





Particulars of the Arrangement Concluded Between Britain and France. London, Jan. 18.—The abundant talk f the Anglo-French alliance is based

London, Jan. 18.—The abundant talk of the Anglo-French alliance is based on the agreemnt recently signed by Great Britain and France relative to the partition of Siam.

Under the new convention France acquires the whole western valley of the Mekong River and part of the eastern valley of the upper Mekong, all of which territory comprises the richest of the Siamese provinces. England takes the territory west of the Menam valley and absorbs the Malay peninsula, so that the Indian Empire will extend in an unbroken line from Beloochistan to the Straits Settlements. France wanted to seize Bankok, the Siamese capital, which would have completely put an end to the kingdom of Siam, but England objected. Siam proper will now be confined to the valley of the Menam.

Both powers have now turned their attention to a settlement of the question of the Niger territory in Africa, for which purpose a joint commission will be formed.



Mr. Brady was born in Warren County, N.Y., in 1823. For 15 years before the Civil War he conducted a studio in New York. In 1851 he entered his work in a London exhibition and tcok first prize. His pictures were to be seen all over Europe. During the War of the Rebellion, Mr. Brady placed a corps of artists in the field and obtained a famous collection of war studies at a cost of \$100,000. The Government now owns the plates.




