



Dayton was situated in a gully two and a half miles wide, between two ranges of hills. According to Canadian geologists this whole gully was a watercourse in some prehistoric age. PARCELS POST CUTS INTO EXPRESS

Washington, April 1-Express companies of the country have been hindered by the operation of the new parcel ost system, according to the statement submitted to the Interstate Commerce commission today by the counsel for the companies in their final arguments against the reduction in the express rates proposed by the commission. It was declared that the companies have suffered a loss of about 25 per cent. in all small package business—a loss which amounts to about 6 per cent. of the gross revenues of the com-


