Bominion Creameries.

Mr. A. E. Howey of the Dairy Commissioner's staff left yesterday for the Northwest Territories to assist in the work of developing the creamery business under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture. There are six superintendents now engaged in this work, under Prof. Robertson's direction, and two traveling inspectors. The duty of these officers is to see that the cold storage arrangements in connection with the creameries are properly carried out and that the plant and machinery are properly put up. The places where creameries will shortly be in operation are as follows: Yorkton, Moosomin, Whitewood, Grenfell, Wolseley, Indian Head, Qu'Appelle Station, Regina, Moose Jaw, Maple Creek, Prince Albert, Calgary, Innisfil, Red Deer, Witaskiwin and South Edmonton. In addition to these there will be 11 or 12 skimming stations, at which the cream will be separated from the milk and then forwarded by rail to one or other of the creameries.




