



### WANT RESTITUTION OF GOLD.

WASHINGTON, To-day. A request for the restitution of \$1,-000,000 in gold, shipped from New York on the Dutch liner Noordam, to the Netherlands Overseas Trust, seized by a British cruiser in the North Sea, was made at the British Embassy to-day by representatives of Goldman Sachs Co., of New York, Britain holds gold as contraband, alleging it was intended for use in paying German trade lalances. The New York firm maintains it was shipped in the course of regular business with a Holland concern. Embassey officials said the incident would have to be taken up through the American Government. This will be done.






