We may not all agree with that judgment, as a very strong contra case can readily be made out in favor of the province being 9ntitled to reap a fair share of the products of the natural wealth in the public of the natural wealth in the public lands. Even those who agree with this view, however, can see that if the provincial exchequer hopes to benefit by the development chequer hopes to benefit by the development of mining in the province, the Government would be amply justified in doing what it could to hasten this development. 
