Agricultural. Bones as a Fertilizer. - Henry Stewart sets forth the value of bones as a fertilizer in a very plain manner. They consist, when fresh, of 63½ per cent, of mineral matter of which 55 per cent., of the bone, is phosphate of lime, 31½ per cent. of organic matter, chiefly gelatine and fat, and five per cent of mitrogen; the mineral matter contains from 20 to 25½ per cent. of hosphoric acid, and 30 to 35 per cent. of lime. The phosphoric acid and the nitrogen are the valuable elements, the former being worth, at six cents a pound, \$1.50, and the latter, at 25 cents a pound, \$7 cents; 100 pounds of bone, then, in a condition to be available would be worth \$2.37. But bones when whole are only slowly soluble in the soil. In moist soil they will decay and wholly disappear, only in so many years that it is necessary to reduce them to a fine state of division to make them useful. This is done by grinding them to powder or by burning them to ashes. The latter method is the cheaper, but the nitrogen is lost, and if the bones can be reduced to powder for less than the value of the nitrogen, the more dostly method is the better. But in many cases it is impossible to grind them for want of mills, and then the burning becomes the only practicable method.
