ONTARIO LAND SURVEYORS

Proceedings of the Second Day's Sessions in Toronto Yesterday.

Papers on Sewage Purification, Polar Research, Waterworks, York - Street Bridge and Technical Topics - Report of the Committee on the Engineering of 1897.

The measurement of time is no part of the practical equipment of our land surveys, if punctuality is the standard of measurement. At 10 o'clock yesterday morning the only member of the association present in the "Glorious Hole" was A. R. Oude of Altonston, who for want of better company silently smoked his pipe and mused. But at 10.30 a fair representation of the members had assembled and the meeting opened.

Engineering in 1897.

Mr. A. W. Campbell read the report. He said the past year had brought forth a number of important engineering works and numerous developments in science. The most striking was the projection of the railway from Guelph to the Stikine River to Lake Tetlow, in order to open up the Klondike. In Ontario there was the possibility of a railway being built from a point on the C.P.R. north to James Bay. These works would develop the mines and other resources of these districts. Among the important engineering schemes of the year was mentioned the exploitation of water-power at Chambly and LaSalle, where water plants were erected to generate and transmit electricity.
