NOT PUBLIC POLICY TO STOP HOUSING

Mayor Makes Affidavit That Attempts at Interference Are Locally Inspired.

In connection with the motions to quash the Toronto housing bylaw and to restrain the commission from going on with its work, Mayor Church has filed an affidavit, in the course of which he says:

"I fully believe that the present proceedings are inspired, not by any feeling of public policy, but solely to prevent the building of houses by the Toronto Housing Commission on a certain piece of land on the south side of Lincoln avenue, on both sides of Web avenue in the city of Toronto.

RECEPTION HOSPITAL NOT YET PLANNED

The government of Canada has proclaimed Peace Day, July 19, 1919, as a public holiday, and in order to admit of as many members of the postal staff as possible participating in the national thanksgiving for victory and peace, the general postoffice and postal stations in Toronto will be closed except between hours of 8 a.m. and 10 a.m., during which period postage stamps will be sold, and general delivery and registration wickets will be open.

GERMAN TAX BILL WILL HIT INCOMES

EXCHANGE MARKET IS DEMORALIZED

Sterling and Francs at Lowest Quotations Ever Recorded in New York.

New York, July 16.—Absence of a short account with a heavy influx of commercial cotton and grain bills resulting from the approach of the crop moving season were the reasons attributed today for further violent declines in the foreign exchange market when sterling and francs fell to the lowest quotations ever recorded here, while the Italian rate approached the low point made during the war.

According to bankers conversant with existing conditions, still further declines of grain, cotton and dried fruits are taken specially to stabilize the market. One large dealer in foreign exchange declared he would not be surprised to see English ship money gold to this center to improve the situation, as she did in 1915, provided she can spare the metal. Large shipments of grain, cotton and dried fruits are going to England, he said, and nothing is being received in return.
