APFAIRS IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—There is a dead-lock in the Newfoundland Legislature. The narrow majority by which Mr Bennet's Government was sustained at the elections was, by the desertion of one member and the appointment of two to offices which had been promised, reduced to a minority. Mr. Bennet and his calleagues resigned on the eve of the meeting of the Legislature, and Mr. Carter formed a Government which could only command a majority of one in the House. The Government's candidate for Speaker, Mr. Emerson, was only elected by his own vote, when he took the chair the House remained evenly balsneed. We had a hundred thousand square miles more territory than the United States, and our policy should be to make the development of this territory subservient to the national institutions of our country and in harmony with them. The future greatness of the country could be better estimated from our commercial activity, however, because it was an index of the industrial activity of the people. Barbarous people had no commerce, for they produced no more than they consumed Our commercial activity was well shown by looking at the proportion of commerce to population. England's commerce was over \$100 for each one of her population; Canada's \$55 per head of population; and the United States', \$31 per head. So that the commerce of our young country nearly doubled that of our powerful neighbors to the south. In shipping, the tonnage of England was in the proportion of 1½ tons to each individual of her population; that of the United States, one ton and a very small fraction per head; and that of Canada, four tons per head; the spoke of the immense advantage Canada had in possessing the cheapest outlet for the vast products of the Western States. Winckleman's, History of Ancient Art has long been a standard authority; but a few have known the career of the author, as given in the pages of this rhview—painful in its outset, tragical at its close. In a review of "The Personal Recollections" of Mrs. Somerville, we have the outline of another life, one of repose and peace, contrasting strongly with the troubled story of the other. The little Scotch lassie, whose parents thought one year's schooling when she was ten years old would fit her for her work in life, had a love for study which could not be repressed by the great discouragements which attended her early years. John Stuart Mill is the subject of arother biographical article, in which the development of his mind is illustrate? by reference to the works produced at the different stages of his career. Other articles are "Simplification of the Law;" "Sacerdotalism, Ancient and Modern," treating on the history and growth of Protestant confessions, and other ritualistic observances; "Lombard Street," showing the importance of the Cash Reserve of the banking department of the Bank of England, as the ultimate safety fund of the English meroantile system; "The Despotism of the Future," of universal interest in these days when the labour question is being agitated all over the world; "Prosper Merimee's Lettres d'une Inconnue," which have created such an extraordinary sensation in Paris; "Russian Songs and Folk-Tales," illustrating Sclavonic Mythology and Russian Social Life; and "The Difficulties of the Liberal Party." Every article is worth reading.

Splendil Wedding Gift.

A splendid wedding gift, of the value of 2,000 guineas, was presented to Hi Royal Highness the Duchess of Edit burgh, on the part of the officers of the Reyal Navy and Royal Marines, on he arrival in London. It takes the form of a dessert service of gold plate, the principal feature of which is a large hexage nal plateau bearing the arms of Englan and Russia in relief, the monogram of the Duke and Duchess, and this inscription:—"Presented to her Imperia Highness the Grand Duchess Maria Alexandrovna, of Russia, on her marriage with Captain His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh, R. M. K. G., by the Moers of the Royal Navy and Royal farines." Each angle of the plateau is alleved by finely modelled water nymphs and friezes. The centre piece is of tripod yrm, and enriched with many beautiful gures. There are also two seven-light at two smaller candelabra, pair of aret-pitchers, six fruit-stands, twelve it-cellars of an ingenious shape, and her articles. The entire service is signed, and modelled from works of the nque-Cento period.
