Law on the Subject of the Franchise-he Government Officials who Cannot Cast a Ballot for Assemblymen, he following, with relation to the fran-lo, will be found useful as polling day

The following, with relation to the franchise, will be found useful as polling day approaches:

1. The only persons who can vote (except by "tendered ballot") are persons whose names are on the first and third parts of the voter lists as sent out by the judge to the clerk of the peace. This is the first and indischashe qualification.

2. The second essential is that the person claiming the right to vote is at the time of the election and was at the time of the election and was at the time of the final revision and correction of the assessment roll, a resident and domiciled within the electoral district.

3. He must be of the age of 21 years.

4. He must be by birth or naturalisation a British subject. The foregoing are essentials in the qualifications of all voters.

By 51 V., c. 4, the Manhood Suffrage Act, fi is enacted as follows:

Every male person of the full age of 21 years, a subject of Her Majesty by birth or naturalisation, and not disqualified under sections a and 5 of the Ontario Election Act, or under this act, and not otherwise by law prohibited from voting, shall, if duly entered on the list of voters proper to be used, be entitled to vote at elections to serve in the Legislative Assembly of this grovince.




