

East Toronto Election Trial.

The trial of this case took place on Thursday before Chief Justice Richards. Mr. John O'Donohue was the respondent. The petition charged, in the usual terms, bribery by the sitting member and his agents. When the case was called, Mr. Bethune said he had only the previous day received the particulars of the case, and had then only come to the knowledge that bribery had been committed by agents without the respondent's knowledge, and he was prepared to admit there was sufficient evidence of this within the meaning of the Act to try the case. The expenses of the election, however, were not over \$1,400. He believed it proper to make this statement at the commencement of the case, as there was a large number of witnesses in attendance, and the expense would be enormous. There were personal charges urged by the opposite side against the respondent, and if they wished to proceed with those they might do so. His client was quite prepared to meet them. One or two witnesses were examined as to bribery by agents, and after that, the counsel for the petitioner accepted the proposition made by Mr. Bethune, not to press the charge of direct bribery by respondent. His Lordship, therefore, declared the election void; that no corrupt practices had been proven to have been committed by the respondent at the election; that John Barron and David Kelly have been proved at the trial to have been guilty of corrupt practices; and that, if it has not been proved that corrupt practices have been carried on to any considerable extent. Costs to be paid by the respondent.

THE RYKERT INVESTIGATION.—A great deal of interest is taken in the proceedings of the Rykert Committee, which has now got fairly to work. The evidence so far relates to the part Mr. Rykert took in the Toronto Street Railway legislation, and the sums he received for services rendered in connection with the Kieley bill in opposition to another bill for the incorporation of a rival Company. The other matters in connection with the investigation will be proceeded with at subsequent meetings of the Committee. Mr. Kerr conducted the examination for Mr. McKellar, and Mr. Cameron for Mr. Rykert.

WHOLESALE LYING.—For real downright lying commend us to the London Free Press. We have on more than one occasion exposed its falsehoods regarding matters in connection with the Agricultural College, and yet it persists in reiterating these day after day, or in coining new ones to suit its purpose. In an editorial on the College on Thursday it indulges in two regular thumpers, which we simply mention as a sample of its ingenuity in fabricating the most unfounded stories about this Institution. It says that the first Matron for the College was appointed nine months before the Government took possession of the farm; that the late Principal was appointed the same way, and that both were living at the public expense for nine months before they moved on to the farm. We need not say how wide of the truth is this assertion, and that these officials were only about the same number of weeks as the Free Press makes months residing in Guelph before they went to live on the farm. Such are the weapons the Tory papers are using in decrying the College and everything connected with it.

The Reformers of North Bruce have again unanimously nominated as their candidate for the Local Legislature their present able member, Mr. Donald Sinclair, who has accepted the nomination. Few men have more the unqualified respect and confidence of all parties than the member for North Bruce, and he is held in equal respect in the House, where his remarks are always listened to with attention.

Judge Johnson has unseated Hurreau (Conservative), at L'Assomption, for corrupt practices by agents. The respondent resigned on proof being made. The Judge denied the petition of Mr. Forest, who claimed the seat on the ground of disqualification. The nomination for South Norfolk will be held on the 9th prox., and the polling a week after.

LAUNDER IN A PUNK.—In the Public Accounts Committee on Wednesday, Mr. Launder got angry and left the room, giving as a reason that he would not submit to any law. He wanted to be allowed to examine the papers while the rest of the Committee were busy about something, and the chairman decided that confusion would be avoided by the Committee acting in union, and getting through with one account at a time. Even Rykert was ashamed of Launder and left him to stop his nonsense, but Launder refused, and after trying to bully the members he left the business went on peacefully.

THE MONTREAL SWINDLER.—Phillips, the patent rights agent arrested on a charge of having conspired with McKinnon, of Toronto, to defraud A. C. Sutherland, merchant, of Montreal, of \$24,000 on fraudulent pretences, has been discharged by the Police Magistrate, owing to informality in the complaint. He is, however, still held on a capias, concerning a motion to quash it on similar grounds was made and taken on de die. We gave the particulars of this astounding case in Thursday's issue.

ANOTHER OLD LANDMARK REMOVED.—Mr. Andrew Pettit, of Grimsby, died on the 15th instant, at the residence of his son, Rev. Charles Pettit, rector of Richmond, county Carleton, at the ripe age of 84 years. Mr. Pettit, the son of U. E. Loyalist, was the second or third white child born in the neighborhood of Grimsby. He served in the war of 1812, being present in several engagements at that time. Two of his sons served in the rebellion of 1838; two more and his son-in-law in 1866. Among the oldest of the settlers there was no man in the surrounding country more universally respected and esteemed in every department of life.

The writs for the general election for the Local Legislature, in Nova Scotia, have been issued. The nominations will be on the 10th of December and the elections on the 17th.

THE GOODNESS MONDAY REWARD.—Miss Mary Handley before the Law Committee of the Brooklyn Common Council, testified under oath that she was hired by Kate Stoddard, and that she was also promised the reward in case she was successful. She then detailed her search for Kate Stoddard and Kate's arrest. Chief Campbell gave similar testimony, and added that he believed from information which he had received from Kate Stoddard that she was the murderer of Mr. Goodrich. He refused to tell what this information was. General Jordan and Mr. Folk gave similar testimony, and the committee in executive session resolved to recommend the payment of the reward to Miss Handley.
