Why the Z R-2 Failed.

The most famous predecessor of the R-38 (which became the ZR-2 on being bought by the United States Navy) was the R-34. It will be remembered that she crossed and re-crossed the Atlantic in . uly 1919. Her log was written by Gen. E M. Maitland-whose fate it afterward was to go down to the death with the ZR-2-and in that log are the following three entries, made on three separate occasions:

"Violent bumps off Dumbarton hills bring big strains on ship, particularly uopn her elevators and rudders. Strong vertical currents of air. Ship alternately up by the bow and by the stern."

"Noticeable leakage from petrol" tanks when ship takes up big angle by bow or stern, causing inpleasant smell of petrol vapor in keel. This must be remedied in

"Violent temperature bumps, evidently caused by rapid variation of sea temperature beneath us. Ship is lifted 400 feet and then dropped 500 feet-measured on our anerold. Scott, who has his head out of a window in the the tail of the ship bend under the strain."

The strain in these instances was ertical. How dangerous it may be when it is horizontal is shown by what happened to the ZR-2 when the attempt was made to swing her round for a change of course. Apparently she was not as strongly constructed, in proportion to her size, as the R-34, which she exceeded in length by 56 feet. According to the court's report, restricted construction sheds "necessitated the amost economy in design," "many new features were introduced," and "in some cases there was lack of vital aerodynamical information as to the effect of these modifications on the strength of the structure."
