


"Then I will stay; thank you very much," he said gratefully.

carefully. Wipe each orange with a dry cloth and wrap it securely in grease-proof paper. Place them loosely in a dry wooden box.

Make an ironing pad for embroidered articles covering one side of the square with Turkish toweling and the other side with white outing flannel. Use the Turkish side for faces and the other side for embroideries.

For painted walls dissolve two ounces of borax in two quarts of water. Add half teaspoonful of ammonia. Use half this quantity to each bucket of water. Do not use soap. Rub with clean towels till dry.

To renovate and brighten gilt frames of pictures or mirrors, wash them very gently with a small sponge moistened with spirits of wine or oil of turpentine. The sponge must be sufficiently wet to remove dirt and fly marks.


If a garment becomes badly soiled with perspiration, put it in soft, lukewarm water and wash with Indian meal instead of soap. This will remove stains of long standing if the meal is well rubbed into the soiled places with your hands.

In washing muslin curtains they will look more sheer if you boil two quarts of wheat for half an hour and strain and mix in the water in which the curtains are to be washed. Rinse lightly in clear, cold water and dry.

For broken skin on the heel, break a fresh egg, take the inner skin of the same and apply it to the heel, holding it firmly in place for a few minutes. It will adhere as closely as true skin and will allay the pain.

In warming a steamed pudding or in steaming a stale cake never put the article on a flat dish. Place the pudding in a colander in the steamer, and you will be surprised how light and delicate it will become.

British Army And Empire Day. London, May 7.—The refusal of the War Office to allow the Marlborough College officers' contingent to take part in Empire Day celebrations was mentioned in the House of Lords yesterday, when Viscount Midleton asked whether if it was in the interest of recruiting the territorial force, he would reconsider his decision. Earl Beauchamp replied that Empire Day celebrations were occasions of civilian rejoicing. The Army Council were strongly of the opinion that the day was not suitable for military displays, but that it should be reserved for His Majesty's birthday. If members of officers' training corps desired to take part in an Empire Day celebration it was more proper for them to do so in their civilian character rather than as soldiers. The Army Council while anxious to stimulate recruiting for the territorial force, adhered to their view as regards contingents taking part in Empire Day celebrations.

Wonderful Johnson.

Pitches 39 Innings Without a Run Being Scored Against Him—Johnson's Wonderful Work.

Washington defeated the world's champions at Boston, Saturday, 2 to 1. Engle pitched for the Senators; Boston scored one in the second, the only run of the game up to the seventh. Engle, who pitched until one man had been retired in the seventh inning, gave 10 bases on balls, but was not hit safely by Boston. Washington scored in the seventh and eighth. Walter Johnson replaced Engle and not a run was scored of him.

Johnson has thus gone 39 straight innings without being scored on, the only man to tally against him being Bert Daniels, of New York, the first man to come to bat in the first innings of the first game of the season in Washington. Johnson has hit only one batsman this season. That man was Daniels, and had Walter not winged the New York outfielder, he would not have been scored on at all to date. Daniels reached second on Jandil's maul of a red hot grounder from Wolter, and came home on a single by Hartzell. Since Daniels came to bat in that first innings, about 140 batsmen have faced Johnson, but not one has found his way around to the plate. Of the 20 hits made off Johnson, this year, only two have been for extra bases. Carrigan getting a three-bagger on April 23, and "Stuffy" McInnis touching him up for a double on April 30. Johnson has struck out 29 batsmen, and has passed only four. The batting average of his opponents in the four games has been a trifle above .161. Incidentally, he has not made a single wild pitch.



Notes and Comments.

In view of the certainty that Newfoundland will have to face the money market again owing to the blundering financing of Sir Edward Morris, it is interesting to note the reception which is being accorded to Colonial Government Loans.

In the May issue of the Empire Review, we find the following statement by "Trustee" in his monthly article on "Indian and Colonial Investments":

"Western Australia has again been in the market for a loan; offering another two million sterling of 4 per cent. Inscribed stock at 98 1/2. This stock is a full trustee security and is redeemable between 1942 and 1962. The issue, however, like most other recent gilt-edged issues, met with scant response from the public and can now be obtained at a discount."

This quotation makes it clear that investors are not hankering after even Four per cent. stocks, and that even when offered at a discount of 1 1/2 per cent. they do not take them, but wait and find they can buy them even at a greater discount.

What hope then is there for the floating of any more Three and a half per cent. loans by Newfoundland? It is clear that the next loan will have to be a Four Per Cent. one, and that under the present outlook it will have to be floated at a discount and there will be a big loss in realizing on it!

The question, of course, arises as to the need of floating another loan. This is due to the fact that Morris blundered badly in making the Railway Branch Contracts. His greatest blunder was to change the method of paying for railway building. Before that contract was entered upon, construction work had been paid for in bonds, and the contractor himself had to take the risk of the sale of the bonds. Morris changed this system. He agreed to pay in gold, and to obtain the gold the country had to take the risk of the sale. This has proved much to the advantage of the

contractor and highly detrimental financially to the country. The Reid Nfd. Company have been the beneficiaries of the change and the country has lost heavily in consequence of it, and Sir Edward Morris is primarily responsible for it, and his Ministers and party are secondarily responsible.

But bad as the blundering has proved, there is worse in store due to the miscalculations of Sir Edward Morris as to the costs of the Railway Extension Contract of 1910. His loan of 1910 was represented by him as sufficient to pay for the whole scheme. His loan of 1912 afforded positive, conclusive and overwhelming proof that he had blundered. But it proved also that the country had lost. The country was "let in" for a loan that Morris argued in 1910 would not be wanted. The country was let in in 1912 because the Railway loan of that year could only be raised on terms more onerous and stringent than those of 1910.

Money has now become even tighter. Colonial loans are not now so attractive as they were then. The day of the Three and a half per cent. is done. Four per cent. are being floated at a discount and do not go off readily. The financial advisers of the Government have advised Sir Edward Morris of these adverse conditions.

The 1910 loan that was issued at 97 1/2 is now quoted at 92. What will be the reception the country will meet with when it tries to float the loan needed to pay off the Morris Branch Line Scheme? The financial outlook for loan raising is worse now than it was in 1912, and Sir Edward Morris has put the country into this financial slough. (1) by his branch railway contracts of 1910; (2) by promising to pay in gold instead of bonds; (3) by his financial miscalculations; and (4) by borrowing in instalments on a steadily deteriorating market; and yet this financial blunderer has the audacity to warn the country against those he is fond of dubbing "political apprentices."

A Real Farce Comedy.

At Rossley's there was a very large crowd of people and every one of them laughed heartily at the fun. It is a real comical act, full of funny business, keen enjoyment and clean amusement. "Oh, What's the Use?" will make you forget your little troubles and worries for the time being. There are some of the best pictures seen in a great while, one needs special mention - The Derby of 1912 - one of the clearest pictures of the greatest of all races, with King George and Queen Mary in attendance. Mr. Rossley secured this great film while in London; also the revival of an old Balclava veteran. The Star Orchestra with Prof. Ryall as leader, needs no recommendation. The new company for Rossley's Theatre leaves New York to-day by the S. S. Stephano.

Old-Time Hooding.

Appropos of the Lloydson's prospective voyage to Greenland for hoods, this was an institution in ye olden times with Bowring Bros., when the late Capt. Arthur Jackman in the old Eagle after the sealing voyage went to Greenland hooding and invariably made a profitable voyage. The last time she went was in 1893. Capt. P. Delany, now of the Reid Nfd. Co., also went hooding in the Eagle, but it is now many years ago. The Kite went whaling, not hooding, as the News of this morning's date says, evidently through mistake.

The Police Court.

One drunk was discharged, and three had to pay cash hire. Two drunks and disorderlies were fined \$5 or 14 days. The case of the St. John's Meat Company vs. a butcher for a breach of contract, was adjourned until this afternoon.

Two Houses Destroyed by Fire.

A message from Magistrate Burt, of Botwood, to Deputy Minister of Justice Hutchings to-day stated that a fire on Saturday night last totally destroyed two dwelling houses, the property of Mr. H. J. Crowe. Part of the contents of both were saved. The origin of the fire is unknown.

May Go to Greenland.

If competent men, such as boatmen, gunners and skippers, can be secured the S. S. Lloydson, in charge of Capt. Alpheus Barbour, may be outfitted for a cruise to the Greenland coast where she will be engaged in sealing for a couple of months. So far the owners have not decided on anything definite but will to-morrow.





Poultry Association.

The above Association held its usual monthly meeting in their rooms, at Bestow Building, last night. At a meeting of Directors—Mr. G. W. Gushue in the chair—held before the ordinary meeting, Mr. Otto Rusch brought forward the names of three new members and others qualified for the prize offered by Mr. Butler.

On adjournment to the ordinary meeting, Mr. G. W. Gushue, as chairman, first excused the absence of the regular Secretary, Mr. Calver, by a sympathetic reference to the loss that our popular Secretary has recently incurred in the death of his father. On a motion proposed by Mr. Barker seconded by Mr. MacClead it was unanimously decided to send a note of condolence to Mr. Calver expressing the sympathy of the members of the Association.

Mr. G. W. Gushue then gave a very minute and interesting account of the results of the incubation recently inaugurated by the Association. Both Mr. Otto Rusch, who proposed the scheme, and Mr. Gushue who has so ably carried it out merit and have the thanks of the Association and of all who feel an interest in the poultry development of this country.

It appears that up to date nearly a thousand eggs have been received from members of the Association and others, thus showing that great interest has been manifested in this venture. Although the results have varied greatly as to the per centage of chickens hatched, the lesson is obvious, viz., that eggs produced under unfavourable conditions and those that are old and stale will not, as a general rule, hatch out nearly as many chickens as eggs produced under proper conditions and put to hatch when fresh.

Altogether Mr. Gushue has put down 17 incubators full, and there are more eggs awaiting the next vacancy—indeed the demand exceeds the means of supply, a most encouraging sign as to the interest being shown in the rearing of poultry.

Following Mr. Gushue's interesting report, Mr. Otto Rusch suggested a discussion as to the holding of a poultry exhibition this year, and on the motion of Mr. Barker seconded by Mr. MacClead it was decided that such an exhibition be held. After a short discussion the same two gentlemen proposed and seconded that the Directors form a committee to make arrangements for the show and that they have power to add to their number. Both propositions were heartily endorsed by the meeting.

It was gratifying to note the large attendance at the meeting including many new members, and a discussion took place on various topics likely to prove interesting and instructive to the expert as well as to the beginner.

It is a fact that the Association is going ahead, with and among its members it now includes many gentlemen of high standing both in commercial and government circles. We hope shortly to be able to run a "poultry" column in the daily papers by means of which much useful knowledge may be disseminated throughout the length and breadth of the country, and we confidently look forward to the time when eggs laid in Newfoundland will take the place in our shops and stores of the imported article.

Fatal Cycling Accident.

OLIPHANT BUTLER, OF CABOT STREET, THE VICTIM—THROWN FROM BICYCLE LAST NIGHT—DIED OF INJURIES THIS MORNING.

"In the midst of life we are in death" is a quotation, the truth of which was demonstrated in a very sad manner last night, and to-day a young lad, just bordering on the threshold of manhood, who yesterday was animated with the vitality and vigor of youth, lies cold and still in death, as the result of a bicycle accident sustained shortly after 10 last night. Oliphant, aged 18 years, the son of Stephen Butler, the well-known shipwright, of 127, Cabot St., is the victim. The lad with his brother's Harry and Ernest, and two other boys, Belbin and Halfyard, was endeavoring last night to learn to ride the bicycle on Cabot Street near his home, and often his companions would steady him on the machine, while at other times he would essay to ride alone. The boys went up and down the street and invariably turned the machine at the junction of Flower Hill with Cabot Street. Shortly after 10 o'clock, Oliphant, who was making good progress alone, ran to the head of Flower Hill which is very steep, and attempted unaided to turn the bike back to Cabot Street. As he did so he lost control and the machine with its rider shot down over Flower Hill at lightning speed and the boy and machine after colliding with a telephone pole near Mr. Butler's house, were thrown with terrible force into the paved drain pitching a distance of fully 10 feet. The shock was awful and the boy was rendered unconscious in which state he remained for almost thirty minutes. His friends rushed to his aid and conveyed him home where he was tenderly cared for and where it was seen that he was badly wounded about the head. Dr. Macpherson was called by telephone from Mr. Butler's house and came in his auto and found the lad suffering from three terrible wounds in the head and one severe cut under the chin. While these were being stitched the lad recovered consciousness and enjoining quiet for the patient, and promising to see him again this forenoon, the doctor left. He evidently did not think that the lad was so seriously hurt, neither did his father or brothers, and all the family stayed up for the night with the injured boy. Though he spoke several times during the night to those about him, his words were of a character that seemed to show that the patient's sleep was wandering. He seemed to heed and breathe regularly until about 3.30 a.m. when his brother, Mr. Wm. Butler, the shipwright and well known diver, found that something serious had transpired, the heart's motion had become weak and in a few minutes life had departed to the intense grief not alone of his father and friends but of the neighbors and people about with whom Oliphant was a favorite. Dr. Macpherson was again telephoned for and was quickly on the scene, but the poor lad was beyond his ministrations. Besides the wounds in the head, the right side

WASHINGTON, To-day.
The British freighter Chiltern Range which collided with an iceberg east of Newfoundland Banks, in a voyage from Hull, to Montreal, was fully 200 miles out of the steamship track, according to a report by the Naval Hydrographic Office. Officials said the freighter was in a field which her Captain must have known was full of ice.

OTTAWA, May 12.
Finance Minister White delivered his Budget Speech this afternoon. He announced the following changes in the tariff, mostly necessitated by the new trade agreement with the West Indies. They involve a new arrangement of duties on sugar and other products of the Islands. There are also reductions in duties on cement, asphalt, threads, tanning machines, typesetting machines, glass apparatus for hospitals and news photos are placed on the free list.

OTTAWA, To-day.
The financial statements showed the Dominion has reached a pitch of prosperity never before attained, trade over a billion surplus—fifty five million and reduction over twenty three million dollars in national debt. The minister's exposition of national finances was clear and concise. He allowed his figures to speak for themselves. The statement as he unfolded a story of unexampled prosperity, evoked frequent outbursts of applause. The total revenue for last year had amounted to \$138,250,000, an increase of \$22,000,000, or almost the total of country's revenue of twenty years ago. The development of the country had called for large outlays, but these had not exceeded \$112,250,000 on current account. The expenditure and capital account had amounted to thirty three millions with allowance \$13,000,000 for sinking fund, there was left the sum of \$23,300,000 toward the reduction debt. The net debt now stands approximately at \$216,619,460.

Though the Minister of Finance has dubbed all fishermen who work on the railway as "collage" still their employers of the fishery do not think them so and fear they will lose many good men for the staple industry this year. But Morris and his party of grabbers reach little about the success or failure of the fishery as long as they can at any cost retain the reins of power. This is election year and if he believed it would ensure the return of himself and party Morris would keep every fisherman in the country from his natural and legitimate employment.

John Pratt, will be learned with extreme pleasure. On April 25th, at the Victoria University Convocation of Divinity, Toronto, he was successful in carrying off four prizes. In 1911 Mr. Pratt graduated as a B.A., the following year he received M.A. and the present year B.D. Mr. Pratt is a clever though young theologian. In a very short time he will be ordained to the Methodist Ministry and to whatever part of the world he is called to preach the Word of God, his exceptional abilities will serve him. Mrs. Pratt, of this city, is to be congratulated on the success of her son.

ASK FOR MINARD'S AND TAKE NO OTHER.

Maxims of Napoleon.

He Told How He Used to Play on Feelings of His Men.

Paris, April 28.—Great interest has been aroused among military students and historians through the publication by C. Ernest Picard, of a selection from hitherto unknown military maxims and precepts dictated by Napoleon during his imprisonment at St. Helena.

The Emperor attached great weight to tact and skill in the treatment of soldiers.
"When I used to say," he wrote "as I rode through the lines in the heat of battle, 'Unlucky your flags, the moment has come,' the French soldier simply shook with eagerness."
"At such a moment nothing seemed impossible to me. The Thirty-second's own forerunner would have died to a man for me, because after Lona to I wrote 'The Thirty-second was there, and I was at ease.' The power of words on men is astonishing."
The following is Napoleon's idea of a general:
"In time of war men are nothing. It is one man who is everything. A great general is not an ordinary man. Military genius is a gift from Heaven, but the most essential quality for a Commander-in-Chief, is firmness of character and the resolution to win at all costs."
Next to the qualities of the Commander, whose secret way of thinking was, he thought, "to exaggerate one's own forces and minimize those of the enemy," Napoleon considered a strong artillery the prime factor in success.
"If I had had 30,000 more rounds on the evening of the 18th at Leipzig, I should to-day be master of the world."
To express his opinion on the value of experience over theory, he said it was "worth a hundred volumes of Cicero and Demosthenes." In speaking of a national army, of which he was, of course, strongly in favor, Napoleon insisted that "all Frenchmen should consider the law of conscription necessary and sacred. If they do not wish to see their homes devastated."

\$22,500,000 In "Ash Heap."

That Was the United States and Canada's Fire Loss Last Year Says Superintendent of Insurance.

Albany, N. Y., May 6.—That "the annual ash heap of the country" can be greatly reduced within a reasonable time is the opinion of Superintendent Emmett, of the State Insurance Department, made public in his annual report. "With even a partial elimination of arson insurance, so-called; with stricter building laws rigidly enforced and with the means of fire defence in all communities brought up to the most efficient standard possible, this can be accomplished," he says.

Mr. Emmett figures that the "ash heap" of this country and Canada accumulated during 1912 represented a fire loss of approximately \$225,000,000, about \$9,000,000 less than in 1911, and \$2,000,000 less than the average for the last five years.

Married After 46 Years' Courtship.

New York, May 7.—After a courtship which lasted more than forty years, it was learned yesterday, Frederick Harrison, a wealthy farmer at Roseland N. J., married Miss Kate De Camp a week ago at the home of the bride in Essex Falls. The couple are now spending their honeymoon in fixing up the old Harrison homestead. Fifty years ago Mr. and Mrs. Harrison both attended the same little red schoolhouse. It was there that their long courtship began. As the two grew to young man and woman hold every one in the little town thought that they soon would marry. The years went by and Mr. Harrison lived alone on his farm and Miss De Camp conducted hers. They were often together and Mr. Harrison called on Miss De Camp as regularly as when he was a young man.

On Sundays he washed up the rubber fired buggy, had the harness polished and hitched up to his road mare to take Miss De Camp riding. But long ago the neighbours gave up all hope of a wedding at which the two would be the principals. Then yesterday morning after church Mr. and Mrs. Harrison told of their marriage the Sunday before.

Slips On Peel; Loses 9,000 Francs.

Paris, May 7.—Ludwig Williams, an American newspaper man, on his way home from the Balkan war, has lost 9,000 francs by the disappearance of a smooth talking man he met in Paris who introduced himself as Stanislaus Bernard to the returning war correspondent.

Williams, on his arrival in Paris, slipped on a banana peel near the railway station and got somewhat hurt. He determined to sue the city. At the United States Consulate he met Bernard who served as a lawyer and offered his services.

Instructions Bernard to go ahead and sue, Williams went to Munich, ordered his mail addressed to Bernard, who cashed a check for 9,000 francs made out to Williams. Bernard has disappeared.

The Nottingham Boat House has been burned down by the suffragettes. It contained many valuable racing and other vessels. Loss, \$10,000.

LONDON, May 12.
No fewer than 3,000 emigrants embarked yesterday at Glasgow for Canada alone, the highest figure on record. Shipping Companies report full bookings to the end of June.

LONDON, May 12.
There is practically no hope for the Duchess of Connaught. Bulletins are as optimistic as the doctors can make them, but a new operation is necessary and it is a physical impossibility for her to undergo it.

COLLINSVILLE, Ok., May 12.
Five employees of the Texas Pipe Line Company were killed to-day by

an electric bolt. Two others are probably fatally injured. The men were driving to the Company's oil fields three miles from town when struck.

VERMAR, Texas, May 12.
After shooting one of her children to death, Mrs. Victor Slavick set fire to the clothing of herself, and two other children. They were dead when neighbors forced their way in to her house. The woman is believed to have become suddenly insane.

LONDON, May 12.
The World's amateur running record for fifty miles was beaten to-day at the Stamford Bridge Athletic grounds by E. W. Lloyd, who ran the distance in 6 hours, 13 minutes, 58 seconds. J. E. Dixon, holder of the record since 1885, did the run in 28 1-5 seconds longer time.

LONDON, May 12.
The Ulster Yacht Club has notified the New York Club that Lipton's challenge intended to convey that the contest should be governed in all respects by the same conditions that prevailed at the last race. If the Club preferred, Sir Thomas was willing to race under the present rules. New York is considering.

LONDON, May 12.
At the annual meeting of the Chief Constables Association, here, J. M. Hogge, M.P., speaking of betting and gambling in their relation to crime, with special reference to football coupon gambling, said the amount wasted in this particular vice approached \$375,000,000 to \$500,000,000 a year.

UNIONTOWN, Pa., May 12.
An explosion of 500 sticks of dynamite in the magazine of the Sunshine Coal and Coke Co.'s mine, No. 1, three miles from here, has practically wiped out the little mining settlement; killing three and injuring forty, of whom twenty cases are serious. Cause unknown. General store, official residence and twenty-five small houses are uninhabitable. Residents are forced to remove elsewhere.

WASHINGTON, May 12.
President Wilson believes that negotiations between Japan and the States are not in an alarming stage, but that the interchange of views thus far have been frank and friendly lines, calculated to remove the appearance of discrimination against Japanese subjects. A Different View.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—In all his writings I.C.M. invariably takes a benevolent view of men and things. The little quotation at the head of his article on the Gipsy Troupe performance in Saturday's Daily News, might very suitably be his motto. But when he speaks "good words" indiscriminately, as I think he does in his unusual advert into the circle of concert criticism, it seems to me that the mischief it might do quite warrants a word in reply, especially when I find myself with such divergent views on the performance.

From artistic, musical, literary and refining viewpoints, I.C.M. finds the entertainment eminently satisfying. If by artistic success he means the bright costumes of the Gipsies and the stage setting, there is some truth in it, as the costumes were perhaps less bizarre and less unbecoming than many so-called fashionable creations which we see and wonder at on Water Street just now.

From a musical standpoint, I agree with I.C.M. if we think only of two performers which were in every sense musical. But after this, I must part company with him. The music of the Gipsies affected me not at all, and I cannot remember even, at this writing, whether I understood one word of either choruses or songs. No doubt the action was everything but this descent into vaudeville has nothing to do with music.

The literary standpoint hangs on the sketch (or was it a drama?) which charmed I.C.M. so much. It seems to me that all literature worthy the name, is great, first and foremost in its sincerity and truth. Now the words that were put in the mouth of the masked lady by the author of the sketch, had but one object, and that was to act a lie; to deceive a morally unstable young diplomat, who, enticed to forget his honor, becomes strong (?) enough to act a coward's part in committing suicide when he thinks all is lost. It is to put a premium on unprincipled sophistry to encourage sketches that show moral weakness, even if at the last everyone becomes good and "lives happily ever afterward."

A refining influence? No! How can anyone say so with the remembrance of the Duet and Dance by two of the Gipsies? I do not know what the song was about but the "trot" (I cannot call it a dance) which followed, surely might have been omitted with advantage. It was neither graceful nor unaffected.

Altogether it was an entertainment to "tickle" the fancy, and the mischief occurs when the shadow is taken for the substance and when this "ticking" is mistaken for refined and elevated feeling. Coleridge says "that only can which with propriety be styled refinement which, by strengthening the intellect, purifies the manners," and I am content to leave that definition without comment. I do not wish to be unduly critical and I do not think that anything I have written errs on this side as much as I.C.M.'s notice errs on the eulogistic side.

To couple the performance with "The Messiah" as a refining influence must surely be a slip of the pen. They have absolutely nothing in common.



Remarkable Escape from Starvation off Cape Horn.

Extract of letter from DAVID JAMES (Master) of the late bark "Colorado" of Glasgow.

"Having lost our ship on Staten Island, on the 5th of July, and having saved neither effects nor provisions, we were then compelled to travel over the island for ten days, subsisting on nothing but shell-fish and seaweed. On the 10th of July we came across another shipwrecked party of seventeen, the surviving part of the crew of the British ship "Dunstaffnage" of Glasgow, fourteen having perished through exposure. Now, the ship was lost on the 23rd of June, and a lot of the cargo, consisting of ERPP'S COCOA, was washed ashore out of the wreck. There was nothing saved except the Cocoa, and we, numbering twenty-five men, were kept alive on it up to the 20th of August, when we were rescued by the steamer "Mercurio" of Buenos Aires.


