### VACCINATED ON THE STAGE.

**Caddy Gaiety girls** infected by the City Physician.

New York, Dec. 4.—Thirty Gaiety girls and 10 Gaiety men, all members of the "Gaiety Girl" Company, were vaccinated on Monday by city physicians. Then, with other members of the company, who didn't have to submit to the needle, they were taken to the hospital, where they were vaccinated because they had been vaccinated or had had the smallpox, they went to their homes, packed their trunks and left at 4 o'clock for Boston, with a clean bill of health.

One member of the company remained behind, however. The cause of his remaining and the cause of the wholesale vaccination were one and the same. He is Harry Monahan, the leading comedian of the company. He was in the Reception Hospital, at the foot of East 16th-street, yesterday. He will be on North Brother Island this morning. Probably he will be able to join the company in 10 days or a couple of weeks. How he got the disease is a mystery. Health-board inspectors were trying to solve it yesterday, and will be on trying until they do. It wasn't known to anybody what his complaint was until Saturday. Very few of the members of the company knew it until they were about to be vaccinated yesterday morning. Then they said they were sorry for him and held out their bare arms.

The company got through at Daly's, after a protracted run, on Saturday night, a week ago, and opened at the Harlem Opera House the Monday night following. Monahan played the part of Dr. Montague Brierly, as usual, but complained to Manager Malone that he didn't feel well--was sick at his stomach and had a headache.

"Well," said Manager Malone, "go home and lay up for a day or two, as to get fit for the Boston engagement."

Monahan went to No. 131 West 45th-street, where he was living with friends. The next day he was no better, and on Tuesday night he had a fever, his underbody, played his part. He played it for the rest of the week, too, for Monahan was a very good actor, and a physician who was attending him saw signs of varioloid on Saturday, and he summoned Chief of the Bureau of Contagious Diseases, Dr. Doty, who ordered the patient to the Reception Hospital. Then Dr. Doty conferred with Managers Malone of the company, and Rosenberg of the Opera House. He told them it would be necessary to vacinate every Gaiety girl and man, and every employe of the Opera House.

Both managers assented readily, and said that everything possible should be done. It means a special deal to them. Manager Malone, at the end of the performance on Saturday night, put up a "call." It was to the effect that every member of the "Gaiety Girl" company should be at No. 1225 Broadway, in the morning, adjoining Daly's Theatre on the uptown side, and the girls assume it was for a rehearsal. The notice didn't say for what, and the girls assumed it was for a rehearsal.

"What?" they asked. "Rehearsal to-morrow and go to Boston at 4 in the afternoon?"

But they were all there on time, and Manager Malone explained to them the emergency that had arisen. They must be vaccinated.

"Will it hurt much?" asked a number in chorus.

"Certainly not," answered Dr. Harrison. "I've vaccinated a hundred of them."

The doctors got out their vaccine points, and they vaccinated the men first. Then Manager Malone whispered to Miss Maud Libson, who is of robust build and philosophical.

"You go first," he said, "that'll brace up the rest of 'em."

She removed her wraps and waist, and held out her bare, right arm to one of the doctors, never flinching when the point pierced the flesh. They Fitzgerald, Decima Moore, Blanche Massey and others followed quickly, the operation lasting only the fraction of a minute. Some of them squeaked "Ow!" when the point went in, but as seemed to regard the whole transaction as a joke, and there was a good deal of laughter throughout. All of the members' names and addresses were taken by Manager Malone as they marched bravely up to the sacrifice. This information was for the Health Department, and will be used in the effort to trace the disease. All were pronounced to be in good physical condition, and the doctors agreed that there was no reason in the world why they should not go to Boston in the afternoon.

### A PURELY CANADIAN LINE.

The St. James' Gazette comments on the Earl of Jersey's Report.

London, Dec. 4.—The St. James' Gazette this afternoon commenting upon the report which the Earl of Jersey has submitted to the Colonial Office upon his mission to the recent intercolonial conference held at Ottawa, says: "It appears that on the whole the Earl of Jersey thoroughly supports the views of the colonial delegates on the great question of international imperial mail and cable routes. The Earl is also understood to favor a liberal policy in regard to the treatment of colonial questions."

The Gazette, however, disapproves of the plan of assisting a new line of steamers by dividing the subsidy now paid for carrying the mails to New York, adding: "The Government is quite rich enough to pay for its bi-weekly service to New York and for a weekly line to Canada as well. The expense would not be great, and we should get a new set of splendid steamers, which would be available as cruisers. The most interesting part of the report relates to preferential trade arrangements among the colonies themselves and between the colonies and Great Britain. The Earl of Jersey does not find any valid objection to this, and thinks we can if we like grant preferential trade advantages to our colonies, though the unlucky Belgian and German treaties prevent us from getting any benefits in each which are not shared by Germany and Belgium. Obviously, the first thing to do is to get these conventions modified."

The paper does not believe that the Government is likely to trouble itself in regard to the report, which, it says, is evidently a mere suggestion as to commercial arrangements of the colonies.

### Did You See Them?

A long string of lorries, with curious bundles wrapped in straw and enormous cases passing up Yonge-street last week, excited our curiosity. On enquiring, we found that it was a shipment of English brass and iron beds, consigned to the Schenberg Furniture Co. On further investigation, we found a member of the firm, who stated that their trade in these goods has so rapidly increased that they are thinking of extending their already large premises to accommodate it. They are old hands at the business, and state that they can sell as many as 1000 beds a day. We think this statement is correct, as the same lorries that delivered the beds to them took back with them consignments to retail houses in different parts of the province.

### James Jimmy Muldoon.
