

Knabenshue is now 31 years old and is married and has four children, the oldest being nine years of age. Knabenshue since boyhood was devoted to balloons and built himself one when only 15 years of age. He was first engaged as a professional aeronaut by Profesor Baldwin, of California. Knabenshue never drinks nor smokes and says much of his success is due to his abstemious habits. He is slender, weighing only about 130 pounds. He flew over New York city in 1905 and created a national sensation, millions of people thronging the roofs and streets to watch the course of his airship.




