New York, March 9.—For the first time in its history the Eastern League of professional baseball clubs, which held its annual meeting at the Hotel Hamilton, Toronto, today, wound up its business in one continuous session. "That this league ratifies the action taken by the National League in regard to rowdy ball players, and that the President is empowered to appoint a Board of Discipline consisting of three members, to pass upon all complaints."
