

Sudbury Waterworks.

S. V. Rorke's paper upon "Sudbury Waterworks," was read by D. D. James, Sudbury became a town two years ago; it now has 2000 inhabitants. Wells are scarce in town, the water flowing through the town not being drinkable, and water was worth 25 cents a barrel, hence the waterworks system was readely decided upon. Lake Ramsay, about three-quarters of a mile from town, was used as the source of supply. A steel tower 80 feet high holds the water drawn off the lake. Thus extremely high pressure is obtained. The total cost of this up-to-date system was about \$45,000.

Prof. C. H. McLeod, M.E., Chief Astronomer of McGill University, secretary of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, was present, and said a few words at the request of the president. 
