

RULES

OF THE

DOMINION ARTILLERY

ASSOCIATION.

1. That the Association be called the Dominion of Canada Artillery Association, and have for its object the development of gunnery skill, and the dissemination of Artillery knowledge throughout the Dominion of Canada.

2. That the annual subscription for individual members be two dollars, which will give the right of voting at any regularly organized meeting, other than a meeting of Council. A donation of twenty dollars in cash, at any one time, or a prize of not less value than forty dollars, to be competed for at a general prize meeting, shall entitle the donor to be elected a life member.

3. That any Canadian Artillery or Engineer corps, the Royal Military College Cadets, and the Artillery Detachment of the North West Mounted Police Force, subscribing not less than ten dollars per Field and five dollars per Garrison Battery per annum, may become affiliated to this Association.

4. The affairs of the Association to be managed by a Council, to consist of ex-officio members and such others as may be elected at a General meeting; Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors of Artillery, the Deputy Adjutant-General of Districts and Brigade Majors, all Officers Commanding affiliated Artillery Brigades or Batteries and Engineer Corps, the Director of Stores, the Commandaat and Professors (being Officers), Royal Military College, Military Secretary to the Governor-General, and President of the Dominion Rifle Association, to be ex-officio members of Council, five to form a quorum.

5. The Office bearers to consist of a President and Vice-Presidents of Council, Secretary and Treasurer,—the latter to be elected annually.

6. Representatives to the Council from affiliated corps must be members of the Association by affiliation or otherwise.

7. The Council may from time to time make such by-laws as they deem necessary, but no by-law to be altered, or new law introduced, without giving 14 days notice to each member of the Council.

8. The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary, and open to the inspection of any member of the Council.

- 9. Extraordinary meetings may be called when required by the President or Vice-President of Council, 14 days notice of such meeting being given to each member of Council, and the object of the meeting stated.
- 10. Two Auditors to be appointed annually to examine the Treasurer's accounts previous to the Annual meeting.
- 11. The Treasurer shall be required to deposit all sums of money paid over to him on behalf of the Association, in a Saving's bank.
- 12. The payments of money for current expenses must be authorized by the President, or in his absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents of Council; other payments to be made only on authority of Council.
- 13. All prize meetings to be held at such times and places as may be agreed upon by the Council and sanctioned by the proper authorities.
- 14. All competitions to be under the superintendence of an umpire appointed by the Inspector of Artillery, and whose decision will be final.
 - 15. All competitions to be closed on the 31st December of each year.
- 16. An Annual report from the Secretary and Treasurer to be submitted to the Council before publication.
- 17. That in cases requiring special legislation the President or Vice-President of the Council are empowered to call special meetings of Council in their respective Provinces. Resolutions adopted at such Provincial meetings are in no case to interfere with rules already agreed to at a General meeting, and are, before being finally adopted, to be passed by a General Meeting.
- 18. That members of Council, not being life members, must pay the annual subscription of two dollars to remain as such.
- 19. The Annual Meeting of the Association to take place at Ottawa on the second Thursday after the meeting of Parliament.
- 20. Commanding Officers in order to be allowed to claim credit for voluntary drills, etc., must send their returns thereof, with list of men entitled to badges, to the Secretary by the 15th of January ensuing the year for which the claim is made.

For the 2 next highest in each Garrison Battery, 2 Badges.

Batteries armed with a special weapon will receive prizes at the same rate as that given per battery entering into competitions.

To the 2 best drivers in each Field Battery, 2 badges of cross whips.

RANGES.

The printed rules of the D. A. A. to be observed, umpires appointed, and scoring in accordance therewith. No claim for prizes will be received unless the conditions have been complied with. But in the case of Batteries competing for the Battery Prizes, where it is found impossible to place target bannerols, the directions on page 16 of the Rules may be applied.

The size of target to be 6 feet.

In the case of floating targets, 3 targets to be used, placed edge to edge so as always to present a face of 6 feet.

Officers commanding Batteries are requested to transmit to the Secretary and Treasurer of D. A. A., at their earliest convenience, the amounts of their subscriptions, to enable the prizes to be forwarded.

SHIFTING ORDNANCE COMPETITION.

ROYAL SCHOOLS OF GUNNERY

3. The operation to be performed by manhandling with ordinary stores, without the aid

UMPIRES REMARKS.

Lots were drawn by Nos. 1 of detachments, Capt. Drury, won and elected to commence. "B" Battery detachment was withdrawn out of sight of the scene of operations.

Both detachments followed the same general plan viz: parbuckling up the ramp. A shorter, but perhaps, less certain method was practicable, namely to take the gun up the steeper slope of the rampart. Pickets were furnished for holdfasts.

The respective times were :-

"A" Battery, R.S.G. 39 min. 0 sec. (no time added).

"B" Battery, R. S. G. 32 min. 30 sec. (including 10 sec. added).

The "B" Battery detachment was declared victorious.

Both detachments were deserving of the greatest praise for the manner in which the work was carried out. There were no hitches anywhere excepting an accident to Capt. Drury, almost at the commencement.—In checking the gun with his handspike whilst looking more at his men the gun overpowered him and he was thrown down his foot being caught between the skid and the handspike with the whole weight of the gun on it, not 20 seconds elapsed, however, before he was extricated and giving the word of command and though in great pain and unable to put his foot on the ground he superintended the shift to its conclusion, but was unable to give manual assistance, his place in this respect being taken by another number.—This amounted nearly to the loss of a man.

It appears to me that Capt. Drury's method of parbuckling was not so speedy as that of Major Short,

The latter officer placed a lever in the muzzle which was manned by 4 numbers and he took the gun up the ramp with the muzzle from the parapet, thus giving plenty of room to the muzzle numbers.

Capt. Drury let the point of the lever rest on the ground and gave the word "muzzle forward" from time to time. He took the muzzle towards the parapet so as to have it to the front when mounting by parbuckling up the side. No doubt he gained time here over Major Short who parbuckled the gun up the rear and then slewed it, but he lost more time owing to the interference of the parapet and other obstacles on that side with the lever.

Capt. Drury is deserving of special commendation for the particularly quick way in which he brought the long skid forward whilst parbuckling on the level, by resting the hinder skid on the gun which, as it revolved, carried it to the front.

I consider Major Short's method of mounting the gun the best that could have been adopted under the circumstances.



Oswald; and Capt. Stewart, Commanding Ottawa Field Battery be a committee to revise the rules of the Association and report to this Council at the next Annual Meeting. P. oposed by Lt. Col. Cotton, seconded by Lt. Col. Montizambert — That the prize list for Garrison Batteries be in the same proportion as last year "-Carried.

P.oposed by Lt.-Col. Montizambert, seconded by Lt. Col. Macdonald:—"That the Council lay before the Hon. the Minister of Militia the advisability of making an appropriation in this year's estimates for the purpose of forming small camps at Quebec and Toronto, after the annual training of batteries, bringing together the detachments of the different Batteries for practice and Shifting Ordance Competitions after the model of the National Artillery Association at Shoeburyness.

Proposed by Lt.-Col. Montizambert, seconded by Major Holmes:—" That range reports as submitted by Lt.-Col. Cotton, Assistant Inspector of Artillery, be adopted by this Association for competitive practice."—Carried.

Resolved "that the questions to be issued during the current year, by the Militia Department be adopted by this Association as the questions for the Efficiency Competitions."

With reference to the following letter received from the Governor General's Secretary, Col. De Winton, R.A., it was decided to accept 3 cups value \$25,00 each together with \$25.00 in money with each cup instead of the alternative.

His Excellency will give this year for competition to the Dominion Artillery Association 3 cups value \$25.00 each together with \$25.00 in money with each cup or a prize of \$50.00 in cash for each competition and it will be left to the Council of the Association to decide which they consider would be most acceptable.

The question of procuring ranges in suitable positions at which batteries might practice under similar conditions as regards length of range and position of target was suggested by me in a previous report. I feel certain that this would be a step in the right direction, and give more confidence in the system to those competing. The length of some of the ranges used at present is too much to short being such as a guaner would rarely, if ever be required to fire over. Some being less than the range of an ordinary Snider Enfield, one range I believe was scarcely 1000 yards long. The range at which Field Batteries are supposed to practice at present "where practicable not under 1300 yards," should I think be increased to not under 1600 and to 1800 yards if obtainable, as this is about the range at which they would, under ordinary circumstances, be required to pave the way for infantry fire.

This year only three batteries of Garrison Artillery attempted the Shifting Ordnance Competition, one falling out before completing the operation. Considering the prize offered, the number of batteries competing seems incredibly small, indeed it can scarcely be called a competition, when only two out of the batteries in the Dominion enter for it.

My remarks in annual report for 1880-81 will bear repeating :- "It is still a matter for regret that the Garrison Artillery do not enter this competition; there is no doubt it is attributable to the short time allowed for training, it being found impossible, during the time allowed to even touch on this absolutely necessary part of an Artilleryman's duties. Nothing but practice can qualify in this respect." The operations selected for the competitions are of the easiest description.

I have always been in doubt whether it was within the province of the Secretary to make these remarks, annually in submitting the reports. They, would doubtless be considered more worthy of attention by the authorities coming as a report from the Council instead of from the Secretary whose duty I suppose is only to record the work done and not to criticise.
