Borden has cut short his fishing trip at Echo Beach and is today back in his office at the parliament buildings hard at work, with no thought of getting any holiday between now and November.

The motive which has prompted the government to prepare for a late summer or early fall campaign comes from Washington and reciprocity is in danger of deteat in the United States by way of the Root amendment and other amendments. So Former President of the Farmers' Bank Argued, and Witnesses Gave Evidence in Support - Letter From Munro to Travers Spoke of "Rumors,"

After the examination of a number f witnesses, including W. R. Travers, former manager, in an effort to establish that Col. James Munro of Embro, president of the Farmer Bank at the time of its suspension, had wilfully signed returns falsely showing the position of the bank, the crown concluded its case late yesterday afternoon. Judgment was reserved by Judge Winchester. H. H. Dewart, K.C., appeared for Col. Munro, and Louis Monahan represented the

The accused banker, while acknow ledging the signatures as his, stoutly naintained that he had signed the returns believing them to be correct. The evidence of Mr. Travers and Accountant Fitzgibbon supported this testimony, each declaring that the president had attached his name to the reports without, so far as they were aware, any idea that they did not truly represent the bank's status.

Letter a Bombshell.

Somewhat of a sensation was caused by the introduction by the crown of a private letter written by Col. Munro to Travers in December, 1909. It referred to "numors" which the writer thought the bank could not afford to disregard, and suggested that Dr. Beattle Nesbitt be compelled to pay his indebtedness to the bank, "as pay his indebtedness to the bank, as many people seem to know of it and claim he is worth nil."

If those markets begin to get glutted, then it is only a few hundred miles to the Queen City of Ontario and metropolitan colleagues in the province. In Close Touch With Cities. "This contiguity to Ontario towns and cities of importance, and especial-

ly Toronto with its 400,000 population, is in reality a wonderful factor. Pioneering in the old days usually meant hard work, long hours, empty stomachs and chronic loneliness. That is a vital consideration, as the settlement of agricultural lands in the north country is ne-cessarily the foundation of trade, commerce and prosperity in its tributary territory.



FOR BEPAIRING INTAK City Gets Three Tenders For Job-Five Hundred Feet Extension to Cost \$62,000.

REFUSE TO FIX TIME

The repairs and extension of the intake pipe were the subjects of discussion at the meeting of the board or control yesterday, in which City Engineer Rust did some fencing with Acting-Mayor Spence and the control-

The Canada Foundry Co.'s tender for the new intake mouth, to cost \$1750, and flexible joints of the pipe, to cest \$1418 each, were both accepted.

For the finishing of the repair work on the broken intake pipe, three tend-ers were received and opened, the con-

ers were received and opened, the controllers being disappointed to find that nobody would guarantee any set time for the work. Capt. Lesslie, as promised, had his name in for the job. He asked for the rental of the city plant, at a price to be agreed upon between himself and the city engineer, \$500 a month, and overtime, and 15 per cent. over the costs. His was the third tender opened.

The names of the other two tenderers were not given out. One asked merely to supervise the city men's work on the city's plant, and to gather in 12½ per cent. This company thought the work could be done in five weeks under ordinary circumstances, but if there was less sand in the southern end of the pipe than thought at present, two weeks' time would do the work. The other company came for-ward with what the controllers thought the best offer, they having their own plant and men, and declaring that all the latter were used to marine work. Probably the plant could get used to it. this, however, being specified. They would take the job entirely in their hands, the price set being 20 per cent. over costs. The city engineer will report on the tenders for the council's confidention part Monday. nsideration next Monday

No New Pipe This Year. Despite wondering comments. Mr. Rust kept strongly to his former declaration that it was impossible to lay the new pipe extension this year, as there was considerable dredging to do before the pipe could be laid in place. A great deal of this dredging, some 500 for the pipe land but even then. feet, was on land, but even then, it was impossible to facilitate matters beyond a certain speed, declared the

"I think every engineer will agree with me," he said. "that it is impossible to put in the extension this year." Controller Spence wanted him to put men out by day labor on the work on Monday, but Mr. Rust objected to any work being done before the tenders were let, and his point was carried. "The work must drag into next sea-son." said Mr. Rust. "The only thing to do is to put a premium on quicker

work."
The only tender for the pipe for the extension work was from the Canada Foundry Co.. which made the city two offers. In one offer the company guarantees to have 500 of the required 3500 antees to have 500 of the required 3500 feet on hand in 70 days and the feet on hand in 10 days and the balance in 160 days. The cost would be \$11.75 a foot, or \$62.125 for the entire quantity. The other scheme was a guarantee to have the first 500 feet on hand in 30 days and the balance in 90 days, at a cost of \$20.75 a foot, or \$72.625. The former offer was accepted, the controllers agreeing that even if the controllers agreeing that even the pipe was on hand in 30 days, it would only lie idle waiting for the dredging, and so money would be lost.

The opening up of a new Canadian bank with practically all outside capital and the incoming of old country funds in payment of many security flotations is gradually easing the local money market, and this should prove beneficial to the stock market. In the present state of the public mind, however, it will require considerable effort to work up speculation.
