Household Notes.

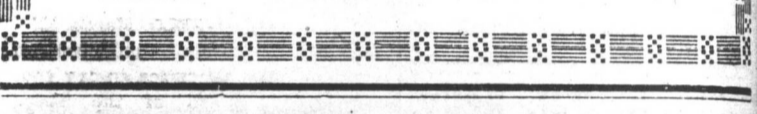

JAPS AND U. S. MARINES CLASH.
PEKING, March 14. (By the A.P.)—American marines have raided the Japanese concession at Tien Tsing forcing their way into the Japanese Consulate and assaulting the Consul, according to despatches received here. The trouble is said to have been caused by the rough treatment given American soldiers who became disorderly in the Japanese quarters of the city. Japanese soldiers drove out the Americans with fixed bayonets, it is said, wounding two of them quite seriously. The next day two hundred angry marines, who were off duty, paraded through the Japanese concession and it is alleged they attacked every Japanese encountered. When the marines reached the Consulate they forcibly entered, it is reported, and assaulted the Consul, whose injuries are understood to be serious. The Consular body is deliberating on measures to be taken to restore normal conditions. It is said that feeling is running high in Tien Tsing.

The policy of Newfoundland, said the Commissioner, was "back to the sea." Instead of "back to the land," and in this connection development of fish, transport and cold storage was of the utmost importance.

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BOLSHEVIK BOAST.

LONDON, March 14. The Bolshevik general staff at Moscow claims that during January and February the Bolshevik army occupied territory the size of France, having 1,055 miles of railroad under its control, and declares that the Soviet troops will reach Archangel by May 1st, according to a Helsingfors despatch to the Mail.

INSURRECTION AT AN END.

BASEL, Switzerland, Mar. 14. The Berlin insurrection may be considered as suppressed, Gustave Noske, the Minister of Defence, announced in the National Assembly at Weimar to-day. Only one suburb remained to be cleared of the Spartacans, the Minister stated.

GERMAN DELEGATION.

WEIMAR, March 14. (A.P.)—All the German delegates to the Peace Conference will be on an equal footing, although Count Von Brockdorff Rantau, the Foreign Minister, will be their leader. The party will not have the power to make final decisions, that is vested in the Cabinet. It will be accompanied to the conference by a large, although as yet undetermined group of experts, clerks and secretaries.

MUST BE REVISED.

BRUSSELS, March 12. Premier Delacroix announced in the Chamber of Deputies to-day that the Supreme Council of the Peace Conference had decided the treaty of April 19, 1919, between Belgium and Holland, must be revised.

ARBITRATION REFUSED.

BUENOS AIRES, March 14. Members of the Argentine Cabinet who have been endeavoring to settle the strike of port workers here, announced to-day that their efforts had failed, as both sides had refused the proffered arbitration.

STRONG CRITICISM.

OTTAWA, March 14. In reply in the House of Commons to-day to the charges of Sir Sam Hughes in reference to Sir Arthur Currie, Lieut.-Col. Peck, V.C., M.P. for Skeena, B.C., strongly criticised Sir Charles Ferguson, Military Governor of Cologne, who, he said, had put the Canadians out of bounds in a message that was insulting. Ferguson, he said, was married to a woman of Cologne, and this might account for his sympathies for the people of that

city. He was the officer who gave up Monchy, said Colonel Peck, which was retaken by the Canadians.

SPARTACANS STILL HOLDING ON.

LONDON, March 14. Spartacan forces still retain part of the Berlin suburbs of Lichtenberg and are stubbornly resisting the Government forces, an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Copenhagen says. Fighting is continuing in Lichtenberg, and also in the Karlshorst district. Numerous persons have been killed and wounded in the fighting and many buildings have been destroyed by the bombs. The despatches say that only a few messages are reaching Copenhagen from Berlin and that these are delayed.

U.S. OFFICER FOR COURT MARTIAL.

LONDON, March 14. The investigation of the stories of the remarkable air exploits of Capt. Edmund M. Chamberlain, of San Antonio, Texas, an officer of the United States Marine Corps, which has been in progress in Paris for several weeks, has developed to an extent that the American naval authorities consider a court martial necessary. The court martial, it is announced, will investigate chiefly whether Captain Chamberlain's recommendations were all forgotten and whether there was any truth whatever in his story of destroying an extraordinary number of machines in a short time.

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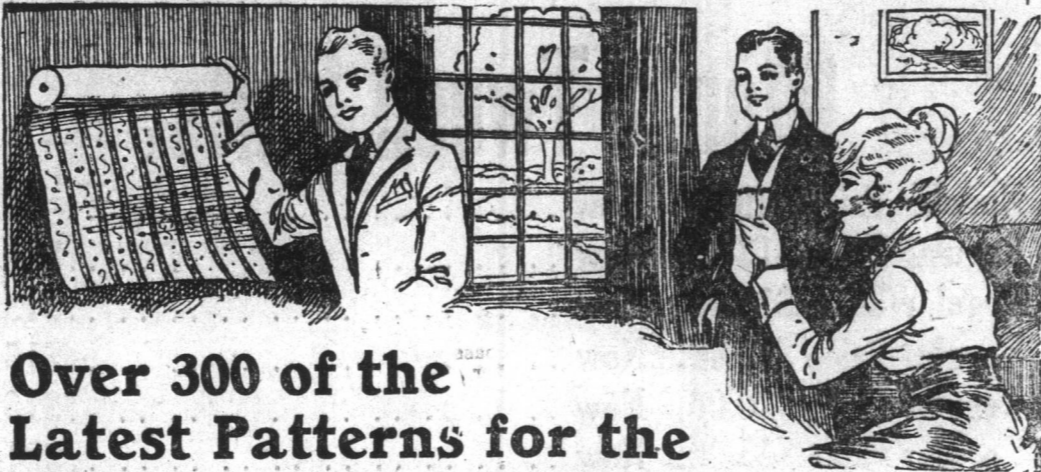

Today's Messages.

NOT A BIG LIST.

ARCHANGEL, Mar. 13. (By the A.P.)—Compared to the losses inflicted upon the enemy, the Allied casualties in the fighting along the Vaga river since February 23, have been extremely light. It is estimated that the Bolsheviks have lost at least 80,000 killed.

FOOD THE FACTOR.

PARIS, Mar. 14. (By the A.P.)—Brigadier General Harris, commander of the American military force at Berlin, has been here for several days to appear before the Supreme War Council to render a report on the military and economic situation at the German capital and throughout Germany. When General Harris' party left Berlin, the Government forces under Gustave Koeks, the German War Minister, had the upper hand, and in the Generals opinion the Govt will control the situation, particularly if food is sent to aid in holding back the Bolshevik menace from the Eastern border.

MORE WORK FOR THE DIPLOMATS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14. United States Government officials were greatly disturbed to-day by the news from Peking, that American Marines raided the Japanese Consulate at Tien Tsin, and seriously injured the consul. No official information had been received either by the State Department or the Japanese Embassy.

BOOM FOR CANADA.

PARIS, Mar. 14. Greece and Italy have joined the list of European nations that are negotiating with Canada for credit in loans, which would be employed in

the purchase of manufactured goods in Canada. France and Roumania have already signed contracts, involving credits of \$25,000,000 each, and discussions with Belgium regarding a similar loan have been proceeding for some time. The negotiations with Greece and Italy are still in their infancy, and the amount of the credits desired by these nations has not yet been stated. It is believed, however, that Greece will be in a position to pay cash for most of the things she needs and would only request a small credit.

IN "GAY PAREE" AGAIN.

PARIS, Mar. 14. President Wilson, returning to the Peace Conference, after his trip to the United States, arrived at Paris shortly after noon to-day.

SENTENCED TO DEATH.

PARIS, Mar. 14. Emile Cottin, the anarchist, who recently made an attempt upon the life of Premier Clemenceau, was to-day sentenced to death by the court martial which was trying him. The verdict of the court martial was unanimous. During his examination to-day, before the court martial trying him on the charge of wilfully attempting to murder Premier Clemenceau, Emile Cottin declared that if he had escaped after his attack upon the Premier, he would again have tried to take Clemenceau's life, if he thought he might succeed.

New Purchase.

Capt. R. F. Hollett of Great Britain, who arrived in the city on Thursday, will leave for Boston on Monday's train to bring down his new purchase, the schooner Smuggler. Capt. Hollett will take a full crew with him. The Smuggler has been engaged in the fishing business out of Gloucester for some years and is pronounced to be one of the staunchest and fastest clippers of the fleet. We wish the genial captain every success in his new purchase.

On Family Pride.

A reader friend wants me to write something about pride of birth. How I wish that there were as swift a "meeting of minds" on the subject that my friends suggest need public airing as there is on this one. You see a neighbor of mine has lately acquired a family tree. She has some beautiful white birch trees on the border of her lawn, which she seems to be proud of, but I think she would have them all cut down before she would part with the book in which that family tree flourishes. And the funny part of the thing is that there are no specially distinguished ancestors on that tree. It is the height, as it were rather than the leafage or the fruit of the tree of which she is proud. Simply Because They Can Trace Back Many Generations.

And so when my letter friend wrote "Many persons are proud of their ancestry not because of anything in the family history to be simply because they can trace back many generations, and the further back the greater glory." I recognized in him a friend and fellow sufferer. Isn't pride of birth ever justifiable, you may question? Of course it is, when it has a real foundation. Weird Remedies.

The patient of old did not differ from his twentieth-century descendant in liking a smack of mystery with his drug, and the early practitioner was apt to play up to this little weakness, just as the modern faith-healer and quack do to this day. The constant recommendation of drugs for "blackness or bruising coming of stryces" was striking. Thus of the virtue of Solomon's seal it was said: "The root is purgative, while it fresh and green, and applied, taketh away in one night, or two at the most, any bruise, black or blew spots gotten by falls or woman's wistfulness in stumbling upon their husbands' fists or such like." The majority of people at the present day, however, would be sceptical of accepting the following remedies: A live spider rolled in butter, and swallowed as a pill, was recommended as a cure for jaundice. One was advised to cut of a lock of one's hair and drink it with wine or beer, to cure plague.

Powdered Skull.
Most remarkable, however, was the belief which our ancestors had in man as a medicine. The skull, the blood, the hair—nothing came amiss or was too revolting. Most valued of all was the skulls of persons who had died violent deaths. The heads of criminals who had been hanged were, therefore, highly prized, and fetched as much as eight shillings to eleven shillings apiece if moss had grown on them. A sympathetic ointment was made of this moss in the seventeenth century—an infallible remedy against epilepsy. The skull itself was powdered. Charles II, when he suffered from

THE STORY OF
GEORGE SINGER.

How Singer Came to Newfoundland.

L. C. MORRIS.
CHAPTER I.

Note.—I have had this story in re-
serve for some of our Christmas
Numbers, for years; but now that I
have written about Evangelists, it is
just as well to publish it; for this
man, though never recognized as an
Evangelist, always posed as one. The
question which I have long asked my-
self in this case is as follows: Was
this man a fugitive from justice? Or
in plainer words, Was he Jack the
Ripper?

We now come to a most peculiar
case, and one which I myself would
hardly credit, were it not that of all
the facts, and of all the details, I was
myself the witness; and am the only
person in the world who can tell
this story.

Could this story have been publish-
ed twenty-nine years ago, the London
police would have certainly shadowed
the man of whom I am about to
write; but it takes long years to be
sure of some things, and even then
there may be a doubt. However, I
have long held my opinions as to who
this man was; and when this tale is
told the readers will perhaps see that
I have not been far astray. But I do
not ask anybody to accept my opin-
ions, although I am sure they will be
absorbed in the narrative.

The man's name was George S.
Singer, and he came here from Liver-
pool in the early autumn of the year
1889—immediately after the last of
the Hyde Park murders. The circum-
stances under which Singer came
here are unknown to the public, and
for their benefit I will narrate just
how it came about. Some seventy
years ago there was stationed at
Bonavista, an Episcopal minister
named Sall, and when he left that
parish he went back to his home in
England, and settled down to his
regular calling. He at the same
time kept in touch with his old
friends in Newfoundland, and his
family relations here were with the
very best class of people and society.

About thirty-one years ago he hap-
pened to see in a paper a letter from
some source, asking that some re-
ligious literature be collected in Eng-
land and sent to Bonavista, in New-
foundland. He having labored at
Bonavista, was naturally interested,
and he made inquiry, and found that
the request was genuine. At once the
good man set to work and made a
splendid collection of books and
tracts, and got them ready for ship-
ment. It then occurred to him that
he would like to send some person
out here with the books, to deliver
them as he wished. With this course
in view he advertised in the English
papers something like the following:
"Wanted—A young man of respect-
able education, and one interested in
religious work, to proceed to New-
foundland, and take charge of the de-
livery and distribution of Christian
literature."
The "ad" which I think was publish-
ed in the Liverpool Mercury, was re-

plied to from London; and Mr. Sall
at once answered, and requested that
the applicant call at his rectory.
Very soon the call was made, and the
man who presented himself gave his
name as George S. Singer, and as a
student for Holy Orders in the Epis-
copal Church. Dr. Sall did not know
anything about the applicant, nor did
the latter know anything about Dr.
Sall. They were both good men as
far as each other knew, and on the
common basis of religion they seem-
ed to be one. Dr. Sall evidently did
not know that George S. Singer was
a deluded man. It was not easy to
know it at first sight; but I learned it
from my study of him, and that was
why I began to suspect him, and to
shadow him.

The result of the interview at
Liverpool between the Rev. Dr. Sall
and the strange man from London,
was, that the latter was engaged to
take charge of the literature and
embark for Newfoundland, and see to
its proper distribution. And so it
came about that in the month of
September, by one of the Allan boats,
there landed at Shea & Co.'s wharf, a
man of about thirty-three or thirty-
five years of age, and without creden-
tials, or money, or friends, or
standing of any kind.

In the meantime Dr. Sall had al-
tered his plans somewhat, and had
decided to come out himself with the
literature, and thus have a chance of
visiting his old friends at Bonavista;
and so he too arrived, and stayed for
some two months; and while in the
city he was the guest of the late Sir
James S. Winter; and he preached at
St. Thomas's Church for the late
Canon Wood; and he also addressed a
 Gospel meeting at the old Temper-
ance Hall, which was held under the
auspices of the Y.M.C.A. of that date.
Dr. Sall was a very venerable man,
and his entire appearance was in his
favor. He had a real patriarchal
personality, and was a learned man;
but he gave the impression of being
rather trustful, and of being easily
deceived. He certainly was not a
reader of character; it was not his
forte; for had he looked at George S.
Singer with the remotest intention or
desire of suspicion, or with the least
tact for detection, he could not have
failed to perceive that there was
something about the man very un-
usual, and that his gaunt face and
deeply sunken eyes, told their own
tale. The Rev. Dr. Sall seems to have
placed much confidence in Singer, or
else he would not have so readily en-
gaged him; but they did not do much
co-operative work when here in the
city; and as for the literature, who-
ever got charge of it, Singer did not.
The fates seemed to be against Sing-
er, and poverty, delusion, and tragedy
followed him, and at best he was
homeless and a wanderer, and in the
end the prison doors closed upon him.
But I must not anticipate my story.

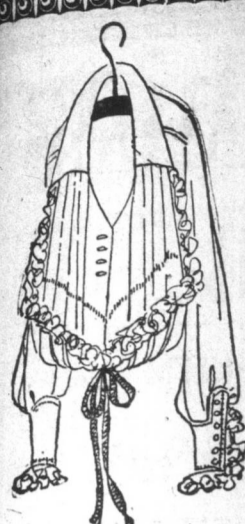

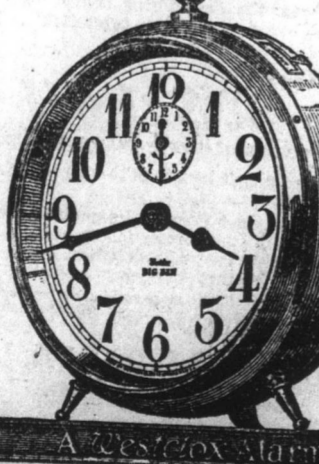

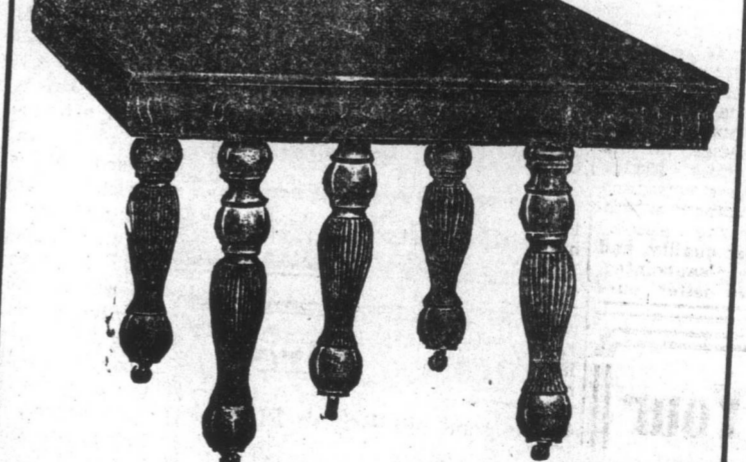
