Hamilton, Dec. 9.—The aldermen in Council this evening sat for two and a half hours and disposed of all the business but the final passage of bylaws. It was resolved to expend \$200 for half an acre of land on Burlington Heights belonging to the P. Patterson estate, to enable the city to lower the approaches to the new bridge that the Grand Trunk will erect over its main line. It was stated that the work on the approaches apart from the land mentioned would be about \$1000. Several of the aldermen foresaw various dangers and wanted the recommendation referred back to the Board of Works, but a majority said nay to this, and the report was adopted.

BALLOON AID TO MEDICINE

It Provides Method of Determining Whether Patient Should Be Sent to Mountain Resort.

EXPERIMENTS IN THIS DIRECTION

Day May Come When Assent in Balloon May Be Necessary to Diagnosis.

Paris, Dec. 9.—According to The Herald, the Academy of Medicine received yesterday an important communication from Dr. Albert Robin, Dr. Maurice Binet and Dr. Dupasquier on the changes which respiration undergoes at a high altitude...

From 2000 to 2500 metres above the sea level the pulse and respiration quickened, and the absorption of oxygen and the formation of carbonic acid increased in a notable proportion.
