Galveston, Sept. 13.—Galveston is beginning to slowly recover from the stunning blow of last week, and, although the city appears to-night to be pitifully desolated, the authorities and the commercial and industrial interests are setting their faces to work, and a start has at last been made toward the resumption of business on a moderate scale.

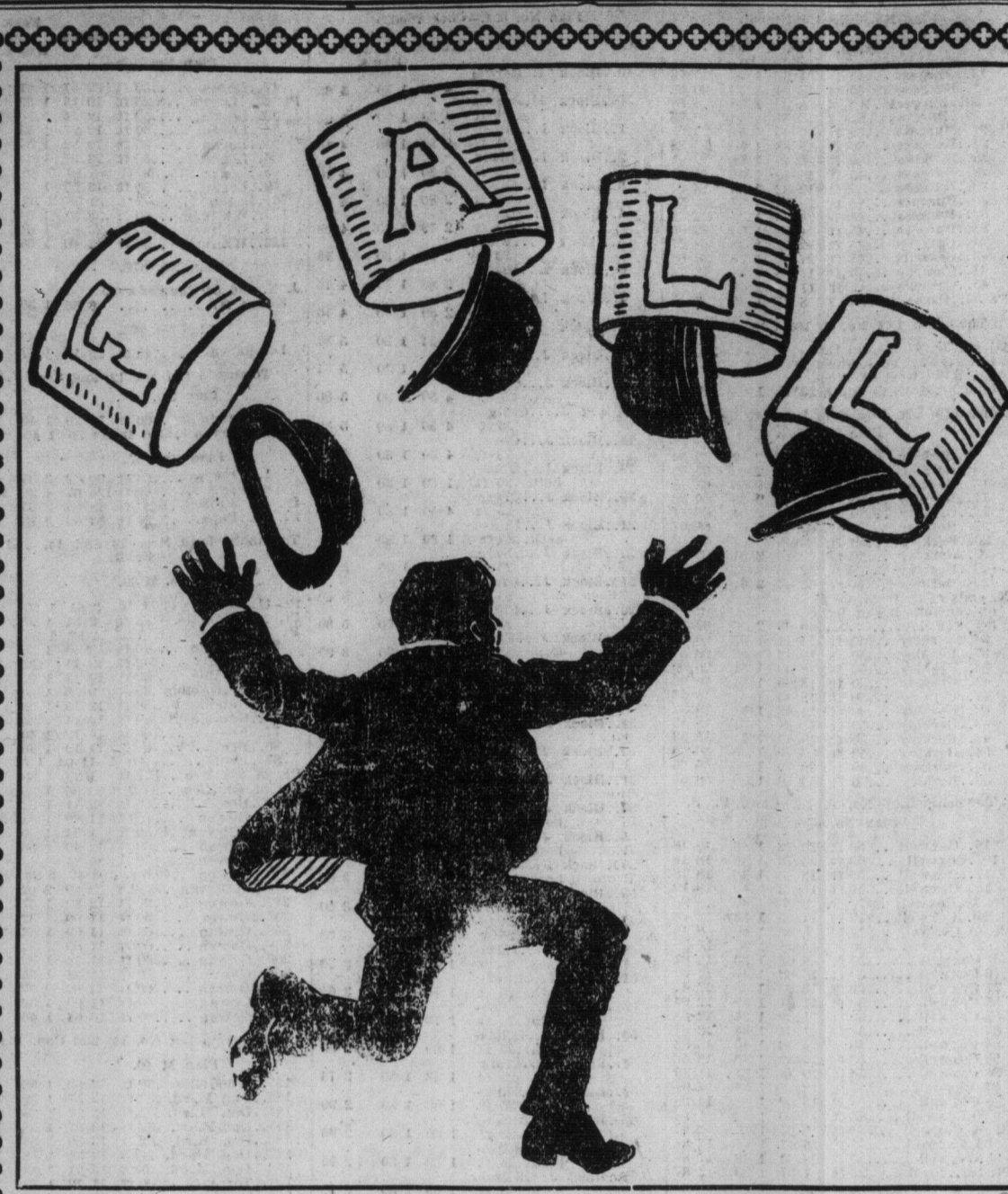
