





How Vegetables Should Be Housed for the The season when all vegetables should be placed in securely frostproof apartments, in order to keep them in a good and wholesome condition throughout the winter months, is already at hand. The main object in storing fruit and vegetables is to do so in such a manner that they will undergo as little change as possible, therefore, great care should be taken to have all the products o the orchard and garden placed in thei winter quarters in a fresh and uninjured condition. When possible to do otherwise vegetables should not be placed in the cellar under the dwelling house. First, it is very apt to cause sickness in the family. Many

vegetable matter. Vegetables stored in a cellar in a careless more to the pound. When possible, potatoes should be placed in barn cellars which are entirely frost proof and where the light can not enter. Earth cellars or pits are also excellent receptacles for potatoes.
