AFTERNOON . SESSION.

July 5th. The Synod opened at 3.30 with the Bishop presiding. After the usual formalities, the Secretaries called the roll, when 35 Clergy and 23 Lay Delegates answered to their names Minutes of last meeting read and

Mr. Higgett's Bill to amend Chap and 9 of the Constitution was read second time, and upon motion of the introducer the House went into Committee on the same. After considerable discussion which brought forth the debating powers of the Synod, the Committee rose without reporting, and the House resumed. At 5 15 decess was taken.

#### EVENING SESSION.

The House met at 7.30 the Lord Bishop in the chair. After prayers, 41 Clergy and 50 Lay Delegates answered the Roll call. Before the House settled down to business the Rev. Canon Smart introduced the Rev. Mr. Clarke, of the Protestant Episco pal Church of America, to the Bishop and members of Synod. Mr. Clarke was the hearer of a letter from the Rt Rev. Bishop Lloyd conveying the greetings of the American Church to the Church in the Diocese of Newfoundland. The Bishop on behalf of the Synod in session as well as the whole Church in Newfoundland extended to Mr. Clarke the right hand of fellowship, and a whole souled welcome was accorded the visiting cleric who took a seat among the Brethren Mr. Clarke is here in connection with the Forward Missionary Movement and will be heard on the floors of the Synod next week.

The following Reports were read and on motion received: From Canon Bolt, Report of Council

of Queen's College. From Mr. Barton, Report of Committee on the Ordination Candidates

Fund. Canon Field presented the Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools which was on motion received and adopted. The following Resolution of sym-



The Forward Missionary Movement.

—The object of this movement is to bring efficient business methods to the attention of American Church the attention of American Church folk, in order to develop the waste energy in the Dioceses and parishes of the American Church. Over 3,000 parishes, in the Protestant Episcopal Church have been touched by this movement, adopting its methods. The result has been not only an increase in offerings from 50 p.c. to 100 p.c., but a raising of the whole standard of Church activities in every depart-

ment of parish life. Creation of the Board of Missions of the Protestant Episcopal Church took place in 1830. It was organized for the purpose of administering the Missions of the Church at Home and Abroad. The Board is now helping Bishops in 39 Dioceses and 24 Mis-Bishops in 39 Dioceses and 24 Mis-Bishops in 39 Dioceses and 24 Missionary jurisdictions in the U.S.A. and its dependences, supporting in whole or part 1,460 Missionaries. There are 10 Dioceses in the Foreign Field—3 in China, 2 in Japan, 1 each in Africa, Brazil, Cuba, Mexico and Haiti. The Board supplies wholly 345 foreign and 1.216 native workers in these foreign 1.216 native workers in these foreign fields out of the more than two million dollars given annually by American Church people.




