hospital. Dr. Phillips said the runner in his victorious spurt had overtaxed himself and had died of heart disease.

A Glass Needle Stiletto.

As diabolical a specimen of murderous ingenuity as ever was discovered by the police was found one day in the possession of a Chinaman who had been working in a laundry in New Orleans and who was believed to have intended using it upon his employer. It was a tiny stiletto, with a handle about as thick as a carpenter's pencil and a blade four inches long of glass, pointed as keenly as a needle. A tiny groove had been filed around the blade close to the hilt. Suppose it was driven into a man's body. It would be certain to break off at the groove and leave three inches of glass deep in his flesh. What is more, the puncture would close at once and show no mark, not even a single drop of blood.

\$1,250,000 Company

To Carry on Colonization Work in Ontario.

Toronto, Aug. 31.—A billion and a quarter dollar company has been organized to carry on organization work in Northern Ontario. The company has been incorporated through a Toronto firm of solicitors, but it is understood that W. Jackson, of Toronto, and other well known capitalists are behind the scheme. Mr. Jackson some time ago secured from the Ontario government two townships north of the Transcontinental Line in Temiskaming and already has a large gang of men in the district laying out roads and erecting temporary buildings.

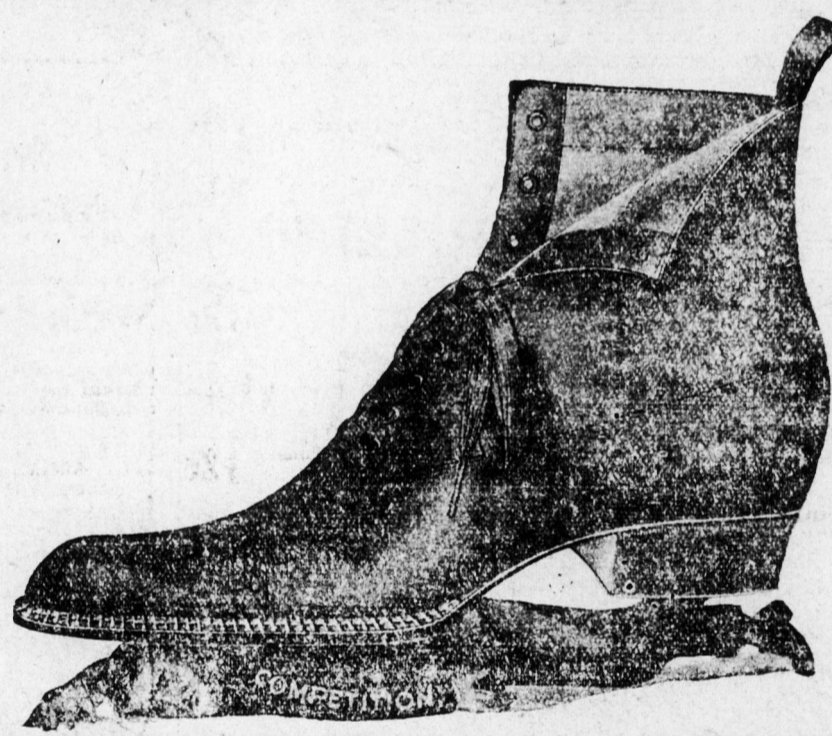

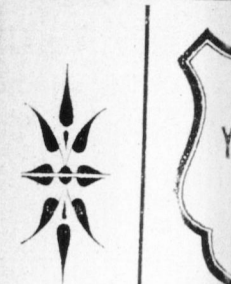

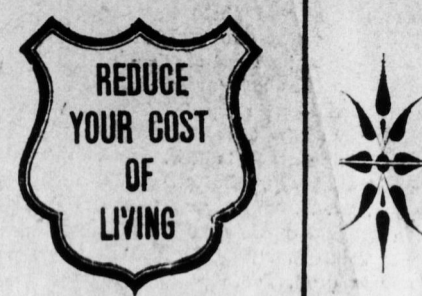

Obituary.

DR. R. WHITE.

Dr. White of Trinity passed away this morning at the advanced age of eighty-one. For almost a life time he had an extensive practice throughout Trinity Bay and was very highly esteemed. He was also one of the old and able Liberal of Trinity and his opinions were held in much repute. He brought two of his sons for the Church of England service and two of them are in holy orders. One of them is the highly respected Canon White, Rector of the Cathedral Parish of this city, the other is Rev. James White of Champneys, Trinity Bay. Another son, Dr. A. White, was trained for the medical profession with his father at Trinity for many years. One daughter is dead, another Henrietta, is unmarried and at home. Two other daughters are married to clergymen. The old doctor will be much missed at Trinity and to his relatives and friends we extend our most sincere sympathy.

The Rise of New York.

It Dates From the Time that the Erie Canal was Opened.

If we seek the original creator of the wealth in New York we must look over the heads of Astor and the Goelets to De Witt Clinton, the man who in 1825 pushed to completion the Erie Canal.

Up to that time New York was not inevitably marked out for the American metropolis. In 1800 Philadelphia was actually a larger city, and Baltimore, with its splendid harbor and its inland river communication, confidently expected to grasp the nation's commercial leadership.

But the Erie canal changed the situation in a twinkling. It placed the city in communication with inland New York—an agricultural empire in itself, whose wealth had previously flowed by way of the Susquehanna river to Baltimore—and New York became the seaport for the agricultural states bordering on the lakes.

Until the Erie canal was opened it had cost \$88 a ton to transport wheat from Buffalo to Albany. With this new waterway the cost fell to something more than \$5. A string of cities, several of which became large ones, sprang up along its course.—Burton J. Hendrick in McClure's Magazine.

Mr. Green Still Missing.

Horse Frightened by Auto

DRIVER INJURED.

Shortly after tea hour last evening while going in the Thorburn Road, a horse driven by a boy named Arthur Lukens was frightened by an approaching automobile. The animal bolted quickly and became unmanageable. Both the driver and his younger sister were thrown out of the express wagon violently to the ground. The boy was badly injured and was driven to Dr. Macpherson's surgery where several stitches were inserted to close a bad wound in his head. His face was also cut and his body bruised. Miss Lukens fortunately escaped unscathed. The horse after running some distance in the road came to a halt itself.

Benedict Arnold.
BY H. L. RANN.



One hundred and thirty-two years ago this month Benedict Arnold tried to deliver the West Point military academy and all its contents, including some haughty first class men and several unwashed and unrepentant plebes, into the hands of the British government. He failed abruptly, with no visible assets, and that is why we are here to-day, living happily and contentedly under the benign rule of J. Pierpont Morgan, rather than being bossed around by a king whom none of us has ever been introduced to. Benedict's work as a traitor was very coarse. He had got mad at George Washington because George refused to make him a brigadier general, which was something Benedict knew he was cut out for every time he looked in the glass. So he arranged with Major Andre to slip West Point to him one dark night, when nobody was looking. Arnold agreed to surrender the academy to Major Andre in exchange for some of England's best tuppence. He was to meet Andre at the front door with a look of great surprise and after firing several blank cartridges at him in an expostulatory vein was to surrender en masse and be given a trip pass to London. On the night of September 23, 1780, Andre pinned a quit claim deed to West Point to his left insole and started on horse back to seize West Point with his bare hands. On the road, however, he met a couple of New York farmers who were of an inquisitive and prying nature, and they searched him with such deadly aim that they discovered his guilty secret by disrobing his feet. Arnold escaped in a British vessel, but returned later and tried to burn down all of the Atlantic coast he could get to. After the war, he engaged in light housekeeping in London and attempted to live down his past. There was too much of it, however, and whenever he went anywhere people would twix him about committing a faux pas, which is a French word meaning bonehead. He died in London, owing several months' rent, and his funeral had the enthusiastic endorsement of all concerned.

**Another Industry
For Bay of Islands.**

We have much pleasure in announcing that arrangements are now complete for opening the premises purchased by the Newfoundland Fisheries Dev. Syn. Ltd., Benoit's Cove and Capt. Chas. A. Swift who will manage this branch of the Company's business. It shortly take up headquarters at this point and make arrangements for receiving the stock of barrels, etc., the Company now have in St. John's.

The operation of this company will be watched with interest, as the industry in Newfoundland of packing under the Scotch method is in its infancy, and is capable of becoming a valuable asset to this part of the island.

A complete cooperage will be installed for manufacturing barrels of Scotch pattern, also the necessary machinery for steam can making and seaming. The Company have a large market in Western Canada for fresh herring in tins and other tinned products.

The cooperage will afford considerable employment during the slack season, the Government having granted an area of timber land for the development and use of this industry so that all staves and boxwood will be cut and milled on the premises.

Bloaters, kippers, red herring and later boneless codfish will be manufactured; it being the object of the owners to handle all classes and quantities of fish caught by the fishermen and to place them on the Canadian and American markets in an up to date and salable manner.—Western Star.

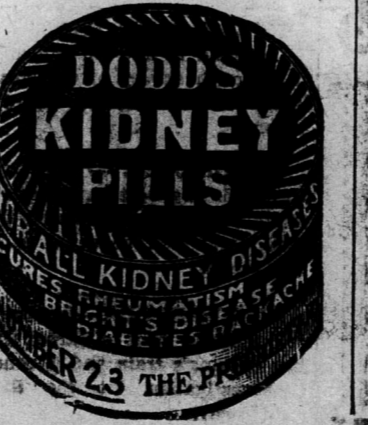

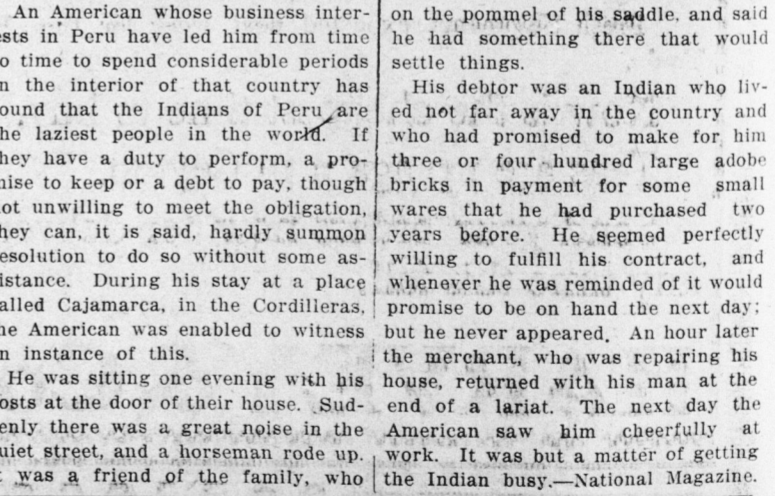

 An outcome of the Titanic inquiry is the set of revised rules for increasing safety at sea, to become effective on January 1st, 1913. They provide that foreign going passenger and emigrant steamships and foreign going sailing vessels carrying passengers shall furnish life boat accommodation for all on board. The life-boat equipment, which has been increased, must be in the boats as soon as the ship leaves the harbour, and remain there throughout the entire voyage. The number of passengers to be carried in each boat to be marked on it. Sydney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, issuing the new rules, makes the statement that it may be necessary to obtain further legislative power in order to make adequate boat drill compulsory, and secure crews to man the boats properly.
