MONKEYS SURVIVED CHOLERA MICROBES

Researches of French Scientists Have Interesting Results ----Curative Serum Discovered.

PARIS, Aug. 5 .- Director Roux of the Pasteur Institute has outlined to the Academy of Sciences results of the researches of Drs. Podevin and Vial. These experimenters injected cholera microbes into monkeys, finding that in some cases, after weak injecto fresh infection.

A serum made from the blood of reovering monkeys appears to have an appreciable curative effect on monkeys freshly and artificially injected with cholera microbes.

# THE CENTRAL GOLD RESERVE SCHEME.


Finance Minister White's stay in London synchronizes with the appearance of an article in The Londor Times, explaining the purpose and intent of the clauses in the last Bank Act creating a central gold reserve.

At present the banks have in their vaults about 38 million dollars in specie, and hold Dominion notes for which they may demand gold from the Dominion Government aggregating 94 million dollars. These Dominion notes to the extent of 77 million dollars are large "bank legals," i.e., notes of the denomination of \$5000 used in clearing balances among the banks. Now the banks would like to have more of their gold represented by currency in circulation. They could easily get for their gold, or big bank legals, Dominion notes in dominations of \$5 and multiples thereof, but they prefer not to have any Dominion notes in circulation.

By the central gold reserve legis lation, the banks will be able to draw their gold or a considerable part of it from the vaults of the government, deposit it in the central reserve, and issue bank notes against it. This legislation will therefore enable the banks to get an emergency currency at all times, without permitting the circulation of Dominion notes among the people, and we are told:

Press.)-"If Fermany bids above present navy law, hen our policy wil be to keep to one," was the striking statement of Lord Ashby St. Ledger during the house of lords' debate yesterday on the shipshipbuilding policy of the government. The debate was initiated by Lord Selborne, who indicted the government for deliberately facing a short sixty per cent. margin which it was agreed was necessary and which they themselves had laid down. In 1915, Germany would have 26 dreadnoughts in the North Sea, while Britain would only have a total of 49 exclusive of those not built by Brit 39, exclusive of those not built by Brit-39, exclusive of those not built by Brit-ish taxpayers. He said nothing about Canadian ships for that was a matter for the people of Canada. He only asked the house to vote how sorely that help from Canada was needed.
